Heads of Departments Kept Hands Off, Leaving All to Employes - No Prizes Were Needed.

Salesclerks and the non-selling force of the Gilchrist Company in Boston recently conducted a sale during which the department managers were absent with official leave. From beginning to end the sale was operated solely by members of the Gilchrist Association, comprising employes of the store. Even the advertising for the event was left to the employes. A small an-nouncement appeared in the local news-papers and the rest of the publicity was obtained by sales-clerks and service em-ployes sending oit personal letters and calling customers on the telephone. One enterprising salesclerk sent out more than 250 letters and every night got in touch with scores of customers by phone. Salesclerks and the non-selling force

The store was divided into twenty-The store was divided into twenty-eight groups, seventeen from the up-stairs departments, and eleven from the basements by a committee representing each of the selling and non-selling del-partments. The committee also set u sales quota for each department. Previous to the opening of the sale the management decided to allow the salesclerks to determine what would be the best kinds of merchandise to fea-ture. Blank forms were distributed and the selling force listed the desir-able merchandise and the prices at which it should be sold. In all cases where goods were listed which the store did not carry, it was up to the buyers to secure them. Perhaps the most interesting thing about the sale was that the store did

It is the contention of the daughter that her father, who was eighty-seven years old at the time of his death, was not of sound mind, and was under the influence of Mrs. Martinez, who, the daughter alleges, was her father's com-mon law wife. Mr. Martinez's first wife was Miss Annie Niblo, a niece of William Niblo, who was the owner of Niblo's Garden. Counsel for Mrs. Longman in open-ing his case said Mr. Martinez first met the woman who now is his widow when she was eighteen years old and was employed in the office of an insur-ance company. She was known as Marie Taylor, and Mr. Martinez, pos-ing as a bachelor, made love to her. When Miss Taylor learned of her suitor's married state and taxed him with the deception he promised to con-tinue to provide for her. When the first Mrs, Martinez died in 1904, Mr. Martinez and Miss Taylor became known as husband and wife, but never went through any ceremonial mariage. About two years before Mr. Mar-tinez's death, it was alleged, Mrs. Marie Taylor Martinez began to exert an influence over her aged husband. She induced him to open a joint a-count in the National City Bank for her husband and herself, in which there was \$110,000, representing the drawing account of Mr. Martinez in his firm for four years, and also, it was charged, the widow induced him to sell some Brooklyn real estate and to deposit the \$112,000 proceeds in the joint account. Mrs. Martinez denies the allegations that she unduly influenced her husband. Several witnesses testified that Mr. Martinez gave no signs of mental de-terioration, but rather appeared much younger than he was. LEFT WAITING AT CHURCH.




