

FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING.

For the second time in its history, the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions gathered in Calvary Church, Montreal, to hold its Annual Meeting. Forty officers and delegates were present, but owing to the rainy weather, the attendance of friends was smaller than in former years. We had also to regret the illness of three officers, Mrs. Wood, Mrs. Burton and Mrs Cowan, who were unable to attend. The marked interest among the young ladies, the presence of four who expect to give their lives to foreign work and of two who have been engaged in it for years, were noticeable features of the occasion. The "Missionary Needles," with their suggestive badges, and the "Faithful Workers" were constant in attendance and helpful at all the sessions. Delegates and friends were entertained at lunch each day and at an informal tea in the afternoon.

FIRST DAY.

The devotional meeting was led by Mrs. Sanderson, of Danville, who based her remarks on Matthew V. The President, Mrs. Macallum, opened the Business Session. Miss Rawlings, Forest, was appointed Minute Secretary, and Mrs. Strathern, Toronto, Acting Treasurer.

Mrs. C. T. Williams read the following notice of motion: "In accordance with the provision in Article VII. of the Constitution of the C. C. W. B. M., requiring one day's notice to be given in writing in order to amend the Constitution at any Annual Meeting, I hereby give such notice with reference to Articles V. and VI. The proposed amendment to Article V. adds to the present Article the words 'and its officers shall be ex-officio members of the General Board.' The proposed amendment to Article VI. makes the present Article 'Section A' and adds another Section to be called 'Section B,' and to read as follows: 'Any association of young people banded together to aid the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions may be auxiliary to the General Board by paying to the general fund at least five dollars (\$5.00) annually. Each Mission Band shall be entitled to send one delegate to the Annual Meeting of the Board, and is desired to select an appropriate name and to report the same to the Society to which its money is sent.' It is also proposed to make a

few verbal changes in the optional Constitutions for Auxiliaries and Mission Bands that the different constitutions may harmonize."

The following Committees were appointed:—On Nominations: Mrs. Brown, Mrs. Roberts, Mrs. Hurd, Mrs. Solandt, Miss Scott; On Business: Miss Dougall, Mrs. Williams, Mrs. Sanderson, Mrs. Jarvis, Miss Wood; On Resolutions; Mrs. Strathern, Mrs. Sanderson, Mrs. McDonald; On the Press: Miss C. Richardson.

The combined reports of the Superintendents of Literature were read by Mrs. Williams. Miss James gave a report of the Committee appointed to receive and ship to Africa the articles given by Eastern Ontario and Quebec. Reports were given by Miss Clarke, of Guelph Branch; Mrs. Brown, of Sherbrooke Branch; and the Corresponding Secretary, of Toronto and Ottawa Branches.

Miss Porter, for a number of years a missionary in North China, was introduced and heartily received. The meeting was adjourned for lunch.

The afternoon Session opened at 2 p.m., Mrs. Macallum in the chair. The President delivered her annual address, after which Miss R. James, in the name of the Montreal friends, extended a cordial welcome to the delegates. In the absence of Mrs. Wood, of Ottawa, her daughter, Mrs. S. J. Jarvis, read the reply.

Mrs. Watkins, a Canadian, for several years connected with the American Methodist Mission in Mexico, Miss Clarke, our new missionary under appointment to Africa, and Miss McCord, Secretary of the Montreal Diocesan Women's Missionary Society, were introduced and spoke briefly. Letters of greeting from Miss Lyman, Bombay, the Women's Missionary Association of Queen's County, N.S., and the Baptist Women's Foreign Missionary Society of Eastern Ontario and Quebec, were read by Miss Scott, of Toronto. Mrs. J. Wade, of St. John, N.B., brought the greetings of the Ladies' Home Missionary Society of the Maritime Provinces, and gave an explanation of its work and its relation to the Canada Congregational Missionary Society. Mrs. Greene represented the Canadian Woman's Board of Missions; Mrs. Ross, the Methodist Women's Missionary Society; Mrs. Grier, the Presbyterian Women's Missionary Society; Miss Porter, the Woman's Board of the Interior; and Mrs. Watkins, the Mexican Missionary Society.

