OF THE

# BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

# SAINT MARTINS, MONDAY, 6th July, 1840.

THE Baptist Association met at 10 o'clock, A. M. The intro ductory Sermon was preached by the Reverend R. E. BURPE, from 13th chapter of Joshua and 1st verse—" There remaineth yet very much land to be possessed."

A collection was then taken, which, with that taken on the Sabbath previous, amounted to  $\pounds 27$  12 0 in aid of Domestic Missions.

Elder JOSEPH CRANDALL was then appointed Moderator, Elder J. C. SKINNER, Clerk,

W. S. Estey, Assistant Clerk,

JOHN SMITH, Treasurer, and,

ZEBULON ESTEY. Assistant Treasurer.

R. E. Burpe, and C. D. Everitt, were appointed to read the Letters from the Churches.

Elders Crawley, Videto, and Pickles, and Brethren Stubbart, Dodge and Shaftner, were invited to take part in the proceedings.

The following Committees were then appointed:---

E. A. Crawley, S. Robinson, D. Harris, W. H. Beckwith, and J. T. Smith, a Committee to arrange the business of the Association.

Elders Thompson and Saunders, and J. Buntin, a Committee to examine the Letters.

Elders Blakeney, Chase, and J. Magee, and Brethren J. Estabrooks and Jarvis Ring, a Committee to examine all matters introduced, except the ordinary business of the Association; and that no such matters be noticed by the Association unless the same shall have been previously referred to said Committee.

R. E. Burpe and Chipman, a Committee to report upon the Christian Messenger.

E. A. Crawley, Beckwith, Blakeney and Stabbard, a Com-

mittee to report upon the State of Sabbath Schools, as connected with the Churches.

Elders Chase, J. Magee, and David Crandall, a Committee to examine the Circular Letter.

Elders Crawley, Robinson, and Pickles, a Committee to examine the Bible question, in relation to the support of the Parent Society being withheld from the Baptist Missionaries in Burmah.



"That the several Committees assemble at the old Chapel tomorrow, at 6 o'clock, A. M., to ttend to the business referred to them.

RESOLVED, That the report be accepted.

**RESOLVED**, That Elder Pickles be received as a Messenger from the Eastern Association in Upper Canada.

RESOLVED, That a Committee of three persons be appointed to open a Correspondence with the Baptist Denomination in the Provinces of the Canadas, and that Elders Robinson, Harris, and Masters be the Committee for that purpose.

Elder Saunders, from the Committee appointed last year to visit the Church at the Oromocto, reported that that duty had been performed, and that the Church expressed a wish to retain its connection with the Association, and further was very desirous of being visited by the Missionaries employed during the present year.

RESOLVED, That the report be accepted, and the request of that Church complied with.

RESOLVED, That the first day of January, 1841, be observed as a day of humiliation, fasting and prayer, and that the first Monday evening in every month be set apart as a season for special prayer to Almighty God, that His blessing may accompany the labours of Gospel Missionaries in heathen lands; and that the Churches are requested to take up a collection at those meetings in aid of the Foreign Missionary Funds.

RESOLVED, That it be recommended to the Ministers and Churches in the different sections of the Province, to make arrangements for holding Quarterly Meetings for preaching—the promotion of the Missionary cause, and for such other objects as may be connected with the Glory of God and the interest of the Denomination. That a collection be taken at all such Meetings in aid of the Domestic Missionary Funds.

**RESOLVED**, That the Association be held at Hillsborough next year, on the third Monday after the 20th June, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

RESOLVED, That Elder A. D. Thompson preach the introductory Sermon, and in case of failure, Elder W. H. Beckwith.

RESOLVED, That the Circular Letter be written by Elder J. C. Skinner.

RESOLVED, That Elder Joseph Crandall be our Messenger to the Nova Scotia Association, and in case of failure, Elder A. D. Thompson, and that the sum of £6 be allowed to defray his expenses.

Adjourned until 7 o'clock, when a Missionary Meeting was held and several interesting Addresses delivered by Elders Crawley, 'Thompson, Beckwith and others, after which the Missionary Accounts were presented, and the following Resolutions adopted:— RESOLVED, That the special blessings which have resulted from the labours of our Missionaries in various parts of the Province during the past year, call for devout acknowledgments to Almighty God; and that this Association, from a consideration that thousands of the inhabitants of the Province are still destitute of religious instruction, and perishing for lack of spiritual knowledge, would recommend to all the Churches connected with the Association the formation of a Missionary Society in each Church where such a Society does not at present exist, in order to enable the Missionary Boards to send the Gospel to the destitute in our land, and earnestly request the united prayers and efforts of the Ministers and Members of our Denomination in behalf of so gloricus an object.

