German Defeat By The Russians In Poland Declared a Rout

Official News Reaches London Announcing The Russian Victory As Decisive

ENEMY IN RETREAT ALONG THE ENTIRE FRONT

At Some Parts The Germans Are Fleeing In Disorder, Leaving Guns and Other War Material Behind Them--In Berlin They Try to Lay the Blame on the Austrians

London, Nov. 26—Official news received in Russian circles in swept down London today declares that the rout of the German and Austrian forces in Poland has been complete.

The general staff, however, is not yet able to give any details of this fighting.

London, Nov. 26-"The Germans have begun a retreat along the entire front," says the Petrograd correspondent of the Express, "and in many places, the flight is a disordered rout, marked by the abandonment of artillery, maxims and transports.'

"It is now clear that the Russian victory in Poland is decisive," says this correspondent. "The number of prisoners taken by the Russians is etimated at fifty thouand.

"Berlin meanwhile is beginning to talk about repulsing Russian attacks, which is a subtle method of announcing that the German troops are on the defensive."

Petrograd, Nov. 26—Semi official advices received from Poland show that the German defeat at Lodz culminating in the capture of a German army corps was the result of a Russian manoeuvre by which the Germans were led into an inextricable trap. The Russian left wing resting on the river Warta and the Russian right wing on the Vistula, both lying along the Warsaw-Kalisz railroad, moved forward in unison in the last two days.

Simultaneously the Russian centre gave ground, and the Germans followed, apparently relying upon a German column from Wielun to repulse the Russian left wing and to form a juncture with the main German forces.

The German plan failed as a result of the battle on November 25, when the German forces from Wielun were repulsed. Thereafter the Russian wings advanced and closed the gap through which the German centre had passed.

In the meantime Russian reserves had come up and they surrounded the Germans, thousands of whom surrendered, others fought their way north in an effort to join the German left in the vicinity of Lowicz, a town fortyfour miles southwest of Warsaw.

They are herents of the Sikh religion, found incipally in the Punjab, the United sovinces, Kashmir, and other parts of orthern India. "The word Sikh," says he Encyclopedia Britannica, "literally seans 'learner,' disciple,' and was the same given by the first guru Nanak to his followers. The Sikh are divided anot two classes, Sahijdhari and Kesadhari. The former were so named from living at ease and the latter from wearing long hair. Both obey the general injunctions of the Sikh gurus, but the Sahipdhari Sikhs have not accepted the pahul or baptism of Guru Govind Singh, and do not wear the distinguishing habiliments of the Kesadhari, who are the paptized Sikhs, also called Singhs or lions. Their distinguishing habiliments are long hair wound round a small dag ger and bearing a comb inserted in it, a steel bracelet and short drawers. Neither the Sahijdhari nor the Kesadhari whom are the paptil or Sikhs may smoke tobacco or drink wine. The prohibition of wine is, however, generally disregarded except by very orthodox Sikhs.

The 26th New Brunswick Regiment of Infantry will be under command of Lieut. Col. J. L. McAvity, and will be a unit in the Second Canadian Expeditionary Contingent for Overseas Service.

PAY FOR VOLUNTEERS

THE PERIOD OF ENLISTMENT is for the duration of the war and for six months after its termination, if required.

THE RATE OF PAY is \$1.10 per day, which for seven days a week, means \$33.00 per month, and found.

IF DISABLED, soldiers will receive pensions at such rates as may be fixed by the government.

IF WOUNDED OR ILL, soldiers will be well cared for and sent back to their homes as soon as convenient. SOLDIERS MAY ASSIGN THEIR PAY or any portion of it, to their wives or other dependents, and such sums will be paid regularly to the persons so named.

SHOULD ANY SOLDIERS BE KILLED, their wives and children will become wards of the Canadian Government, and generous provision will be made for them. SEPARATION ALLOWANCE, Twenty Dollars per Month, in addition to the soldier's pay, will be paid to the wives of married volunteers, the widowed mothers of men going to the front, or other relatives who depend for their sole support upon the incomes of the men offering for services.

EVERY REASONABLE PROVISION is thus made for dependent relatives of volunteers and men contemplating offering for active service need have no anxiety regarding the welfare of those whom they may leave behind.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND

THIS FUND has been created for the purpose of maintaining in reasonable comfort the wives, children or other dependent relatives of men who volunteer for

EACH INDIVIDUAL CASE will be dealt with on its merits, the facts being secured by local committies who shall consider all sources of income of relatives left behind.

THE SCLDIER'S WIFE will, if any such aid is required, receive thirty doilars per month, of which twenty dollars will be from the government and ten dollars from the Patriotic Fund.

PROVISION FOR CHILDREN is made according to a sliding scale. For instance, a wife with three children of the ages of three, seven and twelve, will be entitled to an income of forty-five dollars per month in addition to the soldier's pay.

THE SON OF A WIDOW, who is his mother's principal support, may assign his pay to her, and may on making the proper representations, have the twenty dollars separation allowance and amounts from the Patriotic Fund also made payable to his mother.

OTHER DEPENDENT RELATIVES.—It is the intention of the Government and the Patriotic Fund to provide that those dependent upon the earnings of any volunteer shall not suffer through the loss of his income.




