



COMPOST HEAP. In every war garden this year a place uld be set apart in which unused green stuff from the house—weeds, leaves and so on—may be kept to be used, when thoroughly decomposed, as manure for the following season's crops. If a sprinkling of lime is added from time to time, it will sweeten the material. This provides the basis for excellent manure and none of it should be allowed to go to waste.

If the campost heap was made up early in the season or if part of an old one remains, it is an ideal place to grow squash or other creeping vegetables, provided that it is not situated in too shady a part of the garden. Every square inch of ground should be made to count.