RESOLVED, That the Accounts of the several Local Missionary Boards be made out in future and forwarded to the Treasurer of the General Board on the first day of June, in each year, accompanied by a brief report shewing the success attending the operations of the Board for the year, in order that a General Account and Report may be prepared previous to the Meeting of the Association.

RESOLVED, That any balance that may be in the hands of the Treasurers of the several Boards, when the accounts are made up, be paid over to the Treasurer of the General Board, at the succeeding Association, to be divided among the different Boards.

RESOLVED, That the Office Bearers of the General Board continue the same as last year.

RESOLVED, That the following Persons constitute the several Local Missionary Boards for the ensuing year :---

After the Sermon the Education Society held a public meeting, when the Report of the Committee was presented, the subject of Education discussed, and several highly interesting Addresses delivered by Elders Crawley, Robinson, Thompson and others, in behalf of the Seminary established at Fredericton. (For report and proceedings of the Society see Appendix.)

Association met at 3 o'clock.-Prayer by the Moderator.

RESOLVED, That the Report, Account and other proceedings of the Education Society be printed, as an Appendix to the Minutes.

RESOLVED, That this Association think it highly important to the advancement of the interests of the Seminary in Fredericton, that the debt at present due on it should be paid as soon as possible, and in order to the speedy accomplishment of this object, recommend that the Committee of Management, under the direction of the Board of the Education Society, do employ an efficient Agent to travel throughout the Province to solicit aid for this purpose.

RESOLVED, That the Ministers and Members of the Churches in connexion with this Association, are particularly requested to assist the Agent in his efforts to accomplish this object, in the different parts of the Province where they severally reside.

The Committee appointed to examine all matters introduced out of the ordinary business of the Association, reported that a Letter from the Members of the Church and Congregation at Saint Martins had been laid before them, requesting the Association to adopt such measures as would enable them to secure a suitable Minister, to take the pastoral charge of the Church in that place, and recommending the Association to take the subject into consideration.

RESOLVED, That the report be accepted, and the request now attended to.

RESOLVED, That this Association recommend that the three Ministers at present residing in Saint Martins, do withdraw (entirely) from the Church in that place, and that the Church select some other Minister as their Pastor; and the Association further recommend those Ministers to consider whether their duty to God does not require them to remove their residence from Saint Martins at their earliest convenience. The Association further advise the Church to cultivate towards each other such feelings of kindness and forbearance as may tend to establish among them that charity which is the bond of perfectness.

RESOLVED, That Elders Beckwith, Coy, Chace, Saunders and Pickle be a Committee to meet the Church and Congregation at Saint Martins to-morrow evening at 6 o'clock, to communicate to them the foregoing Resolution, and to assist in making the necessary arrangements to carry the same into effect.

RESOLVED, That Elders Masters, and Beckwith be a Committee to visit the Church at Sussex Vale, to ascertain the reason that Church has not, for some years past, corresponded with the Association, and report thereon at the next meeting of the Association.

Whereas Elder Walker, from Nova Scotia, has expressed a wish to become a Member of this Association, and whereas some differences have arisen between the Church at Hopewell and Mr. Walker, touching doctrinal views;

RESOLVED, That Brethren Crawley, Harris, Ring and Bunting be a Committee to confer with Mr. Walker upon this subject, and report to the Association to-morrow.

RESOLVED, That this Association recommend the Churches not to licence or ordain any person as a Minister, without the advice of a Council of three ordained Ministers, being Pastors of Churches united with the Association.

The Committee appointed to report upon the publication of the CHRISTIAN MESSENGER, presented the following Report :---

That the Messenger be recommended by the Association to the Denomination and Public, as a paper well calculated to disseminate the principles of the glorious truths of the Gospel; that it be sustained as a publication in every respect worthy of our warmest support, and that immediate exertions in its behalf be made by its friends in this Province, as well by a prompt payment of amounts due, as by strenuous endeavours to increase its circulation.

The Editors of the Christian Messenger having engaged Elder R. E. Burpe as an Agent in this Province, on behalf of the paper, in connexion with which he will statedly on the Sabbath perform Missionary labour in the several places he may visit.

RESOLVED, That the Missionary Boards divide with the Editors of the paper the expenses of such Agency, half of which amount to be paid out of the Missionary Funds, at the rate of 30s. per week, and that the Agent be requested to take collections for Missionary purposes.

