Two German Battleships Are Hit By British Torpedoes

Submarine Commander Submits Supplementary Report—Gains on Western Front While Storm Rages

London, Nov. 7.—A statement that two dreadnoughts were hit by a British submarine which yesterday was reported launching a torpedo at and striking a German dreadnought in the North Sea, is contained in a further report received from the commanding officer of the submarine. This was officially announced today. The two dreadnoughts were battleships of the Kaiser class.

The official statement reads: "With reference to yesterday's communication, a further report has now been received from the commanding officer of the submarine. He now claims to have hit two dreadnought battleships of the Kaiser class."

London, Nov. 7.—The British statement on land fighting today says: "During the night we improved our position east of Butte de Warlencourt. We successfully raided enemy trenches between Commeucourt and Serre, taking some prisoners and inflicting considerable casualties. An enemy patrol south of Monchy was dispersed by our fire. Heavy rains and strong southwesterly gales continue."

Berlin, Nov. 7.—On the Somme front yesterday the British made an attack near Baucourt l'Abbaye, but were immediately beaten back.

Berlin, Nov. 7.—On the Transylvanian front, in the region of Tulghe, the Russians yesterday forced back Austro-German troops. The Teutonic forces gained ground west of the Boda Pass.

Bucharest, Nov. 7.—The Roumanian forces in Dobruja, which recently assumed the offensive against Field Marshal von Mackensen's army, are continuing their successes. Progress for the Roumanians along the entire Dobruja front is reported.

Believe Now Soldier Is Dead Word to Mr. and Mr. McLaughlin, Pleasant Point—Other Casualties

Although he has been missing since September 16 and is now officially reported believed to be dead, the news reached the family of Pte. Charles Eugene McLaughlin today. Word was received this morning from Ottawa by Mr. and Mrs. George H. McLaughlin of Pleasant Point that their son has been missing since that date and is now believed to have been killed in action.

English Mail An English letter mail will close on Wednesday morning, November 8, at 12 o'clock.

Mowatt, who was reported missing in May last, through Dr. McFarlane, of New York, has just received a letter from Berlin stating that the young officer must have been killed without being identified.

The deaths in St. John for the year ended October 31, 1916, numbered 871, 472 males and 399 females. The list prepared by the Board of Health shows that there have been 101 deaths from senile debility; 47 from tuberculosis; 46 from cancer; 38 from pneumonia; 59 from infant's diseases; 66 from heart trouble and 21 from simple meningitis. These are the chief causes of death.

The distinguished visitor will be escorted to the residence of James F. Robertson, where she will be entertained during her short stay in the city.

\$350,000 FOR SYRIANS Washington, Nov. 7.—Red Cross Headquarters estimated that nearly \$350,000 has been raised so far for relief of Syrian and Armenian war sufferers as the result of President Wilson's proclamation setting aside Oct. 21 and 22 as special days for contributions. The last official counting on Oct. 31 showed \$225,000 on hand and about \$85,000 a day coming in.

Purchase of supplies to be carried by an American naval collier, which after complicated negotiations with the various foreign governments concerned, will sail for Beirut about Dec. 10, is well under way. The supplies will be distributed chiefly in Syria, where had crops, a locust plague, requisitioning by the Turks, and the shutting off of the country, by rail and sea, because of war conditions, have brought 100,000 people near starvation.

The coast will be about \$250,000, and the balance raised above that will be sent in credit to Americans in Constantinople for relief among Armenians who can be reached only in that way.

About one-quarter of the cargo space of the collier will be devoted to clothing, particularly plain. The other three-quarters will contain food, particularly crushed wheat, now being especially ground as the Syrians use it; cottonseed oil, which is used instead of lard; flour, rice, sugar, coffee, condensed milk, and kerosene.

The collier, which will be either the Casco or the Sterling, will start loading at New York about Dec. 1. She will need a month to make the voyage.

