



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Elders' Districts.

The Congregation is divided into fourteen districts. Each district is assigned to one or more Elders. The Elders visit the families in their respective districts, note changes of residence, and acquaint the Minister and Session of cases requiring special attention, such as sickness, &c. For residence of Elders see preceding page.

DISTRICT No. I .- Mr. JAMES TASKER.

From Bleury street and Park avenue (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Mile End.

DISTRICT No. II.-Mr. C. D. PROCTOR.

From St. Lawrence street (not inclusive) East to Long Point and Longueuil and from the River north to city limits (including Petite Cote).

DISTRICT No. III.-Mr. ROBT. WEIR and Mr. ALEX. McFee.

From Bleury street (not inclusive) to St. Lawrence street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River and St. Lambert.

DISTRICT No. IV .-- Mr. T. A. GIBSON and Mr. JOHN TAYLOR.

From Union avenue (not inclusive) to Bleury street and Park avenue (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. V.-Mr. COLIN MCARTHUR.

From Beaver Hall (not inclusive) to Bleury street (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by St. Peter street.

DISTRICT No. VI.-Mr. JOHN L. MORRIS and Mr. P. S. Ross.

From McGill College avenue to Union avenue (including both) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. VII.-Mr. G. M. KINGHORN.

From University and Hanover streets (inclusive) to Beaver Hall square (inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by McGill street.

DISTRICT No. VIII.-Mr. ALEX. MACPHERSON.

From McGill College avenue to Mountain street (not including either) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. IX.-Mr. JAMES A. CANTLIE.

From Metcalfe street (not inclusive) to University and Hanover streets (not inclusive), and from St. Catherine street to the River by Duke street (including both).

DISTRICT No. X .- Mr. JAMES CROIL and Mr. ALEX. MITCHELL.

From Mcuntain street (inclusive) to St. Mark street (not inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the Mountain.

DISTRICT No. XI.-Mr. WILLIAM REID.

From Mountain street (not inclusive) to end of Dorchester avenue, and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to Dorchester street (inclusive).

DISTRICT No. XII.—REV. DR. J. CLARKE MURRAY.

From St. Mark street (inclusive) to Cote St. Antoine, and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to Cote des Neiges.

DISTRICT No. XIII.-Mr. WILLIAM WALKER.

From Mountain street (inclusive) to Metcalfe and Cathedral streets (inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (inclusive) to the River by Ann street.

DISTRICT No. XIV.-Mr. JOHN LARMONTH.

From Mountain and McCord streets (not inclusive) to farthest West, and from Dorchester street (not inclusive) to the river and Lower Lachine road.

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PUBLIC WORSHIP on the Lord's Day, at II A. M. and 7 P. M.

WEEKLY SERVICE, Wednssday Evening at a quarter past Eight o'clock.

- THE SABBATH-SCHOOL meets every Sabbath at Three P. M.—except in the months of July and August, when the School is closed.
- THE MINISTER'S BIBLE CLASS for Young Men, meets every Sunday afternoon at Three o'clock.
- THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is usually administered on the last Sundays of January, May and October.
- ORDINARY MEETINGS of the Kirk-Session are held on the first Sabbath of each month, immediately after the Morning Service.
- THE MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT SCHEMES of the Church are under the management of a Committee, consisting of the Minister, three members of the Kirk-Session, three members of the Board of Trustees, and four members of the Congregation, appointed at the annual meeting.

- The fund for the support of a missionary in India, undertaken by the Congregation four years ago, is now under the management of Mr. ALEX. F. RIDDELL, to whom contributions for this purpose should be sent: Address No. 22 St. John street.
- THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation for the transaction of business is held in the School-room of the Church, on the second Monday of January in each year.
- THE DORCAS SOCIETY and LADIES' AID ASSOCIATION meet at half past Two o'clock on Tuesday afternoons during the winter months.
- APPLICATIONS FOR SITTINGS may be made to Mr. ALEXANDER EWAN, the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, or to the Sexton, 77 Monique St., near the Church.
- MEMBERS changing their residence are requested to notify the Minister or the Elder of the District in which they reside.
- Cases of Sickness should be made known to the Elder of the District and reported by him to the Minister with as little delay as possible.
- THE MINISTER is at home on the first Thursday evening of each month, and can be seen usually any morning between the hours of nine and ten.