The Committee appointed to consider the Bible question relative to the support of the Parent Society being withdrawn from the Baptist Missionaries in Burmah reported, that they consider further information necessary in order to form a definite conclusion on this important question, and recommend that a Committee be appointed to correspond in the necessary quarters for the purpose of obtaining such information.

The Committee appointed to investigate the subject of Foreign Missions, reported, that Elder R. E. Burpe had been chosen by the Committee appointed the last year by the Associations of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, as a suitable person for a Foreign Missionary; that he is now receiving an education at Queen's College, Nova Scotia, preparatory to the work, and recommend that one half the expenses attending his preparation be paid out of the Foreign Missionary Funds of this Province, the other half to be provided by the Association of Nova Scotia.

RESOLVED, That the report be accepted, and that Elders Crawley and Robinson be a Committee to make an estimate of the sum necessary for that purpose.

RESOLVED, That Elders Miles, Robinson, and Masters, the Henorable W. B. Kinnear, C. D. Everitt, and Z. Estey, be a Foreign Missionary Board for this Province, that Z. Estey be Secretary and Treasurer, and that all money raised for Foreign Missionary purposes be forwarded to the Treasurer.

Whereas the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Magazine was formerly undertaken by the Missionary Societies of both Provinces for their mutual benefit, which Societies are accountable for any debt which may have accrued in conducting the said periodical; and whereas the said Magazine was of great service in aiding the Missionary cause, by the diffusion of religious knowledge and intelligence; and whereas sums of money received for the Magazine were paid into the Missionary Funds of both Provinces during the publication of that periodical, and as a debt now remains due of about £86 in consequence of arrears unpaid, and the Nova Scotia Missionary Society have assumed that debt, and now look to the Society of this Province to unite with them in discharging the same:

RESOLVED, That the Treasurer of the New Brunswick Missionary Board be directed to pay to the Treasurer of the Nova Scotia Society an equal portion of the debt with the Society of Nova Scotia.

A Sermon was preached at 7 o'clock in the evening by Elder Thompson, from Luke v. 12 & 13.

WEDNESDAY, July 8, 9 o'clock, A. M.

Met pursuant to adjournment, when a Sermon was preached by Mr. Chipman, one of the Professors of Queen's College, N. S., after which the business of the Association was resumed. RESOLVED, That Elders David Harris and David Crandall be a Committee to meet the Church and Elder Walker at Hopewell, and enquire into the cause of the charges made by that Church against Mr. Walker, and report thereon at the next Association.

The Committee appointed to investigate the subject of Sabbath Schools, presented the following report:—

The Committee recommend to the Association the adoption of the suggestion of the Nova Scotia Association, for the formation of a Sabbath School Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick on the fundamental principles following, viz: That there be such union of both Provinces with two branches of the same, one for each Province, with their respective Officers, periods of meeting, and depository. That the same amounts shall constitute membership in both, and that the Members of one Branch shall be Members of the other, and entitled to vote at the annual Meetings; and it is recommended as important, that when competent persons can be found, a general Sabbath School Agent shall be employed by each Society to travel in the Provinces, obtain funds and impart general information, and to assist in the formation of Sabbath Schools; and that in accordance with these principles, the Association recommend the following constitution for the said union:

"1st. That a Society be formed for promoting Sabbath School instruction, to be called the Sabbath School Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, to comprise a Branch Union for each Province.

"2nd. That any person subscribing 5s. annually shall be a member of the said union and of each of its branches, and that a donation of 50s. shall constitute the donor a life member, and a donation of  $\pounds 5$  shall constitute the donor a life Director of the said union and branches, and that the funds particularly contributed to each branch shall be subject to the control of the officers of such branch.

"3rd That the Meeting of the New Brunswick Branch shall take place annually, at the same place where the Association shall meet in each year on the Wednesday of the same week, when a Sermon on behalf of the said Branch shall be annually preached.

"4th. That the officers of the New Brunswick Branch shall consist of a President, two Vice Presidents, Board of Directors and Committee, together with a Secretary, who may also be Treasurer and Depositor, to be appointed from year to year at the annual meeting of the Branch, except such life Directors as may become such in manner aforesaid.

"5th. That the Depository shall be kept at Saint John, in a suitable place, to be obtained by the Committee.

