That the object of the Bible Society, namely, the circulation among all the families of the earth of the pure Word of God, is one which should draw forth the sympathy of Christians generally; and that we rejoice to see such sympathy increasingly manifested by the religious community of this Province, and especially by the Branch Bible Societies throughout the country.

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LAWS AND REGULATIONS  
OF THE  
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

AS ADOPTED AT A GENERAL MEETING OF THE SOCIETY, HELD IN THE CITY OF  
TORONTO, ON THE THIRD DAY OF AUGUST, 1855.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be denominated the “UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,” having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society, that is—the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II.—This Society shall endeavour to unite all the different Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III.—This Society shall maintain in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all the Bible Societies in connection with it, shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a board of Directors, consisting of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, together with twenty lay members; fifteen of whom, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election each year; five of whom to form a quorum. All ministers of the Gospel, who are members of the Society, shall be entitled to a seat, and to vote with the Directors.

V.—The President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and Agents, of all Bible Societies in connection therewith, shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

VI.—At the meeting of the Directors, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list, then present, and in the absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII.—Each person paying annually, one dollar, shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying twenty dollars, at any one time either to this Society, or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society; or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII.—That each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a Certificate of Membership, under the Corporate Seal of the Company,

duly signed by the President and Secretaries for the time being, and shall be allowed to receive from the Depositary annually, for distribution, Bibles and Testaments to the value of one dollar.

IX.—That the Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendance and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and the control of its general affairs, and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the act of Incorporation.

X.—The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business once in each quarter, and at any other time when called together by the Secretary, or any three of the Directors.

XI.—A general meeting of the Society shall be held in the month of May, in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interest of the Society; when the officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the proceedings for the foregoing year presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts, duly audited.

XII.—In the Annual Report of the Society, the efforts of the several Societies in connection with it, shall be distinctly mentioned, as respects the circulation of the Scriptures, and the contribution to the funds: together with such other matter connected with them as may be generally interesting.

XIII.—That the general Meeting of the Society shall be opened by reading a portion of the Sacred Scriptures, and with prayer.

XIV.—That no alteration in this Constitution shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the same has been given to the Board.

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## RULES

### RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

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I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the English copies being of the authorized version *only*.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE———BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries and a Committee consisting of not less than —— other members; five to constitute a *quorum*.

V. That all ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned Members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly, or oftener; the time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint two of their own members for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses, to the purchase of Bibles and Testaments from the Upper Canada Bible Society, to supply this neighbourhood; (which copies of the Scriptures the Committee are to sell to members at a reduced price, to others at cost; and to give, *gratis*, to those they know cannot purchase;) and that the overplus be remitted, half-yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and supplying other nations, through the Parent institution, with the pure Word of God.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the —— day of —— in each year at ——, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee, if required.

X. That the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

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## LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

## BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

I. The designation of the Society shall be the BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY, of which the sole object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment: the one copies in the languages of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society shall be the authorized version.

II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British dominions; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries whether Christian, Mahometan, or Pagan.

III. Each Subscriber of one guinea annually shall be a member.

IV. Each Subscriber of ten guineas at one time shall be a member for life.

V. Each Subscriber of five guineas annually shall be a Governor.

VI. Each Subscriber of fifty pounds at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to fifty pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.

VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of fifty pounds, shall be a member for life; or of one hundred pounds, a Governor for life.

IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six Laymen, six of whom shall be Foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

The Committee shall appoint all Officers, except the Treasurer, and call Special General-Meetings; and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.

X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.

XI. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the Accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year reported.

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XII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every Clergyman or dissenting Minister, who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the General Meetings, and Meetings of the Committee, the President,—or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, then present, and in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer; and in his absence, such member as shall be voted for that purpose; shall preside at the Meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Monday in every month, or oftener, if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either MEMBERS FOR LIFE, or GOVERNORS FOR LIFE.

XVIII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating HONORARY MEMBERS from among Foreigners, who have promoted the objects of this Society.

XIX. The whole of the Minutes of every General Meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.

## REGULATIONS

*Adopted at the Annual General Meetings of the Society in 1826 and 1827.*

I. That the Fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the preceeding resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, shall be made to any Society, the books be issued bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of the Scriptures to Societies which circulate the Apocrypha be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition, and that the proceeds of the sales of any such copies of the Scriptures be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

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## TWENTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

# UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

In meeting their constituents and friends at another anniversary, the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society feel that they have abundant cause of thanksgiving to the Father of Mercies. Death has made no breach in the ranks of the Directors, or of the Agents of the Society. They have severally been enabled to go on in the discharge of duty, under the gracious protection of Him, in whose hands our breath is, and whose are all our ways. Our province also has been enjoying manifold blessings during the past year. Abundance crowned the labours of the husbandman, and the tide of prosperity may be regarded as having again set in on our land. While in Europe the dark war cloud seems to be hovering over the nations, and on this continent it has burst in its most lamentable form, threatening to spread slaughter and desolation amongst brothers, we are privileged to dwell in peace and quietness with none to make us afraid. It becometh us to be deeply grateful to God for his abounding goodness. He it is, who maketh us to dwell in safety. Let us take heed that we give not way to presumption and carnal security, but let us seek, under a feeling of our obligations to our God and Saviour, to engage in His work with greater earnestness and diligence than ever.

We proceed at once to give some details of our work and its results during the past year.

### RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE.

We are glad to report an encouraging increase in the receipts for the past year, the amount of such increase being \$1,529. Had all the Branches remitted their funds in time, the increase would have been very considerably greater. But it is found to be necessary promptly to close the Books at the end of the financial year. A considerable amount has been received since the Books were closed, which, however, must be entered in the accounts of next year.

AGENCY.

During the year the Agents have been labouring with their accustomed fidelity and diligence. It can easily be believed that during the past winter, marked as it was by many and most severe snow storms, their difficulties were very great in making their way from one Branch to another. With very few exceptions, however, they were enabled to meet all their appointments, although this required much perseverance and self denial. During part of the winter months, by an arrangement sanctioned by the Directors, Mr. Taylor, the senior Agent had his place supplied by a substitute, the Rev. Mr. Kennedy, while he was engaged, in response to calls addressed to him, in delivering a series of Lectures on Palestine, Egypt and the other localities lately visited by him. It is with very deep regret that the Directors have to announce that Mr. Taylor has felt it to be his duty to tender his resignation, for a time at least, of the Office of Agent, that he may be enabled to respond to the numerous invitations still addressed to him, to deliver Lectures on the

Lands of the Bible in other localities. His resignation was so strongly pressed by Mr. Taylor, that the Directors had no alternative but to accept it, at least in the meantime. They did this however with great reluctance, and at the same time not without a strong hope, which Mr. Taylor encourages them to entertain, that ere long Mr. Taylor may again be found as an Agent of the Upper Canada Bible Society.

The Directors feel that it is only due to Mr. Taylor to express here their very high sense of the value of his services in connection with the Bible Society. His powers of body and mind, his untiring energy, his powerful eloquence have been freely consecrated to the Bible cause. And the present high position which the Bible Society occupies in Canada West may be in no inconsiderable degree traced to his effective agency. As a body, and as individuals the Directors tender to Mr. Taylor their warmest thanks and their best wishes for his future happiness and usefulness, while at the same time, they hope they may again soon see him in his former position.

Mr. Johnston and Mr. Ball have been engaged, the one in the East, and the other in the more Western part of the Province, in the successful prosecution of their work. The following is a brief synopsis of the labours of the several Agents :—

Mr. Taylor has, during the year, travelled upwards of 2,000 miles; made 84 visits; formed 6 new Branches, and re-organized 3 that had become defunct, and received upwards of \$3,700 on behalf of the Society.

Mr. Ball has visited 76 old Branches and established 8 new Branches, leaving at the present time 13 to be visited. He has travelled about 2,000 miles, and received on account of the Society \$3,259.

Family affliction somewhat abridged Mr. Ball's labours in the winter.

Mr. Johnson has visited 90 Branches, but in consequence of the state of the roads, about ten stations required a second visit. He has formed 4 new Branches, and received for the Society, \$3,743.

In consequence of the resignation of Mr. Taylor, large additional work will fall on Messrs. Ball and Johnston, but they will, in the meantime, endeavour, in dependence on the blessing and help of God, to undertake the responsibility, so far as practicable. It is their wish, as it is the desire of the Directors, that there should be no expenditure of Funds beyond what is absolutely necessary. In connection with this it may be remarked that after full consideration, the Directors regard a system of Agency as essential, not merely to the extension of the work, but even to its continuance. Experience proves that most Branches, unless visited by an Agent from time to time, become less zealous and energetic, and it is believed that many would cease to exist, were they not stimulated by the visit, however short, of an active and devoted agent. The Directors therefore regard the employment of Agents, in the present state of things, as a necessity, and they believe that the amount expended in the support of the Agents, brings in a good return in the form of contributions and donations for the general work of Scripture dissemination throughout the world, and in the interest excited in the cause of the Bible, and the advancement of the work of God.

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## COLPORTAGE.

During the year the three Colporteurs who have been in the employment of the Society for a considerable time, have been pursuing their useful labours. Their monthly reports are interesting and encouraging. We subjoin an abstract of the result of their labours.

Mr. Strain has laboured chiefly in the Counties of Grey and Wellington. Mr. Dunn has principally laboured in the Counties of Lambton and Huron.

Mr. Large has laboured for eight months in the Counties of Ontario and Durham. During the remainder of the time he was employed in collecting the subscriptions in the City, and in visiting the Lunatic Asylum, Queen Street and Queen's Park, the General Hospital, House of Industry, the Police Stations, the Railway Stations and the Boy's Home, supplying these Institutions with 134 Copies of the Scripture.

The Directors have not thought it expedient to employ additional Colporteurs. But they have assisted in the support of one who is employed in a very interesting field in connexion with the Williams' Branch. A large proportion of the population in the field referred to consists of Roman Catholics from the Western Islands of Scotland. The Colporteur employed, Mr. Finlayson, appears to be a man well qualified for his work. He has visited a large number of Roman Catholics, and has disseminated a number of Copies of the inspired Volume, which, we trust, may produce important spiritual results. Mr. Finlayson avails himself of opportunities of conversing with the people, and his Reports mention some interesting and encouraging incidents.

In another field, beyond our own bounds, the Directors have felt it a duty and privilege to extend aid for the support of a Colporteur; we refer to the Lumbermen engaged on the Ottawa. Many of these are French Canadians, and as a Class they have been too much neglected in regard to spiritual privileges. Spending the winter in the deep recesses of the forest, and the greater part of the summer in conveying their timber in rafts to Quebec, it is to be feared that they have but few to care for their souls. The Directors have granted to the Ottawa Society the sum of \$400, for the support of a Colporteur. It is to be hoped that a suitable labourer may be soon found for this most interesting field.

## VISIT OF THE PRINCE OF WALES.

In reviewing the events of the past year, the Directors have pleasure in referring to the visit to these provinces of the Prince of Wales, as representative of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen. The Directors had the honor of presenting an address to His Royal Highness during his stay at Government House in this City. To this address a suitable reply was returned by the Prince.

The address and reply are subjoined :



It is pleasing to find the Queen countenancing the operations of the Bible Society, and to find the Heir Apparent, no doubt, in imitation of Her example, also giving countenance and encouragement to the same great and glorious cause.

We proceed, in accordance with our usual custom, to give some notices of kindred Societies and Associations.

#### MONTREAL.

The Montreal Auxiliary has now 140 Branches, for the most part in a lively and efficient state. The issues of the Society for the year 1860 were 5,024 Bibles and 7,792 Testaments; total 12,816 copies, being an increase over the circulation of the preceding year of 1,300 copies. Of this number there were issued gratuitously, 989 Testaments and 1,107 Bibles, total 2,096, amounting in value to \$652. The receipts from all sources amounted to \$9,964 99, including the sum of \$724 44 from our own Auxiliary, being the contributions of various Branches for Colportage among the French Canadians. The work of Colportage has been carried on to a considerable extent, six Colporteurs having been employed, two during the whole year, and the rest for periods varying from three to nine and a half months. Several of the Colporteurs were French Canadians, whose object was to circulate the Scriptures among their fellow countrymen.

#### KINGSTON.

The last report of the Kingston Auxiliary presents some encouraging results. The work of Colportage has been carried on with diligence, and success, the Colporteur, Mr. Denoon, having travelled through the greater part of their field. The report refers to a convention held in Kingston in the month of December, at which two representatives from this Society were present, for the consideration of various matters connected with the operations of the Bible Societies. Although no very important results were come to, the Meeting was pleasant and we trust profitable.

#### OTTAWA.

The Ottawa Auxiliary has been pursuing its course with vigor and success. We have elsewhere referred to a grant of \$400 voted by the Directors of this Society, for the support of a Colporteur to labor among the lumbermen on the Ottawa. We earnestly hope that a suitable Agent may soon be found.

#### QUEBEC.

We are glad to learn that the circulation of French Scriptures during the past year has more than quadrupled that of the previous year, more than 800 Copies having been circulated through various channels. A spirit of enquiry has been excited, which we trust, will issue in permanent and spiritual good to many.

### THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The last report of the American Bible Society which we have seen, viz. that for 1859, presented several very encouraging features. The receipts amounted nearly to \$436,000 00, being an increase of upwards of \$20,000. There was a large increase also in the issues. We fear that the civil conflicts which have been agitating the country must have exerted an injurious effect on the operations of the Bible Society as of other religious and benevolent Societies. Let us pray that our neighbors may soon have peace within their borders, and that God may overrule present troubles for the overthrow of oppression and bondage, and for the advancement of the cause of liberty, and of pure and undefiled religion.

### THE BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Each year adds greatly to the extent of the operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Last year the total income amounted to £164,136 6s. 5d. being an increase over the receipts of the preceding year of upwards of £4,000. During the year 1859, 60, an extraordinary increase in the issues took place. The issues for the year exceeded those of the preceding year, by 291,912, Copies, and amounted in all to 1,917,897 Copies. Our space will not allow us to trace the operations of the Society in every field. The truth is, there is scarcely a country in any quarter of the Globe, in which the Bible Society has not effected a footing. Spain is in a great measure still closed against the Bible. In Japan there are hindrances and impediments still in the way of Bible circulation. But in almost every other land, more or less is done, and the work in several places is most encouraging. In France, notwithstanding opposition from the local authorities in some cases, and priestly denunciations in others, the success attending the operations of the Bible Society is very remarkable. Colportage is largely carried on, and there is good evidence that the Bible is not only circulated, but is read and pondered. In Italy there has been a wide door and effectual. Recent events connected with the political condition of Italy have had a very powerful effect on the state of mind of the people, and now the Bible is openly bought in Towns, where, a short time ago, it would have been almost impossible to put even a single copy in circulation. May the good seed of Bible truth take deep root in the soil of the Italian mind, and then we need not fear the consequences of the changes which have recently been taking place. In Turkey the Bible cause is in a most interesting and hopeful state. During the past year 24,720 Copies were circulated in Turkey in no fewer than thirty languages. A Colporteur is employed in Constantinople, and the Bible has been sold even within the walls of a Mahomedan Mosque. May the fabric of I-lamism soon crumble into ruins, and Christianity again flourish in those regions, where were once the seven Churches of Asia, and in other portions of the Turkish empire.

In India the friends of the Bible have been disappointed. The storm has passed away. The wave of rebellion and carnage has been arrested and turned back. But with the passing storm, there has disappeared in a great measure, the anxiety in regard to the spiritual condition of India. Still something has been done.

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The work of preparing versions and translations has been carried on, and in the several Presidencies, not a few Scriptures have been circulated by Colportage, and in other ways. May Britain seek with growing earnestness to give the Bible to the people of India.

In the West Indies, Australia, New Zealand, and Southern Africa, the work goes on vigorously, but we cannot particularly refer to details. Let us bless God for the establishment of such an Institution as the British and Foreign Bible Society.

We have just received the annexed Letter from the Parent Society, which we introduce, being convinced that it will be received with deep interest :—

MY DEAR SIR,—Yours of March 30, has safely come to hand, and I now beg to forward to you annexed the usual official acknowledgment for the remittance of £1,150 17s. 3d. enclosed therein, from which you will see that we have appropriated the amount in compliance with your directions. Care shall be taken to mention this remittance in our new Report by means of a foot-note.

It is very gratifying to us to receive such liberal remittances from your Society, and we regard them as evidences of the lively interest which the population of your Province continue to take in our world-wide object, as well as proofs of the success which is vouchsafed to the zealous efforts of your Travelling Agents.

We have completed another year in our Society's History, and we are now busily preparing for our Anniversary Meeting on the 1st of May. The Report to be presented, and in part, read on that occasion, is a document replete with interest, and contains abundant proofs of the blessing which accompanies our labours to diffuse the Records of Redeeming Love among the Nations, Kindreds and Tribes of the earth. It also makes special allusion to various new fields of labour which are opening up before us, as for instance in Italy, where our Agent and his staff of Colporteurs are actively at work diffusing the good seed of the Kingdom over the fair soil of that hitherto priest-ridden land. Nearly 30,000 copies have, during the year, been placed in the hands of willing purchasers in various parts of Italy, and great has been the joy of many at obtaining, for the first time, a Book of the very existence of which they had previously been ignorant. There are still hindrances in our way, and among the greatest of these is the inability of the majority of the population to read, but this hindrance will no doubt gradually disappear, owing to the establishment of Schools, which are rising up in all directions. It is pleasant to see the interest which some of your Branches take in our Italian work, and I need scarcely say that our Committee will not fail to be thereby stimulated, were any stimulus required, to do all in their power to prosecute the work to the greatest possible extent.

Austria too is opening her doors at length to our labours, for by a recent Imperial Decree all the Police Regulations which have for so many years completely interfered with the introduction of the Scriptures

into Austria, as well as their free circulation, have been withdrawn, and we shall now have full scope for our efforts among the population of countries, such as Bohemia and Hungary, who have long, and in vain, been sighing for free access to the Volume of Divine Truth.

In France our operations have been carried on with undiminished success, the year's issues having amounted to upwards of 87,000 copies. In Sweden, with a population of not much more than four millions, the issues have again reached nearly 90,000 copies. In Turkey the work is progressing, and upwards of 1,500 copies of the Scriptures in Turkish have been disposed of during the year, mainly by sale, and principally among the Mussulman population. In Russia the Holy Synod has taken up the work of Scripture circulation in real earnest, and now that the Serfs have been emancipated, and schools are being established in increased numbers throughout the Empire, there is reason to hope that many willing purchasers of the Scriptures will be found.

With respect to funds the past year has been very prosperous. The Receipts for the year have amounted to £167,941 14s. 7d., while the Payments have been £165,462 12s. 2d. The Issues are not yet made up, but these, we already know, will exhibit a decrease, to which various causes have contributed.\*

These notices will show you that our work is as encouraging as ever, and that we have abundant cause for gratitude, to our Lord and Master for the blessing which He graciously bestows on the feeble efforts of His servants who are engaged in this holy undertaking, while at the same time we have every incentive to persevere in these efforts.

In Britain, more particularly in Scotland and Ireland, there are kindred Societies engaged in the same blessed work. May they prosper more and more.

#### CONCLUSION.

In conclusion let us, from a renewed contemplation of the great work, feel more alive to our own duty to take a part in the accomplishment of it. This is literally in the power of each of us. We may personally put the Word of God into the hands of some, who possess it not. We may assist in extending the cause of the Bible in our own Province. And although far removed from those interesting lands where there are now open doors for the circulation of the Bible,—from China, from India, from Italy,—still, notwithstanding the distance, we may individually be fellow-helpers. By our prayers, we may aid the work, and no means can succeed without prayer. By our contributions through the British and Foreign Bible Society, we may aid in sending the Bible to these or to other lands. We may thus secure an interest in the work. Our contributions may put the Bible into the hands of a fellow creature, who, otherwise, might never have possessed it. Let us realize our duty and

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privilege in the matter, and let us faithfully, as unto the Lord, contribute of what He may have given us, for the advancement of His cause. While munificent sums are given, and given freely, for the carrying on of earthly struggles and conflicts, let us seek liberally to maintain the cause of God. Whatever we may give is all His own. The silver and the gold are His. We ourselves are His,—His in a double sense, if we have been brought under the influence of the Bible ; and were we to consecrate all we have and all we are, it would be a “reasonable service.” Whatever is done, in a right spirit and with right motives, shall not,—cannot be in vain,—not in vain for ourselves, for they who water others shall be watered also themselves—not in vain in regard to its results in the world, for the seed cast upon the waters shall be found even after many days, and in due time, through God’s blessing on the appointed means, “The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the seas.”

GENERAL AGENTS OF THE SOCIETY.

