



To all, rich and poor alike, comes the tragedy of bereavement. But to the poor the loss of the wage earner gives an added sting even to death itself. Nor is that all. Death not only bereaves the living and thrusts them downward in the struggle for existence by cutting off one who contributed to the family support; it mortgages the living, already struggling under too heavy burdens.