6th. That the Committee shall not consist of less than five nor more than nine person, besides the Presidents, Vice President and Secretary, who shall be members of the Committee, *ex officio*, and it shall and plie whi sary

Thus you may see dear Brethren, that in order to proceed successfully you must move correctly according to the original plan plainly written in the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make us wise unto Salvation through faith in Christ Jesus, revealed by the Holy Spirit.

We may indeed be very successful in propagating a spurious Christianity, as has been the case with others in times that are past, and we fear is too much the case at the present day,-but with such services God is not well pleased; the heart is required, yea the whole heart, not a carnal but a new heart, in which the Holy Spirit has written the Law of God. For the finished work of Christ being a complete satisfaction to all the demands of the Holy Law, the Holy Spirit marvellously forms the new man, so that if any man be in Christ he is a new creature-thus a foundation is laid which cannot fail of success. How cheering is that promise, "Lo I am with you always even unto the end of the world, yea until all that the Father has given are gathered into the fold." The Holy Spirit will not fail to fulfil all the promises our Lord has made to His beloved Church in accomplishing all that mighty work of regenerating and sanctifying lost and perishing sinners, purifying their hearts by faith in Christ.

Under the influence of such spiritual grace we shall be able to contend earnestly for the faith once delivered to the Saints. If the Baptist Churches are to be the honored means of advancing Christ's spiritual kingdom, then the members must not be carnally but spiritually minded, and come out from the world as the Lord has commanded, "Come out from among them my people, having no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness,—the secret of the Lord is only with them that fear him."

When our Lord came into the world to accomplish the great work of our redemption, a small number only were prepared to receive him; and now when the time must be near at hand for his second coming, can we not easily perceive that the slumbering world is saying, where is the promise of his coming. A faithful minister of Christ cannot introduce a subject more offensive to his audience generally than to treat on the second coming of Christ; true most people are in expectation of an increase of members to their Society, or Churches as they are called, and are making pompous aggrandizements preparing for a protracted millenium,and so were the descendants of Abraham in great expectation of a Messiah who would extend the Kingdom of Israel over the whole earth,-but how great was their disappointment in Jesus of Nazareth. Be assured dear Brethren that a greater disappointment shall take place when our Lord shall come, for he is not slack concerning his promise.-Behold the Judge standeth at the door; there are many visible signs all foretold in the Holy Scriptures all as with a warning voice saying to a Gentile world, "prepare to

We answer, learn your duty from the commands of our Lord and the doctrine and example of the Apostles, and give up the tradition of uninspired men, and as you advance in the Christian duty you will find it all pleasant and practicable; your spiritual strength will be renewed, you will find that through Christ you can do all things; you will obtain repeated victories over the old man of sin that dwells in you, and all your duty will become pleasant; you will hold frequent communion with your dear Lord in secret, and your family altar will not be neglected ; you will delight to walk in all the ordinances of the Lord blameless, and take a deep interest in the peace and prosperity of the Church of God; you will contribute freely of your worldly goods, distributing to the necessity of Saints; you will pity and weep over a lost and perishing world of sinners, and use all reasonable means to lead them to Christ; your anxious souls will be waiting at wisdom's door, watching and desiring the coming of your Lord, saying, Come Lord Jesus come quickly.

### APPENDIX.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE BAPTIST EDUCATION SOCIETY.

AT the sixth Annual Meeting of the New Brunswick Baptist Education Society, held at Saint Martins, County of Saint John, on the 7th July, 1840, the following Report was presented by the Committee, and Resolutions adopted by the Society:--

The Committee of Management beg to avail themselves of this, the sixth anniversary Meeting of the Society, to bring before it some of the principal circumstances which have transpired in relation to the interests of the Society during the past year; in doing which, while they can congratulate the Society on the improved aspect of its financial affairs, they are obliged to notice some circumstances in intimate connection with the prosperity of the Institution at Fredericton of a tendency to awaken much apprehension and anxiety as to their ultimate effect.

During the first Term after the last anniversary meeting of the Society, the male department of the School was continued to be conducted by the Reverend Mr. Tupper, and the female department by Mrs. Hartt (formerly Miss Brown), who had taught that School for some years before ; but the return of the Reverend Mr. Miles from England in October last enabled him to resume the charge as principal, in which he continued about six months, when he was compelled by ill health to retire from his labors; the male School has consequently declined to some extent, but by the exertions of Mr. Hartt, the assistant Teacher, the School has been kept up and its usefulness less materially affected than could have been expected.