TO THE SECRETARIES OF THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

DEAR SIRS,—

What a glorious and marvellous year is that which has just terminated, in the history of Bible Society operations throughout the world. Where is the christian sage that, even, a short time ago could have predicted that the Report of the Great Parent Society, about to be published, would contain three such statements as the following? Italy from the Alps to the Bay of Naples, (with the exception of a small patch in the midst of which Pio Nono stands cowering and trembling;) is now open for the Bible. Secondly:—All the police regulations that kept the Bible out of Austria are withdrawn!! Thirdly:—In Russia, The Holy Synod has entered in downright earnest on the work of circulating the word of God, in the language of the people!!! Three such paragraphs have never before appeared in one Report of our magnificent and God-owned Institution. Verily, "this is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes." In looking at these stupendous facts, and at "the great and effectual door which everywhere is being opened," your agent cannot help asking, have we done our duty, and are we coming up to the claims and responsibilities which the world's calls, and the world's wants so loudly demand? In the retrospect of the doings of our Society for the past year, he cannot but feel that this question cannot be answered with the satisfaction that he could wish; and that though each agent reports an increase in the contributions from the Branches in his own division, yet that increase is not what, in his estimation, it should be, considering the increased ability of a large majority of the donors. May the year upon which we are entering atone for the past; and may we make some humble attempt to show that we feel the unspeakable privilege of having our existence, and

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being placed on the stage of moral action, in this, the greatest, and most marvellous era, in the history of our glorious Christianity.

We proceed as usual, to give a brief sketch of the year's labors.

My first visit of importance was to Claremont, in the Township of Pickering, a Branch located in the field of my esteemed colleague, Mr. Johnson. Although we held our meeting on a summer afternoon, in the midst of an agricultural community, yet, a good country church was densely filled with an interesting congregation. Two or three Ministers from a distance added much to the success of the meeting; a spirit of deep and intense earnestness was manifested throughout the entire services, and an impetus given to the cause, which, in connection with subsequent efforts, bore fruit in the noble returns made at the close of the year. During the agency of our esteemed friend Mr. Richardson, we had a Branch in the Township of Bertie, on Lake Erie, whose patrons, after a season, became weary in well doing, and the Branch died. For the purpose of revivifying and ingrafting this scion again into our noble vine, I paid them a visit, and succeeded in the effort with much satisfaction. I preached on Sabbath to an immense audience, held the meeting on Monday evening, and took up a subscription as a nucleus for future operations. Some five months afterwards, my esteemed friend Mr. Kennedy, visited them, when, they paid their purchase account in full, and made a small donation to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

My next meeting was in Pelham, which was convened in one of Nature's temples, a beautiful grove, located on one of the most picturesque hills in Western Canada. I gave them a sketch of my travels in the east, which seemed deeply to interest them, we took up a good collection, and Mr. Kennedy reports from them, the largest returns ever made to the funds of your Society. My next visit was to Bridgeport, the first station on the Great Western Railway, west of St. Catharines, and commanding a fine portion of the Township of Louth, a small section of which has done something for years in connection with the St. Catharine's Auxiliary. The public meeting was very spirited and numerous attended, the subscription very liberal, and Mr. Kennedy subsequently has reported fine progress and good returns.

The Township of Glanford, situated in one of the finest Agricultural Districts in Canada, had not been visited for the purposes of our Society, until during the past year. To afford its thriving and prosperous inhabitants the privilege of co-operating with us in the great work of Bible circulation, I paid them a visit in the beginning of August, and preached in the grove to an audience which

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was variously estimated at from twelve to fifteen hundred. The meeting on Monday evening was also numerously attended; the Rev. Messrs. Betts and Laird gave their valuable aid; a liberal subscription was taken up, and Glanford thus enlisted among the Auxiliaries of our noble Institution.

My next point was the village of St. George in the Township of Dumfries, whose liberal and intelligent inhabitants were fully prepared for us, and expecting a visit from one of our Agents for some time previously. At the Sablath service the members and adherents of all the branches of the Christian Church in the village and neighbourhood were largely represented, and three of the Ministers took seats in the pulpit. The meeting on Monday evening was held in the spacious and beautiful Baptist Church; the audience was large, and responded to the eloquent and appropriate appeals of my Ministerial brethren by a very liberal subscription, among which Mr. Keefer, one of the village merchants, subscribed twenty dollars to make his lady a life member of the Society. St. George promises to be one of our most fruitful and flourishing Auxiliaries. I visited the Township of Binbrook, (which had also been without a Bible Society until the past year,) and received a cordial welcome from a people among whom I had preached the word of life in the beginning of my Ministry. A Branch was formed under the most favorable auspices; and with the presidency of the Rev. Mr. Cheyne, a business Secretary and Treasurer, with a working Committee, we confidently anticipate growing and permanent prosperity.

As our meeting in Allansville, in the Township of Peel, the previous Spring, was almost a failure in consequence of a heavy storm, I promised them an extra visit in the summer, which I performed accordingly. I preached twice in the neighborhood, and held the meeting in the Presbyterian Church on Tuesday evening. The audience was very large, the meeting spirited and stirring, and a subscription was taken up to be supplemented by the active lady collectors before the close of the year.

In accordance with promises previously given, I made two Bible Society sabbath visits to Waterdown and Grimsby, and preached to a large audience in each place with great satisfaction and comfort, and I trust with beneficial results.

Towards the close of the year I again visited St. George, where I had organized a Branch some six or seven months previously; and was delighted to find that the high hopes which were then entertained of its future usefulness and fruit were not blighted. Although they did not expect me so soon, yet they made a noble effort, and reported a suitable Stock of Bibles paid for, and two handsome dona

tions to the Upper Canada and the British and Foreign Bible Societies. All sections of this liberal and wealthy community are united in sustaining the good cause.

Having been permitted through the kindness and courtesy of the Board of Directors, to devote the winter months to lecturing on my travels in the East, I was able, fortunately, to obtain the labors of the Rev. George Kennedy, who entered upon his work the commencement of October, and efficiently discharged the duties of the Agency during the last six months of the year. We here present Mr. Kennedy's report in his own words :

Having been solicited to supply Mr. Taylor's place for six months, my first meeting was held in the Nanticoke Settlement, County of Haldimand. We had a very interesting meeting in the English Church, the Episcopalian and Wesleyan congregations heartily uniting in sustaining the Bible cause. Our next visit was to the beautiful village of Selkirk, where we had the Primitive Methodist Church crowded to excess. Valuable aid was rendered by Rev. Messrs. Paul and Service. This fine little Society, under the Presidency of Mr. Kent, is fully alive to the duty of supplying the spiritually destitute with the word of life. Jarvis, a small village on the Hamilton and Port Dover plank road, was the next place on my list. Here I found the Society in a very enfeebled state, notwithstanding the almost supernatural life infused into it last year. The meeting was very thinly attended, and no funds collected ; they promised however, to make a vigorous effort, and remit to Toronto. The sum of £4 16s 1½d on deposit from the preceding year, was donated to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Hagersville and Ballsville, is one of those societies which the Agent feels it a treat to visit. The officers are men of the right stamp. We had an excellent meeting in the Wesleyan Church, and although the young ladies appointed to collect had done exceedingly well, Mr. Hagar, the worthy President, went out himself on a collecting tour, and calling on an aged Dutch gentleman solicited a subscription. *Yes, was the reply, I will give as much as you, Mr. Hagar!* Thank, you Sir, said the other, I give eight dollars a year. The old gentleman handed over the eight dollars, came that evening to the meeting, made himself very useful in keeping the lights in order, and for the first time, occupied a front seat.

I spent the next Sabbath in Cayuga, the county town, preached to a large audience in the afternoon, and in the evening in the village of York, six miles distant. On Monday evening I held the meeting in Cayuga in the English Church, aided by the Rev. Mr. Cobb of York. The meeting, though small, was no criterion by which to judge of the financial results. The well known devotion of the

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Judge, who is the President, and the gentlemanly secretary A. P. Farrell, Esq., to the Bible cause, is a sufficient guarantee, that Cayuga though minus nearly half its population, will not lag behind in the good work.

York is doing nobly, and appears to take pleasure in sharing with the Society the general prosperity of the village. Our meeting was held in the English Church, the good Rector, Rev. Mr. Hill, conducting the opening services; and the ministers of the Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist Churches rendering good aid to the cause, by their noble and zealous advocacy of its interests. Returns over \$80, for the various purposes of the Society.

Our noble Branch in Caledonia had, through circumstances that need not be explained, departed from the usual practice of collecting the subscriptions before the meeting. The meeting was held in Dr. Ferrier's Church, and as usual, the Dr. and Rev. Mr. Black contributed much to its interest and success. Since the Agent's visit, our worthy friend, the Doctor, has entered into rest. At the post of duty, *suddenly*, he heard his Master's voice, "Give an account of thy stewardship," but the servant of God was not surprised, for he had learned to trust in Jesus; and calmly and firmly leaning on his arm he descended peacefully into the valley, and soared to his mansion and his crown. The effort for the year was made after the meeting and our friends remitted as usual, a noble sum for the various purposes of the Society.

Dunnville Branch has been suffering not only from the crushing pressure of the times, but from the removal of the President, to a more salubrious climate, for the restoration of his health. The secretary also, through severe affliction had been for some time unable to attend to the business of the Society. At this juncture, Rev. Thomas Jeffers came to the aid of the Committee; and with a zeal which does him credit, secured the efficient services of some young ladies, who succeeded in raising the handsome sum of nearly Sixty Dollars, I preached twice on Sabbath, and held the meeting in the Wesleyan Church on Monday evening. The vacancies in the Committee were filled up, and now the Society has the prospect of maintaining its former efficiency and usefulness, under the Presidency of Mr. Jeffers.

At Cayuga South, one of the model Societies; continued prosperity and united zeal mark all their operations. A handsome sum on purchase account; and \$40 donation to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Canboro very low; succeeded in getting a part of the purchase account.

Caistorville is trying to strengthen the things which remain, and is considerably in advance of the previous year. My old friend, Rev. J. Shaw met me here, and interested the meeting with his address.

The Branch at Smithville, owing to local jealousies, no longer exhibits the vigor and zeal becoming an old Society. It required some effort to get a new Committee appointed. I received the balance due on purchase account, but no donation for the Society's schemes of usefulness abroad.

The beautiful village of Thorold contributed nobly; \$43 on purchase account: and \$90 for the benevolent objects of the Society. Visits to such Branches as these must always be refreshing and encouraging to the Agents.

The friends at Drummondville were already prepared with their contributions, which was quite fortunate, for the meeting was a partial failure, owing to a heavy rain storm.

I next proceeded to Chippewa, amidst a sufficiency of mud and rain. The meeting which was held in the Presbyterian Church was rather small. The elaborate report read by the President, a report which would reflect no discredit on Exeter Hall, was the principal attraction of the meeting. I spent the Sabbath in Port Robinson and Welland, and preached to attentive congregations. Both places are in advance of last year; though suffering fearfully from financial embarrassment. The ministers of the various congregations rendered efficient aid at these meetings. The Pelham meeting in Mr. McGlashan's church was a kind of jubilee; and resulted in the largest returns that have been made for years by that Society. As their purchase account was paid up, they presented a donation of \$53 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Clifton is still groaning from the effects of the financial panic, and deserted by its citizens, proclaims nevertheless as its motto; "ever onward in the Bible Cause!" Sustained by such devoted friends as the Rev. G. Bell, and a few others, it cannot but prosper.

Niagara made a noble effort to sustain her former character. The most liberal collection of any meeting during the month. The clergy of old Niagara seem inspired by a holy zeal for the triumph of scriptural holiness over error and sin.

At Humberstone, the evening was very unpropitious, dense darkness and heavy rain, yet that infant Branch paid its debt, and gave a handsome donation for the general purposes of the Society.

Another rural Branch in its infancy too, having its location on the banks of old Erie, in the fertile Township of Bertie, was equally

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avored with darkness and rain ; yet we had a fair meeting. They paid their debt, and made a small donation.

Bridgeport, organized some three months before my visit, has made a noble beginning, and follows with youthful vigor in the wake of older and larger Branches. Purchase account paid up ; and a small donation to the Upper Canada Society.

Beamsville, this Branch has passed through several serious vicissitudes and adverse dispensations, yet it still lives, and bears a little fruit. May its light speedily break forth as the noon-day.

Grimsbys is a small but well managed Branch. We had a lively and interesting meeting in the Union Church. The Presbyterian and Wesleyan Churches, are heartily united in the good work.

The last meeting of the autumn tour was at Ontario, in the old Wesleyan Church. Neither roads nor weather affect this little Society ; for whether the meeting is large or small, the returns are sure.

After resting a little, before entering on the great winter tour, I visited a few Branches that are so located that they are not included in one of the grand general tours ; and commenced at Newark, in South Oxford. At this place I found a large audience, but neither President, Secretary, nor Treasurer forthcoming ; not even a member of the Committee to be found by advertising. We buried the old Society in solemn silence, and organised a new one ; but whether it will have a greater longevity than its predecessor, time alone will tell.

Springfield was not quite so bad. The excellent Secretary, Dr. Cameron, was constituted President, Treasurer, Committee and all. We could not even get a hearing, for one of the village churches had some special services going on, and as they did not choose to discontinue them on that evening, our meeting was a failure. A small return on purchase account. Norwichville : an interesting meeting ; a liberal subscription, and a splendid depository. This is an excellent Branch and well managed. The speaking was well sustained by Rev. Messrs. Harris and Donald.

Hazen's Branch I found dead ; but unfortunately it had never lived. Re-organized with but dull prospects as to usefulness.

The Branch at Port-Rowan had also ceased to breathe. We got a small meeting convened ; gave them a very plain address suited to the circumstances ; organized anew, and introduced some fresh element which gives promise of doing better in the future.

St. Williams gave me a hearty welcome, and I was gladdened and refreshed by meeting the people of my former charge. I preached

there on Sabbath evening to a large audience, and held the meeting the following evening. Although the returns were behind those of the preceding year; yet from the subscription taken up, and the spirit manifested, we hope for continued advancement.

Lyndock, though but a new Branch, is doing exceedingly well. The meeting was small, the evening being very stormy, the funds however were all ready, and a good subscription taken up.

The Branch at Burford, under the Presidency of Rev. C. Byrne, has advanced at railroad speed. Our meeting was held during the week of the world's prayer meeting. The meeting for that evening was partially suspended for our accommodation, and after the addresses, in which the Agent had the valuable aid of Rev. Messrs. Hay and Carrier, it was resumed for about half an hour, and was an appropriate sequel to the Anniversary Meeting of the Bible Society. This Branch is in a flourishing condition—Returns, a large payment on purchase account; and nearly \$70 donation to the U. C. B. Society. Our next visit was to Scotland, (Oakland,) where we were again ably assisted by Mr. Hay, who has a church there also, as well as by Mr. Kippen, a Baptist Minister. A full house and a liberal subscription.

The Meeting at Waterford was quite an improvement on last year. I had the able assistance of Rev. Messrs. Watts and Cleaver; and the Branch wiped off the old score.

At Mount Pleasant, though the evening was very stormy, the attendance was fair, and a liberal spirit was manifested. The Episcopalian, Presbyterian and Wesleyan Churches are heartily united in sustaining the cause. The Ministers of the two latter rendered efficient aid.

The Anniversary Meeting in the city of Hamilton, was a perfect success. The Rev. Mr. Inglis' Church was filled to overflowing, and the platform presented an array of talent of the first order. All the Protestant Churches in the city were represented, but the chief attraction seemed to be the Bishop of Huron, who, with his usual facility, kept the large audience enchained for nearly an hour; after which the agent thought it prudent to be very brief, the evening being far advanced. Returns: a payment on purchase account; \$500, donation to the British and Foreign Bible Society; and \$100 to Upper Canada.

At St. Catharines, the Town Hall was well filled with an intelligent and interesting audience. The churches of the Town were well represented on the platform; and able addresses were given by Rev. Messrs. Burns, Norton and Carey. Returns transmitted to Toronto, quite liberal.

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I commenced the labors and visits of the long winter tour, at the little village of Erin, in the County of Wellington. I drove about sixty miles through deep snow, and arrived just in time for the meeting. The speaking was well sustained by the Ministers of the Wesleyan and New Connexion Churches. I shared the very welcome hospitality of my excellent and gentlemanly friend, William Tyler, Esq., to whom the cause is so much indebted, and whose kind-hearted lady will always make her guests feel at home. Eramosa is going on steadily. Many came several miles through the snow-drifts to attend the meeting. The venerable Secretary, Rev. Mr. Barrie, pastor of the church in which we met, is a thorough business man, and had every thing in order. He seems to have a place for every thing, and every thing in its place. At the lively little village of Arthur, there was quite a crowd of disappointed expectants, word having gone round that Mr. Taylor was to give an address on the Holy Land. At the close of the meeting, however, we left them in better humour, after pledging to use our influence to have Mr. Taylor meet their expectations at some future day. Arthur now takes a high position among our village Auxiliaries.

I preached twice at Mount Forest the following Sabbath. My own appointment was announced for the evening in the Kirk of Scotland. The Wesleyan Church was disappointed in a supply for a Missionary sermon in the morning; and the Rev. Mr. McLean being quite unwell, requested me to occupy his pulpit, and by a mutual arrangement the two congregations came together in the largest of the two churches, (the Free.) Thus a little good nature united with christian charity, can make the thorny path of life much more agreeable, and sometimes even strew it with flowers. I much regretted the following evening, when a denomination thought proper to hold a meeting for special services at the same hour, and within sight of the meeting of the Bible Society. This Branch, though in its infancy, exhibits the zeal and liberality of matured age. The returns reached the noble sum of nearly \$153 00. I hope the Durham friends have redeemed their pledge, by sending in their contributions prior to the 20th of March. The public meeting was almost a failure. County Council business, and Grey Election zeal, together with the deep snow, threw Bible Society business into the shade. I trust it will not be so again. So the good President, the Rev. Mr. Park, promised.

The Branch at Owen Sound is doing well; the meeting there too was affected by election excitement. The Clergy of the Town are indefatigable in sustaining the interests of the Society. I preached in the Wesleyan Church on Sabbath evening to a large congregation.

In connection with Meaford, the next point I intended to visit, a number of outposts was suggested in a letter from the zealous Secretary of the Owen Sound Society; and although I forwarded appointments to every one of them, yet through the delay of the Mail, and the almost unparalleled fall of snow about that time, completely blocking up the back roads, and stopping even railroad trains for a time, I could not accomplish any thing by way of organizing new Branches. In another year, this, I have no doubt can be successfully accomplished.

I had a long and memorable drive one of the coldest days in February, from this northern region southward, to the beautiful village of Fergus. A noble Branch, sustained by an intelligent and liberal people. The meeting in the kirk was rather small, owing to the severity of the night. The failure of the public meeting, however, does not as in some places, injure this Society. They do their work systematically and from principle. They donated the noble sum of \$80 to the Upper Canada; and \$100 to the British and Foreign Bible Society. I spent the next Sabbath in Winterbourne, and preached in the evening. The Presbyterian friends treated me with much courtesy; for although it was communion day in the Free Church, yet they withdrew their evening service, that they might attend mine in the Wesleyan Church. Monday evening being wet, the meeting was not as well attended as it otherwise would have been, but it was a good one, and the Branch seems to be well managed.

Our next visit was to Allansville, now Glenallan, where we had no meeting, as none had been announced. I called the officers together next day, when the President and Secretary feeling ashamed of their neglect, promised to do even better financially than if we had had a public meeting, by making more than an ordinary effort.

This promise they have nobly and faithfully redeemed.

At Drayton I found no effort had been made to raise funds, which is the greatest disappointment an Agent can meet with. Returns from this Branch also, have since been made to Toronto.

It is quite a treat to the agent to visit Elora, one of the most admirably managed Branches in our entire field of operations. The man with *the cap*, had a *large purse full* to hand over, donated as follows:—

\$60 to Upper Canada; \$80 for the general purposes of the Great Parent; and \$10 for India; and \$60 to the Montreal Auxiliary. The meeting in the United Presbyterian Church was large and interesting; and all the ministers of the Presbyterian and Wesleyan Churches were present, and rendered excellent service.

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Guelph, this model Society handed over upwards of \$290; \$240 of which were donated to the Home and Foreign work. The Presbyterian, Wesleyan, Congregational, and Primitive Methodist Ministers attended, and gave addresses of the first order. The meeting was held in the spacious Wesleyan Church, but was not as large as usual, owing to some popular lecturer holding forth at the same time in the Town Hall. It is to be hoped that a collision of this kind will be avoided in future.

There seems to be a great want of efficiency and system in working the Society in Berlin. No subscriptions had been solicited, and no funds collected. The officers thought the people could not afford to be liberal to the Society this year on account of Church improvements. Why they keep year after year about \$50 in their treasury yielding no benefit to the Society, I am at a loss to know. The Rev. Messrs. McMahan, Philp, and Hodgskin, rendered efficient service.

Our next meeting was at the interesting Town of Galt, and held in the Free Church. There the Bishop of Huron, was attending to his Diocesan duties; and hearing of the Bible Society meeting, came to aid us without the formality of an invitation; and his address gave a new and grand impetus to the meeting. We were aided also by Dr. Boomer; and by the Methodist and Presbyterian Ministers of the Town. Returns: \$100 donation to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Glenmorris is a useful little Branch, directed by the excellent President, Rev. Mr. Dunbar. Its sphere of operations is quite circumscribed, but it nevertheless pursues the even tenor of its way with unswerving fidelity.

Brantford Meeting, was one of the very best of the whole winter. The beautiful new English Church was completely filled; and its revered Pastor, who is President of the Society, seemed to be in one of his happiest moods. The Secretary as usual, read an admirable Report; and the Rev. Messrs. Young, Wesleyan, and Stott, of the Kirk of Scotland, gave us good speeches. The other Ministers of the Town were absent from indisposition.