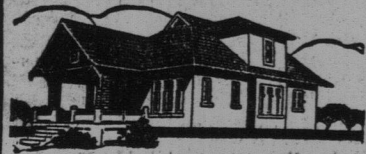

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HUGHES AND THE TARIFF

If Hughes should win in the presidential election today the high tariff men in the United States will rejoice. The Republican candidate, in a recent speech, said:

"I agree with Chairman Hurley of the Federal Trade Commission as to the necessity for organization and efficiency, but he stops short of a full conclusion which, it seems to me, he should have reached, because we may have a very high degree of efficiency, and we should develop it to the utmost; and we may have the best possible organization and we should do far more than we have done to encourage it, and still we may not be able to compete with Europe, where there is at least equal organization and equal efficiency. Our friends on the other side are very eloquent with respect to the natural strength of American manhood, the wonderful resources of America, and the great power we have in meeting these new economic conditions. Well, I rather think that America had all these things twenty-two months ago, before the war broke out. Certainly the men of this country were just as resourceful and alert as ever, and we had our raw materials and we had our plants; but we did not have a policy that protected American industry; and that is necessary for the simple reason that I have already stated. Whatever debate there may have been in the past with respect to these matters of theory, there is very little debate with respect to these matters of fact, or rather, very little room for debate. When this year ends we are going to enter upon a very keen commercial rivalry. The nations on the other side understand the matter."

Which means, in short metre, that if the Republicans win up goes the tariff wall, and if that should happen the protectionists of Canada would forthwith desire to give another twist to the tariff screw on this side of the border.

THE GOSPEL OF SERVICE

If the new vision of Rotary which was revealed to the Rotary Club of St. John last evening by Past International President Albert takes hold of the members there is no worthy cause which will not benefit by their newly aroused or increased desire for service.

This does not mean that every member will be an easy mark for every advocate of every cause. There was once a man who went out into the street after having heard an appeal that stirred within him a desire to be of greater service to his fellows. To him came one who said he was penniless and hungry, and forthwith the citizen gave him a dollar, and passed on in quite a glow of self-content produced by having embraced the very first opportunity to do a good deed. The man who got the dollar purchased a bottle of gin, got drunk, and was arrested and sentenced to three months' hard labor.

The point of this story is that there must be preparation for service, in order that it may not be wasted. The moment a man feels that he ought to do more for the welfare of the community than he has hitherto done, that very moment he should begin to take soundings just as he would do if he were about to embark in a new business of his own. He will soon learn where a helping hand is needed, and further sympathetic investigations which need to be changed. And if he will gather about him others of like mind they will discover ways and means of changing the conditions and performing a real and lasting service for the community. Mr. Albert tells the Rotarians they should boost the board of trade. They should support organized charity. They should develop the courage that makes a man not ashamed to follow the better impulses of his nature in any company and under any conditions. They should develop the boy spirit of clean play and healthy emotions. They should attend the church to which they profess adhesion, and their homes should be fit temples for the development of the best in the lives of their children.

If this is Rotary, it is a bigger and a better thing than even its founders dreamed of. It may be but a passing phase of human brotherhood its opportunity for real, helpful, human service is here and now; and the field of opportunity is as wide as the needs of humanity.

MEN, WOMEN AND CHILDREN

A member of The Times staff last evening listened to many other men, to one of the most striking presentations of the gospel of service any St. John organization has heard for many a day. No man could listen to Rotarian Albert without feeling his better impulses strongly stirred, or without feeling that there is a nobleness in community welfare work which ought to command the loving service of every individual.

A little later in the evening the members of The Times staff went to the annual meeting of the Free Kindergarten Association. The mayor was in the chair, but the audience was almost exclusively made up of women. Omitting the speakers and reporters, there were not half a dozen men in the room. Doubtless there were other meetings

of interest and importance last evening, but are the men of St. John taking themselves seriously when they ignore the call to service which the neglected child life of St. John daily makes to them? The tragedy of the lives of some children cried out in the simply-voiced reports read by the devoted teachers, and it ought to appeal to every man as well as every woman in this city. Capt. Morrow was quite right when he said there was something wrong in St. John. He had seen it in the faces of the children of the alleys, who are not getting a fair start in life.