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The following are the Schemes for which the General Assembly appoints collections to be made annually in all the Congregations and Mission Stations of the Church:—

I. Home Missions.—The Presbyterian Church in Canada has a vast Home Mission field, extending from Newfoundland to Vancouver Island. The number of mission fields in the 32 Western Presbyteries is 276, and of preaching stations 820; in the Eastern Section, 45 mission stations and 170 preaching places, making in all 321 distinct fields and 990 places where stated services were conducted for longer or shorter periods during the past year. The number of missionaries employed, in both sections, was 329, of whom 121 were ordained ministers and licentiates, and 208 were students and catechists. The average Sabbath attendance at these stations was 43,065, the number of families connected with them, 11,701, and of communicants, 13,997. The total expenditure was \$66,475; the amount contributed by the people in the mission stations was \$65,739. The amounts asked from the congregations of the Church for the current year are, for the West, \$55,000; for the East, \$12,000; in all \$67,000—none too much to meet the pressing claims on the Committees, owing to the rapid extension of the work in the North-West and in British Columbia, where many settlements are as yet unprovided with religious services.

II. Augmentation of Stipends.—This fund was instituted by the General Assembly with a view of supplementing the stipends of ministers in the small and weak congregations so as to secure them an income of at least \$750 per annum with a manse. It claims the sympathy and generous support of the congregation on the well understood principle that the Church is one; and that the strong ought to help the weak. Many of the now large and wealthy congregations have had a stage in their own history when they required and obtained aid to support ordinances, and they cannot now reasonably refuse aid to those who need assistance. During the past seven years the fund has done a great deal of good. For one thing, it has encouraged struggling congregations to put forth stronger efforts in their own behalf. Since 1883, no fewer than 216 aid-receiving congregations have became self-supporting. The process of transferring mission stations to the list of augmented congregations, and these to become independent of aid, is constantly going on and adding to the numerical and material strength of the Church. The amounts required for this purpose for the current year are, for the West, \$30,000, and for the East, \$9,000.

III. French Evangelization.—The statements contained in the last annual report of the Board of the General Assembly are encouraging. The work is being diligently prosecuted in its various departments, and not without visible tokens of success. "Already,"

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the report says, "there are wide-spread and marked symptoms among Roman Catholics themselves of the bitter discontent with which they endure the heavy exactions of their Church; and there is a loud call ssembly to the lovers of truth and freedom to increase an hundred-fold their ons and prayers, their liberality, and their activity to hasten the national emancipation of the whole French-speaking people." The Board continues its three-fold agency of colportage, schools, and preaching Canada the Gospel. > IV. The Colleges.-While each of the six Theological Colleges is looking to a permanent endowment fund as best suited for their support and usefulness, none of them has yet reached the point when they would be independent of assistance from the congregations to meet their necessary annual expenditure. The whole amount asked this year is \$35,200, as follows:-For Knox, Queen's and Montreal Colleges, \$15,200; for Manitoba College, \$10,000, and for Halifax and Morrin College, Quebec, \$10,000. The congregations are at liberty to appropriate their benefactions to the several Colleges

V. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund.—This most deserving fund has a strong claim on the practical sympathies of the whole Church. An appeal to relieve the widow and the fatherless strikes a chord that naturally and forcibly commends itself, instinctively to every reflecting mind. Christianity demands it : and yet the contributions of many congregations to this fund are utterly inadequate to attain the end in view. There are upwards of 130 annuitants whose comfort is in a large measure dependent on the annual contributions of the congregations. The annuities are very small, ranging only from \$100. to \$200. per annum. To meet these claims requires, at the least, \$8,500 from congregational sources this

VI. The Assembly Fund.—This is one of the funds in support of which it may be difficult to make an eloquent or pathetic appeal, it is, however, of vital importance that it be adequately sup-The annual amount required to defray the expenses connected with the meeting of the General Assembly, the printing and issuing of the minutes, the salaries of the clerks, and other unavoidable outlays, is about \$5,000—constituting a very small tax on the liberality of 1000 congregations.