Paris deserves to rank among our first class Auxiliaries. The Meeting was of the first order, and well sustained in the speaking department, by all the Ministers of the Town. Returns: over \$154 for the various purposes of the Society.

Jerseyville, and Alberton are small rural Branches, but sending forth streams of healthful moral influence all around them. At the latter place, we were much cheered by the presence of the Rev. Mr.

Lees of Ancaster, who kindly came to our aid, and to offer a passage to his hospitable dwelling, had we been without a conveyance of our own.

Ancaster is doing well in proportion to its ability. The meeting was a very agreeable one, every one seeming to feel an interest in the prosperity of the Bible Cause. Waterdown was the next scene of action. The meeting was lively, and the subscriptions liberal. My old friend, the Rev. James Gray, accompanied me to Carlisle, and took part in the speaking. This Branch, as also that at Nairn, is not by any means indifferent to the great work of disseminating Bible truth to the nations of the earth. At the latter place, Rev. Mr. McLean of Cumminsville, added to the interest of the meeting, by his very interesting remarks. The returns from this little Branch reached the noble sum of \$75 88.

The Meeting in Beverly was thinly attended, owing to the wetness of the roads, rendering travelling in a country place very disagreeable. But the bad state of the roads did not affect the funds, for the handsome sum of \$49 12½ was donated to Upper Canada and \$24 to the Parent Society for Italy. West Puslinch was the next on my list, where I held the meeting on Friday evening. I rested on Saturday, and preached on Sabbath for my invalid friend, the Rev. Andrew McLean, of the Free Church. Though the Branch was only organized the previous Spring, yet I found their purchase account paid up; and they handed me the noble sum of \$75, to be donated to our own, and the Parent Society, for Home and Foreign operations.

The Branch in the east of Puslinch, is also sustained by a noble and liberal people. A friendly emulation appears to exist between it and the three last named, (which are all located closely together,) their returns being nearly the same. May they ever continue *thus*, to provoke one another to love and good works in advancing the Cause and Kingdom of Jesus.

The Town of Dundas was next in order. The audience was intelligent, but not as large as might be expected, but the principal work was done, and the funds were all ready. After making a handsome payment on Purchase Account, they made a free contribution of \$60 to U. Canada; \$60 to the Parent Society; and \$28 20 to the Montreal Auxiliary.

The following evening I visited Lynden, a small village in the Township of Ancaster, on the line of the Great Western Railway. The Church was well filled, and we organized a new Branch, which promises to be an important addition to the ranks of the Society's contributors.

After the close of the financial year, I visited three small but promising Branches in the neighborhood of Guelph; two of which, Rockwood and Eden Mills, had made their remittance prior to my visit. I was sorry to find that the returns of the former had fallen off more than one half during the year; but as a few good men and true are still connected with its management, I confidently hope that the ensuing year will restore it to its former efficiency.

Our friends in Oneida, a Settlement near Caledonia, having expressed a wish to change their relation from an Auxiliary to the Branch just named, to that of a separate organization; I paid them a visit, and formed a small but hopeful Society. May its progress be like that of the light, "which shineth brighter and brighter unto the perfect day."

I here take the opportunity of gratefully acknowledging the countenance and kind co-operation of my ministerial brethren of all the churches; for the christian courtesies they extended to me, while acting as the representative of Rev. L. Taylor, during the past six months; and also to those friends in whose hospitality I occasionally shared.

## TO THE SECRETARIES OF THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

ACTON, March, 31, 1861.

DEAR SIRS,—

In presenting a report of labors in connexion with your Society, during another year of its operations, we cannot but rejoice that at a time, so remarkable for stirring events, God has been graciously pleased to continue our prosperity. The movements among the nations, the earnestness with which great principles are asserted, the conviction daily gaining force, that the numerous shams and unrealities have had their day, have furnished a wide scope for appeals on the part of your Agents, which have met in many quarters with a warm response from the friends of the Bible throughout the country.

During the last three months of the year, a somewhat graphic account might be given of perils by the way, in consequence of the blockade of the roads by such deep and repeated drifts of snow. It was found on this account to be altogether impossible to keep duty all the appointments, and a second visit has consequently, in several instances, been rendered necessary, never since my connection with the Society has so much difficulty been encountered in traveling, but with the exception of some severe frost nips, and a heavy cold caught while traveling through the storms, no mishap has occurred, the weather several times had great effect in thinning our meetings, but the interest in the good work has by no means abated. I would here speak of a very important movement which I was delighted to find had been undertaken by several of our country Branches, by which their operations have been largely increased, and which we would rejoice to see carried out to a large extent by our numerous local organizations. Not satisfied with contributing once a year to the objects of the Society, and in the hope of extending the influence of our noble Society, about and around them, the officers, and committee have arranged a number of meetings in various school sections, the assistance of resident ministers, wherever practicable, has been secured, but when other engagements have prevented their attendance, the work has still gone on, and with the happiest results. Were such action to become general, I doubt not our funds would soon be doubled.

My first visit was paid to York Church, where, after a Sabbath engagement, our public meeting was held on Monday evening: the attendance was good, and I left our friends pledged to renewed exertions on our behalf. Aurora, which always displays a commendable

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activity in exertion on our behalf, was next *en route* after an interesting meeting I received upwards of \$80, as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Newmarket, though we can never speak of a large meeting, we have some devoted, zealous friends, whose contributions evince that the Word of God is more precious than gold. My esteemed friend, Rev. S. F. Ramsay, as in former years, attended the meetings in his neighborhood and delivered a number of addresses of a most interesting and instructive character. The contributions from Newmarket which amounted to \$100 had been previously forwarded. Holland Landing—The contributions from this Branch, owing to circumstances over which our friends have no control, have, for the last few years, been smaller than of old, but the good cause still lives, and is dear to those who remain. From Bradford, after our annual meeting, I received the following large donations in addition to a considerable payment for Stock, \$37 09 U. C. ; \$20 British and Foreign, and \$10 Montreal Bible Society.

Our little Branch at Innisfil has some active friends who labor diligently on its behalf. At our meeting which was well attended and at which the Rev. Mr. Moyan attended at much personal inconvenience, I received \$20 to the U. C., and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society. After a Sabbath appointment, our public meeting was held at Barrie, in the large and commodious Town Hall; the attendance was larger than on any previous occasion. The local clergymen all did good service, after which I received \$100 free contribution to the U. C. Bible Society. My next visit was to Orillia, and although the evening was wet and very unfavorable, the Free Church was filled with an attentive audience; a most interesting report was presented by Rev. Mr. Grey, and we were fortunate enough to secure the aid of two clergymen from a distant part of the country, who were traveling in that vicinity. In consequence of the non-arrival of the boat, I lost my next appointment at Bond Head, though I made every effort to reach in time, but had a second opportunity of holding a meeting in this place, which is unsurpassed for zeal and liberality in the Province. I next proceeded to Newtown Robinson, where we had the pleasure of meeting and listening to a most interesting address from our friend, A. Gaviller, Esq., President of the Bond Head Society. I received \$50 as a free contribution to the U. C. Bible Society; this completed my tour till after harvest, when I again commenced with Bolton and found our friends still active in the good work. At Lloydtown the subscriptions were not behind hand; our friends diligently attend to the business of the Society in this interesting Branch. At Cookstown matters had not progressed favorably, but after preaching twice on the Sab-

bath, a good meeting was held on Monday evening, and some new life and vigor was infused among my friends, who have since forwarded the receipts. At Thornton, I was glad to find that no diminution of interest was manifested; after a very interesting meeting, I received \$28 88 between the U. C. Bible Society and the Montreal.

At West Essa, our friends are not so diligent or successful as they might be, or as their early efforts gave us reason to expect; they require to put forth renewed energy to come up to their former stand.

Nottawassaga, though a new Branch, promises well, and I was pleased to witness some signs of improvement in Collingwood, at both of which places I received monies on purchase account.

I next held a meeting at Georgetown, where the Society is in vigorous and active operation. The meeting was large and enthusiastic, the resident ministers were all present, and forcibly urged the claims of the Bible. Returns in advance of last year. At Norval the greatest energy and fidelity has been manifested in conducting the operations of this highly valued Branch. The returns were exceedingly liberal. I received \$87 as a free contribution to the different objects of the Society; some little difficulty, principally occasioned by the illness and death of the Depository, has prevented the vote of the committee from being fully carried out, that \$90 be given as a free contribution, and that the remaining account be paid in full.

Streetsville,—the affairs of this old and fruitful Branch are also well attended to. The meeting was a large and successful one. The collections are here made after the meeting, and have been duly forwarded. Cooksville and Wellington Square are both handsomely in advance. It was decided this year to alter the time of holding the public meeting in Milton from the Spring, and after a most delightful meeting, the noble sum of \$180 was given to the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Society. Our little societies at Nelson, and Nelson Middle road, are still holding on, and not without some fruit. Owing to unfortunate occurrences, our annual meeting at Weston could not be held, and their collections of \$40 was not in consequence appropriated. It was the intention of your agent to hold a meeting before the close of the current year, but time did not permit.

North Etobicoke has exerted itself with most satisfactory results; after a most encouraging meeting, I received \$80 to the various purposes of the Society. Eglinton too, where we held the Annual Meeting in connection with the York Township Branch, has not become indifferent to our success—contributions forwarded after the meeting. Thornhill is not behind last year, though not equal to

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some of her past efforts, while Richmond Hill maintains her position as one of our most liberal Branches. In addition to payment on purchase account, the liberal contribution of \$120, proves her esteem for the work in which we are engaged. Vaughan too, presents nearly \$50 as her quota towards our treasury.

The friends in Oakville still testify their attachment by a donation of \$44 and upwards to the different claims of the Society. The Branch in Acton still lives and flourishes, as evident from a contribution of \$84, between the British and Foreign, U. C. and Montreal Bible Societies.

At Brampton we held an adjourned meeting, as on a former occasion, the state of the roads was such that few could venture out. After the meeting I received \$60 pur. account; \$40 free contribution to the British and Foreign, and \$28 to the U. C. Bible Society. Cheltenham, and Campbell's Cross have both made liberal returns and have been well sustained by numerous and active friends. Chinguacousy East has not kept pace with its more liberal neighbor, Derry West, with which it used to run nobly side by side. A new organization has been formed at Malton, with the promise of much usefulness. Our friends in North Etobicoke I found active and vigorous as ever.

My visits East of Toronto commenced at Whitby, where I found every thing in order—the platform filled with the resident Ministers—the speaking was excellent, and a deep and general interest seemed to pervade the assembly. I received \$50 to the British and Foreign, \$20 to the Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society. At Dunbarton, although a New Branch has been formed in the rear, somewhat curtailing their operations, funds, notwithstanding, were in advance of last year, \$20 to the British and Foreign, and \$33 24 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Duffin's Creek our little Society is still vigorous and effective. After preaching on Sabbath, we held a very pleasant meeting on Monday evening. Receipts \$41, between the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies. On the following evening, the first anniversary of a New Branch, formed by me last year in the rear of the Township at Claremont, was held. Mr. Taylor had also given them a meeting early in the Spring. My last report speaks most favorably of the prospect of usefulness then afforded, but our expectations have been more than realized. I found that \$80 had already been paid for Scriptures, and I had the pleasure of receiving \$80 free contribution to the U. C. Bible Society, after one of the best meetings I have ever attended in a country district, leaving them with a stock of about \$60 worth of Scriptures, all paid for, to commence proceedings on

their second year. At Oshawa we held the largest meeting I have ever attended in that place; the religious aspect of the town I found very much improved; receipts \$74, equally divided. At Hampton I found the interest in the Work of Bible circulation on the increase; after an excellent meeting, I received \$22 50 to the British and Foreign, and \$22 85 to the U. C. Bible Society. Our little Branch in Zion settlement, always confined within narrow limits, though energetic and useful within its bounds, had become principally supported by a single Wesleyan Congregation. With a view to extend operations, a Sabbath was spent in the neighborhood, and the public meeting was held in a Church belonging to the Bible Christians, which fully answered our expectations, after which I received \$28 30 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Orono I found things still usefully holding on. I received \$40 purchase account. The free contributions to be forwarded. At Newcastle, though our friends have been active, I was sorry to find a falling off in the receipts of this Branch; in addition to a considerable payment for Stock, I received \$16 85 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Newton, the same energy was displayed as ever; receipted a payment on account; \$36 to the British and Foreign, and \$20 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Hope Township—one of the best Branches in the Province; the meeting this year was a delightful one; the Rev. Dr. Short, and Revds. Camelon and Chaplin all from Port Hope, were present, and spoke admirably. The Secretary Mr. Carr, presented a most interesting report, and though the returns were not all complete, I received \$40 to the British and Foreign; \$40 to the U. C. and \$40 to the Montreal Bible Society. At Columbus, owing to the severe weather, the meeting was postponed till my second visit, which I paid, and after Sabbath appointments, the public meeting was held on Monday evening. I received \$20 to the British and Foreign and \$15 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. The meeting at Cold-springs was by far the most encouraging which has yet been held. a severe snow storm rendered the roads entirely impassible the next day, so that it was impossible to keep my appointment. My next visit was to Grafton, where I was gratified to find an encouraging increase over last year. I received \$5 15 purchase account; \$23 32 to the British and Foreign; and \$23 32 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Colborne we had a delightful meeting. I found the excellent President had, with the committee and Rev. Mr. Duncan, held not less than eight of the meetings to which I made reference at the commencement of my report. Owing to the state of the roads, it was impossible to complete the returns. I received \$40 on purchase account. At Brighton after an interesting meeting, I

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received \$23 to the British and Foreign ; and \$23 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Frankford—in consequence of the self-denying exertions of a warm friend to the Bible, a large number of Scriptures has been circulated. I received upwards of \$160 on purchase account.

Hastings.—At this small village which is growing faster, and evinces as much promise for the future, as any place with which I am acquainted, we held our first anniversary meeting ; returns were not made, but the promise of a most active and vigorous Branch is formed in connection with this new but energetic ally. I proceeded with the greatest difficulty, in consequence of the depth and drifts of snow to Alnwick, where, after a Sabbath appointment, we formed a promising Branch. A novel feature presented itself to my notice in the attendance and interest manifested by a settlement of Indians who reside here. I next visited Norwood, a Branch which has been but feeble, but which promises to act more vigorously for the future, and whose returns this year shew a gratifying increase. At Keene, I found affairs in a more promising position than for some time previously. After a meeting which, on account of the weather, was much smaller than it otherwise would have been, I received \$60 free contribution to the British and Foreign, and \$30 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

The following day was, so far as my experience goes, unexampled in severity. I started against strong advice for Peterboro', but after a drive of two miles, during which my face and left hand were badly frozen, I was necessitated to return. I drove to Peterboro', next day, where I received from the respected Treasurer, upwards of \$200 on purchase account. A colporteur is employed by our active friends in this place ; but promise of a free contribution was made. Our meeting was a very interesting one. Colonel Haltane, who evinces the greatest interest in the Society, was present, and with quite a strong deputation, accompanied me the next evening to Lakefield, a small but rapidly improving village about 10 miles distant. We were most hospitably entertained at the beautiful residence of Colonel Strickland, brother to the celebrated authoress, Agnes Strickland. The friends have contributed to our funds for some years, and were anxious for a meeting, which was densely crowded. A collection of nearly \$10 was taken up and given to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Millbrook I found our good friends as warmly attached as ever. After a good meeting, I received \$42 63 purchase account. South Monaghan continues as steady in the good work as any of the Branches with which I am acquainted ; the contributions have been forwarded since my visit. Baltimore has displayed this year even more than her usual energy and usefulness.

In addition to a payment for Stock, I received \$50 free contributions to the British and Foreign, and \$30 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Port Hope.—At this foremost Branch of our operations, we held, as always, a most excellent meeting. The local clergy all out in strong force, and everything most admirably arranged. I received \$100 between the three Lower Canadian Missionary Societies, and \$143 21¼ to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Cobourg our meeting was the largest I have ever attended in that place, and every thing was well arranged. For the first time, if I am not mistaken, since my connection with the Society, their large Stock is all paid for, and the balance of funds on hand, has, since the meeting, been forwarded to the Society. Mount Pleasant, (Cavan) still actively engaged in prosecuting the work with energy and vigor. The weather was not importunate, but the returns were made, speaks well for the devotion and activity of our friends. Omemee, though still active, shews a decrease in funds this year. Lindsay,—the Society in this place scarcely keeps pace with the progress of the Town. We had an interesting meeting. Mariposa is still alive if not vigorous. I received \$33 88 on purchase account. At Manilla I received \$20 free contribution; the friends reserving \$16 to assist the Woodville Branch with Colportage. From Cannington, I received nearly \$10 on purchase account; and \$20 free contributions to the Upper Canada Bible Society. The new Society formed last year in Woodville, promises to exercise a most useful influence upon the townships lying in the rear, among whom a colporteur will be employed, we trust with beneficial results. The movement has commenced most auspiciously. At Beaverton our meeting was a most successful one, and a gratifying increase in the operations of this Society may be confidently expected. After an excellent meeting at Prince Albert I received \$28 02 on purchase account; \$20 free contribution to the British and Foreign; \$20 to the Upper Canada; and \$6 06½ to the Montreal Bible Society. I next proceeded to Cartwright, where we held the first anniversary of this new but active and useful auxiliary. After an animated meeting, I received about \$41 on purchase account; \$20 to the Montreal Society; \$20 to the British and Foreign; and nearly \$31 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Our meeting at Bowmanville was not so well attended this year as usual. The speaking was excellent. I received \$53 12 on purchase account; \$50 to the British and Foreign; \$25 to the U. C., and \$25 to the Montreal Bible Society. Uxbridge.—This Branch is well attended to by some active earnest friends; returns nearly \$40 purchase account; and \$21 58 free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society for Italy.

Stouffville is still usefully holding on, and at Markham a gratifying improvement is noted. I received \$15 purchase account; and \$67

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51e free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society. Our friends at Scarboro, are as active, and laborious in the good work as in former years. A visit is always a source of pleasure. Returns since forwarded. Orangeville contributed a free contribution of \$37 48 to the British and Foreign Bible Society for the work of Translating the Scriptures; and \$10 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Caledon contributed \$28 to the British and Foreign Bible Society for Italy; and our old and valued Branch at Nassagaweya, \$20 to the British and Foreign; \$10 to the U. C.; and \$5 86 to the Montreal Bible Society.

May our friends continue their exertions, and augment their influence. The blessed fruits of the Bible shall extend from the rising of the sun to the going down thereof.

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TO THE PRESIDENT AND DIRECTORS OF THE UPPER CANADA  
BIBLE SOCIETY.

Woodstock, June 1st, 1861.

GENTLEMEN,—

Another year has passed away and it becomes my duty to render an account of my labors in the field assigned me. This duty is for the most part a pleasant one, although the pleasure would be much increased, had not some few of whom better things were expected, chosen to take a less active part in this work than they might have done. Yet a great advance has, on the whole, been made, and now taking a retrospect of the field and the work, I look thankfully on the past and hopefully on the future.

My autumn work commenced at the village of Thamesford, where our cause is fairly revived, and is now supported by warm hearts and willing hands, who are resolved that the work shall be diligently, and of course successfully prosecuted.

The usual warm welcome awaited me at St. Thomas, from the untiring friends of our cause there. The contributions were in the aggregate less than last year, yet not less than the commercial difficulties of the place led me to expect. Our friends, with Judge Hughes as their head, will not suffer the cause to languish, although they have lost a host in the removal of my friend, the Rev. A. Young.

Southwold is nobly in advance. The field of this Branch, though small, is most fertile and well cultivated.

Sparta and Port Stanley have most unaccountably declined a little. They will do their first works again this year.

Fingal is in a most prosperous condition, and their efforts since the meeting have been even more energetic and successful than before. As the state of the weather was most unpropitious for our meeting, I remained over the Sabbath and preached twice, once in the Free, and once in the Wesleyan Church.

Returning home, as every right hearted man was in duty bound, I shared in the joyous celebrations connected with the Prince's visit, and lustily helped to cheer the heir apparent of the throne of Great Britain, and the eldest son of the most exalted patron of the Bible in the world. My next tour led me into the adopted land of the Highlander, where I found an unabated interest in our good work, an interest evidenced by the substantiated token of liberal contributions.

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At Ekfrid and Ekfrid East, large meetings came out to hear the report of our proceedings and to help on the Bible cause. It is always a treat to attend the anniversaries of their Branches when so much interest in the work seems to forward all their movements.

Wardsville, Aldboro and Dunwich, have all largely advanced in their efforts and contributions to the good cause. Several important elements of strength have been added to these Branches during the year, which have already increased their efficiency with the prospect of still greater progress in the future.

Iona is worthy of its name and of its devoted President, Judge Hughes, a liberal contribution and a large and enthusiastic meeting are sure to greet your Agent at Iona. The last anniversary was a time of universal interest, and as you will see, of great liberality.

My first visit to Westminster was of little benefit, except to enable me to spy out the land. At a subsequent visit I preached on the Sabbath morning, and held our meeting on the following Monday, the meeting and the results were most satisfactory.

The Branches at Tilsonburgh, Aylmer, Vienna and Port Burwell, are all managed with great regularity, and supported with great liberality.