When will the kindergarten be given its rightful place in the school system of St. John. These devoted women who have kept the classes going, and who cannot even secure proper premises for their work, deserve more from the city and the citizens than they are getting. It was shown by the record last evening that kindergarten children lead in their class when they enter the public schools. It was shown that the teachers, through their association with the children, bring a refining influence into some homes where it is greatly needed. The community is benefited far more than it can ever realize by the good seeds planted in child-minds in the formative period of life.

Bishop LeBlanc's message of sympathy and commendation, and his fine appreciation of the value of kindergarten work was a feature of last night's meeting, which was the more appreciated because of his lordship's high office and his well-proved sympathy with all that pertains to the education and training of the young.

Capt. Morrow, out of his boundless sympathy and his Toronto experiences, thrilled his hearers not less by his earnestness than by his stern insistence that St. John should incorporate the kindergarten into its school system; and that these little ones with whom rests the future of our civilization should be given all the careful care and training. One very interesting statement made by him will give great comfort to those who know how much of child misery is due to drink. There are today in Toronto, he said, more depositors in the savings banks than ever before; and men who formerly upheld the drink traffic now rejoice that Ontario has prohibition. But all the misfortunes of needy and neglected children are not due to drink. Our whole social system is honeycombed with wrongs that need to be righted. The parents who permit their young daughters to roam the streets at night without proper escort need to be brought up with a sharp turn, for they are guilty of a crime against the innocence of childhood. The appeal is to the manhood of St. John. Too many men are quite too much absorbed in profit-making, or in pleasure, or in their various clubs or other men's organizations, to hear or heed the cry of the children. They mean well, no doubt, but they have not seen the vision of a nobler and a truer service.

In the police court this morning a pitiful, tiny old man of eight years stood up on the witness bench beside the magistrate. He had not known school or Sunday school, he was slightly deaf, and he looked at those about him with an expression of age and detachment that was infinitely pathetic. He was thin and under-sized and ill-nourished, and his tawny hair bristled out as if it had never known a comb. His mother has been ill a long time, but his father is not a good provider, and last night a neighbor took the child in an arm, and later he was taken to the police station to spend the night. Today he was taken where he will be properly cared for till the Children's Aid Society have the question of his future decided.

A pitiful, neglected, tiny, suffering old man of eight years. What are the men of St. John going to do about this sort of thing for this case is typical? If they want to do something they know where to apply. Who can afford to evade responsibility for such conditions as are daily revealed? The call is to service. Who answers?

Mr. A. H. Wetmore is to be congratulated on being elected to the presidency of the board of trade. As one of the younger business men of the city he has shown a keen and intelligent interest in all that pertains to the welfare of St. John; and he has been an active member of the board of trade. Moreover, he is sufficiently independent in his views to be ready to stand up for the interests of St. John without fear or favor; and that is the kind of man the leading business organization of the city should have at its head.



URGE KINDERGARTEN AS PART OF PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM

At the annual meeting of the Free Kindergarten Association, which was held last evening in the Germain street church institute rooms, a general demand for the inclusion of kindergartens as part of the public school system was voiced.

Captain J. D. Morrow, chaplain of the 160th, told of conditions in Toronto and of what he had seen in St. John and earnestly advocated an extension of the schools to include kindergarten methods.

A. M. Beiding, president of the Children's Aid Society, gave a graphic description of child life conditions in certain parts of the city and showed the great need for more extended efforts in aid of the children.

A letter from Bishop LeBlanc voiced his sympathy with the work and his hope that it would be made a permanent part of the educational system of the city.

The teachers, Misses Edith Stevens, Ruth Hanks, Lou Esley and Belle Morton reported on the work in their schools.

Private Estabrooks and Bryant of the 160th Battalion were heard in solos.

Mrs. W. C. Matthews, president of the society, gave a brief resume of the year's work. At the present time there are 160 pupils in the four kindergarten classes, and because of lack of accommodations and facilities it has been necessary to refuse admission to 160 others.

Mrs. W. Currie, the secretary, also gave a very interesting report. Mrs. J. W. Lewis, treasurer, advised that the total income for the year had been \$2,508, including the civic grant of \$750. Total expenses were \$1,922. The largest items on the list were salaries of the four teachers, rent and general supplies. The balance on hand is \$384.

