

HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

ANNUAL REPORT.

The Managers of the House of Industry, when presenting their Report for 1877, took occasion to characterise that year as exceptional, with regard to the strain upon their resources ; the same remark was applied with greater force to the year 1878,—and the year just closed, showing, as it does, a continued increase in the applications for relief, brings them, it is hoped, to the culminating point.

The subdivision of the visiting districts of the city, has no doubt contributed to this increased demand for relief. The new visitors have generally shewn themselves very efficient, and under the system now in operation, it is scarcely possible that a deserving case of distress can be overlooked.

It must however be borne in mind that the available means of the House have not been augmented in proportion to the demands made upon them. The Managers have endeavoured to meet those demands ; but during the past year they were forced to seek bank accommodation to enable them to do so, and at the commencement of the present season the funds at their disposal were less by some \$1,200 or \$1,500 than those of the corresponding period last year. They were at one time apprehensive that the stringency of the times would compel them to discontinue all out-door relief, and limit

their work exclusively to inmates of the Institution. In view of this state of affairs, the collector, Mr. Thomas Armstrong, commenced his rounds earlier than usual, and the Managers are happy to state that the success of his appeal thus far, encourages them to hope that the public, when duly informed of the difficulties to be overcome, will, with their usual liberality, kindly furnish the necessary supplies.

It is advisable that the operations of the House be conducted with prudence. The Managers should not, therefore, be expected to anticipate their income, or incur liabilities on their own responsibility; but any funds entrusted to their care will be disbursed with the utmost economy, they may say liberality, should contributions warrant such action. They confidently appeal to their past, as a guarantee for their future conduct.

For details of the last season's work, the Managers refer to the accompanying Reports from the Treasurer, Medical Officer, and Superintendent.

Successive Reports from the House have drawn attention to the fact that country municipalities are accustomed to send their poor to Toronto, to be maintained during the winter months. The Managers merely wish to express their regret that no Legislative action has been taken to check a practice which to them seems both reprehensible and unjust.

Again, the Managers may be permitted to ask, what should be done when parents, undeserving of relief, are nevertheless in charge of families of small children? Cases of this nature occur but too frequently. In such circumstances the position of the visitor is embarrassing; if he grant assistance, it will almost certainly be misapplied; if he withhold it, the children will suffer. The Managers have no power to remove children from such contaminating influences. It may not be expe-

dient that they should have such a power ; but attention is drawn to the difficulty, in the hope that time or experience may suggest an available remedy.

The Managers record with deep regret, the death, during the last year, of three very efficient members of their Board : The late Rev. Dr. Green, Mr. Ex-Alderman Downey, and the Rev. Dr. Topp. The Rev. Dr. Green was one of the pioneer members of the Board, and for several years its Chairman ; he took an unvarying interest in the management, and attended the meetings with exemplary punctuality, till failing health forced him to withdraw. Mr. Thomas Downey, during the few years of his connection with the House, was regular in his attendance, and always ready to perform with cheerfulness and alacrity, whatever duties might be allotted to him. The Rev. Dr. Topp was formerly Vice-Chairman : his opinions, never obtrusive, were the result of mature experience, and as such, were always received with much deference. He was a most valuable associate ; and his death, while on an errand of kindness, was worthy of a Christian minister.

The Managers cannot close this Report without acknowledging the continued and very efficient services of the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Duckett.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR 1879.

The Medical Officer has no unusual amount of sickness to report, and nothing has happened to disturb the even tenor of the medical service. Several fractures have occurred among the inmates from falls, and the usual number of acute and chronic diseases have called for treatment; but, with one exception, all the deaths have resulted from old age simply, or chronic disease of long standing, and although one man was only 23 at the time of his death from chronic Bright's disease, yet the combined ages of the 13 who have died gives an average of 69 years for each, thus: 1 died at 23, 1 at 56, 1 at 61, 1 at 65, 1 at 67, 1 at 72, 1 at 74, 1 at 75, 1 at 76, 2 at 78, and 1 at 86 years of age.