Staffordville had gone to sleep for two years, but my friend, Rev. A. Smith, of Vienna, effectually worked up the sleeper, and in company with Rev. Mr. Baskeville, we managed to get matters put into a working, and I trust, promising condition, as a new Richmond Branch has died of neglect. I next proceeded Westward, and in due time found myself at the good town of Chatham. I was rejoiced to find matters so very much improved since my last visit. The sales and circulation of the Word had been large. All the clergymen in town most cheerfully co-operated; the Committee had wisely asked, and of course obtained the assistance of lady collectors; the natural result is, that Chatham again appears in a position worthy of herself. I expect much from Chatham this year.

Ridgetown and Morpeth are two Branches where the Spirit of your Agent, if weary, is sure to be refreshed; a living union and truly christian rivalry at once unites and animates the two, and nothing can be more refreshing than a visit to these Branches. Shortly after my visit, a distressing accident befel the venerable President at Ridgetown, the Rev. R. Phelps, but I am rejoiced to hear that he is quite recovered, and still at his post of duty.

Amherstburgh has not advanced as much as I expected, but Windsor and Sandwich have both taken a noble, and I trust, firm step in advance.

Florence is still once more in advance, and the strength of this Society has been greatly increased by the alliance of the Rev. J. Gunne, of the Church of England, who has felt it his duty to throw his influence in with your Society, thus uniting all denominations at Florence in the work.

At Wallaceburgh I found the whole community agitated with a political contest, yet our meeting was magnificent. Revd. Messrs. Hughes and Clarke, of Dresden, along with the brethren of other denominations, resident at Wallaceburgh, contributed their powerful assistance. The Hon. Mr. Cameron, an old friend of the Bible Society, happened to be in town, and gave us one of his most successful efforts. The whole result was most pleasing and successful. At Otterville I think the work of the Colporteur is required to prepare the way for a Bible Society. I then proceeded to visit Simcoe and Port Dover. At both places, in addition to the usual organization of the Bible Society, there had been instituted a Female Bible Association, and with no little anxiety, I wished to ascertain the result of their first year's operations. I was happy to find that they had been quite successful. Many destitute families and persons had been visited and supplied, the contributions had been much increased, and both associations started hopefully on the operations of another year.

On my first visit to Vittoria I found but little done, and a small meeting, so I made a second visit, when I found matters more prosperous and promising. My next tour lay through some of the Branches in the County of Oxford. Beginning with Innerkip, I found this Branch more prosperous than at any former period, although it does not appear as a contributor to your Society this year, the whole revenue being devoted to pay the large balance due the Tract Society. At Blandford, the Society is in a most prosperous condition. A fearful storm prevented the success of our meeting at Washington, at the first appointment; but at the second meeting, held on the last night of the year, we had the most triumphant success ever given to your noble Branch there.

In connexion with the Blenheim Branch, two meetings were held this year. Some friends at Drumbo wished a meeting there to awaken an interest in your work, the effort was completely successful, and the work commenced most hopefully in that thriving village. A good meeting was held the next night in Princeton, and although Blenheim is this year very slightly behind, she is only behind herself, and not behind another. The efforts of the Societies at Ingersoll, Woodstock and Beachville, have been most successful during the year, shewing a large increase of effort, with proportionate success. I trust the increase of the past, is in each of their Branches but a pledge and earnest of greater success for the future.

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At Ingersoll a Ladies Association has been formed under hopeful circumstances. Salford has made a great stride during the year. The public meeting; all the arrangements of the Branch, and the results for the year, shew great energy on the part of our friends there. They have felt their strength for good; may they continue to use it.

A delightful tour brought me successively to North Easthope, Egmondville, Brucefield and Warrensville, all of which Branches I found in a most prosperous state. It is impossible to name all our devoted friends throughout the various Branches, or it would be a sincere pleasure to speak of some of those, who, as in these and other Societies, never grow weary in their work of faith and labor of love. On reaching Exeter, my friend James Logie, Esq., our untiring Secretary, handed me a letter with the melancholy intelligence that my youngest child was not expected to live, and I was at once compelled to drive my horse sixty three miles on that cold dreary day home. I wrote the friends of these Branches for which I had appointments, namely: Exeter and Francistown, McGillvray and Biddulph, and London Township, and I desire here to return my thanks to the officers and members of those Branches who evinced such a lively sympathy with me in my family affliction, and who so nobly made up my lack of service, consequent upon the trial it pleased our Master to lay on me and mine. I was afterwards able to visit the Branches, but owing to the miscarriage of my letter, no meeting was held at Exeter, a circumstance I much regret.

At Delaware I found the friends all alive and moving, the Society had done well, and seems now in a more prosperous state than it has ever been before.

Komoka has advanced during the year, and I trust the extension of our influence into the Township of Lobo, will be productive of good.

Strathroy has not maintained its former fame, though I trust it will more than regain its position; local causes have weakened our efforts, though I believe only for a season.

Warwick abounds still in this good work. Sarnia is second to none in energy. The friends of the Bible here are untiring in zeal, and most successful in their efforts.

Widder and Arkona are for the present in a state of hybernation, though I think the former will be awake on the next visit of your Agent.

Adelaide has done nobly; the purchase and free donations of this Branch would reflect credit on many a large town in Canada. We will yet see better things here next year.

At Embro I found that notwithstanding some adverse influences at work, this Branch had not only maintained its ground, but made a good advance during the year. St. Marys has one of the most efficient Branches to be found in Canada. During the past year the advance has been very great, and the prospect for the future is still more hopeful. Williams' Bible Society, which lays upon your Agent the pleasing though heavy burden of a double meeting, is one of the most remarkable Branches connected with your Society. Want of space forbids me to particularize as I wish, but no Branch has been more systematically conducted or more efficient and useful in its operations.

Goderich has made the greatest proportionate advance of any Society in our connexion during the year, and it must be a cause of intense satisfaction and heartfelt gratitude to the noble men, who for years have unflinchingly toiled on through good report and through evil report, to find their efforts at last so completely successful. Goderich will soon have a noble field of labor among the crowds of seamen from the lake, and it is a matter of thankfulness that those at the head of your Society there, are the men for the work.

Clinton still maintains its high position in the Bible work, and no higher honor can be given, than that this thriving place has made an advance, even on past energy and liberality. Harpurhay and Mitchell are again in advance, with every prospect of greater usefulness in the future. Stratford was the last place visited in the winter tour, and formed a grand finale to the successful work of the season.

By invitation of the Branch, the Bishop of Huron was present and presided. A union service was held in the Town Hall, at which the ministers and members of all denominations took part, and the public meeting on Monday night was one of the most magnificent ever assembled in Canada. The spacious and splendid hall was filled in every part. Ministers of all denominations were on the platform. The speeches were most effective. The enthusiasm unbounded. The Report complete in every part, and the result more than the most sanguine could have anticipated.

Of the New Branches formed during the last year, I visited Mosa, Napier, Metcalfe, Belmont, Pond Mills, Vittoria, Bothwell, Ainlayville, Exeter and Franciston, and Williams. All these Branches are in a healthy and flourishing state, except Napier.

I also found new Branches at Orford, Raleigh, Dresden, Thamesville, Listowell, Towbridge and Moore.

I append a short statement to present the state of the Branches in my field of labour during the past year, premising that among

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the contributions from the old Branches, the large advance of London is not included, nor are the efforts of the new Branch at Williams to be found among the contributions from new Branches.

During the year, while we have added many new friends we have not missed any old friends, and death has made no inroads upon us.

Many most interesting circumstances have arisen to encourage us. In at least three parts of my field of labour we have enjoyed a delightful measure of access to Roman Catholic communities, which I would wish to particularize, did not publicity arouse opposition and hinder the blessed work. We have pushed our lines further into the rising settlements of this noble colony, and more widely spread the Book in the different languages spoken in our diversified and interesting population. We have opened our depots far in the heart of our vast forests, and placed the Bible within reach of our most remote pioneers, and our work is watered by prayers from many a heart, that during this year for the first time has felt the blessings of your efforts. Our contributions have been swelled by the larger gifts of our wealthier people, while the poor, in lesser sums, but with equal liberality, have come to help in this work, and at the close of the year we look with devout gratitude to God who has helped us to extend and strengthen the Kingdom of His Son. We have not only extended our work at home, but by our alliance with our great parent Society in the dear Fatherland, are at this day working to the utmost ends of the earth. *Our Bibles* are in India and China and in Italy, and where the great British and Foreign Bible Society is pressing forward her Godlike work. ## ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BRANTFORD BRANCH OF THE BIBLE SOCIETY.

The annual meeting of the Brantford Branch of the Bible Society was held, according to announcement, in Grace (Episcopal) Church last Monday evening. The spacious edifice was well filled on the occasion by an interested and attentive audience, composed of the various Christian denominations in town desirous by their presence and means to assist in the spread of the gospel—deeply impressed with the fact of

“ Its brightest splendors darting west,  
Our happy shores illumine ;  
Our farther regions, once unblest,  
Now, like a garden, bloom ?”

and with devout hearts praying that—

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" Like Lebanon in tow'ring pride,  
 May all our forests smile ;  
 And may our borders blossom wide,  
 Like Sharon's fruitful soil ?"

The chair was filled by the President of the Society, Rev. J. C. Usher, about whom, on the Platform, were seated a number of the ministers of Brantford, and the agent of the Bible Society, Rev. Geo. Kennedy. The absence of Rev. W. S. Ball, another agent of the Society, and whose presence was fully counted on, was much regretted. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. David Stott, minister of the Church of Scotland, who was followed by other ministers in the delivery of addresses suitable to the occasion. A report of the speeches has been excluded to make room for what will be read with more interest and gratification, viz, the encouraging 24th annual report which was read to the meeting by the Rev. John Wood, Congregational minister. The following is the

## REPORT.

" Another Anniversary renders it proper that the committee of this Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society should give an account of their stewardship. In doing so, they have the satisfaction of reporting that their work is every year becoming increasingly interesting and practical; and that while the income of the Society, from sales and voluntary contributions to its funds, is, with the exception of one year, larger than ever, the direct efforts put forth by the committee for the circulation of the word of God, in the town and surrounding country, have been more satisfactory and encouraging than ever.

" The last annual report of this branch having suggested the propriety of renewed effort in the way of Colportage, the attention of your committee was directed to that object shortly after they were called to administer the affairs of the Society. A meeting of the several Branch societies in the County, by delegation from their several committees, was convened in Brantford, in the month of May last, for the purpose of securing their co-operation, as far as practicable, in this important undertaking. It was then proposed that a suitable man should be sought to act as colporteur in the County of Brant, offering the scriptures for sale at every man's door, and authorised to bestow them gratuitously to such as were anxious to procure them, but were unable to purchase them. Several of the Branch Societies, cordially sympathizing with the proposed movement, promised their assistance in the event of the effort being made—the Mount Pleasant Branch, in particular, having placed at our disposal Stock to the value of \$20—but it was subsequently decided to canvass the town and Township of Brantford, first and afterwards, should the result have proved satisfactory, to undertake, with the help of the Branch Societies willing to co-operate with us, the systematic visitation of the whole County. The latter, your Committee regret to say, through failure of the health of their very efficient and laborious colporteur, Mr. James Woods, has not been accomplished. The canvassing of the town and Township, however, has been most faithfully done, at an expense of less than \$50, in the course of which 217 Bibles and Testaments were sold, and 45 given away. Mr. Woods reports having visited, besides those resident in the town and villages in the Township, over 500 families in the country, with 234 of whom he held lengthened conversation on the matter of personal religion, or offered prayer. His report also states that he found but few persons, or families, utterly destitute of the Bible; " as a general thing, (he remarks) the people are well supplied, and the books I did sell, were mostly sold to those who took an interest in the Bible; the people who need it most are the least anxious about it."

"In addition to these efforts, your Committee have made grants of Bibles to several mission Sabbath schools, organized in the outskirts of the town by the Young Men's Christian Association, and a small grant for the use of the prisoners in the gaol. Their attention has also been recently directed to the desirableness of supplying the several new hotels erected in the town with copies of the Scriptures for the use of travellers; but this suggestion, as well as that of further prosecuting the work of colportage in the county, they must respectfully submit to their successors in office.

"The accounts of the Treasurer and Depository for the year now closing, show sales to the extent of 860 volumes—286 Bibles and 574 Testaments—value, \$159 53; and subscriptions to the amount of \$371 09, to which, if we add \$34 84, the balance in the hands of the Treasurer at the date of the last annual account, we shall find the income of the Society for the year now ending, \$565 46. Of this sum your committee, besides remitting \$183 25 to settle the purchase account, voted \$320 as a free contribution, to be equally divided between the British and Foreign and the Upper Canada Bible Societies. We thus enjoy the honorable distinction of having contributed to the Bible cause the largest sum contributed, during the year 1859-60, by any Branch Society in Canada West, with the exception of those in the cities of Hamilton and Toronto. This statement of our affairs becomes all the more satisfactory when we remember that our stock of books in hand is equal to that of last account, amounting in value to \$165 83 at cost prices in Toronto, all paid for. While, therefore, there may be no room for boasting—and your committee would not make these statements with any such vain-glorious spirit—there is great reason for thankfulness and encouragement, that in seasons of great commercial straitness so much has been done, and done with so much cheerfulness on the part of the contributors to our funds. Let us begin a new year of effort in this cause, resolved to abound more and more in this grace of liberality, and offering all we can devote to it in the spirit of the great and good King David on the occasion of his gathering means for the erection of Israel's gorgeous temple, exclaiming with delight and gratitude to the Author of all our mercies—"of thine own have we given thee!"

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EKFRID EAST BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

Time, with its ceaseless motion, has again brought us to the period, when it becomes the duty of your Committee to render an account of their stewardship.

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It can be readily credited that the esteemed Agent of the U. C. Bible Society, selected the time most convenient for himself, to visit our Branch; yet your Committee cannot forbear to remark, that, satisfactory as are the results which they have it in their power to set before you, they would be still more so, if he had given us two weeks more time to prepare for his coming.

The Volume which it is the peculiar object of the Bible Society to disseminate widely among the nations of the world, has challenged the admiration, and drawn forth the praise of the learned and the good, to whom it was known in all ages and nations. The utmost that can be done to extol its merits, and show forth its praise, must fall very far short of doing it justice. Yet your Committee feel it to be appropriate, on such an occasion as the present, to point to a few of its excellencies, and enumerate a small number out of the many and weighty claims it has on the attention of mankind.

It has, for its author, the Maker and Framer of all beings and all worlds; and so far as He is superior to, and exalted above man, so far must the Bible be superior to all human productions. It communicates knowledge of the utmost importance to every human being, and contains an inexhaustible mass of information, which, without it, could never be found in any other book. As its origin stretches back to the remotest antiquity, so the events it records, and the scenes it describes, date from the early morning of our world's history.

Before the all-subduing majesty of its diction even the Atheist must bow; and from its storehouse even the infidel must get his information. It has, from century to century, stood the fire of the closest investigation; science has presented herself an humble yet powerful witness to substantiate its infallible truthfulness; and the succeeding discoveries of human ingenuity have but more loudly proclaimed its divine origin. There can be no condition of any of Adam's race which it does not fully describe, and no possible difficulty for which it does not furnish a solution. It is suited to all ranks and stations of life—to the wretched beggar equally with the lofty monarch. It gives a clear and perspicuous recital, either historically or prophetically, of all the important transactions of the past, and a certain prediction of what is yet hid from view in the dark future. It contains the purest morality that was ever inculcated, and the best laws ever propagated. It exhibits the loftiest examples of virtue, and the noblest instances of heroism ever made known to mankind. It is, emphatically, the book of books. From year to year, and from age to age, it has furnished matter for innumerable volumes, and countless thousands of discourses; yet it is as far as ever from being exhausted.

It contains all needful warnings against vice and immorality, and all necessary precepts for the guidance of human conduct. The impious attempts of sceptics to turn it into ridicule, or convince the world of its falsehood, have only more clearly revealed its value, and discovered to the nations its superlative excellence. It is so simple in its language that even a child may understand it; yet it contains mysteries which the wisest sages, and most profound philosophers have never been able to fathom; and, what crowns all, it is exactly adapted and is specially intended as a revelation to a race of depraved and ruined beings, whose destiny is an endless eternity; and who can find in it alone any prospect of deliverance from the consequences of their transgression.

Such are some of the features of that book, which it is the one simple, undivided object of the Bible Society to distribute, to the utmost possible extent

among all kindreds, tongues and peoples. To every country in which it becomes generally known, it must be a source of untold good, vastly elevating the moral and intellectual condition of a people in addition to the spiritual and saving benefits, which, under the divine blessing, must flow from it. Our beloved Queen, on being asked the secret of England's greatness, pointed to a copy of the Bible, and said, "That is the secret of England's greatness."

Then, considering the character of the Bible—considering the state of those who have it not, and considering the benefits which it must confer, the object of making it known to the hundreds of millions who are destitute of it, is one which has the strongest claims on the support of every true Christian, and every lover of the best interests of humanity.

It is sad to think that the Bible is not yet known to one half the world's inhabitants. Yet, even in this professedly christian land, many are destitute of it; many more have it, but seldom or never peruse it; and of those who do read it, thousands do so without any right understanding of its meaning, or deriving any lasting benefit from it.

It is now time that your Committee should go on to give the results of the Society's operations during the year. The only purchase of Stock made during the year was fifty-one Testaments; and the amount of our indebtedness to the U. C. Bible and Tract Societies, is \$7 80. The value of Stock reported on hand last year, was \$33 25½, including two cases charged to us at 80 cents., which, being deducted, leaves \$32 45½. We trust, under the blessing of God, that the labors of this Society have been the means of enlightening some small portion of the dark places of the earth. We bless the God of the Bible for the many privileges that we enjoy, both civil and religious. We believe we owe all to that Blessed inspired Volume, when we look on the dark places of our World, whether it be Popery or Heathenism, there we see the Bible has no entry; they lay in the darkness of night. Let us pray the God of the Bible that a way may be opened up, so that the Light of the ever Blessed Gospel may shine with all its effulgent light and brilliant lustre into the valley of these dry bones, and that like Ezekiel's vision, they may live and become an exceedingly great army. Let our motto be—*Give the Bible to all.* Our own indebtedness to the Bible should constrain us to pity those who have it not. What have we, and what are we which we do not owe to the Bible and its influences; if we rejoice in our intelligence as a people, in our free institutions, in the general diffusion of the blessings of religion; in peace, prosperity, happiness, let us remember that for all these we are indebted to the Bible; if ours is a land of happy families, let us not forget that it is the Bible which has taught us to respect the marriage relation, and rendered us in some measure, faithful to the relative duties of life; and hence that it is to the Bible that we owe every endearment of home; ah! what would our homes be without the Bible—*The Family Bible.* Put the Bible into every House, and you strike a light which shall never be extinguished; the bright shining of whose rays all the darkness of Popery can never obscure, whose blaze shall increase till the millenium glories shall shed their blessed radiance over the earth, when the light of the moon shall be as the light of the sun, and the light of the sun shall be sevenfold as the light of seven days, and glad voices shall be heard in Heaven; saying, the Kingdoms of this world are become the Kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ.

That noble Institution, the British and Foreign Bible Society, of which this Auxiliary forms an humble part, is still winding its way; its active Agents and vigilant Committee with that true Patriotic British Nobleman, the Earl of Shaftesbury at its head, is ever ready to pour the inspired Volume into the Nations which providence is from time to time opening up to their influence. The sale of Bibles and Testaments at the present time is going on with great activity in the Kingdom of Naples. Your Committee in reviewing the past, feel the present aspect of the Society is very encouraging, and should call forth gratitude to the God of the Bible that He has in some measure allowed His creatures to become co-workers with Him in this great and glorious work.

The income of the Parent Society through the past year amounted to the noble sum of £160,062 19s. 4d. sterling, being £7,488 15s. 10d sterling, in advance of the previous year, and £21,318 2s 1d sterling in advance of the Receipts of 1856-7.

The issues of the Parent Society during the past year, amounted to One Million Six Hundred and Twenty five Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty Five Copies.

The Total Issues of the Society have now reached Thirty five Millions Six Hundred and Nine Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty one Copies.

The Total number of Auxiliaries 3,639.

Your Committee have the pleasure of stating that the income of this Society from collections and subscriptions, is £17 14s 2½d in advance of last year. The total amount paid to the Treasurer through the past year from collections and Subscriptions is £64 13 10½. The sale of Bibles and Testaments is in the advance of the previous year 19 copies. The number of copies sold is 256.

Amount of sales through the past year has been £16 3s 11d, being an increase in the value of sales over the previous year of £1 12s 8½d. Debts due the Society £4 12s 4d. Number of copies circulated since the formation of this Branch, 2,753. Number of copies on hand, 445; value £47 19s. Discount allowed on sales to Sabbath Schools, &c., £1 4s. 1d. Purchase account through the year, £32 6s. 8d. Due to the Upper Canada Bible and Tract Societies on purchase account, £12 14s. 2d.

Your Committee have again the gratification of noticing subscriptions from both the Grammar and Common Schools of this Village, a fact highly creditable both to teachers and pupils.

We cannot conclude without returning our warmest thanks to our Collectors for their exertions in behalf of the Society.

The meeting was closed with prayer, when all separated highly gratified with their visit to the annual meeting of the Bible Society.

#### REPORT OF THE FERGUS BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY, FOR THE YEAR ENDING 1st FEBRUARY, 1861.

