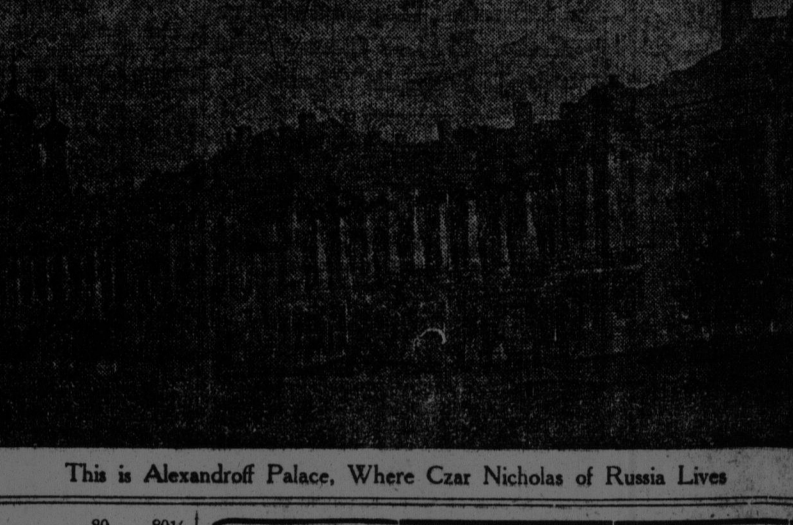

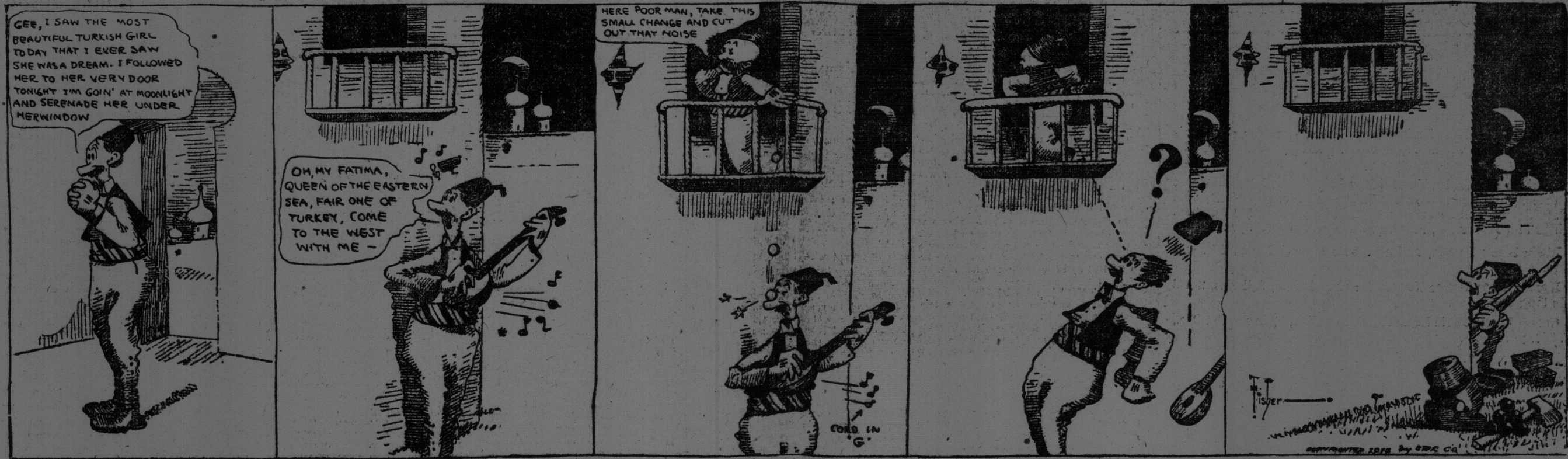

Will Jose Rivers and Tommy Come Together for the Title?