VII. Manitoba College.—The exceptional circumstances of this College, and the important work it is doing for the Church in the North-West and British Columbia, have caused the General Assembly to authorize a special contribution from the whole Church

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in its behalf. While the College authorities have succeeded in extinguishing the debt on the buildings, the increasing attendance of students, and the urgent demand for still more, to overtake the rapidly extending work, has made it necessary to incur additional expense in the way of supplementing the teaching staff. The great benefit of Manitoba College to the western part of the Church, and to the Dominion, has never been more apparent than now. The amount asked this year is \$10,000.

VIII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund.—The sum of \$18,000 is required to enable the Committee to continue the utterly inadequate payments-not exceeding in any case \$200 per annum-to the ministers of our Church who through old age or infirmity have been compelled to retire from the active duties of their calling. The number of beneficiaries at present on the roll is 86. A special effort is being made to secure a permanent endowment fund of at least \$200,000, so as to relieve the pressure on the annual congregational fund, and if possible to increase the annuities to at least \$300 or \$400. A considerable amount has already been contributed for this purpose, and the Committee have been greatly encouraged by the promise of a gift of \$20,000 from Sir Donald A. Smith, provided that the contemplated \$200,000 shall have been secured within a stated time. A few generous contributions from the wealthier members of the Church would be most acceptable at the present stage of the canvas.

IX. Foreign Missions.—Although the last to be mentioned, not the least in importance, is the appeal made to the constituency of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for \$118,000 to enable the Foreign Mission Committee to carry on and extend the beneficent work of sending forth missionaries to preach the Gospel of the grace of God in benighted heathen lands. Year by year, affords more convincing testimony that the harvest is plenteous and the labourers few. Year after year, the call from missionaries already in the field waxes louder and louder, "Come over and help us" The time seems opportune, as never before, for a combined advance by the forces of Christianity upon the strongholds of error and superstition The gratifying success which has attended the missions of our own Church in the new Hebrides, Trinidad, China, Central India, and among the Aborigines in our own country may well encourage us to abound in this grace also, and to esteem it a privilege no less than a duty to be found fellow-workers with God in His grand design for the evangelization of the world.

The above are the Schemes of the General Assembly, to which all the congregations of the Church are expected to contribute annually. The mode of contributing for them in this congregation is by means of a schedule sent to all the members and adherents at the beginning of the year, in which they are requested to enter the amounts they desire to contribute for the different purposes named, and to transmit it to the Treasurer. Those who prefer to contribute annonymously are at liberty to do so. As this is the *only* way in which the contributions of St.

REV. GEORGE LESLIE MACKAY, D.D.

MISSIONARY AT TAMSUI, FORMOSA.

Born in the Township of Zorra, Oxford Co., Ont., 21st March, 1844. His parents came from Sutherlandshire, Scotland. He studied for the ministry at Knox College, Toronto, and Princeton Theological Seminary, N. J., U. S., completing his curriculum in 1870: spent the following winter in Edinburgh, attending lectures in the Free Church College, and meeting such leading spirits as Drs. Guthrie, Candlish, and Duff. Ordained by the Presbytery of Toronto, Sept. 19th, 1871, and designated as a missionary to the heathen—the choice of a field being left to himself: same year, sailed for China on Nov. 1st. After spending some time with the missionaries of the Presbyterian Church of England in Southern Formosa, fixed upon Tamsui, Northern Formosa, as the headquarters of his future sphere of labour: in April, 1872, began to preach the Gospel in the Chinese language: in February, 1873, baptized his first converts-five in number: in 1875, had trained nine native helpers and placed them in charge of as many chapels: in 1878, married a Chinese lady: in 1881-82, with Mrs. Mackay, visited Canada and addressed many of the congregations: in 1886, two of his early converts were ordained to the office of the ministry, viz: Giam Chheng Hôa and Tan Hè: in 1889, reported to the General Assembly that up to that date he had erected 50 chapels—six of these being substantial stone structures—had educated 51 preachers, had 24 others in training, that he had 2833 baptized members on the roll of adherents; had two well equipped Hospitals, a commodious College for the education of helpers and teachers, and a Girls' School-all provided with suitable and substantial buildings; received the degree of D.D. from Queen's University, Kingston, in 1880: has had for his assistants the following Canadian ministers: Rev. J. B. Fraser, M.D., appointed 1874, now of Leith and Annan, Ont.; Rev. Kenneth F. Junor, 1878, now of New York, and Rev. John Jamieson, 1883, now with him in Formosa.