The Committee of the Fergus Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society, in presenting another Annual Report of their operations, cannot do so without, at the same time, expressing gratitude to Almighty God for what they have been enabled to attempt, with the view of advancing the interests of the Redeemer's Kingdom among men; and for the measure of success, so far as it has been discernible, which has attended their efforts. The grand result, the *salvation of sinners*, they cannot in any case point to, as instrumentally effected by means of the distribution of Bibles by this Branch Society, but they desire to work in hope and expectation, that their labour will not be "in vain in the Lord." No breach has been made in your Committee. The members who have undertaken the work of collecting, have made their returns, and the sum of \$165 61 $\frac{1}{2}$  of free contributions is found to have been subscribed. This exhibits of itself, desirable progress; and the Committee trust that the same, or a yet larger sum may be reached, next, and future years, notwithstanding certain causes that may operate for a time against the Financial interests of the Branch. The Report presented to you a year ago, said:—"The sales in the Village have been considerably short of the former year; but the free contributions have been greater." It is now the pleasing duty of the Committee to report an increase in both these departments. Last year's Report further remarked, that, through the establishment in the Village, of a Branch of the Upper Canada Tract Society, the worth of the Bible *might* be more fully made known to some, than it had yet been; and thus the Bible itself, might in future be more sought after. Whether in every case the result has been owing to this, it is impossible to say; but certainly, there has been more demand for the Bible in Fergus, during the past season, than for some previous years; 77 Bibles and 116 Testaments having been disposed of at the Depositories. The Committee desire to express their sense of

the obligations they lie under to the various ladies and gentlemen, who have cordially engaged in the work of collecting subscriptions; and more especially to those ladies in Fergus, who most readily responded to the request made of them at the suggestion of last Annual Meeting, and with much zeal, perseverance and success, have acted as collectors in the Village. The free contributions taken up in Fergus, amounting to \$20 more than last year, or in all \$64 79½ is sufficient proof of the wisdom of selecting ladies to this part of the work, and this can safely be said without disparagement of any former collectors. The application of the same Agency to the whole field of the operations of the Branch has not been attempted, and perhaps could not, except in certain localities, with success. It is, however, right to acknowledge that, in one of the country districts, two ladies did act as collectors, cheerfully giving their time and trouble, and with no diminution of the amount formerly obtained. The difference in some districts from others is quite observable, in various members contributing, in place of the head of the family alone. Were this generally the case, there would be no lack of funds to send the Bible on its mission of mercy to mankind: and there would be some ground to hope that a general and heartfelt interest existed in its diffusion.

The Committee have reason to expect that a Branch of the Bible Society will shortly be organized at Douglas, which will probably do away with any call for maintaining a Depository there as heretofore, and reduce the amount of free contributions to this Branch for future years, unless some other locality should be found, as well suited for a Depository, and equally disposed to contribute to the cause, and to assist in carrying on the work which has characterized the friends of the Society in that part of Garafraxa. There is a wide field for all the exertions that can be used, and work to do which your Committee might have been unable to overtake. The connection of this Branch with the Village of Mount Forest, has also terminated since last Annual Meeting, by the formation there of a Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society; and the receipts for the past year shew a sum received for Bibles sold previously, which should have been given in before last meeting. The Committee acted on the advice of the Agent of the Society, in taking credit for a time, for Stock required for the Branch, and was thus able to give \$160 as a Donation to be divided equally between the British and Foreign, and Upper Canada Bible Society. They are happy to say that the stock obtained during the season, has now been all paid for, and that their remains in the Depositories in Fergus, 129 Bibles and 84 Testaments, which is amply sufficient to supply all demands for a while, although not so varied in character as is desirable. There also remains in the Treasurer's hands, a free balance of \$190 37, the appropriation of which, in whole or in part, for aiding in circulating the word of God at home or abroad, in some one or more of those quarters, where in His Providence an opening has only very recently been possible, the Committee trust and believe it will be accompanied by the earnest prayers of many of the subscribers, that the whole "earth may soon be filled with the knowledge of the Lord."

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GEORGETOWN BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY FOR THE YEAR, 1860.

It has pleased Almighty God in His great mercy, to spare our lives, and again permit us to meet together to celebrate another Anniversary of our Branch Bible Society.

In rendering an account of our stewardship in reference to the operations of this Branch during the past year, Your Committee would beg to remind you of the fact that a Society, situated as we are, where the community are supplied with the word of life, and at the same time, professing at least, a nominal assent to the great truths of our beloved Christianity, there is not of necessity, so many incidents of individual effort, or enterprise, or so many interesting exhibitions of the power and influence of the Divine word upon the hearts and lives of individuals to be traced directly to the operations of our Society.

Your Committee are, however, thankful to be able to congratulate the Society on the prosperous, and satisfactory condition of its affairs.

The contributions just collected are considerably in advance of any previous year, since the organization of this Branch.

Our collectors have been as abundant in labors as in former years, and to their praise-worthy and indefatigable efforts, we are indebted for the handsome sum we will be able to present as a free contribution.

Although the amount raised may be considered creditable, and the subscriptions of many of our friends furnish a noble exhibition of *Christian generosity*, yet, we feel assured that many who only contribute their twenty-five cents, and others who give *nothing*—if more fully aware of the magnitude of the Society's operations, and the incalculable good resulting from its labors would give such sums as would swell our contributions to more than *double* the present amount.

It therefore becomes us to continue faithful in using every reasonable effort to press the claims of the Society on every member of our community, and by that means the illiberality and narrow-mindedness, that our collectors so often meet with, will gradually give place to a more enlightened sense of duty. Never did the Parent Society stand in greater need of the increased exertions of its friends in all its branches. Millions are anxiously waiting for the labors of the *Bible Society*. Passing events on the Continent are now producing extraordinary openings for the circulation of the Scriptures.

The correspondent of the London *Times*, writing from Naples under date of September 26, says :—The greatest wonder of the day, and the fact which inspires the greatest hope for the future of this country is, that the Bible and the new Testament were exposed for sale in the Toledo yesterday. Let the 25th September, 1860, be written in red letters in the History of the Two Sicilies, as the day when the true light of freedom was shed in this country. *Bibles* selling in the streets of Naples, was a marvellous sight for the Neapolitans, for I have no hesitation in saying that *not one man* in a thousand ever saw a Bible; vast numbers could not read it, though the kingdom is teeming with priests who assume to be the lights of the world.

There is much to cherish and encourage us in this good work, and who can think of the labours and prospects of the Society and at the same time remember his own fleeting opportunities for usefulness, without considering the Divine injunction. Whatsoever Thine hand findeth to do, do with all thy might.

BIBLE SOCIETY MEETING.

On the evening of the 3rd current, Revd. Mr. Ball, Bible Society Agent, preached an appropriate sermon in Knox's Church, at the close of which the sum of \$10 67 was collected on behalf of the Society.

The Annual meeting of the Goderich Branch of that Society was held in the Wesleyan Methodist Church on the 4th current. The chair was taken at 7 o'clock by Rev. A. McKid, who made an introductory address and then called on the Secretary and Treasurer to read their respective Annual Reports, as follows:—

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GODERICH B. B. SOCIETY.

Goderich, 4th March, 1861.

In presenting the Annual Report of the Goderich Branch Bible Society for 1860-1, Your Committee have much pleasure in reporting a marked improvement in the state of the Society over that of the previous year. They would not affirm that as much has been done as could have been accomplished, or that the appreciation of the objects of your Society, or the public zeal on their behalf has been at all commensurate with their overwhelming importance. It is true that there are comparatively few in this vicinity who are absolutely destitute of the scriptures, our great want is a living Christianity—a large proportion even of our church going population is attached to empty forms and venerated customs rather than to the truth as it is in Jesus.

Yet, when your Committee consider the increase in the amount collected this year when compared with that of last year—when they reflect on the favorable reception generally accorded to your collectors, and the increased interest expressed by the people on behalf of Bible and Tract circulation—when they recollect the valuable information disseminated here, respecting the cause of Bible truth throughout the world, and especially when they think of the cordial unanimity with which, not only at our monthly concerts for prayer, but at all our meetings, the friends of the different churches have joined together in pleading with God that He would bless his cause in every land, your Committee cannot but give thanks to Jehovah for what he has done, and urge upon your Society to press on to future duty, with renewed energy and hope.

But your Committee would not confine their views to their own immediate locality. They feel that the dawn of the promised millennial glory has risen upon the world, and that during the past year more has been accomplished by way of preparation for its full development than centuries have accomplished at other times.

In China they would see the warlike operations of Great Britain and France marvellously joining the operations of the rebel Chinese, in throwing light upon the grinding oppression and hideous Idolatry of that land; but the people must be supplied with the sacred Scriptures to bring them near to God.

Your Committee rejoice to hear of the contemplated employment of Female Bible readers to operate upon the millions of women in Burmah; but these Bible readers require the word of God to aid them in their work.

They hear a voice uttered not merely by the moral destitution of long neglected India. Multitudes in that vast region are now enjoying the Bread of life, and untold multitudes more are ardently longing and calling for that precious boon, and can Christians under British rule refuse that gift of God?

Your Committee feel that the abolition of Serfdom in Russia, creates a vastly important era in the moral development of that people which calls loudly for the Word of God.

The upheavings in Germany and especially in Austria, require the sacred Scriptures to guide those downtrodden people and nations into the desired strongholds of liberty and peace.

Italy, too, blessed of God, has snapped assunder the galling chain which lately bound her, and throughout the greater part of the peninsula, she lives under the protection of a constitutional government of her own choice. But yet the war between her devoted sons and their relentless enemies is not yet ended. It was not to be expected that the Popish Hierarchy would suffer their temporal power to be snatched from them without again and again putting forth all their energy to effect its restoration. It could not be, that Jesuitical cunning and hatred of everything good, would cease all at once to plot and labour to undermine and destroy this reformation work. To aid the Italians in their coming struggle, however, we must throw light upon their path. The word of God must be put into every hand. This alone will give stability to their institutions and permanency to their triumphs. But, in one word, your Committee feel that God has arisen out of this place to urge on the work of latter day glory. And the word of God tells us that in that day "The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord as the waters cover the sea." That at that time the voices in Heaven shall be heard

saying, for then it shall be true.—The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ, and He shall reign forever and ever. There are mighty obstacles in every land to the realization of this transcendent glory; but do we not now see in every quarter of the globe the very foundations of society being upheaved and revolutionized. Those things which can be shaken are being shaken, that those things which cannot be shaken may remain; and above all other operations those revivals of practical and heart felt religion, accomplishing such mighty moral revolutions in so many parts of the world in which darkness has become light in the Lord, and infidelity itself has been taught to pray. In the midst of these circumstances your committee cannot but feel that Jehovah calls on them and you to be fellow laborers with Him in this great work. Let us then “gird on our armour” and “go forth to the help of the Lord against the mighty.” Let our conduct in the coming year prove that we feel this at once to be our privilege and our duty.

THE TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GUELPH BRANCH  
OF THE UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

Your Committee, in presenting their Annual Report, would call attention to the fact, that the Society whose affairs they have been called to manage during the past year, has now been in existence for a *quarter of a century*. What wonderful changes have taken place during this period, and how marked the contrast in the aspect of the world as a field for Bible circulation, twenty-five years ago, and now. No intelligent christian can survey the varied points in this marked contrast, without discerning abundant cause for thankfulness to Almighty God, whose providence has so mightily wrought with His people in their efforts to spread Divine truth through the earth. Events tread so closely on each others heels in this age, that to give even a bird's eye view of the chief occurrences of the past quarter of a century, in their bearing on Bible Society operations, would make a respectable volume. But, as it is often easier to see, after an interval, that a plant or tree *has grown*, than it is to satisfy one's-self that it is growing—so it often helps a just appreciation of a holy enterprise, to view it at two points or periods of its history, and note the progress made through intervening years. Such a contemplation of the Bible cause as a whole, would be a good spiritual prescription for those hypochondriac Christians, who for want of observing the wondrous works of God on the Earth, are evermore taking despondent and gloomy views of things, in their bearing on the kingdom of Jesus Christ.

The past year has been inferior to no preceding one in signs of promise and tokens of encouragement. Indeed, the year 1860 will ever be memorable, if for no other event, for this, the opening up of Italy for the circulation of the Word of God. That interesting country, where until recently, priestly tyranny punished the cravings of souls hungry for the bread of life, with torture and imprisonment, is now free, and Christian sympathy can minister unimpeded to its moral needs. Nowhere had the Bible been more rigidly interdicted than in Naples, but no sooner was the dictatorship of Garibaldi established, than the interdict was done away, and men might be seen standing behind their stalls holding up the Book of Books, and exclaiming, "Who will buy the Bible?" In Tuscany and Florence, where, a few short months ago, parties were imprisoned for having a copy of the Scriptures in their possession, persecution has ceased. In the language of an earnest laborer in that field, "the priest has been removed from the Custom House; boxes of Bibles and Evangelical books daily cross the frontier; depots have been established, and colporteurs, under the sanction of the law, are vending the Bible from cafe to cafe in all the large towns, as well as from hamlet to hamlet, in the agricultural districts. Instead of an outburst of infidel sentiment attending the present political crisis, its leading characteristic has been the desire everywhere manifested to obtain a copy of the Bible, and hear the Gospel preached." In view of such facts, your committee cannot repress the exclamation, "It is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes."

The cheering appearance of things, on the European continent generally, is somewhat marred by the persecuting attitude still assumed by the Spanish Government, which has recently treated two men most barbarously, simply for the crime of reading the Word of God. It is to be hoped that an effectual remonstrance against this outrage has already been sent by the British Government to that miserable and decrepid power, as an earnest and influential appeal for that purpose has been made to the Foreign Secretary, by a large deputation representing the allied Protestantism of England.

The noble Parent Society of Great Britain shows no symptoms of weakness or decay, but on the contrary seems renewing its youth, and girding itself for its gloriously expanding work. Its last report contains these charming passages: "The prominent characteristic by which the Society has been distinguished during this fifty-fifth year of its history, is *enlargement*. The receipts amounting to the noble sum of £160,062 tell of enlargement. The issues reaching to more than 1,625,000 copies, tell of enlargement. In fields of labor already occupied, there are enlarged demands for the Scriptures. There is enlargement, too, in the opening of countries, where hitherto, little or nothing has been accomplished for the dissemination of the Bible.

An interesting movement has lately commenced in the British metropolis designed to provide "Bibles for the Million." Its objects are "the reading aloud of the Word of God in the squares, lanes, courts, roads, &c., of the City of London and its suburbs,—together with the sale of Bibles at cost price, and the giving away printed papers containing small portions of the Word of God only. It is hoped and believed, that the attention of many careless ones will be arrested, and much good done by this novel agency.

The Upper Canada Bible Society is also pursuing its work vigorously. Its receipts for the year prior to its last Annual Meeting, show a very considerable advance on the preceding year, while the Report supplies many cheering facts in reference to Bible work in this land.

The signs of the times, and the aspect of the cause in which we are engaged, justify a cheerful courage and a large faith, while they call on God's people to redouble their efforts and prayers that the Word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified, until it shall become a household book, and a heart treasure all over the world.

We who enjoy the inestimable privilege of Gospel light and Gospel freedom, cannot but feel the deep responsibility resting upon us to use our utmost efforts in promoting the universal diffusion of that glorious light, which we believe is yet to illuminate the nations, and dispel those dark clouds of ignorance and superstition which envelope three-fourths of our race. The Bible Society, a Branch of which we are, whose gigantic operations are carried on under a system the most complete and extensive of any Christian Mission that has yet been established, presents to us the most favorable medium of rendering our local efforts subservient to the evangelization of the world. It is, therefore, with the greatest pleasure that we hail the annual visits of those useful messengers of peace, the Agents of the "Upper Canada Bible Society, bringing tidings of the progress of truth, and infusing new life and vigor into our Branch Institutions."

REPORT OF THE INGERSOL B. B. SOCIETY.

In the Report presented last year it was stated the sale of books at your Depository had greatly exceeded any previous year, and we have great pleasure in stating that the sales for the past year have nearly equalled that

being only \$1 92 short, the amount of the sales being \$79 47. In the course of the year \$82 worth of books, such as are of most general sale, have been purchased, and the amount of our present stock is \$144 64, being \$2 53 more than last year. Your Committee have also enquired after the Bibles and Testaments furnished last year to the taverns, for the accommodation of travellers, &c., and have pleasure in reporting that all are safe, and with the exception of those left at one tavern, occupying the places for which they were furnished, the exception, however, are in good keeping and will be furnished to your Depository in a short time.

Your Committee, ever anxious to meet the wants of the needy, avail themselves with pleasure of those opportunities when met with to furnish, without money and without price, the Word of God unto those who are unable to buy, although but one or two opportunities have occurred during the past year. In conclusion, your Committee respectfully submit that your Society is now in a most happy, healthful and efficient state; having a good, useful and well-selected stock in your Depository, free from debt and encumbrance, which we trust will enable you to present a handsome bonus to the parent Society.

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whether or not they would be willing to enter into an arrangement of the kind indicated, and give pecuniary support to the carrying of it out. The reply of the directors, however, was unfavorable, and your committee, finding that the funds of the Society would not warrant their undertaking the measure alone, any action in reference to it has been again postponed for the present.

In last year's report there was notice taken of a proposal to place copies of the Scriptures, for the use of travellers, in the rooms of the principal hotels in the city. This proposal has been carried out, and 140 Bibles employed in that way, at an expense of \$65 90. On every Bible there was placed a label indicating that it was granted by the Society for public use. And we have heard of instances in which travellers have expressed their gratification at finding the Word of God thus provided for their use, and there is full ground to hope that He who hath said, "My word shall not return to me void," will make it the means of spiritual good to many whose cases may never be heard of in this world.

The issues of the Society during the year have been, of Bibles, 531, and of Testaments, 803—making the total number of copies issued, 1,334. All these were issued in the form of sales, with the exception of 153 given as gratuities. One copy, in large type, was placed in the hospital for the use of one of the patients there, twelve were distributed to destitute families in Westminster, and 140, as already stated, placed in the hotels.

The Society has not been in a position to make any donations of money this year. Last year \$200 were given to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and \$160 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. But part of the amounts thus used was taken from the proceeds of sales, which diminished the means for keeping up the stock. This, together with the increase in the number of depositaries, has rendered it necessary to employ the free contributions collected in the city this year, in increasing the amount of Stock.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MILTON BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY, AND TWENTY-FIRST OF THE SOCIETY'S OPERATIONS.

On the conclusion of the labors of another year, it becomes the duty of Your Committee to give an account of their stewardship, and resign the trust committed to their care.

In reviewing the work of the past year, Your Committee desire to express their gratitude to the Giver of all good, that He hath deigned to own and bless, and crown with some measure of success, their humble efforts for the promotion of His glory.

While we rejoice that the cause is still onwards, and that its numerous friends have again manifested the deep interest which they feel in this great work, by contributing liberally of their means to help it forward, our hearts are saddened by the reflection, that he, who, at our last Anniversary was appointed to the responsible office of Secretary to this Society, has "ceased from his labors" and passed from among us; we refer to the late Geo. Brown, Esq. But while we have lost his valuable assistance here, it comforts us to know, that, that word which he labored so earnestly to disseminate among others, had its desired influence upon his own heart, and that through months' of affliction and suffering, he could calmly look forward to the hour when his Master should say, well done good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of thy Lord.

Your Committee, ever anxious to advance, by any means in their power, the interests of the Society, have concluded to change the time of holding the Annual Meeting from spring to the fall, or winter, believing that at these seasons of the year, the contributions to the Society could be more readily collected, and that owing to a more favorable condition of the roads, a better attendance could be secured at our Anniversaries.

For the present year this change has perhaps lessened, to some extent, the contributions to the Society, inasmuch as the subscribers have been twice called on within a few months.

Your Committee would acknowledge their obligations to the collectors who have faithfully discharged the duty devolving upon them, and thus materially contributed to the prosperity of the Society.

The contributions to your Society for the present year, have amounted to \$165 48½, considerably in advance of last year.

Through the liberality of the supporters of the Society, Your Committee have been able to increase their free contributions to \$180; \$100 to the B. & F. Bible Society, and \$80 to the U. C. Bible Society.

The dissemination among all "nations and kindreds, and tongues of that Book which reveals God's will to us, and from which alone we can learn those truths which are able to make us wise unto salvation, is one of the most glorious works in which our energies can be employed. A Book which is the Divinely appointed means by which we are to be instructed in our duty to God, and to our fellow men. The source whence we obtain our knowledge of the goodness and mercy of God, and of the way and plan of salvation which hath been wrought out for us.

"Hast thou ever heard of such a Book? The Author, God Himself—The Subject, God and Man—Salvation—Life and Death—Eternal Life—Eternal Death—Most wondrous Book!—Bright Candle of the Lord!—Star of Eternity! The only Star by which the bark of man could navigate the sea of life, and gain the coast of bliss securely.

Of this precious Book, the B. & F. Bible Society, with which we have the honor to be identified through the U. C. Bible Society, has distributed in various parts of the world, during the past year, 1,900,000 copies; a number greater than in any previous year. In almost every nation of the world, the Agents of this Society are working energetically and perseveringly, and God is crowning their efforts with success.