The Committee, being deeply sensible of the importance of having the Institution supplied with efficient and properly qualified Teachers, have spared no pains since its first commencement to procure persons of that description, and view the continued illness of the Rev. Mr. Miles with much uneasiness, and now most earnestly implore Almighty God that his invaluable life may be spared, and his usefulness long continued to the Institution; and desire to recommend to the Society and Churches generally, that their prayers may not be wanting for so desirable an object.

The female School has been conducted for the last three Terms by Miss Bennett, a lady employed by Mr. Miles when in England, and is in a very prosperous state. The capabilities of Miss Bennett

as a Teacher appear to be generally acknowledged and appreciated. The number of pupils in both departments have been fully equal to that of any preceding year,-the Register for the last Term of the past year shewing the number of 69 in actual attendance. No pains or exertions have been spared by the Teachers to make themselves useful to their pupils, but in consequence of the illness of Mr. Miles the public examination was dispensed with at the close of the last Term, which the Committee much regret, as the interest attending such exhibitions and the stimulus afforded to the pupils by the approbation of parents and friends who may visit them have much good effect.

With respect to the Rev. Mr. Miles' agency in England the Committee remark, that although the pecuniary affairs of the Society may not have been relieved to the extent expected by some, they fully believe that his visit will prove highly beneficial to the Institution, inasmuch as the feelings of persons in England deeply interested in the grand cause of education have been enlisted in behalf of the Education Society in this Province, and such arrangements made as will enable the Society to obtain Books and Teachers when required for the Institution. The expenses of Mr. Miles' agency amounted to £250 13 4; the amount collected by him, exclusive of a special donation for a Library, amounted to £415 11s. leaving a nett balance at the disposal of your Committe of £164 17 8.

A grant of £500 was made by the Legislature at its last Session without a dissentient voice in either Branch, by which the financial state of the Society has been greatly improved, and individuals who had made large advances to the Institution much relieved. The harmonious and unanimous manner in which the appropriation was made by the several Branches of the Legislature was even more pleasing to the Committee than the amount of assistance received; and it must be peculiarly gratifying to the friends of the Institution to find, that notwithstanding much difference of opinion prevailed among the several Members of the Legislature during previous discussions of this subject, that by a steady effort on the part of the Society to sustain the Institution, and a strict adherence to the professed principles upon which it was established, all seem now convinced that the New Brunswick Baptist Education Society has aimed at nothing more than to assist in the diffusion of sound and useful instruction through the Province, and that the operations of their plan has proved highly and generally beneficial.

The Committee now annex a full statement of the Accounts of the Society, made up to the 1st instant, shewing a balance due of £772 17 10, out of which a balance of about £60 due on Tuition to be deducted, leaving the real amount of debt £712 17 10, this is sum somewhat exceeds the amount contemplated by the Committee

The request of last year that the several Churches in the Province would raise a small sum in aid of the Institution, has not been responded to except by the Churches at Northesk and Blissfield, in Miramichi, and those named in the last year's report.

The sum of £90 only has been collected in the Province during the past year, and principally by the Rev. Mr. Beckwith.

The Society will perceive by these statements that no general effort has been made since your last annual Meeting to liquidate the debt now due on the Institution, and that the Committee have been subjected to the payment of a large sum of interest for another year, which with the cost of insurance, deficiency in Teachers Salaries, and other contingent expenses has unavoidably increased the amount of debt.

The Committee in adhering to the opinion expressed in their former reports, that the general objects of the Society could not be fully accomplished and the debt liquidated without the assistance of an efficient agent to travel through the Province urging the claims of the Institution and soliciting aid in its behalf, induced in October last the Rev. Mr. Beckwith to commence such an undertaking, but after spending a short time in that capacity he was compelled by the pressure of other duties to abandon it for a time, and has not been since able to resume it. From Mr. Beckwith's efficiency as an agent, and the encouragement received by him during the short period in which he acted in that capacity, the Committee feel confident that could he have prosecuted the agency as was contemplated, the principal part of the debt might have been before this time collected; indeed they are of opinion that could the services of a suitable agent have been obtained some years ago for a period of twelve months, the whole of the balance due might have been collected, and the payment of large sums as interest avoided.