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Pastoral Letter.

TO THE MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF ST. PAUL'S CHURCH:

My DEAR FRIENDS,

The past year, like its predecessor, has been one of quiet work, marked by no special feature, and my letter of this year must be mainly a repetition of last year's. All departments of the congregation's work continue to indicate growing life and activity, and I take this opportunity of warmly thanking all who have in different ways by their active co-operation assisted me in my ministry, thus cheering my heart and strengthening my hands. There is much to be thankful for, but there are still some things to regret and amend. On the part of some there is an irregularity of attendance at the Sunday services, and an abstention altogether from the Wednesday service, which for their own sakes and for the sake of the congregation I hope to see rectified. On the part of some, irregularity of communion is to be deeply regretted, whils there are others who have not yet seen it to be their duty and their privilege to "do this in remembrance of Christ." The continued refusal of so many to bear any share in our contribution to the Missionary work of the Church is a source of disheartening disappointment. Surely there is no one in the congregation, who earnestly and prayerfully facing the the question, can say "Christ does not need, does not ask my help." Remember this, that refusing to give when and what you are able to give, means a personal refusal to Christ himself of a personal request.

That this year may be marked by increased earnestness and activity of work, and increased generosity and self-denial in giving, by a more regular attendance upon ordinances, and, above all, by a higher and holier life amongst us, individually, is the prayer of Your affectionate Pastor,

part of this report that the Trustees have decided to make a thorough canvas of the congregation with a view of getting all, as far as possible, to join in the envelope system of giving their Sunday collections. It is earnestly hoped that all in the congregation will give this matter their cordial support, so that the Treasurer will be able, next year, to report a surplus instead of a deficit.

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THE SCHEMES OF THE CHURCH.—It is a matter of regret that notwithstanding the earnest appeals made from time to time from the pulpit on behalf of the schedules, there is still a large number in the congregation who have not joined in this mode of contributing to the Schemes of the Church. This being the only way in which the members of St. Paul's are asked to contribute to the missionary and benevolent funds of the Church, it is earnestly hoped that next year the Treasurer will be able to report a very much larger number of contributors.

VICTORIA MISSION.—A joint meeting of the representatives from St. Paul's, St. Matthew's and the Victoria Mission, was held on the first of November last, to consider the wants of the Mission. After conference, it was unanimously agreed, that St. Matthew's Session should work this district as a Mission and make arrangements for holding morning and evening services on the Sabbath, and for conducting the Sunday School in the afternoon. (See Victoria Mission Report.)

It was gratifying to the many friends of Dr. and Mrs. Jenkins to have the pleasure of meeting them here during the past summer. The Doctor preached in St. Paul's with much vigour and with great acceptance to a large congregation. Before their departure for England a very pleasant social meeting of the congregation was held and was attended not only by a large number of the congregation but many other old friends in the city.

Appended to this report will be found an alphabetical list of the heads of families and other members and adherents of the congregation. This list is made as complete as possible, but some names may have been inadvertently omitted and the address in some instances may be incorrect. The Kirk-Session request that any such inaccuracies be pointed out to the Minister, or to the Elder of the District.

The desire and prayer of the Kirk-Session is, that the work of our Church may be carried on with increasing zeal and success and that the members of the congregation, collectively and individually, may be found contributing more largely in the future than in the past to the advancement of the cause and Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

The Annual Meeting.

Minutes of Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church, held within the School-room of the Church, on Monday the 12th Fanuary, 1891, at 8 o'clock p.m.

Mr. Alex. Mitchell was called to the chair, and Mr. E. B. Greenshields was requested to act as secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer.

The minutes of the last annual meeting, held on the 13th January, 1890, were read and confirmed.

The report of the Trustees and Treasurer's financial statement having been placed in the pews on the previous Sunday were taken as read.

The consideration of the report was postponed until after the other business before the meeting was finished.

The Secretary read the Treasurer's statement of the Manse fund. The total cost of the work was \$13,908.44. The subscriptions paid came to \$12,667.60, leaving \$1,240.84. Of this \$200.00 was still due from subscriptions and would be paid, and \$333.33 had already been collected from the rent of the manse. The balance \$707.51 would be paid also from the rent.