Nations, who, but a few years ago, were firmly closed against the introduction of the word of God, are gradually removing the barriers, and permitting the light of truth to shine in upon them. In all the nations of Europe, the work of distribution is being carried on with increased vigor. In Italy, the field is widening and the prospect grows more cheerily, and we have every encouragement to hope that the revolution which is now going on in that Country will lead to the enjoyment of greater religious and political liberty, and open up the way for increased circulation of the word of truth.

In Turkey the work is progressing gloriously. The hitherto bigoted and exclusive Mahometan, are laying aside the fabrications of the Koran, and are eagerly purchasing the Scriptures, and evidence are not wanting to shew that many have been brought to a knowledge of Christ as their Saviour. In China, too, a great work is being accomplished, and there is good reason to believe that Japan, hitherto secluded from the rest of the world, will soon be thrown open for the circulation of the word of God. In our own country too, the good work is progressing; 27,000 copies of the Scriptures have been circulated by the U. C. Bible Society, during the past year; and the Colporteurs engaged by the Society, have visited 1454 families, with the conviction that their labors have not been in vain. And in like manner over the whole world, the labors of the Society have been signally owned and blessed of God. The fields which are occupied have brought forth fruit abundantly, to the honor and glory of God, thus encouraging us to persevere in our "work of faith, and labor of love."

While the labors of past years are yielding their harvest, new doors of usefulness are constantly presenting themselves to us; and from every side we hear the Macedonian cry, "come over and help us," urging us on to more earnest, continuous effort for the dissemination of the truth, and the salvation of our fellow-men. Let us, then, while we contribute liberally of our means for the advancement of this glorious work, pray fervently that the time may soon come, when all the nations of the earth shall own the mild sway of the "King of Righteousness," and ascribe "blessing and honor, and glory, and power unto Him that sitteth upon the Throne, and unto the Lamb forever."

Secretary, Mount Pleasant B. B. S.,—

Sir,—I think the greater number of the families in the vicinity connected with that Branch have been visited. Having two objects in view, in the discharge of this duty, namely: to circulate as many copies of Sacred Scriptures as possible, and to elicit the sympathies of the people in reference to the claims and operations of the Society. Having, some time after visiting your neighborhood, I made a visit to a portion of the Township of Ops, Fenton and the Northern border of Mariposa, I may inform you that one hundred and

thirty-two volumes were received from the Depository, including Bibles and Testaments, which have been all circulated by sales and gifts, excepting fifteen Bibles. I am glad to be able to inform you that all the Tracts which the Committee supplied, have been circulated gratuitously, which amounted to almost three thousand pages.

In conclusion, Your Committee cannot but express their gratification at the result of the past year's operations, and still hope that the blessing of God may rest upon the labors of our successors in office; so that they may be the means of assisting in placing the blessed book in the hands of all those who are destitute of it, so that every house may, *thereby*, become a house of prayer, and every heart a fit temple for the living God to dwell in.

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE OSHAWA BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

In presenting the seventh annual report of the Oshawa Branch Bible Society, Your Committee beg leave to observe, that while they have much to be thankful for during the past year, in the interest and zeal which has been evinced by the various officers and collectors connected with the Society in this place, they have at the same time, to disclose the loss of one of the firmest friends of the Institution, in the person of Mr. Burns, the Society's Depository for the Village, who died a few days ago, retaining up to the last moment his connection with the Society, whose interests for a long series of years he has done his utmost to promote.

In reviewing the events of the year that has just closed, your Committee have great pleasure in referring to the wonderful Providence of God, whereby in other lands, new and enlarged fields of enterprise and usefulness has been opened up, for the Society's operations, and that in *Italy*, where but a few short months ago, the Book of God was hunted and proscribed by the authorities of the land, it can now be disseminated without let or hindrance, as freely as in our own country, and its soul-saving truths can now be proclaimed by the messengers of peace in the ears of all the people.

Surely, when we consider the mighty changes which a few short months has witnessed, may we not exclaim, "what has God wrought, and how wonderful has he magnified His holy name."

THE SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ORILLIA AND ORO  
BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

Every religious institution has its periodical spring and neap-tides, at one time flowing on in a full tide of prosperity, and at another exposed to the storms of adversity. Such has been the history of our Branch Society in this place. When first established, the country was in a prosperous state, and stimulated by the fervid eloquence of Mr. Taylor, and by the charm of novelty, which has a powerful effect on the Canadian minds, the sum of \$126 75c. was cheerfully raised. In 1856, our greatest prosperity was attained, \$151 15 having been contributed. In 1857, a nearly equal amount (\$142 75) was raised. Then came the crushing crisis, which has prostrated so many of novelty well nigh removed, it need not excite surprise, that in 1858, our contributions fell to \$105 39. In 1859, the prospects of the country were dark and lowering in the extreme, a blighting frost so injured the crops, that famine and bankruptcy threatened the country, and in Europe, was raging a fierce war, which seemed about to extend over the whole of that continent. Under such depressing circumstances, it might have been expected that our Society would be greatly affected; and we accordingly regret to chronicle 1859, as our least prosperous year, the contributions amounting to \$79 38. This year, as might have been anticipated from the returning prosperity of the country, the sum raised has increased to \$99 46. And may not the hope be cherished, that, with returning prosperity and the cheering prospect of a fertile harvest, (a prospect, that, with the blessing of God, seems about to be realized,) our small Branch may spread its roots like Lebanon, and more than attain to its past prosperity.

The following table, handed in by the Treasurer, is regarded as important, and is therefore embodied in this Report:—

**REPORT OF THE PETERBORO' BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY, 1860.**

The Committee in presenting a report of their proceedings for the past year, although they have little to lay before you of an exciting or animating nature with reference to the more immediate operations of the Branch in their own neighborhood, yet rejoice that with you they are permitted to lend their humble efforts and influence in spreading abroad a knowledge of the Saviour's name through the circulation of the Book of God, being convinced that the Bible in the heart, the home and the nation, can alone purify, elevate and save. It is mainly to its influence that we, as a nation, occupy the highest and happiest position on the face of the whole earth. Let us guard our blessings and seek to feel more and more grateful for our inestimable privileges, appreciating and improving them, shewing our gratitude and sense of their greatness by continuing, yea, and exerting ourselves more strenuously to extend the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, and thus be instrumental in some measure in ushering in that happy era when the knowledge of the Lord shall cover the earth as the waters cover the channel of the mighty deep.

At their first meeting your Committee resolved to continue the services of Mr. Nicholls, as Colporteur. They appropriated the sum of £30 of the amount placed at their disposal as a free contribution to the Toronto Society, requesting that a portion should be set apart for the circulation of the Scriptures in Lower Canada. At the last meeting of the former committee a resolution having been passed and a copy transmitted to the Committee of the Tract Society, the substance of which was "to take into consideration the propriety of combining the efforts of that Society with those of the Bible Society in regard to colportage." A letter was read stating that the Committee of the Tract Society, cordially approving of the same, had appointed a Committee to confer with the Committee of the Bible Society, the result of which conference was "that in the mean time all that the Tract Society was in a position to do was to supply the Colporteur with the Tracts of the Society," which has accordingly been done.

At their next meeting your Committee learned with regret Mr. Nicholls had been obliged to resign the office of Colporteur. At that meeting the ministers of the town and the Secretary were appointed to take the necessary steps to procure a Colporteur.

After the lapse of some time during which several sub-committee meetings were held and letters having passed between the Committee, the Toronto Society and others relative to a Colporteur, the services of Mr. John McDonald, of Eldon, who had been employed by the Woodville and Beaverton Young Men's Christian Association, were secured, who the Committee believe has discharged his duties with fidelity and zeal.

Mr. McDonald commenced operations in the Township of Otonabee, where he visited one hundred and twenty-five Protestant families, among whom he sold seventy-five copies of the Sacred Scriptures and distributed fifty-six Tracts, supplying an indigent widow and family with a copy of the Bible. The most of the people there take a deep interest in the cause, those whom he found did not, he endeavored to enlist their sympathies in the good work. He also visited in that Township thirty-eight Roman Catholic families, among whom he left ten Tracts; they in general received him very coldly, almost refusing intercourse with him, he, however, was permitted to hold conversations with a few of them; he relates three conversations which he had, in which he pointed them to the only ground of hope and acceptance with God, namely: faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, and endeavored to prove to them from Scripture the falsity of some of the tenets of their Church; with one of the persons he left a copy of the New Testament.

Mr. McDonald next visited the Townships of Emily, Ennismore and part of Smith. In the latter Township they are well supplied with Bibles. On this tour he visited ninety-four Protestant families and fifty-six Roman Catholic families. Sold to Protestants fifty-eight copies; to a Roman Catholic one copy; gave to Roman Catholics three copies. He was received by the Roman Catholics there better than by those in Otonabee, and was comparatively well entertained by them. He also distributed forty Tracts amongst the Roman Catholics of Ennismore. He remarks that they appear to be destitute of knowledge, especially of that derived from the Bible. He had a good deal of conversation with them, also read several portions of the New Testament while they compared it with the Dowry Translation, a copy of which he carried along with him. He thinks that more would have made themselves possessors of the sacred volume, but for their fear of each other and especially of the Priest.

Mr. McDonald next canvassed part of the Townships of Emily, Ops, Fencelon, Eldon and Verulum. On this tour he visited two hundred and seventy-eight Protestant families and thirty Roman Catholic families. Sold one hundred and fifty-seven copies of the Scriptures; giving gratuitously eleven copies, and distributed one hundred and nine Tracts.

During the two and a half months he has been engaged he has visited about six hundred and fifty families; sold between three and four hundred copies of the Scriptures; given to those who were unable to purchase sixteen copies, and distributed about two hundred and fifty Tracts.

The issues from the Depository amount to eight hundred and seventy-nine copies, being two hundred and ninety-five copies more than last year. The subscriptions for the present year amount to \$225 62.

With regard to the operations of the Parent Society the Committee would only state that so far from it's showing any symptoms of weakness or decay, still advances in vigor and strength, entering into the many doors that are opening for the dissemination of the Holy Scriptures, and seeking to address to every nation in its own language the message of peace and reconciliation. In no previous year was the Society permitted to accomplish as much as during the past year, and in no year has it been favored with more numerous or cheering proofs that the seed of the word scattered abroad has been blessed by the Spirit of God to the salvation of immortal souls. The receipts for the year amounts to the large sum of £164,136 6s. 5d., while the payments have exceeded that sum nearly £15,000 the issues exceed 1,900,000 copies, the largest issue of Holy Scriptures ever effected in any one year.

Surely there is abundant encouragement for increased zeal in the great work; although much has been done, infinitely more is yet to be done; we have freely received, let us freely give of our substance, our efforts, but especially our prayers that God would bless yet more abundantly the means thus employed by copious effusions of His Spirit. Thus shall we ourselves be more effectually blessed and made a blessing.

Your Committee desires to feel grateful that they are permitted, along with you, to aid in sending the Bible to those distant lands, the only instrument that an all-wise Creator sees fit to employ through the agency of his servants, to enlighten the mind and bring back his erring children that have strayed far from God, and point out clearly to them, through his own blessed word, the way of salvation through the cross of Christ.

And in conclusion, your committee would state that, upon the whole, our prospects here are good, and they fondly hope that the next report that is submitted to you, after our Society has been a little longer in operation, will not only be fuller, but also more cheering than the present one.

REPORT OF THE SARNIA B. B. SOCIETY.

In performing the annual work of submitting a report of the proceedings of our Branch of the Bible Society, the Committee will confine themselves to a brief statement of facts and the offering of one suggestion, which they consider will contribute to the advancement of the cause we have in hand.

First, as to facts, a branch of the Society has been established in the Township of Moore; this, while it will diminish the amount of money at the disposal of the Sarnia Branch, will, we confidently hope, be of great benefit to the Township in which it is established, while at the same time it will tend to interest the inhabitants more deeply in our cause.

Eighty-four Bibles and seventy-eight Testaments have been sold during the year and ten given as free gifts. Some portions of the Bible in the Indian language remaining at the Depository were equally divided between the Missions of Sarnia and Walpole Island.

## REPORT OF THE STRATFORD BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of the Stratford Branch Bible Society was held in the Town Hall, on Monday evening, the 11th March, 1861. The Hall was well filled with a highly respectable audience.

The Right Rev. Dr. Crouyn, Bishop of Huron, occupied the chair. There were on the platform the Rev. W. S. Ball, travelling Agent, of the U. C. B. Society; Dr. Hyde, President of the Stratford Branch, and W. N. Hossie, Secretary; also the Rev. Thomas Macpherson, Rev. E. Patterson, Rev. W. Miller, Rev. Mr. Drummond, Rev. Thomas Cleghorn, Rev. Thomas Dudley, T. M. Daly, Esq., M. P. P.; Messrs. Kyle, Mowat, Campbell, Ewert, Fortune, Marshall, Reynolds, &c., &c.

The proceedings were commenced by singing the 100th Psalm; Rev. Mr. Drummond read a portion of Scripture, and prayer by the Right Rev. Dr. Crouyn, Bishop of Huron; after which his Lordship delivered an excellent and interesting opening address. A well organized Choir, led by Mr. McWalters, next sang a delightful piece.

## THE ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The following Report was read by W. N. Hossie, Secretary:—

“Another year is numbered among the past since this Society was assembled on a similar occasion, during which period a gracious and ever-mindful Providence has blessed our land with an abundant harvest, and the inhabitants with peace and health; for which we rejoice to record our united thanks to Almighty God for all His mercies. We are summoned again in general meeting to view the progress and prospects of the Bible cause in this and other lands. The Committee, at the outset, have great pleasure to an-

nounce that this Branch is largely on the increase, as well in the number of contributors as in the amount contributed. Though little can be said in regard to local circulation, it is satisfactory to know that the Parent Society is doing great work and still continues to make rapid progress, as the following extract from the 56th report will show:—"Estimating the magnitude of present operations by a comparison with the past, it appears, that during the first five years the whole circulation amounted to 158,429 copies, while during the last five years the whole circulation has been 8,138,321 copies. Such are the enlarged dimensions assumed." And while this noble work is so blessed, Providence is opening up many new and very important fields for the free circulation of the Bible. Thus calling upon us in this remote but favored land, for increased exertions on our part to aid in the great work of spreading Bible Truth. In fact the rallying cry now is liberty, while the whole world appears groaning to be set free. Speaking of Italian liberty, that noble patriot, Garibaldi, has said:—"The Bible is the best cannon to break the tyrant's fetters and set the captives free." Then let the Stratford Branch be among the foremost in supplying such cannons. Small though our contributions may appear, yet when we consider that the mighty ocean is only composed of drops of water, and the surrounding land of small grains of sand, so the British and Foreign Bible Society with all its component parts, is becoming a mighty ocean. In 1859, it had in great Britain connected with it, Auxiliaries, Branches, and Associations, in all 3,672; in the colonies, 877, besides some 65 other Bible Societies in various parts of the globe, with their numerous branches also, all aiming at the same grand end, and busily engaged in that noble work so signally blessed of God. Even Romish opinion of the Bible is becoming favorable to its use, as the following extract from a Roman Catholic paper published in Paris seems to admit:—"Much may be said on Protestant diversities and sects, but one fact remains certain, it is that nations where the Bible circulates and is read, have preserved a strong, deep and enduring religious faith; while in countries where it is not known, one is obliged to deplore a moral superficiality and want of principle, for which a splendid uniformity of rites cannot compensate. Let the learned theologians discuss on certain passages, on the authenticity of certain texts, what are such miseries compared to the healthful and pure atmosphere which the Bible spreads wherever it is read, whether in low or elevated classes?" Now while such efforts are being made to send Bibles to foreign lands, the Committee are forcibly persuaded that in this neighborhood there are many who are destitute of the Book, and what is still more to be deplored, is that many who have it, read it not. The Committee would call the attention of this meeting to the resolution passed at the last annual meeting, by which members are entitled to receive annually from the Depository, for gratuitous distribution, copies of the Scriptures to the value of 25 cents, of which had each member availed themselves, we should have had the pleasure of recording that fifty-eight, at least, destitute persons had been supplied with a copy each.

The circulation from our Depository as shown by the foregoing abstract, may appear small for so important a community, but as no addition has been made to the stock during the past three years, the volumes on hand seemed of an unsaleable nature, and too insignificant in appearance even for gratuitous distribution. At the last annual meeting there was only one Bible in stock and one hundred and fifty-two Testaments of the smallest size, it was then resolved that the stock should be renewed—which has only very recently been carried into effect, and accordingly an addition of \$90 96 worth of books have been made, but only received on the 4th of January last. Since then, you will observe, that there have been circulated fifteen Bibles and fifty-nine Testaments, thus showing that a convenient assortment of books will meet with a ready demand. It will be necessary to retain an amount out of the funds at present on hand, equal to the expense, gratuitous distribution, and sales during the past year, in order to keep on hand a paid-up stock.

REPORT OF THE WHITBY TOWN B. B. SOCIETY FOR THE YEAR  
ENDING DECEMBER, 31, 1860.

## REPORT.

Never was there a time in which the authority and claims of the Bible should be more earnestly pressed than the present. It is an age characterised by startling events, untiring energy, and great activity. The press and living voices, are engrossing the attention of multitudes. There are many things to divert attention from the truths of holy writ, and many influences to pervert and corrupt those truths, or to induce scepticism in relation to them. The friends of truth, however, are not idle, they are engaged in a noble struggle, and they are making obvious inroads upon the enemies' battlements; but they need to quicken their pace, brighten and buckle on afresh their armor, and be prepared to wield their weapons for more extensive conquests.

It is a distinguished mark of divine favor to be brought under the saving influence of the Gospel, and it is a privilege of the highest order to be permitted to take part in the efforts now making to publish that Gospel through every portion of the globe. Such honor have all the saints, and in this great work all may share, although they have not yielded to the sceptre of Immanuel. The Bible is the common property of Man, and those who possess the sacred treasure are under the most solemn obligations to place it within the reach of every rational creature. Numbers have been engaged in this work already, numbers are still engaged, but many more are required, for wide and extensive fields of labor are opening, and encouraging prospects are presented.

*The British and Foreign Bible Society*, with its numerous auxiliaries, associations and Branches, have achieved noble results. In every quarter of the globe this agency is actively at work. *The American Bible Society*, is also an honored instrumentality in the same enterprise. *Other Institutions* are likewise aiding in promoting the same objects. And shall we not rejoice in opportunities to share in any humble measure in labors designed to spread abroad the records of eternal truth?

Your Committee hail with some degree of satisfaction, the return of this anniversary. Although they have but little to report, and everything connected with this Town Branch is necessarily conducted on a small scale, still the scriptures are kept in circulation, public attention is often directed to our Depository, and funds are raised to provide for the wants of our immediate sphere, or to assist others, at home or abroad, in promoting the dissemination of the Word of God.

The Ladies, as usual, have cheerfully responded to the call upon their valuable time, and self-denying services, to minister to our treasury. Some have engaged in this good work for the first time, others have repeated exertions formerly rendered, and all have labored with a good grace, and with more or less tact and diligence. With these facts and details before us, your Committee hope, in retiring from office, that the friends generally will be grateful for the part which God has permitted them to take in this work of faith, and labor of love; and that they will cheerfully sustain their successors in whatever efforts they may put forth to aid the circulation of the scriptures. Whether we look at home or abroad, the Bible is working wonders, and greater changes will yet be

effected as it spreads its precious treasures among the people. With this weapon, "right Jerusalem blade," to use the words of John Bunyan, the Christian soldier is sure of triumph. With this lever, the spiritual mechanic can raise the world to exalted heights of intellectual and moral greatness. With this balm, the maladies of our nature can be effectually healed, and blessings be diffused most gladdening to mankind. The open Bible frowns upon oppression and wrong, superstition, error and sin. Before its glaring light, long-standing systems are rapidly falling. The breath of the Lord is fast chasing away the darkness which has so long covered the earth, and hastening the establishment of Messiah's Kingdom, whose right it is to reign. Among the Italians, the Hindoos, the Chinese, and others, comprehending millions upon millions, an effectual door is opened for Christian labor. God is astonishing His people. They have long prayed for these nations, and hoped to be heard and answered; but before they expected, or were fully ready for work, the Lord has removed barriers, and presented inviting and extensive fields for the highest enterprise. In other spheres, He has poured out His spirit in copious showers, and produced results of the most joyful character for the interests of vital piety. In Ireland and Scotland, England and Wales, the spirit of God has lifted up a standard, under which many precious souls have rejoiced with joy unspeakable, and full of glory. Eyewitnesses have reported the progress of this mighty work, and the pleasing fruits it has yielded. It has rescued multitudes from the grasp of the Man of sin. It has diminished crime in various forms. The moral habits of the people have been changed. Earnest and thirsting groups have been drawn to the preaching of the Gospel. The communicants of churches have been vastly increased. Meetings for prayer abound. Family religion, Sabbath schools, the circulation of the scriptures, the spirit of Christian liberality, and the increased number of evangelistic agencies, indicate an amount of success that cannot fail to fill many hearts with holy exultation, awaken hope of similar visitations elsewhere, and prompt to importune prayer and zealous effort for these ends.

