The Fifteenth Annual Meeting of the Infants'. Home and Infirmary was held at the Home, 21 St. Mary Street, on
Saturday, October 25th, aud was attended by a large number of ladies and gentlemen.

The Mayor being unable to be present, the Chair was occupied by Sir W. P. Howland, and the meeting opened with prayer by the Rev. J. Pearson; after which the Secretary read the report of the Managers, the adoption of which was moved by Prof. Goldwin Smith, seconded by Mr. Geó. McKenzie of Deer Park.

The Treasurer's report, Work Room and Medical reports, were read, and, in moving their adoption, very earnest and eloquent speeches were made by Mr. Herbert Mason, Mr. Justice Rose, Mr. J. J. Maclaren, Mr. Thos. Hodgins, and others.

Among the gentlemen present were all the Medical Staff of the Home, Rev. Mr. Bilkey, Rev. Septimus Jones, Dr. Langtry, Rev. J. V. Smith, Wm. Boultbee, de.

Letters expressing regret at not being present were read from J. Ross Robertson, Stapleton Caldicott, George $\mathbf{S}$. Holmested, W. N. Miller, Rev. J. Alexander.

The very successful meeting was closed with prayer by the Rev. J. V. Smith.

The visitors were then taken to inspect the Home, and served with refreshments, which were, as usual, provided for their guests by the Ladies of the Board of Managers.

MANAGERS' REPORT, Oct., 1889, то Oct., 1890.

The yearly reports of all Charitable Institutions offer but little variety; as trees whose growth year by year is scarcely noticed; so with benevolent enterprises, they are by the general public considered but as necessary adjuncts to a large city, and it is only on an occasion such as this, our Annual Meeting, that the managers have an opportunity to show the public that this particular Home, or Charity, is one absolutely required. As an oak to an acorn, so is our present Infants' Home, compared to its first inception. Two or three merciful people, impressed by the misery and mitplessness of a special form of wretchedness, began in a small way to relieve that want, and year by year, slowly but surely, has our Infants' Home attained to its present condition; and in presenting their annual report, the managers desire to acknowledge the goodness and loving kindness of their Heavenly Father, which has followed them step by step, guiding and directing their deliberations during the fifteen years' existence of this most necessary Institution. We say necessary, and are prepared in this Report to substantiate our claim to be so.

The year just closed has, fortunately for the Home, been marked by little beyond the ordinary routine. Last year we had the Kirmiss to report, and the advantages aceruing to the Institution, owing to the careful appropriation of the money raised by this special effort. This year the comfort to the inmates of the Home from the increased laundry facilities, has been very great, and in many little ways the Home has been improved, owing to the Kirmiss receipts, which were divided between the reduction of the debt upon this building, permanent improvements, and payment of all outstanding liabilities, The reduction of our mortgage will

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in the future enable us to make still further improvements to the Home : chief among which will be the introduction of more complete fire-escapes than those at present attached to the building; also the alsolute safety of our inmates from dangers arising from imperfect lighting. This subject, we may say, has for some time past engaged the most serious attention of the managers, and has been carefully considered. Some years ago, gas was used in two of our large rooms and in the Hall, in the hope that funds would shortly permit of its use over the entire building, but the amgunt charged for even so few burners placed this lighting far beyond our means. We know that coal oil is a dangerous element, but judging from the frequent fatalities reported due to defective burners, or the blowing out of the gas by ignorant persons, we cannot but feel the risks rin by either mode of lighting are about equal. The electric light has been under consideration, but $\$ 700$ for the necessary plant, while covering the entire cost of engines and fittings, is an outley as yet, beyond our present resources. Meantime, patent safety lamps are used throughout the building, and the utmost vigilance is exercised by the stperintenident of the Home over every department of this most important particular. The Chief of the City Fire Department has thoroughly inspected the Home, and is assisting, by his practical advice, plans now on hand to insure the speedy removal of the infants in the untoward event of a fire occuring in the building.

We just now spoke of the Infants' Home as necessary, and feel that a few facts will prove that this word is not misplaced.

A young man of twenty-two appears, bringing an infant of but a week old; his wife,-aged nineteen, has been snatched from him by death; no relatives in the town, his income that of a salesman in a small shop; where could he place his motherless child but in this Infants' Home?

