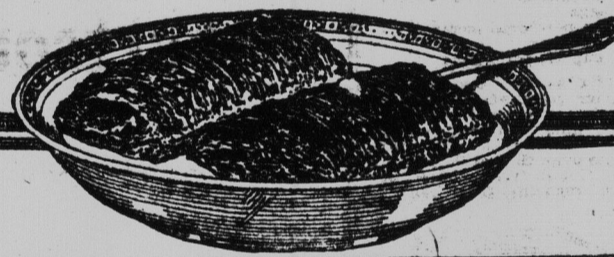

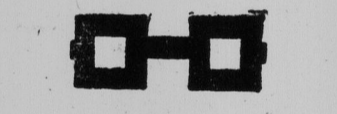

COCOA FRUIT BREAD

- 1 cup sugar
- 2/3 cups Graham flour
- 1/2 cup Cowan Cocoa
- 1/2 cup walnuts
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup vanilla
- 1. Mix and add dry ingredients.
- 2. Add milk.
- 3. Add shortening, melted.
- 4. Add fruit and nuts. Pour.
- 5. Turn into greased and floured pan.
- 6. Bake in a moderate oven twenty minutes.

COCOA BROWNIES

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 teaspoon Cowan Cocoa
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup powdered sugar
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Mix as for cake; spread butter on bottom; stir as usual; as possible, sprinkle very finely chopped nuts on top. Bake in a very moderate oven till lightly browned. Cut in fancy shapes before removing from pan.

FAMOUS INDIAN DIES.

Moraviantown, Ont., Feb. 20.—(Gen.) Stonefish, Canada's most noted Indian sniper, for three years in France, was found frozen to death the other night near his home on the reserve. Stonefish's dead body was discovered by neighbors and the belief is that he was overcome in his exertion in wading through the huge drifts near his home.





Morristown, Vt., Feb. 20.—Robert
Whittemore, a war veteran who was
wounded three times and twice cited
for bravery, was shot through the left
breast yesterday. Then, with his
mother's assistance, he overpowered
Henry Gagnon, his alleged assailant, and
led him to a chair to await the arrival
of the Gagnon family. Whittemore
later told his mother when he was told
his daughter had been there several
days.

TEN YEARS IN PRISON

Newark, Feb. 20.—Walter Gabriel, con-
victed of being a member of the com-
munist party and of advocating the
overthrow of the government by vio-
lence, was sentenced yesterday to ten
years' imprisonment and a fine of \$1,000.

INCREASE IN CRIME

Toronto, Feb. 20.—Crime in this city
last year was greater than in 1918, ac-
cording to a report made public. Chief
Police Geo. C. Drury said for the in-
crease in crime here as a natural re-
action of the war and he points out
that there is an increase of crime all over
the civilized world. There were five
murders in Toronto in 1919, as against
three in 1918. The number of house
and shop-breaking cases was 1,039 last
year, an increase of 483.
There were eighteen cases of man-
slaughter here last year, ten of which
were due to motor cars, two to street
cars and the remainder to drunken quar-
rels.

LLOYD GEORGE IS INVITED TO RUSSIA

London, Feb. 19.—George Lansbury,
British labor leader and editor of the
Daily Herald, who is in Moscow in-
vestigating conditions in the Soviet capi-
tal, has sent a wireless message to Pre-
mier Lloyd George inviting the premier
to visit the Soviet leaders, whom Lan-
sbury describes as "clear-headed, honest
and humane."
The message says:
"I beg you to come and join confer-

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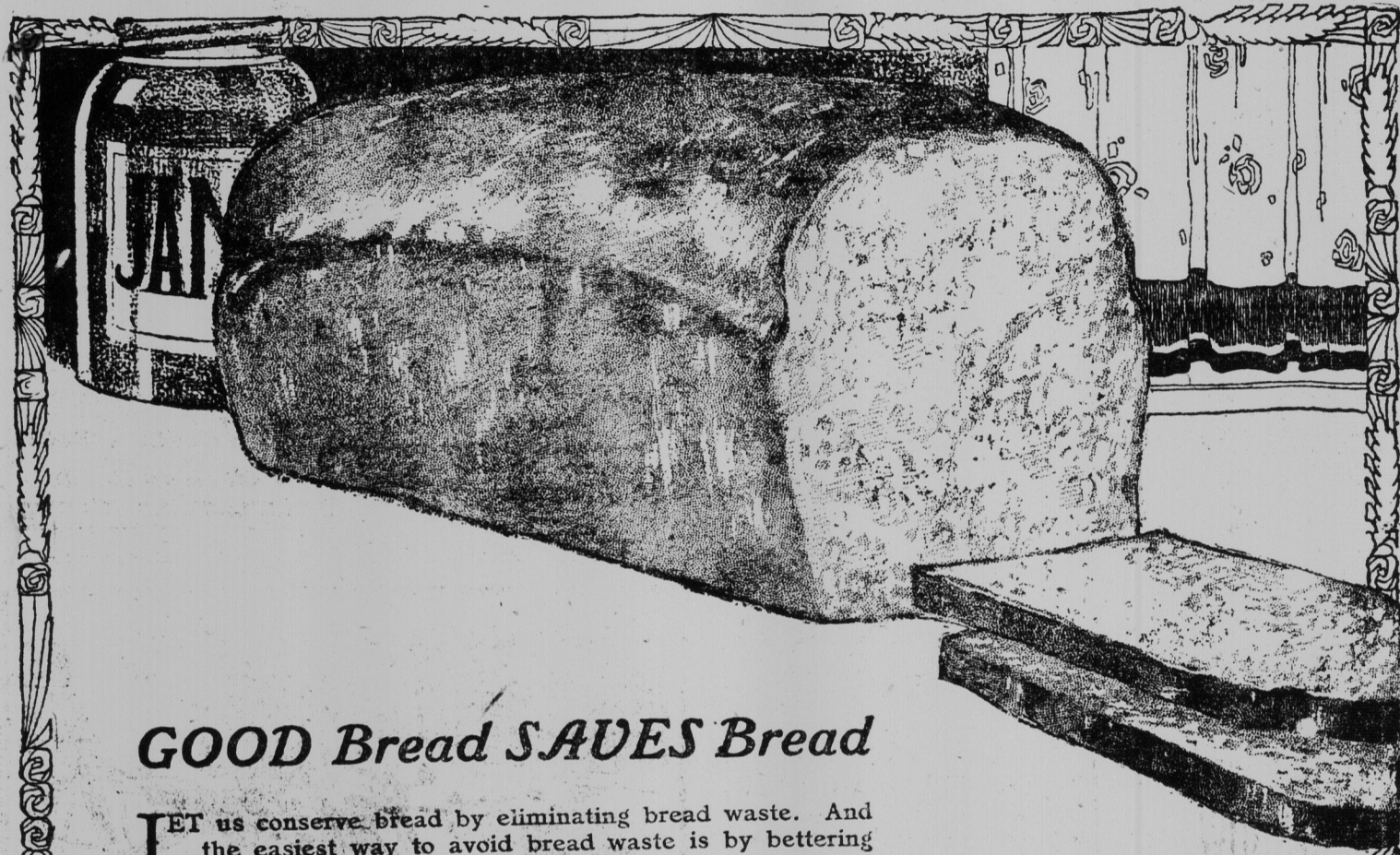