Truly we live in momentous times. The High and Lofty One is drawing near with all condescension, mercy and love. He is making bare his arm to save. Saints are blending their supplications, and waiting in hallowed spots for the promise of the spirit. The heavens are looking bright as the golden vials of their prayers ascend to the eternal Throne through the merits of the atoning sacrifice, and perfect righteousness of the great Redeemer. The heavens, in fact, are opening. Sounds, like to a mighty rushing wind, may be heard by the far-seeing and listening Christian, indicating the approach and presence of the Holy Spirit, the comforter. His overshadowing wings seem to hover around prayerful expecting saints. A chain of prayer encompasses the mercy seat, and in a few hours from this time, a *wonderful spectacle* will be presented, a spectacle to be continued for a number of days—the fact of *special united supplication on the part of the church of God in all its ramifications throughout the world*. The issues of such a delightful state of things, it is impossible for us to predict, but we may confidently expect vastly increased prosperity in connexion with all Bible institutions and agencies, and the advancement of pure religion throughout the earth.

Under these circumstances, and with these prospects, it behoves us, as one of the links in the chain of Bible influences, to bestir ourselves to yet greater devotedness, liberality and zeal in the work to which we have put our hands. However limited our sphere and resources, we can render important aid in conjunction with others, in diffusing the knowledge which maketh wise unto salvation. The benefits we have derived from the Bible, the blessings it has

elsewhere diffused, its adaptation to produce similar fruit wherever circulated, and the revealed purposes and love of God in relation to its future and final achievements, should operate as motives to renewed activity in the noble cause we have espoused. And if spared to witness another anniversary, who can tell what glorious things will be recorded of Zion's labor and triumphs, and the welfare of the world? May the gracious Lord visit us with His smiles, and make us the humble and honored instruments of increasing good; and may all who love His appearing, realize their fondest anticipations of the bright and eternal day that is dawning upon Man.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEST PUSLINCH BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

In appearing before you with this, our first Annual Report, your Committee find that there have been few incidents of public interest in connection with their labours for the past year, which deserve to be recorded. This must, of necessity, make our annual report a very short one. Your Committee would desire to express their gratitude to the Great Disposer of all events, for the success which attended our efforts during the first year of our existence as a Society. They would also express the hope that, having begun well, we may go on steadily advancing, until we come up to the full measure of our duty to the cause of Christ in this and other lands, and the claims of our fellow creatures who are perishing for lack of knowledge. Last year we started at a time of great commercial depression, when money was very scarce and the prospects for the future anything but cheering; nevertheless, the people subscribed liberally, and when the time of getting in their contributions arrived—as it pleased the Lord in the interval to crown the year with abundance—not only that the money subscribed was cheerfully given, but a number of additional contributors were added to the list, and in some instances, former contributors increased their subscriptions. Your Committee earnestly hope that the same interest will continue to be manifested in this great Missionary scheme; no effort on their part will be wanting to secure so desirable a result. The object, as a Branch Society, we are pledged to aim at is, as you are aware, threefold. First, to raise money by subscription, donation and otherwise, for the purpose of aiding in circulating the word of God in the dark places of the earth. What we have been able to do in this department of our duty, will be seen from the statement just to be submitted to you. The second object aimed at is to secure, and have on hand for sale, a sufficient stock of Bibles, so as to put it in the power of every one to possess a copy of the Word of God at the lowest possible price. In this department your committee rejoice to have to report that they have succeeded beyond their most sanguine expectations, so many as eighty volumes having been disposed of, at their full prices during the last nine months. Your Committee, at a recent meeting, appointed that your President should proceed to Toronto, for the purpose of selecting a stock of Bibles, such as would be suited to our district. They are now in your Depository, and are well deserving the attention of those who are not already supplied with pocket and family Bibles.

The third object aimed at by your Society is the circulation of the Scriptures, gratuitously or at reduced prices, to such as may not be able, or may not care to purchase them. Your Committee have very little to report in that way, there being hardly any field for that department of usefulness in this place. The inhabitants, with very few exceptions, are all protestants, connected with some protestant denomination, and generally speaking, in good circumstances. A few Highland Roman Catholics there are in the district, but it has been ascertained that these cannot read, and although their children, in some cases, can read English, the old people cannot benefit by it. Your Committee, in these circumstances, feel that they would need to have some prospects, that the Bibles would at least be read before giving them away; they have the matter under consideration, however, and would only say in conclusion, that any suggestion on the matter, or any other bearing upon the more extensive circulation of the word of God, at full or reduced prices, or gratis, will meet with their most cordial attention.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WILLIAMS BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY,  
FOR 1860-1.

Your Committee, in presenting the First Annual Report of the proceedings of this Society, feel much pleasure in pointing out the success which has attended their efforts in circulating the Word of God.

As the objects of the Society were comparatively unknown to those to whom our first appeal for subscriptions was made, we must consider that the success attending this appeal, was a good indication of the value attached to the Scriptures; by those who have responded to the call. This success is a matter of deep thankfulness to Him who has thus opened the hearts of the people, to devote their labour and substance to His cause.

Our attention was early directed to the importance of making an effort to introduce the Scriptures among the Roman Catholic population of this and adjacent Townships; and, after considerable enquiry, we succeeded in obtaining the services of Mr. Finlayson as Colporteur. He has been engaged nearly six months in visiting both Catholics and Protestants in the Townships of East and West Williams, McGillivray, Stephen and portions of London, Lobo and Hay. We have received six Monthly Reports from him, showing that during that period he has visited 1,338 families, and has sold or distributed 141 Bibles and 174 Testaments, in all, 315 copies of the Word of God, in whole or in part. His reports show that in almost every instance, his visits have been received with kindness, and in many cases with expressions of gratitude, both to himself and the Society for whom he was acting. In many instances, the Families visited had long been destitute, not only of copies of the Word of God, but also of the public means of grace; and we trust that it will be seen hereafter that these visits will result in more earnest appreciation of the Word of God, for its own sake, and in the religious and social improvement of those to whom we have thus carried the Word of Life. It is a matter of thankfulness that Mr. Finlayson's last visits among our Roman Catholic neighbors have been received with increasing interest, and that, while on his first tour among them, he could only dispose of one Testa-

ment; he has since disposed of 15 copies, in most instances as the direct result of the reading of that one copy, sold on a former occasion.

We rejoice, therefore, at having been permitted to labour in so good a cause, and would look forward to the future operations of this Society with the devout hope that God, who has thus far blessed our exertions, will continue to own them, and that our successors will use increased diligence in prosecuting the important field of usefulness now open before them.

We cannot close this notice of Mr. Finlayson's mission, without testifying to the zeal and ability with which he has prosecuted it. We cheerfully recognize his devotion to the work, for which he possesses qualifications of a high order, and we would earnestly hope and pray that wherever his future field of labour may be placed, he may receive, if not in this life, at the last great day, abundant evidence that his... ul exhortations to the study of God's word have not been in vain.

It is our pleasing duty to acknowledge the timely assistance which we have received from the U. C. Bible Society, in the shape of a grant of \$60 towards the salary paid Mr. Finlayson. We trust that this will prove a stimulus to the friends of Bible distribution, to assist by all means in their power, the operations of the Parent Society.

The extracts given, will illustrate the importance of the work, at the same time that they call for gratitude to God, for opening a door for the introduction of His life-giving word, among a people who hitherto have appeared to be unapproachable.

*Extracts from the Journal kept by John Finlayson, Colporteur of the Williams Branch Bible Society.*

September 6, Read and spoke to a woman who said "she never heard any such words before, from any books or men, that a man must be born again, before he can enter the Kingdom of Heaven."

September 18, Found an aged woman who said "I was the first who called upon them for five years, to speak with them about the salvation of their souls."

September 19, Found a Roman Catholic family—could not read, had no book, listened to the word of instruction with some kind of interest, and thanked me for my visit.

September 24, Met a true son of mother church, who found great fault with me for offering them books they did not want. I spoke to him in love, without fear, and left him to go on his way, and think over the truth I told him.

October 9, Visited seventeen Protestant families, and one Roman Catholic. Sold no book of any kind; met with much confession, but little true religion this day.

October 22, Visited, to-day, two R. C. families who had said they would purchase a Gaelic Testament, should I bring them one. Only one of them bought a New Testament. He thought the price high, yet paid for it. Glad to have one copy of the pure word of God left among this people.

October 25, Visited ten families—sold seven Testaments. Received with much Christian kindness by the people.

October 31, Spent some time in one family, (R. C.,) who were thinking of purchasing a New Testament. Left without affecting a sale. The man said "they dare not read the book."

November 1, In one family, after spending some time, they wanted me to stop for the night, which I could not do. The master of the house followed me, and I could not prevail on him to return, until I promised to give him a night, if spared to come that way again.

November 14, Met, to-day, a young woman from the west, who gave me good news, telling me that in a house where I stopped for the night, my

counsel had been blessed to the head of the family; and being aware of two families in McGillvray, in which I believe good has been done; this gives me comfort.

November 15, Left this morning the 7th Concession, where I had spent the last two nights. Held a pleasant meeting last evening, and had an opportunity of speaking to a number of young and old people, who came to hear.

I hope my visit to this family has been blessed. The parting request was, "Remember me in your prayers."

January 2, Found one family who had only parts of a Bible and a Testament. The husband was absent. The wife complained that they never saw any of the Books from the Bible Society for the poor; and that they had no money—I said "you shall not have that to say any longer, and gifted a New Testament to a little girl in the family, who could read it well."

January 14, Received some fresh proofs, to-day, that my visits have been blessed.

February 1, Visited five Roman Catholic families, found them kind and open to converse with. Permitted to read portions of the Word of God with two of them, and two more have agreed to take Testaments. Returned with thanksgiving to God.

February 4, Met to-day with one woman who would receive no book or tract, nor hear any word of counsel, but in the next house, sold a New Testament, (R. C.)

February 8, Sold one Testament to a Roman Catholic who said, after receiving the book, "that he could read now for himself, and that he would know for himself."

February 15, Conversed for some time to-day, with an aged man of good education, (R. C.) found him kind and willing to converse on the contents of the Book.

February 16, My heart is made glad by meeting with so many who are willing to receive the word of God into their families.

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## ABSTRACT OF THE FIFTY-SIXTH REPORT

OF THE

### British and Foreign Bible Society, 1860.

SUMMONED by the lapse of time to review the proceedings of another year, it behoves your Committee, prior to the recital of the continued and extraordinary success in which they rejoice, to advert to the new and solemn position in which they stand. The generation which laid the broad, but not loose, foundation of the Society, has now entirely passed away. With the dying words of the venerable Dr. Steinkopff, was silenced the voice of one who had participated the cares of the earliest difficulties and the joys of the earliest triumphs. Installed in office as one of the first Secretaries, he was the last survivor of the little band of three hundred, who, on the 7th of March 1804, definitely and practically embodied, by the formation of the Society, earnest aspirations of British Christians for the dissemination of the Sacred Scriptures. On that memorable occasion he rose, and, with "simplicity and pathos," pleaded for those destitute of the Book of God. The First Annual Report bore testimony to the "indefatigable exertions" of the fervent advocate. Elsewhere his subsequent labours for the Society will be noticed. Here, while recording in connection with his name the transfer of responsibility from the past to the present generation, it will suffice merely to allude, for future encouragement, to the progress which this eminent officer of the Society was permitted to behold. From the summit of that high position to which he had been raised by services to the universal Church, his mental "eye not dim," and his spiritual "force not abated," he was privileged, like Moses from the top of Pisgah, to survey in his later years glorious fields expanded and expanding almost on every side. Here too, like Moses, he died. A book-mark in the "History of the Society," published shortly before his death, proves that almost to his dying hour he was once more engaged in contemplating those scenes which he had ever viewed with gladdened soul.

But while the labourers are thus removed, the work thus remains. The last of the three hundred assembled in London has departed, but the work now engages the sympathies and energies of countless thousands in different regions of the earth. The Society, holding the testimonies of God in trust for the world, has passed from its original narrow limits to those extended dimensions which encircle the globe; and as when the "ark of the testimony" was removed from the domestic hearth of Obed-edom to a royal tent in Jerusalem, the occasion calls both for gratitude and joy. If, when the ark was transferred, the voice of a mighty multitude shouted with exultation; if "all Israel brought up the ark of the covenant of the Lord with shouting, and with the sound of the cornet, and with trumpets, and with cymbals, making a noise with psalteries and harps" may not British Christians rejoice, more calmly but not less deeply, that the Society has become to the nation both a bulwark and a glory; and may they not add, in the words of the Evangelical prophet, "Upon all the glory shall be a defence."

FRANCE.—Multiplied cares, involving a nervous anxiety, appear to have been interwoven with the operations in France during the past year. While the increased attention to religion has been as marked as the declining influence of the Romish Church, it must not be supposed that such manifest decline indicates an early fall of the Roman hierarchy. Ignorance in the lower ranks of life permits the Episcopacy and Clergy still to exercise a potent influence in favour of error, and to create a baneful prejudice against the truth. Hence the political pamphlet of the Bishop, and the ecclesiastical denunciation of the Priest, often induce the inhabitants of a locality to treat the Colporteur with suspicion, if not with scorn. Yet amid these difficulties it is as encouraging as remarkable to find, that during a year not a single licence for Colportage has, on application, been refused; and not a single licence, already granted, has been withdrawn.

The circulation has been 85,810 copies. More than four millions and a half copies of the Scriptures has been circulated in France, and of these copies, more than seven-eighths have been placed in the hands of Roman Catholics.

BELGIUM.—Difficulties of no extraordinary character still beset the Society's work in Belgium. The constitution of the country is such as simply to tolerate, but the influence of Romanism is such as greatly to impede, the distribution of the Scriptures. Popery entrenched in the land, resists with a determined hostility the efforts of those who, "as good soldiers of Jesus Christ, are enduring hardships" in circulating the word of God. A circulation of 9,238 copies can be reported for the past year.

**HOLLAND.**—While the work in Holland has not been marked by any new features, it has also not been impeded by any new difficulties. Colportage has been continued with most beneficial results, and the lamentable spiritual destitution among the appointed ministers, renders the labours of the Colporteur doubly important. During the year 12,080 copies have been distributed by five Colporteurs, while the total issues have been 22,477 copies.

**GERMANY.**—Surveying the work accomplished among that portion of the German race, occupying Central Europe, to which access is permitted, the circulation of the year is measured by the unprecedented number of 379,187 copies. The reflection that each unit included in these figures represents a volume containing inspired truth renders the work done as solemn and important as it is extensive and encouraging.

**COLOGNE.**—While the proceedings of the year cannot be asserted to have been comparatively, yet they may be affirmed to have been actually successful. A diminution of 7,411 copies in the circulation attained last year leaves the issues for the year just elapsed at 96,842 volumes.

**FRANKFORT.**—Momentous events have caused some deviation from the ordinary proceedings of the Agency. Some circumstances and occurrences have favourably affected, while others have adversely influenced the circulation of the Scriptures. The propelling have, however, been greater than the retarding forces, and thus a distribution of 95,651 copies has been effected, being 16,813 copies more than were announced in the last Annual Statement.

**BERLIN.**—The extraordinary dimensions which the Society's work has, during the last few years, attained within the limits of the Berlin Agency, has again been considerably exceeded. The simple announcement of a circulation of 156,826 copies, is alone sufficient to convey an impression of the scale of magnitude upon which operations have been conducted. The increase, as compared with last year, is no less than 28,243 volumes.

**DENMARK.**—The incorporation of the Apocrypha with the Bibles printed in Denmark debars your Society from issuing the entire Scriptures. The Agency at Copenhagen is consequently restricted to the dissemination of the New Testament, of which 6,783 copies have been circulated during the past year.

**NORWAY.**—Undistinguished by any extraordinary occurrences, the Society's work in Norway has proceeded as in bygone years. The

principal distributions have been made in connection with the Agency at Christiana. Colportage has been successfully employed at Christianssand, and the total number of copies actually issued in Norway itself during the year, by the various Agencies, has amounted to 16,247 Bibles and Testaments.

**SWEDEN.**—Statistics indubitable as evidence, rather than incidents graphic in illustration, are the prominent features of the work in Sweden. All classes of the community have combined to effect a circulation in all the divisions of the country. Clergy, merchants, schoolmasters, peasants, have all assisted, both by communication with the Agency in Stockholm, and by participation in the work of Colportage. The depression in some departments of commerce created in the early part of the year a fear lest the results obtained would not compare favourably with those of previous labours, but an increase in the issues of 17,709, bringing the total for the year to 89,355 copies, and the total during the existence of the Agency to 1,033,034 copies, has substituted hope for fear, and gratitude for anxiety.

**RUSSIA.—ST. PETERSBURGH.**—Another year has passed without the publication of the Sacred Volume in Modern Russ, and without any permission being accorded for its importation. A very general desire exists among the more educated class for such a publication, and any single copies which find their way into Russia tend to excite a desire to obtain the Sacred Volume on the part of those now deprived of it. The issues for the year 1859 have been 21,571 copies.

**ODESSA.**—Results far more encouraging than those obtained of late years have attended the diligent and devout labours of Mr. Melville, who has again been permitted to travel for the purpose of prosecuting his work. Considering all the difficulties encountered, a circulation of 10,078 copies from Odessa must be regarded as satisfactory.

In the autumn of last year Mr. Melville undertook a journey to Astrachan, for the purpose of distributing some Scriptures which had long lain useless in store. There were found 2,325 volumes in almost all the languages of Europe and Western Asia. Of these, all were distributed except 858 copies.

**SPAIN AND PORTUGAL.**—The announcement concerning Spain and Portugal is simply an announcement of the continued impossibility of circulating the Scriptures, by reason of the continued hostility of the authorities. The Peninsula is as completely closed against every ef-

fort for distributing the Word of God as in the island of Madagascar. In one case the prohibition becomes effectual by the mandate of a nominally Christian Government; in the other, by the command of an avowedly Heathen Queen. There is also reason to believe, that in the Peninsula, as in Madagascar, many of the people desire to possess the Book of God; and your Committee earnestly hope that ere long a door of entrance into these lands will be made by Him "who shutteth, and no man openeth," and "who openeth, and no man shutteth."

SWITZERLAND.—The survey of the work accomplished by Lieut. Graydon in Switzerland and Northern Italy must elicit thankfulness from those who earnestly desire the extensive circulation of the Scriptures in this part of Europe. No fewer than 44,171 copies have been distributed, being an increase of 13,555 copies as compared with last year. Of the whole circulation, nearly 24,000 copies found purchasers in those portions of Italy open to the work of the Society, while the sales in Switzerland have continued satisfactory.

ITALY.—Liberty for the Italian people has been the object which has occupied the minds of thousands, not only in Italy, but in every State of Europe. It is altogether beyond the province of your Committee even to allude to the varied senses in which the captivating term "Liberty" has been used by those who have uttered it. With one sense alone—is the Bible Society concerned. Upon this liberty, now to some extent enjoyed, all attention has been concentrated, and towards the improvement of this liberty every energy has been directed. The results prove, that although religious feeling has been almost crushed by the long domination of Popery, yet enough remains to inspire in many hearts the desire to learn something of the "depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God," which called forth the admiration of the Apostle when writing to "all that be in Rome." The great Apostle of the Gentiles could in the first century appeal to a fervent wish to visit the Roman Christians; and the great Society for the world can, in the nineteenth century, adopt his language, and declare to the Italian people its "great desire these many years to come unto" them. Already "a prosperous journey, by the will of God," has, into some parts of Italy, been made, and though the Book of God has been floated into the land upon the troubled waters of political excitement, yet it "swims" like the "axe-head" upon the waters of Jordan, while the injunction of Elisha, "Take it up to thee," is obeyed by many who "put out the hand and take it."

TURIN.—The efficiency of the Depot in this city has been injured by frequent changes in the superintendence; but notwithstanding

these disadvantages, and the distractions incident to the capital of a kingdom engaged in war, a circulation of 5,393 copies has been attained, of which 1,210 were placed in the hands of soldiers. The two Colporteurs attached to the Depôt have not been so successful in their work as could be desired.

**GENOA**.—Through the diligent and persevering labours of Mr. Betti, to whom the Society's Depôt is entrusted, there have been 11,639 copies issued during the year. Of this number, more than 6,000 have been sold by Colporteurs, and more than 5,000 directly circulated from the Depôt and its five subsidiaries. The Colporteurs have visited a wide extent of country in Piedmont, Lombardy, Parma, Modena, and Romagna. Few have been found hostile to their work except the priests of the Romish Church.

**MILAN**.—Liberty to disseminate the Scriptures in Milan was obtained in June last. In that month 1,344 copies, for some time imprisoned in the Custom-house, were released. Impediments to free circulation, however, arose. The Royal Commissioner of the victorious powers announced that the regulations of Austria in reference to Popery would be maintained. The impression prevailed that Bible colportage was only a particular form of British policy, and little success attended the efforts first made in a city which had only received from the Society 34 copies in the 30 months immediately preceding. In July, however, 2,650 copies were safely passed through the Custom-house. In August a Colporteur sold 166 copies, of which 41 were purchased by poor soldiers at the little stall of the Colporteur, close to the wall of the Cathedral; and, at a later period, 1,000 copies in addition to large numbers previously circulated, were purchased by Pastor Kind for general distribution. The issues at Milan, from June to December, were 2,977 copies.

**LEGHORN**.—The delicate and difficult work of circulating the Scriptures in Italy during the last twelve months has been promoted by Mr. T. Bruce, a resident in Leghorn, with not less discretion than diligence.

