

HE is usually as well dressed as any woman she is with.

And yet everybody knows she has far less means than most of her com

And yet everybody knows she has far less means than most of her companions.

Her plan of action is to buy very nice, though simple things and then keep them looking well about twice as long as the average woman.

Everybody wonders how she accomplishes this. Here are some of the minutiae of the trick as explained to one wonderer.

"In the first place, I azver buy anything that is cheap or shoddy or extreme in any way. I am willing to pay well for good lines and good materials. If necessary, I conomice on trimmings. Consequently, my things will always be all right for three or four seasons if I keep them well.

"I always have on hand in summer a plain sailor hat, which I can wear in stormy or even damp or threatening weather. Such a hat will last me three or four seasons, and the saving to my nice hats is incalculable.

"In winter I have a felt sailor for the same purpose.

"I always have a good looking rain coat and wear it when there is any danger of a storm. Nothing makes a coat grow old faster than wetting it. A suit that is never worn or caught in a storm will look well just about twice as long as as one that has had several such experiences.

"I always keep two or three pairs of shoes going and keep those not in use on shoe-trees. You know one pair of shoes worn constantly will go to pieces much more quickly because they never get a chance to get rid of the animal heat which rots the leather.

"I also change my stockings at least three or four times a week. They wear







BAKED TOMATOES. Get tomatoes of uniform size. Cut off tops and scoop out a portion of the pulp. Butter a pudding dish and put the tomatoes in this. Fill tops of the tomatoes with bread crumbs, plenty of butter, a little sugar, and pepper and salt. Put pieces of butter, sugar, and bread crumbs in spaces between the tomatoes as they lie in the dish. Put in oven and bake a nice brown. When done, put baking dish with the tomatoes on top of stove, pour three-fourths of a cup of cream over them and let boil up once or twice. In this way they are simply delicious.

### CANADA MILLIONS RICHER

Estimated That Newcomers Average \$300 Each in Cash and Effects - Fully 85 Per Cent Were From British Isles-Mostly Through St. John

again in July and August. This year affigures for June were 20,000 and for April 32,000, the latter compared with only 10,000 in April, 1909. The advance for May was even greater, the total being 34,000, and for March 24,000. Most of these 110,000 immigrants, in fact fully eighty-five per cent, were natives of the British Isles, while Scandinavians, Poles, Germans and Galacians made up the remaining 15 per cent., and as most of these are settling along the lines of the C. P. R., they are doing their share towards building up a traffic producing country for that campany. One fact that has been very no ceable about the new citizens is that they all seem to be fairly well-to-do. They were dressed neatly and comfortably, and paid all their travelling bills with ready cash. In fact, one authority states that the new-comers would average in cash and personal property at least \$300 each, in which case they would have brought with them to this country about \$33,000,000 all told.

(By Palmer L. Clark.) The suspension of thoroughbred racing at the several metropolitan centres has been a severe blow to that interest; and, at the several metropolitan centres has been a severe blow to that interest; and, while the sundry and several state laws prohibiting all attendant features of betting may, on the face of things, seem to have relegated the "sport of kings" to the discard, a sane review of all the conditions, which so prevailed as to demand the curtailment of certain predatory interests, demands popular acclaim of the present prohibitive statutes which, though seemingly drastic, will in good time prove the salvation of legitimate racing. Thoroughbred racing will endure and with the management of the sport once again in the control of men, to whom the thoroughbred horse is the product of generations of intensified heredity rather than a machine of chance, the classic events of the running turf, around which are clustered the halo of tradition and sentiment, will be renewed, and the racing glories of Ascott, of Derby, of Longchamps and of Melbourne will be rivaled.

Though the thoroughbred interests have been buffeted by adverse legislation and their promoters and their devotees have been driven from pillar to post, the light harness horse—the trotter and the pacer—has pursued the even tenor of its course and has in no manner been affected by the ban imposed upon the betting ring. This condition of affairs is due primarily and solely to the fact that the managers of harness racing have ever considered the betting ring only as an incident to their racing programme and have not viewed it as a source of principal revenue; and wherever the law has demanded the cessation of the betting incident, the management has bowed gracefully to the decree and continued its programme as conducted in previous years, depending upon the ever increasing patronage at the gate.

On account of the glamour of the run-

On account of the glamour of the running track, the sulky brigade has never come into its own at the racing centres where the thoroughbred was so greatly in evidence, but with the elimination of the bookmaker, the trotter is gradually receiving merited recognition not only where the thoroughbred once reigned supreme, but in every city, town and hamlet from coast to coast and from the Canadian wilds to the gulf. 