BOY ROBBERS ROUNDED UP; A LONG CRIME LIST

Systematic Pocket Picking at Theatres, in Store and in Streets
 Four Lads Arrested and Confess—Two Give Details of Series of Thefts Extending Over Years—Worked a Regular System.

A gang composed of lads ranging in age from nine to thirteen that call themselves "Co-boys," who for the last six or eight months have been going along the streets and in the various public thoroughfares in the city snatching pocket-books from ladies, have been rounded up by the detective department. On Tuesday night Detective Donohue arrested two boys in front of the Imperial Theatre on grounds that they were acting suspiciously. On being brought before the magistrate and questioned it was learned that they belonged to the gang and after a thorough examination of the names and whereabouts of four others were learned. The two pleaded guilty to the charges and were sentenced to a term in the Boys' Industrial Home.

Last night in front of the Opera House Detective Donohue carried out today four more arrested two lads, also members of the gang, and took them to the police station. They admitted they had been carrying on the pocket-picking game for some time and gave the detectives a list of their victims as far as possible, or, as one lad put it, "all I can think of." The two boys, aged eleven and thirteen, were arraigned before the magistrate this morning, pleaded guilty and were sentenced to four years in the Industrial Home.

The criminal record of this gang brings back to mind the days when the old "burrard" gang carried out their activities in the city some years ago. Complaints have been received by the department about ladies having their pocket-books snatched from their hands, and as a result of this the detectives have been on the lookout for any such law-breaking.

At the Empress Theatre on the west side their activities were extensive, as is shown by the lad's confession, as follows: Jan. 1, a pocket-book containing \$10 and two containing \$8 and \$2 respectively. At the Lyric Theatre he snatched a pocket-book containing \$5.50 and \$100 from a lady on the stage. He said five years ago he took three pocket-books containing \$16, \$14 and \$16 respectively from ladies in the five, ten and fifteen cent store. The lad has not been in Bathurst street since he was taken there on Feb. 13, 1919. The lad's record is not so extensive, as he is only eleven years old, yet he has a few thefts against him. On February 17 he said he took a pocket-book containing \$17 from a lady at the head of King street. It was found out afterwards that the lady was Mrs. Doherty, 138 Brittain street. This money, he said, he divided with three other lads and three of the pocket-books in all they got German street. In the Queen Square Theatre he took a pocket-book, containing ninety-five cents from a lady. He took two containing \$16 and \$33 respectively from a lady in the Imperial Theatre about three weeks ago. He said he divided the spoils with four other of his colleagues and threw the pocket-books in an alley off Green street. At the Victoria Rink the harvest was not so large, as in a pocket-book taken from a lady there the contents amounted to only one cent with a hole in it. The lad was "made" he said, and he threw the pocket-book across the street.

How It Was Done.
 The story is told by the lads in their own words, and they said that some of their number were "no good," they couldn't get them without being caught, so the honorable ones were detailed to scout through the crowds and put the "clever" lads "wise" as to who had pocket-books. On seeing a prospect they would immediately inform their "executive" and the "haul" would be accomplished. One instance is mentioned where a lady on coming out of the Imperial reached in her pocket to get her gloves and while putting on one and before she could get the other one, the lad had picked \$10 out of her pocket and was out of reach. The detective department have warned the managers of theatres of this and have acquainted them of the tactics used by the amateur pocket-pickers.

The detectives now have in their possession a pocket-book lost by a lady at the Opera House on February 16 and she can recover it by identifying it. They also have one which was found in an alleyway near the Imperial. There is some chance they say, of finding those thrown in the alley off Green street, but it is feared they will be somewhat beaten.