Mrs. Watkins and Miss Porter were made members of the Convention. The reports of the Home, Foreign and Corresponding Secretaries and the Treasurer were read and adopted.

Mrs. Sanderson, Danville, gave notice of motion to amend Article I. of the Constitution to make it read: "This Society shall be called the Canada Congregational Woman's Board of Missions, and shall be auxiliary to the Canada Congregational Missionary Society and the Canada Congregational Foreign Missionary Society." The motion also asked for representation on the Board of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society.

Miss Scott, Toronto, gave notice of motion to amend the Constitution, that in Article IV. after word President shall be inserted the words "A Vice-President at Large," and that the Presidents of Branches be ex-officio Vice-Presidents.

A paper, "Rum and Missions," written by Mrs. Franklin, of Listowel, was read by Mrs. Sanderson. Meeting closed with the Doxology.

YOUNG LADIES' HOUR.

Miss C. Richardson presided at the evening meeting. After the opening hymn and prayer, Miss Wilkes tendered the greeting of Emmanuel Church Young Ladies' Missionary Society. Miss M. E. Macallum gave the greeting of Kingston Women's Medical College and delivered a short address on "Medical Missions." "There is a green hill far away" was very sweetly sung by Miss McPherson, of Montreal. Miss Carter, Cowansville, read a carefully prepared paper on the "Needs of Africa," Miss Möeser, Montreal, following with "What has been done for Africa." Miss Clarke spoke earnestly to the young people on having an aim in life. Miss McPherson kindly sang another solo. A practical paper, "What girls and young women can do," was read by Miss Cochrane, and Miss Porter, in her address, emphasized the work which young women can do in influencing the minds of the younger girls. Meeting closed with singing, Mr. Craik pronouncing the benediction.

SECOND DAY.

The devotional meeting, one of great power and deep feeling, was led by Miss Porter, whose remarks were based on Psalm exxi.

At the Business Session verbal reports of the following Societies were given: Brigham Auxiliary and Mission Band by Mrs. Solandt; Warwick Auxiliary and Forest Auxiliary and Mission Band by Miss Rawlings. Written reports were presented from Calvary Church Auxiliary by Mrs. McLachlan; Zion Church Auxiliary, Montreal, by Miss Van Buren; Man-

chester, Yarmouth and Wingham Auxiliaries and Paris Young Ladies' Society by the Corresponding Secretary.

The roll was called and the minutes of previous Session read and accepted.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was considered in detail as follows:—

Mrs. William's motion to amend Articles V. and VI. of the Constitution was seconded by Miss Dougall, discussed and carried.

Miss Scott's motion to amend Article IV. was seconded by Mrs. Hurd and carried after some discussion.

Mrs. Sanderson's motion to amend Article I., seconded by Mrs. Hurd, caused a prolonged discussion. The motion was lost.

Mrs. Williams moved, seconded by Mrs. Brown, that the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands connected with the Board be requested to hold some form of thanksgiving service during Thanksgiving Week, when a thank-offering shall be taken, the amount received to be appropriated to the debt of the C. C. M. S. Carried. This motion expressed the feeling of many who deplore the state of the Home Missionary Society's treasury, and wish to put forth special effort on its behalf.

Moved by Mrs. Jarvis, seconded by Mrs. Munro, that we continue Miss Lyman's support. The representatives of the Woman's Board, who met by invitation with the Committee of the Foreign Missionary Society, were asked to report at this juncture. In reply, Mrs. Williams said that the Foreign Missionary Society recommended that we continue Miss Lyman's support and do what we can for Miss Clarke. Miss Dougall read a letter from Rev. E. M. Hill in support of this recommendation. The motion was carried.