Rev. Mr. Barclay reported that owing to the illness of the Secretary-Treasurer, the report of the Committee on the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church was not ready to present to the meeting, but that the result for the year would be about the same as last year.

It was accordingly moved by Mr. John McDonald, seconded by Mr. T. H. Newman, and carried:

That the report of the Schedule Committee, when completed, be printed with the other reports for distribution, and that the Committee be thanked on behalf of the congregation for the manner in which it managed the funds contributed during the year, and that

Mr. J. Murray Smith, Mr. R. Forsyth, Mr. R. S. Kinghorn, and Mr. A. S. Ewing,

be elected members of the Committee for the current year, and that the thanks of the congregation be given to Mr. R. S. Kinghorn for his efficient performance of the duties of Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee.

Mr. J. A. Cantlie moved, seconded by Mr. R. Forsyth:

That the thanks of the congregation be tendered to the Trustees for their able and satisfactory management of the financial affairs of the Church during the past year.—Carried.

The chairman announced that in accordance with the By-laws, two of the Trustees, Mr. Andrew Allan and Mr. E. B. Greenshields retired by rotation this year, but were eligible for re-election.

Mr. C. D. Proctor then moved, seconded by Mr. James Tasker: That Mr. Andrew Allan and Mr E. B. Greenshields be re-elected Trustees for the usual term.—Carried.

The following motions were put to the meeting and carried unanimously:

Moved by Mr. A. Macpherson, seconded by Mr. J. L. Morris:

That Mr. P. S. Ross and Mr. John McDonald be thanked for their services as auditors for the past year, and that they be requested to continue in the office for the present year.

Moved by Mr. Colin McArthur, seconded by Mr. Alex. Macpherson:

That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the Organist for the attentive and able manner in which he has conducted the musical services of the Church, and to the members of the Choir for their valuable assistance.

Moved by Mr. A. McFee, seconded by Mr. P. S. Ross:

That the thanks of the congregation are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. John L. Morris and to Mrs. Morris, for their very zealous and very successful work in connection with the Sunday School of the Church.

The Rev. Mr. Barclay moved, seconded by Mr. James Tasker:

That the thanks of this meeting be given to Mr. John Larmonth for his faithful and successful labours during twenty-four years at the Victoria Mission Sunday School.

This was carried unanimously, and the secretary was requested to send a copy of the resolution to Mr. Larmonth.

Mr. Alex. Macpherson reported that a joint meeting of St. Paul's Kirk-Session and St. Matthew's Kirk-Session, and representatives of the Victoria Mission Sunday School, was held on 1st November, 1890, and that this meeting decided that it was advisable that St. Matthew's Church should work this district as a mission, and should hold morning and evening services on the Sabbath, with a school in

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It was 19th Januar the Trustee the situation the afternoon. It was also resolved to ask the Kirk-Session of St. Paul's Church to assent to this arrangement, and to contribute as liberally as possible to its financial support.

It was thereupon moved by Mr. Alex. Macpherson, and seconded by Mr. R. Macfarlane:

That this meeting approve of and now confirm the actions of the Kirk-Session in this matter, and also recommend the Schedule Committee to increase the grant from \$300.00 to \$500.00 for the present year.—Carried.

The Rev. Mr. Barclay expressed the pleasure he had experienced in carrying on the work of the Church during the year, and thanked the office-bearers of the Church and others connected with its various branches of work for the assistance they had given to him. He said he had now had seven years' of happy ministry in St. Paul's Church, and everything that the congregation had promised to do, had been more than fulfilled.

It was then moved by the chairman, seconded by Mr. J. C. Watson:

That the report of the Trustees be approved and adopted, and that it with the Treasurer's statement and the minutes of the meeting be printed for circulation among the members of the congregation.—Carried.

A general discussion followed as to the best means of collecting the amount of additional revenue necessary.

Mr. John L. Morris moved, seconded by Mr. Jas. Tasker:

That this meeting affirm the principle of collecting by the envelope system, and recommend that a special body or organization be appointed to carry out the same.

This was lost by the casting vote of the chairman.