Mayor Hayes presided for the first part of the evening and was succeeded by Rev. S. S. Poole.

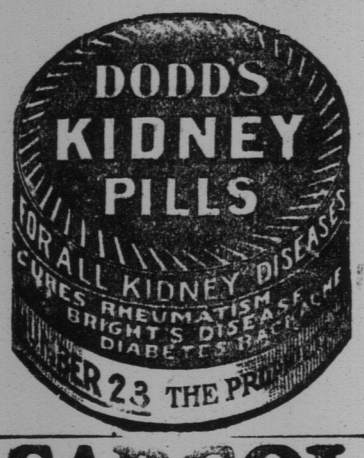

BILINGUAL CASE COSTS TO REACH \$150,000 TOTAL

Province Will Have to Bear \$100,000—Legal Fees are \$80,000

It is estimated that the entire cost of the bilingual litigation through the Ontario courts and the Privy Council, will exceed \$150,000, of which \$100,000 will be borne by the province. These figures cover court costs, legal fees, traveling and other expenses incidental to the trials. The costs assessed by the courts will total \$25,000. In the first appeal before the Privy Council, which resulted in favor of the province, the province is allowed its costs, but in the second appeal the decision in which was adverse, the Ottawa Separate School Commission appointed by the government, must pay the costs of the city of Ottawa and Quebec Bank, parties in the action.

The legal fees which the government must pay will alone reach \$80,000. This sum covers the fee of Sir Robert Finlay, who was retained by the government, and those of Messrs. W. N. Tilley and McGregor Young, government counsel. The traveling expenses will, in addition, represent \$5,000.

PIG IRON ADVANCES \$1 A TON IN TWO DAYS

Pittsburg, Nov. 4.—Pig iron prices continue to advance in the Pittsburg district, \$1 a ton having been added in the last day or two, with premiums appearing yesterday and today for small lots for prompt shipment. One sale was reported at \$36 a ton for foundry iron. Trade authorities say that since Oct. 1 pig iron has advanced an average of \$8.50 a ton, or more than one-half as much as it advanced during all of 1915.

"NO LONGER BRITISH EMPIRE; A BRITISH COMMONWEALTH NOW"

Bishop of Worcester Says No Peace Will Be Concluded Until Allies' Cause Has Been Won.

New York, Nov. 6.—Speaking at a luncheon given in his honor here today by the Pilgrims of the United States, Right Rev. Hayshe Wolcott Yeatman-Biggs, Bishop of Worcester, England, asserted that the role which English people believe that the most thoughtful Americans desire to play is that their nation shall be "hailed by all the world as the herald of true peace and of progress which gives to every nation, big or little, a place in God's sun."

Later, in his address, the bishop said: "I doubt whether the temper of the Allies would ever suffer any suggestion of peace intervention until the cause for which we are ready to give our all is accomplished.

"When peace comes, it would be indeed helpful if the neutral countries lent a hand in the adjustment of all our furniture, in the adjustment of those social conditions which will make for a lasting commonwealth. That is what we aim at. We are tired of the word 'empire.' I do not think we want any longer to talk of the British Empire. We want to talk of the British brotherhood and the British commonwealth."

BETHLEHEM STEEL TO SPEND \$90,000,000

Amount Will Be Used in New Construction Work and Additions in Next Two Years.

The Bethlehem Steel Corporation is planning to spend \$90,000,000 in new construction work and in additions to existing plants in the next two years. Some details of Bethlehem's expansion became known last summer, after the Pennsylvania Steel Company was bought but Charles M. Schwab emphasized the scope of the undertaking in a speech made last Thursday at a luncheon given him in St. Louis by the Members Conference of the Business Men's League. According to The Iron Age Mr. Schwab said:

"In the face of a certain amount of opposition on the part of the directors of the corporation with which I am affiliated, I have insisted upon spending \$90,000,000 within the next two years for improvements, beginning immediately."