Moved by Mrs. Williams, seconded by Miss Wood, that the balance in hand at the disposal of the Board be divided equally between Home and Foreign Missions.

Moved in amendment by Mrs. Sanderson, seconded by Mrs. Wilkes, that the balance in hand be donated to the C. C. M. S. to supplement the grants made the home missionary pastors, relieving as far as possible the C. C. M. S. from the painful necessity of reducing said grants 25 percent. As the hour for adjournment had arrived, a motion to that effect was carried and the meeting closed.

The question of disposal of money was again brought up at the afternoon Session. Mrs. Williams asked and obtained permission to change

the terms of her motion, so as to divide equally between home and foreign missions the even hundreds of the sum at the disposal of the Board, leaving the remainder in the treasury. Mrs. Williams stated that the increase in funds was due in part to the strong desire of some to undertake Miss Clarke's support, as expressed at last Annual Meeting. After full discussion, the motion was carried.

Moved by Miss C. Richardson, seconded by Mrs. Quinn, that we assume Miss Clarke's support. Carried.

It was decided to renew the grant of \$25.00 to the Department of Literature; to print and distribute free 2,000 copies of the Annual Report; to appoint Mrs. Macallum and Miss Wood, Compiling Committee, and Mrs. R. W. McLachlan, Printing Committee.

The greeting of the Theo Dora Society of McGill College, presented by Miss Williams, and a solo by Miss Lamb, made a pleasant break in the routine of business.

The report of the Nominating Committee was then considered. In the course of the discussion it appeared necessary to reconsider the motion to change Article IV. of the Constitution, as many were unwilling to drop from the list of Vice-Presidents the names of old and valued friends of missions. A motion to reconsider was passed; Miss Scott, with the consent of the seconder, remodelled the motion so as to include both Vice-Presidents and ex-officio Vice-Presidents, who shall consist of Presidents of Branches; the vote was taken and motion carried.

Moved by Mrs. McGarry, seconded by Mrs. Brown, that the headquarters of the Literature Department be in Toronto, with Miss Ashdown as Superintendent, and that an assistant be appointed. Carried.

The officers were then elected as follows: President, Mrs. Macallum; Vice-President at Large, Mrs. Burton; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Wilkes, Mrs. Wood, Mrs. Boult, Miss Dougall, Mrs. J. D. Nasmith, Mrs. (Dr.) Richardson; Corresponding Secretary, Miss Wood; Home Secretary, Miss Northey; Foreign Secretary, Mrs. Cowan; Treasurer, Mrs. Williams; Superintendent of Literature, Miss Ashdown; Assistant, Miss C. Richardson; Superintendents of Organization, Miss Rawlings, Mrs. Sanderson; Superintendent of Letters, Miss L. N. Currie. We regret that Mrs. Burton has been obliged to refuse office on account of ill health.

Mrs. Jarvis read an excellent paper on "Home Missions." A telegram, "Greetings with thanks. Gal. VI. 9," was received from the Home Missionary Society in session at Kingston. In reply, "Deut. I. 11," was sent.

The Resolutions Committee next reported. Resolutions I., II. and III., expressed gratitude to God for past success, for two new mission-aries, Mr. Lee and Miss Clarke, and for four life members; IV., regret for the pecuniary embarrassments of the Home Missionary Society and hope that the Woman's Board will help to relieve it; V., the desire that all Auxiliaries report work done and monies collected to the Branch, or to the Board where Branch is unorganized; VI., thanks to Mrs. Watkins and Miss Porter for their assistance; VII., thanks to the pastor and officers of the church and to the ladies of the Reception and Refreshment Committees. On motion of Mrs. Roberts, seconded by Mrs. Thomas, the report was accepted.

A "Symposium on Methods of Work," written by Miss Patton of Paris, was read by Miss Rawlings.

The President and Corresponding Secretary were appointed a Committee to receive invitations for the next Annual Meeting.