**FLORENCE**.—The current of events in Florence has created an anxious interest in the minds of those who have endeavoured to place the Scriptures in the hands of the Tuscan people. In prosecuting the work, there has been required zeal tempered with discretion, as well as patience sustained by hope. In the spring of 1859, more than 4,000 copies were admitted into the capital city; and as if dangerous to the vessel of the State, were suddenly cast forth to appease the angry and threatening waters of political strife. In November

last, the difficulties which impeded the Society's Agent, in endeavoring again to introduce the Scriptures, were removed. A public Depository for the sale of the word of God was soon opened, Colportage was commenced in and around Florence; advertisements announcing that the Society's Scriptures could be purchased, appeared even in the Government newspapers; and the city, from which, in 1851, the Madiai with a few Bibles were banished, received in a few weeks more than 500 copies of the Scriptures.

**ROMAGNA.**—Towards the close of the year Lieut. Graydon was able to employ Colporteurs in this part of Italy. Although the population to a great extent were found ignorant, and unable even to read, yet the operations which commenced in November resulted in the issue of 1,185 copies before the end of December.

**MALTA, GREECE, &c.**—There is reason to conclude, that while, on the one hand, no special circumstances have marked the progress of the work which, from the island of Malta, has extended to Asia Minor, Syria, Egypt, and North Africa, there have been, on the other hand, no indications of the diminished value of what have been accomplished. The Rev. I. Lowndes is still enabled to distribute many copies by the instrumentality of the Missionaries labouring for the spiritual welfare of Jews, Mahommedans, Greeks, Armenians, Roman Catholics, and Protestants; and the issues for the year have comprised 8,100 copies.

**TURKEY.—CONSTANTINOPLE.**—The wild field embraced within the limits of the Turkish Agency has been cultivated with signal success, and give promise of a still more abundant spiritual harvest. Although the noxious plant of the Mahommedan delusion is interwoven in rank luxuriance with the baneful weed of Greek superstition, yet the good seed of the Word of life has not been entirely choked. A generation which has for the most part "sown in tears," is beginning "to reap in joy;" and the accumulated evidence of results in the different lands of the Turkish empire only demonstrates, that in spiritual, as well as in physical husbandry, the injunction is to be remembered, "In the morning sow thy seed, and in the evening withhold not thine hand; for thou knowest not whether shall prosper, either this or that, or whether they both shall be alike good." In regions remote, and to Christians almost unknown, the seed of Divine truth has "taken root downward, and borne fruit upward," giving joy not only to the labourer in the vineyard, but also to the angels which shall one day reap for the Lord of the harvest. In the midst of this present and prospective ingathering, Mr. B. Barker, whose hand had widely scattered the "precious seed," has been removed. The issues

for the year have amounted to 24,720 copies, in no fewer than thirty languages, being 11,254 more than in the previous year.

**INDIA.**—The language of regret, deepened by disappointment, must be adopted with regard to India. The storm is hushed, and with the cessation of danger to the temporal power of Britain there has been the cessation of anxiety for the eternal welfare of India. Some men of God, to whom alarmed authority looked for aid in the hour of extremity, as Pharaoh sought relief from Moses, are constrained to behold, with grief, the adoption by reassured authority of the words of the Egyptian monarch: Who is the Lord, that we should obey his voice? Where, it may be asked, is now the deep conviction, so general in the day of calamity, that the millions of India ought to have been, and for the future must be taught the truths contained in Holy Scripture? Has not such conviction passed from the national conscience, as the dream passed from the mind of the Babylonian monarch? A sad and conclusive reply to these inquiries is furnished by the avowed disappointment of those men of God, who trusted that recent experience would have demonstrated the imperative necessity of introducing the light of Divine truth into the dark recesses of the Hindoo and Mahomedan heart. More especially must it be lamented that the rising generation of India are not to be instructed with all plainness and freedom in the doctrines of Christianity. Hence the operations of your Society continue altogether insignificant, and the millions of India have received only 92,293 copies of Scripture during the last year, from the Depôts established by the Auxiliary Societies in the different Presidencies.

**CALCUTTA.**—The establishment of tranquility and the restoration of order have enabled the Calcutta Auxiliary to extend the unusually limited operation of the previous year. An increase in the issues, to 4,013, brings the circulation of the past year to 29,280 copies; but it must be admitted that both the increase and the total are lamentably inadequate to diffuse the knowledge of Divine truth among the millions of Bengal.

**NORTH INDIA.—ALLAHABAD.**—The scarcity of Scriptures in the vernacular languages, consequent upon the utter destruction of the copies in the Agra Depôt, has rendered active proceedings almost impossible. Immediate aid was obtained from Calcutta and Mirzapore, while more permanent assistance was rendered by editions printed in London.

**MADRAS.**—The position of usefulness occupied by the Madras Auxiliary has been fully maintained. As in previous years, the Mis-

sonary operations of South India have been largely facilitated and strengthened by the editions of Scriptures in the vernacular languages, continuously prepared for dissemination within the limits of the Auxiliary. Among the encouraging facts of the year, may be noted the sale of 10,000 copies by Colporteurs, and the increased interest in the Bible manifested both in English and vernacular schools. Prejudice is to some extent waning, and the Scriptures are often sold beneath the very shadow of great and sacred idols, "Brahmins themselves being, in some cases, the purchasers." Nor is the Bible appreciated only in schools, and by Brahmins. The Indian mother, having doubtless "tasted the word of God, and the power of the world to come," sometimes stops the passing Colporteur, surprises him by reading a portion of the Scriptures before making the purchase, and then pays the required amount either in money or grain. An entire Bible was recently bought by a widow, who, repairing to her house, fell on her knees, and thanked God for the opportunity of obtaining a copy of His word.

The issues for the year have been 59,629.

**BOMBAY.**—The operations in Western India have been extremely limited, as compared with the vastness of the field of labour. In some measure the diminished results are attributable to the death, or removal to Europe, of friends devotedly attached to the Society; but the hope is entertained that many who are commencing life in Western India will be found ready to give their support to the Bombay Auxiliary. The issues for the year have been 3,384 copies, of which 799 were circulated by two Colporteurs.

**CHINA.**—The information concerning the Society's work in the Chinese Empire is as unsatisfactory as it is concise. The hostile collision with the Government, and the constitutional apathy of the people, may be considered as the principal obstacles in the path of those who have sought to circulate the scriptures. Less than 30,000 copies have been distributed during the year. Hope is indeed deferred, but not extinct; and your Committee continue their preparations for extensive operations in China, under the conviction that the "night" of toil "is far spent," and the "day" of success "is at hand."

**JAPAN.**—The anticipations concerning this interesting country have not been realized. Barriers and impediments, at first too slightly regarded by sanguine hope, have hitherto been found too strong for practical effort. Decided aversion to Christianity exists among the educated classes.

AUSTRALIA.—SYDNEY.—Gratitude for what has been effected, accompanied with regret that more has not been accomplished, characterizes the Forty-second Report of the New South Wales Auxilliary. Such sentiments justify the hope that expansive efforts will mark the future, and that the privileged duty of "holding forth the word of life" will continue to be deeply realized and actively discharged.

The more important operations are thus stated :—

"During the past year the sales to the public from the Depôt have been slightly in excess of those of the previous year, viz.—Bibles 975, and Testaments 565; the sales to the Branches have been, Bibles 741, and Testaments 834."

The amount received from the Auxiliary has been 480*l.* 16*s.* 3*d.* on Purchase Account.\*

HUNTER RIVER.—The Auxiliary recently formed with this designation is enlisting the co-operation of the more considerable townships of the neighborhood. Intelligence is constantly furnished by the active Secretary, the Rev. E. Griffith.

The free contributions have amounted to 160*l.*

VICTORIA.—Convinced alike of the importance of the Society's labours, and of the inadequacy of the efforts made by the Victoria Auxiliary, the friends at Melbourne have determined to recuscitate those branches already established, and to form others where none exist. The issues for the year have been 6,713 copies, being 1,535 in advance of the previous year. Nearly 1,000 Chinese Testaments have been supplied to the mining districts.

GEE LONG.—A deeper attachment to the principles, and a fuller appreciation of the objects of the Society, is the characteristic feature of the last Annual Report of this Auxiliary. The issues have comprised 860 Bibles and 585 Testaments.

ADLAIDE.—An uninterrupted career of usefulness, with present position and future prospects as encouraging as at any former period, is the tenor of the last Report of the South Australian Auxiliary. Although no facts of extraordinary interest can be recorded, yet the figures representing the issues and funds indicate the steady progress made. No fewer than 4,637 copies have been circulated during the

year. The general objects of the Parent Society have again been liberally assisted, the amount received as Free Contributions during the year being 550*l*.

**TASMANIA.—HOBARTON.**—Although no Report of proceedings has reached your Committee, they are persuaded that the efforts of the friends in Tasmania have not been less zealous than in former years. They have been forwarded 6,096 copies of Scripture, and 100*l*. as a Free Contribution has been received, accompanied by the brief but satisfactory assurance that the Auxiliary is progressing.

**LAUNCESTON.**—The position occupied by the Cornwall Auxiliary appears, by the Twenty-fifth Annual Report, to be satisfactory. The issues for the year consisted of 1,303 copies.

**NEW ZEALAND.—AUCKLAND.**—Exertions, not less judicious than diligent, continue to be made by the friends who direct the proceedings of the Auxiliary in this province. Scriptures are distributed alike to the European and the Maori. Thus the labours of the Auxiliary have been blessed both to the colonist and the native. Each can, in his own tongue, read the same message of Divine love; and it is not too much to affirm that the future welfare, as well temporal as spiritual, of both, depends upon the reception given to the revelation of God. The issues from the principal Depôt have been 1,250 copies.

The various Mission stations have received the required Scriptures in both languages, and the colonization of "this Austral-Britain, the England of a hemisphere of new nations," is not altogether unpromising, when, as recently has been the case, a little band of Nova Scotian settlers transmit 37*l*. 13*s*. 1*d*. as a Free Contribution to the Society's funds.

**TAHITI.**—The intelligence transmitted by the Rev. W. Howe affords most satisfactory evidence of the value of the assistance rendered by the Society to Missionary efforts. The Christian stability of communicants is promoted by their possession of the Scriptures, and the converts from heathenism are thus "stablished, strengthened, and settled" in the Faith.

**SAMOA.**—The Missionaries have been engaged in the preparation of a revised version of the Scriptures in the Samoan, and the question of printing such an edition will probably be soon brought under the consideration of your Committee.

**FRIENDLY ISLANDS.**—At the request of the Wesleyan Missionary

Society, an edition of 10,000 copies of the Tongan Bible has been undertaken.

**MAURITIUS.**—Difficulties arising on the one hand from the heterogeneous character of the population, and on the other from the low state of education, impede the operations of the Auxiliary in this colony. Yet a circulation of 2,711 copies, comprising 653 in English and French, and 2,058 in the languages of India, has resulted from the exertions put forth on behalf of the Society. Five Colporteurs are employed, of whom one is charged with the sale of French Scriptures, and the remaining four dispose of copies in the Indian languages.

**SOUTH AFRICA.—CAPE TOWN.**—An undiminished vigour continues to mark the proceedings of the South African Auxiliary. The Christian denominations of England, (and the Christian denominations of Holland, unite in the dissemination of the Inspired Volume, which, while circulated by each, is the standard of faith to all. More than 5,000 copies were issued during the eleven months preceding the 1st of October 1859. A large portion comprised Scriptures for the use of the English and Dutch, while copies were also supplied to the natives in their vernacular tongue.

**WEST AFRICA.**—The Missionaries labouring on the Western Coast of Africa transmit from time to time portions of the Scripture, translated into the languages of the people among whom they dwell.

**SOUTH AMERICA.—RIO DE JANEIRO AND BUENOS AYRES.**—Although considerable success, under the adverse circumstances of the Brazils, has attended the labours of your Agent, yet the sales effected in Rio being insufficient to give full occupation, he was removed, under the sanction of the Committee, to Buenos Ayres, having first made satisfactory arrangements for continuing the work at Rio.

The total number of copies circulated in the year has been 3,319.

**PERU.**—The materials for compiling an account of the work in Peru are very scanty. Early in the year the Agent, Mr. A. J. Duffield, removed from Bogota, in New Granada, to occupy what appeared to be a most important and promising position in Lima. The expectations raised concerning this field of labour have not yet been fulfilled; but your Committee trust the future will be more encouraging than the past.

**UNITED STATES.—NEW YORK.**—The eminent position previously attained by the American Bible Society, has, according to the latest

official announcements, been more than sustained. Although commercial depression has seriously affected the remittances from some of the more recently settled States and Territories, yet the operations of the year last reported are marked by an increase both of Scriptures issued and of funds received.

The number of volumes of the Sacred Scriptures issued during the year, is 721,095.

**BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.—TORONTO.**—The temporary derangement and depression of commerce have in some measure affected the important Auxiliary, which from Toronto extends its operations almost over the whole of Upper Canada. But zeal from the spiritual enlightenment of the community by the dissemination of the written Word has not abated. According to the most recently received intelligence, the prospects are such as to justify the expectation of greater usefulness than has at any time been attained.

The remittances from Toronto during the year have reached the large amount of 2,403*l.* 18*s.* 9*d.*; of which sum 603*l.* 18*s.* 11*d.* was a Free Contribution, and 1,799*l.* 19*s.* 10*d.* on Purchase Account. The number of Scriptures forwarded from Earl Street has comprised 29,382 copies.\*

**MONTREAL.**—Distinctly apprehending the peculiar impediments which, within the limits of the Auxiliary, obstruct the progress of the work, the Montreal Committee have courageously endeavoured to surmount the difficulties of their position. Regarding the enterprise of the Society as the achievement of the age, and as "worthy of the best efforts of the best men," the determination has been formed to "make Canada a land of Bibles."

The issues form a total of 11,516 copies. Three Colporteurs have been employed.

**QUEBEC.**—A promising harvest at length begins to gladden the hearts of those who have long toiled in a somewhat sterile field of labour. Romish influence, long felt over the land, is becoming affected by the knowledge of Scripture truth. Even the inhabitants of the villages, usually most completely under the power of the priesthood, are unquestionably asserting their right to possess and peruse the Word of God; while the converts of Protestantism residing in Quebec are already enduring persecution with Christian firmness.

\* Since the accounts for the year were closed, further Remittances, comprising 504*l.* 16*s.* 3*d.* on Purchase Account, and 234*l.* 15*s.* 3*d.* as a Free Contribution, &c, have been received from Toronto.

The issues for the year have been 1,538 copies, being 229 in excess of the previous year.

**NEW BRUNSWICK.**—The undiminished interest of the Christian communities of Saint John has been manifest both by crowded audiences and earnest speeches on the occasion of the last Annual Meeting of the Auxiliary. The total income for the year has been 1,057*l.* 4*s.* 9*d.*

**FREDERICTON.**—The resources of the Auxiliary have been considerably augmented by the activity of the ladies, who have undertaken the collection of funds in Fredericton and the surrounding settlements. In the course of last summer a Colporteur was employed in the visitation of the back settlements, and those on the River St. John, between Fredericton and the Grand Falls. The families visited were 1,583, and the copies of Scripture sold were 946.

**NOVA SCOTIA.—HALIFAX.**—The Committee regret their inability, in the absence of the usual Annual Report, to give any detailed account of the operations of the Nova Scotia Auxiliary. To the Auxiliary 4,019 copies of Scripture have been sent, and the sum of 164*l.* 9*s.* 4*d.* has been placed to the credit of the Purchase Account. The Free Contributions have amounted to 171*l.* 19*s.*

**NEWFOUNDLAND.**—Undiminished attachment on the part of the supporters is reported by the Officers of this Colonial Auxiliary. The operations has been such as to call forth the gratitude of those who have conducted the work. The issues of the Auxiliary for the year have been 2,022 copies.

**DOMESTIC.**—At the request of your Committee, the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Bangor has accepted the office of a Vice-President of the Society.

**FUNDS.**—Your Committee again record with thankfulness an increased Income. The receipts from ordinary sources have been 162,020*l.* 13*s.* 5*d.*; and for special funds, 2,115*l.* 13*s.*; making a total income of 164,136*l.* 6*s.* 5*d.* Compared with the previous year, the increase upon the total income has been 4,073*l.* 7*s.* 1*d.*; and upon the ordinary income 7,114*l.* 7*s.* 4*d.*

The amount applicable to the Society's **GENERAL PURPOSES** is 80,526*l.* 17*s.* 6*d.*

The Receipts in payment for Scriptures have been 81,493*l.* 15*s.* 11*d.*; being in excess of the previous year to the extent of 4,634*l.* 10*s.* 10*d.*

The EXPENDITURE of the Society has increased more than the Income. The total expenditure has been 179,365*l.* 15*s.* 6*d.* The ordinary expenditure is in excess of the previous year to the amount of 20,030*l.* 15*s.*

ISSUES.—An unprecedented enlargement in the circulation has occurred between the 1st April, 1859, and the 31st March, 1860. The issues have comprised 1,917,897 copies, and exceed the issues of last year by the large number of 291,912 copies. If the operations of the Indian Auxiliaries, not included in the above figures, be added, there is a total of more than 2,000,000 copies circulated in a single year. Doubtless such success has been vouchsafed to feeble and sinful men, in order "that they may know that this is Thy hand, and that Thou, Lord, hast done it."

The TOTAL ISSUES of the Society now form an aggregate of THIRTY-SEVEN MILLION, FIVE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-SEVEN THOUSAND, EIGHT HUNDRED AND TWENTY-EIGHT COPIES.

The system of Female Bible Colportage, originated in connection with the Society, has now become an extensive and deeply interesting Domestic Mission to the demoralized and degraded population, of the Metropolis. Anxious to place the Scriptures in the hands of the destitute, and desirous, at the same time, of adhering to the Society's principles, your Committee have ceased to make pecuniary grants to be applied in paying the weekly wages of the Bible women, and have resolved to supply, through three members of their own body, Scriptures to the Female Colporteurs, for sale at the Society's prices. In consideration of the time and labour devoted to the Bible work, a deduction is made from the proceeds, in acknowledgment of the services rendered. During the year, 5,500 copies of Scripture have been sold, and at the close of the year 64 Bible women were employed.

SCOTLAND.—The position of your Society in Scotland remains unchanged. Some earnest friends continue to render all assistance in their power, but the majority of the population support Societies established in the country. Some efforts have been made to amalgamate these local organizations with a view to forming a national Society, but your Committee are not able to state with what probability of success these measures have thus far been adopted.

IRELAND.—It is peculiarly gratifying to your Committee to be able to record the continued prosperity of the HIBERNIAN BIBLE SOCIETY. Both the issues and funds have increased. In the Province of Ulster, the copies circulated have been double the number

issued in the previous year. Mention may be made of a donation of 500*l.* recently received from the Hibernian Society, for promoting the general objects of your Society.

CONCLUSION.—After recounting such unparalleled success, to indulge in any prolonged comments would only be distracting the mental eye by engaging the listening ear. A circulation of more than 1,900,000, and an increase of nearly 300,000 copies, are solemn and substantial facts, which even the caviller, who seeks rather to injure than to aid, must discern as clearly as Balaam discerned the “goodly tents and tabernacles” of Israel, and concerning which he must exclaim, “What hath God wrought !”

For a moment, by reason of the importance of the subject, allusion must be made to an increase in the expenditure, for ordinary purposes, of 20,000*l.*, in connection with an increase in the income for general objects of 7,000*l.* Your Committee feel that such a state of the finances demands vigilance, but not anxiety, and they dismiss the question of resources with the firm conviction, that, as long as the Bible Society can wisely and profitably extend its operations, the Christian Church will joyfully and liberally sustain its funds.

The position which the Society has already attained now demands a momentary attention. Estimating the magnitude of present operations by a comparison with the past, it appears, that during the first five years the whole circulation amounted to 158,429 copies, while during the last five years the whole circulation has been 8,138,821 copies. Such are the enlarged dimensions assumed. Your committee, however, rejoice not only in a wonderfully extended, but in a spiritually blessed work. Testimony is afforded from every land of the value of the Scriptures in leading men, under the guidance of the Divine Spirit, from the path of error and sin into the way of truth and holiness. Sometimes in the busy city, sometimes in the lonely wilderness, sometimes on the troubled ocean, sometimes in the peaceful haven, the oracles of God enlighten and comfort, guide and sustain.

Finally, your Committee would advert to the revival of religion in Protestant countries, as at once a consequence and a cause of increased issues. To what extent the immense circulation, effected of late years by the Society, may have contributed to the general revival, is one of the “secret things which belong to the Lord our God,” but it may, without fear of contradiction, be affirmed, that both at home and abroad, the private perusal of the oracles of God has often led to public attendance at the house of God. But whatever the invisible causes, there remain the evident effects. Multitudes assemble to raise the voice of prayer. Multitudes assemble to listen to the

sound of the Gospel. Hence a resuscitated Christianity must seek to become "mighty in the Scriptures," and an aroused world must "search those Scriptures which testify of Jesus." Thus shall the recorded message of God speed fast and far; granted, on behalf of the world, shall be the prayer of the prophet, "REVIVE THY WORK, O LORD, IN THE MIDST OF THE YEARS;" granted, on behalf of the Church, shall be the prayer of the Saviour, SANCTIFY THEM THROUGH THY TRUTH; THY WORD IS TRUTH."