An older man applies to have his child, eighteen months' old, taken in. "My wife acted queer, ladies ; spent my

wages faster than I could earn, and was not good to the little one." Kindly questions elicit the fact that the poor n.other has just been placed in the Insane Asylum. Need we say our nursery doors were opened to his boy?

Application is made for the admission of two children of a poor woman whose husband has been sent by charitable people to the South, in hopes to arrest cousumption; the wife, worn with nursing, is unable by her sewing to support herself and children. How grateful was this poor woman when told that not only her two childrin were admitted, but that she could still care for her intants by entering the home with them herself.

We have had a large proportion of these sad cases during the year, such as tiny, motherless twins; several admissions of infants whose mothers are in the Asylum ; and fewer than in former years of unmarried women, but alas, too often is the story repeated: "No mother ; came to this country to better myself; no relations here." Our doors are open to all cases such as these, but no unmarried woman can ever be re-admitted to this Home. Here is the strong point in favour of this Charity : Shelter and care are bestowed upon those who would otherwise be driven to despair ; and in letters we have from parents, grateful for the restoration of their daughters; and in the large percentage of marriages made by girls who have been placed in service from this Home, the managers realize ever more and more the necessity of the work they have undertaken. People who condemn this Charity, incur a grave responsibility in thus prejudging an Institution, whose methods of working and rules for admission they have not taken the trouble to ascertain fairly for themselves.

This report with all other statistics of our work, collected together in pamphlet form, is distributed by our managers while engaged in their individual work of collecting from house to honse funds to carry on the work of the Home : Never a very pleasant undertaking. asmuch as ye have done it to one of these, My little ones, ye have done it unto Me " : that induces the carrying out of this part of the work of a manager; and the sight of our nursery children, and the satisfactory adoptions from their ranks, are constant encouragements to persevere in what is far too often most up.hill work.

Pay a visit to some of the densely populated back lanes and streets of our city; how hard it is for little children to thrive in such localities, and what care can the year old child of some widow get in a room already crowded with the family of the woman who takes the child to board. We listen to the ever repeated entreaty made to us, sometimes by a young widow, sometimes a deserted wife, sometimes by a sad faced woman who should still be an innocent girl at home: "I want my child taken here so that I can feel easy about it, it gets so knocked about where I have it boarding, I don't feel it will live." How often have we to say sadly to the pleading woman: "We cannot take your child, we have no room." The miseries endured by these helpless children, and the hope that some few may be rescued, and from the watchful care bestowed upon them here, be enabled in the future to become sturdy men and women, is an ever present incentive for renewed efforts, amidst many discouragements, in this work of rescuing infants and tiny children from a life of suffering that it is impossible in the limits of this repont to describe.

Our deserted or orphan children are the class for whom we endeavor to find good homes, and the following extracts from letters yearly written to us by the parties who have adopted our children, will serve to illustrate the reality of these adoptions:-
"Our little girl, Louise, taken by us in February, has got along nicely ; she is quite strong and hearty ; has improved wonderfully in looks, and is beloved by all." And again: "Our boy, George, is splendid; whatever we did before we got him, his father and I cannot think." Think of the happiness brought into the life of the writer of the following:
"I am so satisfied with the child ; I feel as if no one had any right to her but myself ; she is everything to us, she is so clever, goes to Church and Sunday school, and to say all in a few words, she is all we could desire."

Letters such as these, added to the knowledge that 102 orphans, or deserted children, have been adopted into loving homes, are most encouraging itens in the record of fifteen years, and furnish additional proofs of the necessity of this Home.

During the past year we have received into the Infants' Home and Infirmary, 161 children, 97 boys, 64 girls. Their record is as follows: Went, out with their mothers, 6 ; adopted, 4 ; taken out by friends, 41 ; died, 58 ; remaining in Home, 52. Of these children 35 were entered at their admission into the Infirmary, by the physician, as dying; that is, in some cases they might linger weeks, or even months; but owing to their diseased and enfeebled state the utmost care, combined with skilled medical attendance, was powerless to save these little lives. 10 foundlings eame in during the year, and twice we have had twins brought to us but a few days old and motherless. Only 1 death among the children over 8 months old took place, showing most conclusively the good effects of the Home care, can they once rally from previous neglect.