The Question Box, conducted by Mrs. Williams, called forth a number of opinions on practical questions.

The ballot for a motto showed a majority in favor of "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it." John II., 5.

Mrs. Strathern moved, seconded by Mrs. Roberts, that the vote be unanimous in favor of this motto. Carried.

Our motto was sent in reply to a telegram, "Greetings. Acts XVI., 9, 10," received from the Foreign Missionary Society, then meeting in Kingston.

In closing the meeting, the President read the Lord's command to Moses, "Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward. Deut. XIV., 15.

EVENING MEETING.

The evening meeting was presided over by Mr. C. T. Williams, and addressed by Miss Porter and Mrs. Watkins. A pleasing incident was the short service in recognition of Miss Clarke as our own missionary. The choir and some of the gentlemen sang several times during the evening.

MEMORANDUM.

After the Annual Meeting, in accordance with the request of the Treasurer, the Sub-Executive decided that, in future, no bills should be paid except upon an order signed by both President and Corresponding Secretary.

OFFICIAL REPORTS (Condensed.)

From the Report of the Corresponding Secretary we quote:-

During the year, the Listowel Branch, embracing the churches at Listowel, Kincardine, Turnbury, Wingham, Wiarton and Stratford, was organized. This Branch recommends the work of the Home Missionary Society to its Auxiliaries.

Four Auxiliaries, viz.: Zion Church, Montreal; Yarmouth, N.S.; Zion Church, Warwick, Ont.; Wingham, Ont.; and two Mission Bands, Danville and Brigham, have been added to our number. Two Mission Bands in Toronto Branch have become Young Women's Auxiliaries. Reports have been received from 18 Auxiliaries, 5 Young Women's Auxiliaries and 11 Mission Bands in Ontario; 11 Auxiliaries, 2 Young Women's Auxiliaries and 7 Mission Bands in Quebec; 1 Auxiliary in Manitoba and 2 in Nova Scotia; making in all, 32 Auxiliaries, 7 Young Women's Auxiliaries and 18 Mission Bands, 57 Societies in all. Your Secretary has reason to suppose that several Auxiliaries have failed to report.

In August, a letter was received saying that a Mission Band in Toronto Branch wished to send scrap books, etc., to some foreign mission. It was suggested that the Mission Bands of Toronto Branch unite in sending a box to India or Africa. At its quarterly meeting Toronto Branch decided to send a box or boxes to Africa; Ottawa Branch at its annual meeting resolved to join in the work. It was then thought advisable to invite all Auxiliaries to contribute; Mrs. (Dr.) Richardson was appointed receiver of goods for Toronto and the West, Miss R. James for Eastern Ontario and Quebec; and a notice was inserted in several numbers of the Canadian Independent. The response was so unexpected that the "African Box" assumed surprising proportions, and several boxes of garments and other articles are now on their way to West Central Africa.

MRS. COWAN, Foreign Secretary, writes :-

"We think the results justify the decision of the Board to sustain Miss Lyman during the year now closed. From her monthly letters, many of you have learned of her growing interest in her work. For these, our earnest thanks are due, for as she says "the work has now become so engrossing that I sometimes almost forget my appointed time for writing you." But she never quite forgets it. The first letter received after the last annual meeting contained the following touching acknowledgment of the resolution of sympathy and confidence you voted her at that time.

"I was very glad to learn that my connexion with the C. C. W. B. M. will remain unbroken another year, and I wish to thank the ladies for this fresh assurance of their loving sympathy and confidence. It was very precious, and the knowledge that so many prayers are being offered for the dear work the Master has given me to do and for my own soul, has cheered me in moments when inclined to yield to despondency."

That she has made good progress in the use of the language is evident from the fact that she is employed in carrying the Gospel into the homes and teaching the women there. She adds "I am encouraged by being

told they understand me well when I read or speak to them."