OTTAWA STANDS BY TEMPERANCE ACT OF ONTARIO

Dominion Refuses to Issue Bonded Warehouse Licenses While Prohibition is in Force

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The Ottawa government is refusing to issue bonded warehouse licenses in Ontario during the period that the Ontario Temperance Act is in force.

Applicants for such licenses have received replies from the department of inland revenue announcing the government's decision in the matter. A month ago a circular was issued by a prominent firm of distillers in the province to former shop licensees pointing out that Clause 189 of the Ontario Temperance Act would appear to permit upon payment of excise duties, direct deliveries to private customers in Ontario from any bonded warehouse provided orders for delivery are received from without the province. It was urged that former shop licensees should apply to Ottawa for bonded warehouse licenses and obtaining it do business under these conditions.

Members of the Ontario License Board when advised of this circular stated a debatable question was raised which only the courts could determine. The action of the Ottawa government in refusing to grant any bonded warehouse licenses in future terminates the manner and likewise disappoints a dozen or more former shop licensees who had made application to Ottawa to do business from a bonded warehouse.

There are at present about twenty bonded warehouses in Ontario which received their licenses before the Ontario Temperance Act was passed. These will apparently be allowed to do business until the end of the federal license year, Dec. 31, but it is unlikely their licenses will be renewed after that date.

CITY OF MONTREAL MUST PAY \$500 FOR EGG SEIZURE

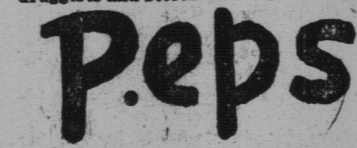
Montreal, Nov. 6.—This city was condemned today by the court of appeals to pay John Layton & Company, Ltd., of London, England, \$500 compensation for the seizure of \$100,000 worth of Chinese frozen eggs, shipped from Hun Kow, China, by way of Liverpool, to Montreal, in October, 1910, the seizure having been on the ground that the frozen eggs were not wholesome and suitable for food. The company sued for \$58,000 damages, and the action was dismissed by the superior court in June, 1915, and the company appealed, with the result that the shipment of canned eggs consisted of 288 tons, and fifty tons were forwarded to Toronto.

Washington, Nov. 7.—Acceptance of the resignation of Dr. Constantin Dumba is taken by state department officials as a plain indication that the Austrian government is about to name a new diplomat representative to Washington.

Dr. Dumba returned to Austria after he was declared to be persona non grata by the United States government more than a year ago, and the fact that Austria has not sooner accepted his resignation from a post in which he could not serve was looked upon as showing that Emperor Francis Joseph desired to express displeasure with the United States in this fashion.

