The first duty of the authorities is of course to restore order at the Sault, and show that even the just claims of the men cannot be enforced by violence. But there is much to be said for the opinion that the government of Ontario, or both governments, would have been justified in paying off the men, and taking the chance of repaying themselves. It may be said that bad precedent would be created by this action. But this is not an ordinary case of an employer being unable to pay wages. It is a great public calamity, affecting a whole community. An analogy may be found in the grants made by governments and municipalities in aid of a community visited by a great fire. A government does not make good the loss suffered by the burning of one house or shop, or a dozen. But when fire sweeps over a whole town or city, making thousands of people homeless, it is regarded as a public matter, and public aid is ed. Is not this a similar case?

This action should of course have been taken before any violence had been committed, for it would not do to set a premium on violence. But when once order is restored, it is doubtful whether it would not still be advisable for the government to advance the wages, at least as much as is necessary to relieve distress and restore confidence among the men, and even to take the chance of the province suffering loss. There are very few citizens who would object to bearing a trifling share of the burden that would be thus created.


LOST LIFE DUCK SHOOTING. Bruce Gordon Fourth Victim of



MUNICIPAL MATTERS.

When the first fall frosts begin to nip the vines and maple leaves, the ronto alderman is prone to bethink him of being more wary of his words and votes in Council and committee than was his wont in the earlier months of the year. Press and public are taking closer interest in him. Ratepayers are allowing their minds to revert to their tax bills. They generally do when the coal order for the winter comes under considera tion. In the good old summer time any half reasonable excuse from a commit tee or the Board of Control will satisfy Council about an extra item of expenditure if the law but allows it In the cool and lengthening evenings of late September, however, the alderman grows quite conservative. He likes to have (whatever raises of salary he promised to support forgotten by that time. His thoughts abide with his constituents and he prefers to talk about parks for them rather than anything else you could possibly suggest.

There is an uneasy feeling around the Hall concerning the pretty big salary stipulated for the new City Architect, Robert McCallum. It is consilered rather late in the year to have the ratepayer's mind encumbered by details of either new or increased salaries. 