There are two objects in relation to the Institution upon the

accomplishment of which its future prospects very much depend, and these the Committee beg most particularly to urge upon the Board of Directors and the members of the Society. The first is to raise a sum sufficient for the payment of the balance due by the Society,-the other is to increase the number of pupils at the Seminary, and thereby ensure to the public the advantages contemplated and enable the Committee to meet the Salaries of a sufficient number of competent Teachers. Let those two objects have the attention their importance demand and the Institution must become a blessing to the Province, but so long as they are neglected the Institution will be embarrassed in all its operations and its usefulness greatly diminished. While a debt is allowed to hang upon it imaginary difficulties are added to those that are real, the Society is discouraged and its energies weakened; but let that debt be once fully paid off and the whole energies of the Society directed to the immediate operations of the Institution and it cannot but succeed. Although the Committee believe that these objects cannot be fully accomplished without the aid of a regular agent, still they suggest that much may be done by the Office Bearers, Board of Directors, and individual members of the Education Society in the several parts of the Province where they reside.

By the Constitution of the Society all the regularly ordained Ministers in connexion with the Baptist denomination are Members of the Society and of the Board of Directors, beyond this there are no tests of Membership save the payment of twenty shillings annually, or a donation of ten pounds at once,-any persons complying with either of these prerequisites becomes a Member of the New Brunswick Baptist Education Society, no matter what his religious creed may be, and is entitled to a voice in all the business of the Society. The Seminary was however established principally under the direction and patronage of the Baptist denomination, although some assistance has been received from other sects of the Christian Church,-and notwithstanding its management has been entrusted to the care of a Committee, still efforts beyond those exerted by seven persons, members of that Committee, are required to sustain it. The Institution has claims upon the public generally for support, inasmuch as its advantages are open alike to all; but it has special claims upon the Baptist as a denomination, they being more immediately identified with its establishment, and these claims should be felt and responded to by them as a body.

Since the Seminary has been in operation about twenty young persons have been qualified within its walls as School Teachers and are now engaged in the useful employment of instructing the youth in the different parts of the Province, many more have been qaalified for other useful avocations.

effort it may be kept in operation, its interests duly attended to, and the objects for which it was established fully secured.

The liberal grant from the Legislature this year should not cause the friends of the Institution to relax in their exertions, but should rather excite such additional efforts as shall render it increasingly useful, that an abundant return may be made for the public funds received.

The Committee cannot close their report without again urging the claims of the Institution upon the attention of the Society, feeling confident that the Legislature will continue to grant such assistance from time to time as the exertions of the Society and the usefuluess of the Institution may recommend.

RESOLVED, That it is important to the interests of the Seminary that the balance of debt now due thereon be paid off, and that the grant recently made by the Legislature should be regarded as an additional incentive to vigorous effort for the accomplishment of this object, in order that the usefulness of the Institution may not be lessened by means of pecuniary embarrassment.

RESOLVED, That this Society are desirous of awakening a general interest in every part of a progressive system of education; that they have the highest concern for the increase and improvement of common Schools, as of essential importance to the mass of the community, and are no less assured that many should aim at Academical and Collegiate instruction; they are therefore anxious to press the fact, that each of these species of literary institutions exert a direct influence on every other;—the common Schools training for the Academies, and the Academies for Colleges, and the Colleges and Academies again furnishing suitable Teachers for the common Schools and preparing persons for professional and other avocations, and tending to arouse and regulate a proper feeling toward education in its important connection with religious and general interests.

RESOLVED, That this Society regard the exertions of the friends of education in Nova Scotia with deep interest, as tending in a high degree to religious and general improvement; and hail with joy the success which has attended the operations of the College and Academy established at Horton.

RESOLVED, That while this Society consider the Seminary at Fredericton as meriting the warmest support of the friends of education generally in this Province, they would recommend the College at Horton as a highly useful Institution of learning, and would encourage such pious young men as desire to engage in the Christian Ministry and have adequate means, when they shall have completed the usual course of study at the Seminary in Fredericton, to endeavor, with a just regard to the Divine will, to seek the farther advantages of learning which are provided by that College.

RESOLVED, That this Society deeply lament the death of Mr. George Miles, one of the Members of the Committee of Management, by whose counsel, zeal and assiduity as a member of the Committee, and liberal donations, the interests of the Institution have been greatly promoted. The Society also regret the illness of the Reverend Mr. Miles, by which the Institution is deprived, for the present, of the labours of its principal, and the Committee of the assistance of an active and useful member; they however feel to acquiesce, with becoming submission, in the dispensations of God, and to trust in Him for direction.

RESOLVED, That Mr. S. W. Babbit be the assistant Secretary of the Society, in the place of Mr. E. Packard, resigned, and Elder S. Robinson a member of the Committee in the place of the late Mr. George Miles, deceased; the remainder of the Office bearers and Members of the Board of Directors and Committee of Management to remain the same as last year.