TWO of the hardest light weight battles seen on the Pacific coast in years, occurred on the same day—Washington's birthday—when Ad Wolgast, former light weight champion, fought a terrific 20-round draw with Harlem Tommy Murphy of New York before Jim Coffroth's club near San Francisco, while Jose Rivers, Spanish-American 133-pounder, put Knockout Brown, New York light weight, to sleep in ten rounds. Both were near championship battles, as the winners are expected to get together to determine which one will meet Willie Ritchie next July for the American title.

Wolgast put up a wonderful battle, considering that he had not a great deal of time to condition himself. For the first half of the battle Tommy Murphy gave the Michigan boxer, as many call him, a fierce beating, and had him in bad shape, but remarkable endurance came to his aid again in the thirteenth round and he fought with renewed courage and ambition, but was near collapse at the final bell; in fact, according to all reports both were ready to shout enough.

Murphy showed the better form and the more cleverness during the greater part of the battle and if he could have staved off Ad's constant body punches he would no doubt have gained the referee's decision. There seemed to be no doubt in the minds of the critics that Murphy earned the right to fight Ritchie for the title, even though he has not met and defeated Jose Rivers. Wolgast also proved that he is far from being "all in" as has been reported, but it was also evident that while he showed wonderful endurance, still he was not there with the punching powers that characterized some of his former battles.

And while Ad was fighting like a wild man to gain the verdict over his rival, Murphy, another rival was handing the New York boy, Knockout Brown, a beating, only in shorter time. Rivers was the master of Brown throughout the fight, letting him tear in and meeting him with vicious lefts or rights to the head as he came in. Brown is a fighter of the Charlie Neary order—always boring in—and being naturally left handed, he is rather hard to get at sometimes. However, Rivers solved his style early in the combat and sent home enough drives to the head and jaw to stop an ordinary light weight, but the husky New York German kept plunging in for more, and he certainly got it, until the tenth, when a series of hard smashes to the jaw put him down and practically out.

The chances are now that either Tom McCarrey or Jim Coffroth will match the two winners—Rivers and Murphy—for another big battle over the marathon route. Pal Brown, Joe Mandot and Steve Ketchel are all chasing after Willie Ritchie's crown and there will be a sort of elimination tourney among them.

The score piled up by the Quebec boys, Stanley Cup holders, represents about the difference in play between the two teams. When a team leaves the ice with only three goals scored out of seventeen played, it looks to the ordinary spectator as if it was an aggregation that had no license to be challenging for championship honors.

BASEBALL

Collins and the Red Sox. Says the Boston Globe—With the main bulk of the Red Sox leaving for the training camp, the principal matter of interest at headquarters was the fact that John Collins shows no signs of coming in from the "hold-out" brigade. President McAleer said that he had heard nothing from Collins since the latter's visit to Boston two weeks ago, when Ray tendered to sign the contract tendered him. "I offered Collins a contract I regarded as fair, all things considered, as any that was submitted to any other player on the team," said President McAleer, "but he did not intend to play this season. I certainly offered him all I thought he was worth to the club, but he wanted more."

Collins did not round into shape to pitch last season until the middle of July. Thereafter he did very well, winning fourteen games and losing eight for the season. While McAleer says he has no kick coming on a pitcher who wins 84 per cent of his games, he wants them to get started before the middle of the season. "If those other fellows had not rounded into form before the middle of July last year," said McAleer, "there would not have been any world's series played in Boston, no matter how well they did after they got started."

IN THE CHURCHES

Rev. Mr. Thomas Advocates Prohibition—Rev. Dr. Hutchinson Speaks on Lent. The immediate adoption of provincial prohibition was advocated by Rev. H. E. Thomas in his sermon in the Carleton Methodist church last evening. He urged that the province was ready for the measure, and that it would be easier of enforcement than all the laws which are now used to keep the traffic within certain bounds.

In Main street Baptist church last night Rev. Dr. Hutchinson spoke on Lent. He said the only people who observed it were the Roman Catholics and Anglicans, but he could not see that members of these denominations were any truer to Christ and His teachings than people of other bodies who did not observe it. He said there was no Bible command to keep Lent. He concluded his sermon, by saying that he thought the Baptists would do better a little more fasting and a proper spirit of self-denial.