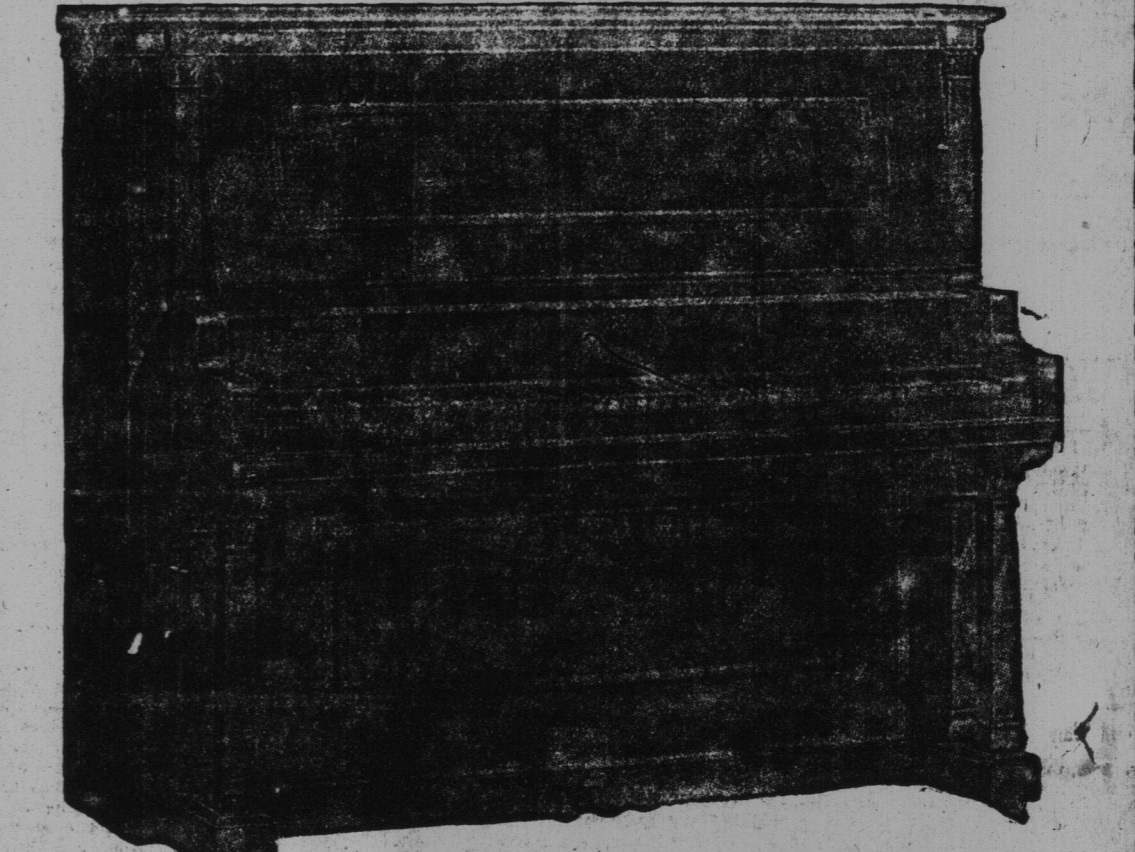

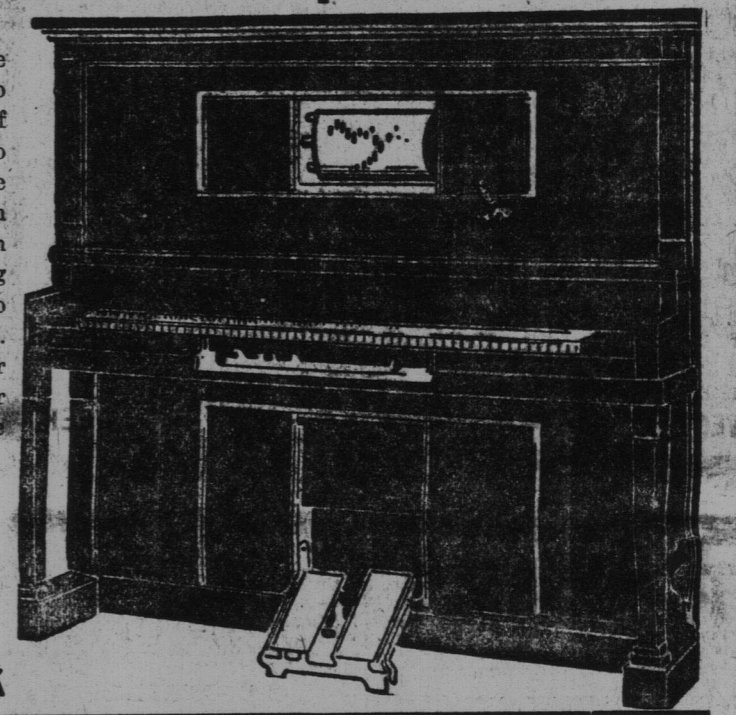

LOCAL NEWS

METHODIST SUNDAY SCHOOLS
The Methodist Sunday school superintendents and assistants had supper last evening in the Y. M. C. A., after which election of officers for the year took place as follows: His Worship Mayor Hayes, chairman; Alfred Burley, vice-chairman; H. N. Stout, secretary, and Duncan Smith, treasurer. Plans were discussed and a programme drawn up for the annual Sunday school rally to be held on New Year's Day in Centenary church at 10.30 a.m.