It was explained by those who voted against this motion, that they approved of the principle of the envelope system, and wished it to be continued as in the past few years, but they did not think that the amount of money required could be got in this way, and they wished some other means tried in addition to keeping on the present envelope system.

It was finally decided to adjourn the meeting until Monday, the 19th January, 1891, at eight o'clock, to allow of a joint meeting of the Trustees and members of the Kirk-Session being held to discuss the situation. The meeting accordingly adjourned.

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Report of the Crustees

of St. Paul's Church for the year ending 31st December, 1890.

In submitting their Annual Report, accompanied by the Treasurer's statement for the year, the Trustees of St. Paul's Church have again the pleasure of recording the close of another year of continued prosperity.

Under the able ministration of the Rev. Mr. Barclay, the life and work of the congregation have been fully maintained.

The attendance at the services has been very large, and the pews are all rented. The amount collected from pew rents is \$7816.77. This is slightly in excess of last year, when the amount was \$7784.30. The ordinary collections also shew a slight increase, being \$3766.07 against \$3517.64 last year. This is still however considerably below the sum collected in 1888, viz., \$4388.14. The Trustees expected that the amount would at least have reached the figures of 1888. The account with the Treasurer for the Decoration Fund has been closed. The balance due last year of \$48.45 was charged to general expenses, and a further sum of \$177.80, which settles all claims in full, will be found in the item "Sundry accounts" in this year's statement.

During the year the building of the Manse has been completed, and the Trustees are glad to see the Minister of the Church occupying a manse erected on the Church property.

A statement of the Manse fund is submitted with this report, shewing a small balance on hand of \$42.52. Against this there is an amount of \$35.39 charged in "Sundry accounts." There still remains a balance due the contractors. A full statement of this fund will be presented at the Annual Meeting.

It will be seen by the statement of the finances of the Church, that the balance due to the Treasurer on 31st December, 1889, was \$1161.28, and this year the amount due to him is \$1929.70, shewing a deficiency of \$768.42 for the year. To shew however the correct amount necessary to make the revenue meet the expenditure, the amounts received from the Guarantee fund \$675.00, and from the rent of the Manse \$333.33, which is to be used first in paying off the balance due on the Manse, must be added, making the deficiency \$1776.75.

An Annual Guarantee fund was commenced a year ago, and subscriptions received from a few members of the congregation. In this way \$750.00 was collected last year, and \$675,00 this year.

It is quite evident that it is necessary to collect in some way about \$1800.00 a year more that at present, in addition to paying off the amount now due to the Treasurer \$1929.70.

This can be done if the members of the congregation will subscribe to an Annual Guarantee fund, or the amount can be obtained by an addition to the price of the sittings in the Church.

As it is very important that this matter should be attended to, the Trustees would like to receive an expression of opinion about it from the congregation, at the Annual Meeting, that immediate steps may be taken to increase the revenue.

The Trustees who retire by rotation this year are Mr. Andrew Allan and Mr. E. B. Greenshields, both of whom are eligible for reelection.

The work of the School has been conducted much as usual during the year. The attendance both of teachers and scholars has been very good, and the greatest harmony has prevailed in all departments. Many changes have taken place in the roll, and some valued and experienced teachers, who will be much missed, have felt obliged to resign.

In every case these resignations were from unavoidable causes, such as engrossing occupations, ill-health, or removal from the city. The following are the names of those who have severed their connection with the School for the present:—Mrs. Barclay, Miss Caldwell, Miss Shanks, Miss Jessie Shanks, Miss Thompson, Miss Brown, Miss Mills, Miss Struthers, Miss Watt, and Mr. Rankin.

The following were added to our roll during the year:—Miss McArthur. Miss Watt, Miss Kinloch, Miss Cameron, Miss McFarlane, Miss Davidson, Miss Stewart, Mr. McArthur, and Mr. Procter.

No less than six new classes have been formed from the infant class since last year's report, and five of these are taught by teachers trained i

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trained in the school and supplied from the two senior girls' classes conducted by Miss Lawder and Mrs. Tasker.

One teacher has also been given by Mr. Barclay from his young men's class. This class numbers 42 at present, and much interest has been taken in it by the young men, some of whom have never been absent during the session.

The Superintendent and teachers are grateful to the elders for regular visitation of the school, and to Messrs. Croil and J. Murray Smith for addressing the scholars upon missionary and other subjects.

