PARSNIP WINE.

Wine made of parsnip-root approaches nearer to the Malmsey of Madeira and the Canaries than any other wine; it is made with little expense or trouble, and only requires to be kept a few years to make it as agreeable to the palate as it is wholesome to the body. To every 4lbs of parsnips, clean and quartered, put one gallon of water; boil them till they are quite tender; drain them through a seive, but do not bruise them, as no remedy would clear them afterwards. Pour the liquor into a tub, and to each gallon add 3lbs of loaf sugar, and half an ounce of crude tartar. When cooled to the temperature of seventy-five degrees, put in a little new yeast; let it stand four days in a warm room, then turn it. The mixture should, if possible, be fermented in a temperature of sixty degrees. September and March are the best seasons for making the wine.