ANOTHER NEGLECTED CHILD
An undisciplined boy of eight years, who has no proper home life, was taken to the police station last night and provided with a bed. His father was in court this morning, but his mother has been in for some time. The testimony of Policeman Armstrong and the appearance of the man himself, as well as the ill-nourished and neglected appearance of the boy resulted in having the latter given in charge of Father Duke until the case can be further dealt with. At noon a great bowl of food was given the little fellow in the guard room, and he ate it with a relish that told its own story to the sympathetic officers.

THEY MADE \$12.80.
The sum of \$12.80 was realized at a tiny fair held in the mission in St. James street, West Side, recently, by four little boys, Bruce and William Thompson and Eric and Clarence King. The proceeds were passed over to Mrs. Fraser of the West Side Soldiers' Comfort Association.

NEW WATER MAIN TO COST \$30,000
Lancaster Renewal Approved by Common Council
WOULD START THIS FALL
Inquiries Regarding High Cost of Electric Lighting—Letter From Mayor of Toronto Presented to Council

An expenditure of \$30,000 for a new twenty-four inch cast iron water main from Moore's Hill to the West St. John reservoir to improve the water service in Lancaster, was approved by the common council meeting in committee this morning. Commissioner Wigmore also was authorized to negotiate for the purchase of a two-ton motor truck and to purchase a heavy draught horse.

As a result of representations made by Commissioner Fisher, the common clerk was instructed to write to the St. John Railway Company asking why the net cost of electric current for lighting purposes should be five cents in Montreal and nine cents in Halifax while it is thirteen and a half cents in St. John. Commissioner Fisher announced his intention of connecting the two new strips of pavement in Main street with a section of asphalt Macadam, replacing the present wooden blocks in the section. He also submitted plans for the new railway siding in the southern end of Charlotte street.

A letter from the Mayor of Toronto expressing his thanks for the kindness shown to the 180th battalion since their arrival in St. John was presented to the meeting.

Matters discussed at the meeting this morning will be confirmed at the weekly meeting of the common council this afternoon.

The mayor presided and all the members were present at the meeting this morning.

Commissioner Fisher presented plans for the proposed additional track to be laid in Charlotte street extension for handling lumber, which will be submitted to the common council this afternoon.

He also reported that he proposes to replace the wooden block pavement in Main street, between the new granite block and asphalt pavements, with an asphalt Macadam.

Cost of Lighting
Commissioner Fisher announced that he had been making some inquiries regarding the cost of electric lighting for houses and stores. While the cost in St. John is fifteen cents per kilowatt hour, less ten per cent discount for cash payment in Halifax is ten cents, less ten per cent, and in Montreal it is six cents, less one cent discount, a net cost of five cents. He moved that the common clerk be instructed to write to the St. John Railway Company asking why the difference is so great. Carried.

Lancaster Water Improvements
Plans for the proposed improvements in the water service in Lancaster were presented by Commissioner Wigmore. He said he regarded it as absolutely essential that the twelve-inch cement pipe from Moore's Hill to the reservoir should be replaced this year, as if anything should happen to the old twenty-four inch iron pipe, West St. John would be left without water. This pipe would feed into the reservoir and would afford an extra protection, without the use of a pumping station. The estimated cost is \$50,000 and he was confident the work could be finished before the intensely cold weather comes. The new pipe would greatly increase the pressure in Carleton, in addition to the added pressure gained by the saving of a million gallons which he expected to effect by insisting on reduction of leakage and waste. The proposed new pipe would be a twenty-four inch cast iron pipe. He moved for authority to call for tenders for the cast iron pipe, the excavation and back-fill, at an estimated cost of \$80,000, to be taken from water-main-tenance. The resolution was carried.

Commissioner Wigmore reported that he had purchased only one horse for his department in the year, and the four now in service are pretty well used up. He thought it would be more economical and more efficient to purchase a two-ton truck, if not he would like to buy two new horses. In addition to its use in hauling, it would be used as an emergency car for repair work at night. He moved for authority to negotiate for the purchase of a car, the prices and specifications to be approved by the council before purchasing.

Commissioner McLellan remarked that present conditions make it extravagant to use horses instead of motors.

Commissioner Russell suggested that other departments might be able to use cars also.

The motion was carried.