The library is now in a very efficient state, a large number of valuable new books having recently been added.

Too many thanks cannot be given to the librarians, Messrs. George Kinloch, Alexander Ross and Frederick McFarlane, for the energy they have shewn in preparing a new catalogue, and generally for the efficient and business-like manner in which this important department of the school is conducted by them.

No branch of Church work is more hopeful and encouraging than that of the Sunday-School teacher, and there is room in the Sunday-School for every child and young person belonging to the Church.

The number of scholars at present on the roll is:—Male, 151; female, 107; total, 258, which, including 32 teachers, makes a happy band of 290 workers in the vineyard of our Lord.

The Teachers on the roll number—13 male and 14 female—total 27. The Scholars on the roll number—125 male and 117 female, total 242.

The average attendance during the year has been 18 teachers and 178 scholars.

The missionary collections during the year amounted to \$4.16 more than the preceding one, and were \$116.50.

We regret to say that during the year our teaching staff suffered the loss, by removal from the district and from the city, of nine of its most faithful and efficient workers, viz.:—Misses Anderson, Rough, McLeod, Kirkham and Renouf, and Messrs. D. Finlayson, D. Davis, E. T. Davis and J. C. Locke.

This change left about one-half of our classes without teachers during the greater part of the summer months, and but for the timely assistance rendered by a prominent member of the Presbyterian Sunday-School Association, who secured the services of four teachers from the city, the school would have suffered a large decrease in the attendance.

For some years back the Sunday Evening Service has been carried on during the winter months only, but through the action of the Church Extension Committee of our Church, it has been decided to transfer the entire charge of the Mission to the care of St. Matthew's Church Session. Their interests are largely represented in the dis-

trict, and it is thought that with an increased grant from St. Paul's Church, regular services can be held during the whole year, both morning and evening.

The prospects are, that such a decided change as this will greatly help towards establishing a congregation in the near future.

In view of this being done, our office-bearers and teachers desire to place on record the very great kindness and assistance cheerfully given them at all times by St. Paul's congregation during the past seventeen years; and with the prayer that God may yet greatly bless them and this work in the years to come.

As we enter upon a new year, we meet again to review our work and to render thanks to our Heavenly Father for the mercy and goodness that have followed us all the way through the past year.

We have been greatly encouraged by the interest shewn by many new members, and the valuable assistance rendered by them has added new life to the work. We trust this interest begun will continue and increase, and in the coming year that our sphere of usefulness may widen, and that we may be instrumental in relieving the wants of many needy and distressed ones.

Our attention in the early part of the year was principally directed towards Dorcas work. Underclothing was made and sent to the Maternity Hospital, and two dozen pinafores to the Hervey Institute; also clothing for such of our own poor as required it. Thirty-five yards of material were distributed, and eighteen yards of gingham sent to the French Sewing Class at Russell Hall. A parcel of clothing was sent to Mrs. Haldimand for the use of the nurses of the W. P. Missionary Society. We also assisted in purchasing a sewing-machine for a poor woman.

The contributions in aid of the Industrial Rooms were requested to be sent in March, so as not to interfere with our own collection. The amount received was \$108. The bazaar, however, was not held until December, when the Society undertook the Children's Table, and the proceeds from the doll, toy and tea-tables amounted to \$181.70.

It was decided, instead of sending the usual donations in money to the different institutions, to purchase from the Industrial Rooms clothing, and thus perform a double charity by helping the ladies to dispose of the accumulated stock they had on their hands. Accordingly, \$10 worth of clothing was purchased and sent to the Sheltering Home, the same amount to the Diet Dispensary, also to the Home for Friendless Women, and \$15 worth to the Protestant

Insane Hospital, besides two parcels of clothing sent by members of the congregation for the latter institution.

Before closing our report we take this opportunity of thanking the ladies who have kindly undertaken the duty of collecting, Mr. Barclay for his kindness in opening our meetings, and all who have in any way assisted us in furthering the interests of these most deserving charities. We would ask their continued support and sympathy.

May God's blessing rest upon our future labours, and may we all feel it to be our duty as well as our privilege to work for the deserving poor, and be more earnest and self-denying in our efforts to do good.