In addition to that she has taught an hour every morning in the Girls' School at Parel, twice a week in a family where the girls were considered too old to attend school and twice a week visited a Mahommedan family and taught some of the children, who were not allowed to enter a Christian school.

In December, she wrote that the work was growing very rapidly and spreading in all directions, and that she had been urgently importuned to open another school in a neighboring village. The inability to respond to these pathetic appeals, she says, is one of the keenest trials of the missionaries.

In visiting the homes, she finds many women who have given their hearts to God, but dare not confess it openly, as it would involve the loss of all things and separation from their children, whom they are trying to train for Christ. One of the women said to her "we believe the time will soon come in India, when there will be no need of secrecy, and then there will be many hundreds of women, all about us, who will ask to be baptized, and what a day of rejoicing that will be."

At the last Annual Meeting it was expected that Miss M. Clarke, of Guelph, a young lady well known and much beloved in several of our churches, had offered herself for the work in Africa, but as she had not then received her appointment by the American Board, no definite action could be taken by this Board.

With very great pleasure your Secretary now reports that Miss Clarke has been appointed to labor in West Central Africa, and expects to sail early in July. In January, she attended the Annual Meeting of the W. B. M. in Boston, and with another missionary lady elect addressed the meeting. One present wrote of it "their earnest words touched every heart present."

In a recent letter from her she writes: "I am more and more glad and thankful every day that I ever thought of mission work, and especially glad that I gave myself to God for Africa. Pray for me that complete preparation of heart and mind be given me."

MISS NORTHEY, Home Secretary, reports :-

"Your Secretary has to report the writing of 32 letters during the year requesting some news of our mission churches. In response to these the churches of Brandon, Alton, Barrie, N. E. Margaree, Watford, Wingham and Listowel, kindly gave us the information required, which was duly sent through the Department of Letters to the Auxiliaries of the Board.

"In submitting this Report, your Secretary regrets the small number who have responded."

REPORT FROM MISSIONARY LETTER DEPARTMENT.

The advisability of some special object for home mission work for the coming year was recommended by the Executive in June last, and a circular to that effect was prepared by the President, which was copied and sent out to the different Auxiliaries in October. In November and December, letters were received from Miss Lyman and Mr. Currie, which were copied and forwarded. In January, extracts from a number of Home letters. During the following months, February, March and April, news from the African field and from India was supplied. Sometimes the letters were lengthy, which necessitated their being sent separately, but as far as possible they were sent together.

The number of names at present on the list to whom copies have been sent is 44, which is an increase of 14 on last year.

In December, Mrs. Saer, President of the Woman's Missionary Society, of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, wrote asking if it would be possible to have missionary letters sent to the different branches of their Society. At the same time she expressed her willingness to defray any expenses in the way of postage, etc., that would be incurred. With this consideration I undertook to supply the extra copies needed, and in this way, 90 letters have been circulated through Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, free of any expense to the Woman's Board.

It is not clearly understood by all of our own Auxiliaries that those receiving letters are not expected to provide postage for the same.

Recently there has been sent to me 25 cents in stamps from one and 20 cents in money from another. I mention this so that there may be a proper understanding concerning it for the coming year.

The expenses connected with the distribution, towards which \$5.00 was granted by the Board, have been: Postage, \$3.81; Envelopes, 40 cents; Post Cards, 5 cents; Ink and Oil, 70 cents; Total, \$4.96.

A letter has just been received of Miss Lyman's, which will be prepared for distribution immediately.

It has been a source of pleasure to have received word from time to time expressive of the gratification felt by the recipients of the letters. They have not been at all times just as satisfactorily printed as I would wish, but some little practice and experience is needed to use the instrument so as to obtain the best possible results.

"In September, 1889, I visited Zion Church, Warwick, and organized a Woman's Auxiliary, known as the Zion Congregational Woman's Auxiliary, Warwick. I also wrote to a number of our Western churches and sent reports, but no work was done. I visited the pastors of two churches, who hoped to do something for us in future."

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