Authority was given Commissioner Wigmore to purchase a heavy truck horse also.

Attention was drawn by Commissioner McLellan to the need of replanking the trucking strips at the warehouses 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6 in West St. John. He estimated that the cost would be less than \$1,000. Commissioner Russell said he had an estimate of \$3,000 for the work but the engineer is preparing a revised estimate, if the cost is within reason, he will move for the work to be done.

Commissioner McLellan spoke of the situation arising from the use of soft coal in a laundry at the corner of Union at Pitt streets, regarding which a petition had been received from residents of the district. Mr. Armstrong, had protested against being forced to do something that other laundries did not, and more recently that he could not secure hard coal slacks. It now appears that the agreement that only hard coal should be used, had not been made a matter of record.

For the Soldiers
Regarding the proposal to do something to entertain the men of the visiting battalions, Commissioner McLellan said that Captain Morrow had informed him that the bills for the receptions had not been paid. It now appears that as anything else, and officers of the 180th had agreed. Ten barrels of apples had been sent to each battalion. He moved that the bills be paid. Carried.

It came out that the mayor had undertaken, personally, to pay the bills for the receptions to officers of newly arriving battalions, and on motion of Commissioner McLellan, refunds of bills paid

FINE OF \$100 FOR VIOLATING LIQUOR ACT
Judging from recent heavy fines struck against bootleggers and others engaged in the illegal sale of liquor, the conclusion can be drawn that the police authorities are bent upon putting a stop to direct or indirect supplying of liquor to soldiers.

Last week two prisoners were fined the full amount of \$50 each. Yesterday a penalty of \$100 for selling liquor without a license was handed out. This morning Edwin McAllister was fined a like sum for selling liquor without a license. The magistrate said that if it was for another offence he might be able to strike the penalty and compound the fine, but where it was a violation of the liquor act, he himself could be jailed if he was to attempt to minimize the fine. He was therefore compelled to strike the full penalty.

A case brought up by building inspector Carleton, for infringement upon the building regulations was postponed until Friday morning, as U. J. Sweeney, who is appearing for the defendant, made known that his client was out of town.

Four prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined \$8 or two months in jail. Another left a deposit and did not appear.

THE 132ND ARE SAFELY ACROSS
Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 7.—It is officially announced that the following troops have arrived safely in England and 180th New Brunswick Battalion, 203rd Manitoba Battalion, half of 160th Ontario Battalion, officers training corps; drafts, artillery, medical, royal flying corps and cyclists.

JACOB WHITEBONE DEAD
An aged and respected citizen passed away this morning in the person of Jacob Whitebone, at his residence, 38 Garden street. Mr. Whitebone was seventy-one years old. He was a native of Amsterdam, and returned to Toronto when a young man, and later to St. John. He also lived for a time in New York. For many years Mr. Whitebone kept a tobacco store in Main street, but of late had been in the wholesale tobacco business. He is survived by his wife; four sons, Ernest A., with the 8th Battery, William M., Allan A. and James A. of this city; and two daughters, Lillian C. and Ida M., at home. One daughter lives in Halifax. His funeral will take place tomorrow at half past two o'clock.

GERMAN WOMEN ARE BITTER AGAINST THOSE OF ENGLAND AND THE STATES
New York, Nov. 7.—The New York Sun publishes another installment of an article written by D. Thomas Curtin of Boston for the London Times, in which Mr. Curtin deals with the attitude of the German women toward the war. Peace and food, Mr. Curtin says, are the two principal subjects of conversation among German women. He says:

"The second question the German women are not standing their losses as well as the women of England. The venom with which the German women regard the American women, in contrast to the feeling expressed by English women. German women read a good deal about English and American women, and cordially detest them.

"There is a notion in England that the 'Gott stafe England' cry has ceased in Germany. I found no sign of it lessening. To it has been added 'Gott stafe America'. Pastors, professors and the press have told the German women that their husbands, sons and sweethearts are killed by American shells. The feeling against America among the German women is so intense that the American flag has been withdrawn from the American hospital at Munich, though the hospital was supported by German-American funds."

FATHER AND FOUR SONS