Of the nurses, the record is as follows: Went to service, taking children, 6 ; gone back to friends, 23 ; went to servicè, 19 ; sent away, 3 ; remaining in Home, 24 ; total, 75. Therefore, during the year there have been 236 inmates to board, to lodge, and to clothe. The amount of work and the sewing required for this number can hardly be estimated by the general public. All needful garments are made in the house, with the exception of generous gifts of clothing made for the infants by the elder girls of the Jessie Ketchum and Wellesley Street schools ; a grant being made by the School Board to provide material on which the girls are taught to cut out and make clothing, which is divided among the various Charitable Institutions of the city. work room, presided over by two of our managers, Mrs. Hodgins and Miss Grieg, steadfastly continue their labours of love in making the tiny garments required by the babies. The nurses in the Home also do a large amount of sewing, having made during the year 400 articles, besides making over and keeping in repair the general wardrobe. We may here say that gifts of clothing are always acceptable, especially out of door garments for the nursery children.

Our medical staff, as usual, have been most kind and attentive to every detail of sickness. The managers feel they can ill express their sense of what the Home owes to the gratuitous services of our talented physicians.

The managers also desire on this occasion to express their thankfulness to the Clergy, who so regularly conduct religious services for the inmates. Also to the ladies who take charge of the various Bible classes for the women. Miss Jarvis, long the faithful teacher of the Sunday evening Bible class, has, we grieve to say, been many months obliged to give up her class, owing to severe illness ; her many friends hope for her speedy recovery.

For the order and careful management of the Home, the managers feel they are much indebted to the lady Superintendent, Miss Boultbee; also the Matron, Mrs. Jordan; both being unwearied in the discharge of their duties.


The "Little Maids" Club have continued their third annual donation, $\$ 50$, to support a cradle in the Home. The Maurice Mason cot is, as yet, our only one endowed. Truly in this instance, a little child, "being dead, yet speaketh." The Mulock cot continues to receive its annual support. To all kind frieuds who have sent donations of clothing, giffs of frutut, etc., the managers desire to offer their sincere thanks.

We have now, as regards our Infants' Home, touched upon the past, and dwelt upon the present, and feel that, this report would be incomplete, did we not express our, hopes for the future. No Institution should limit its possibilities. "Ever Onward" should be our motto, And our hope for the coming year will, we feel sure, meet with the sympathy of all present to-day. It is that at our sixteenth annual meeting we may show that this Home has been enlarged by the addition of a wing, thus enabling us to keep our children with us, or admit others up to five years of age a continuation, as it were, of the Infants' Home, and thus endeavour in even a partial manner to relieve what is at present a most keenly felt want.

Thé Iate Mr. William Gooderham, whoseigenerous bequest to the Home, of $\$ 2,000$, we now most gratefully record, while visiting the Home shortly before his lamented death, remarked upon the necessity of such a wing, and that it was an enterprise in which the managers of the Home must shortly engage.

Had we such a wing, and could keep our nursery children, the School Board would, we believe, supply a Kindergarten teacher, and the first cost over, such branch of our work would soon become self-supporting.

A man ventures his life to rescue an infant from a burning building, and the saving of that child is felt by on-lookers to be well worth the possible risk of a man's life. Why then do not people realize that to rescue one of these poor infants, and often the mother from a far more miserable fate than death, is a noble act, and one in which all can participate. An untimely frost chills the early blossoms of the spring. The tiny bud of infant life droops and slowly perishes in the dreary frost of neglect and starvation. The sufferings of an infant are soon over, and one more is added to the mighty host of infant martyrs.
The Infants' Home and Infirmary by its very name suggests the possible refuge in which these neglected waifs may besheltered. Want of room, or lack of nurses, are the only reasons for ever refusing admission to children answering to the class for whom this Home was begun. In writing this report the wish arises that each word were as a living coal, burning its way into the hearts of all who hear or read it, inkindling a flaming zeal which should cause subscriptions to pour in towards the enlargement of the building, thus enabling the managers to take into its shelter a greater number of destitute mothers and infants, and also arouse the sympathies of many who have not yet considered the matter, to the manifold needs of the young children of the poorer class in this our rapidly increasing city. "Even so it is not the will of your Father which is in Heaven, that one of these little ones should perish."

## PHYSICIANS' REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen :-On behalf of the Medical Staff of the Infants' Home, I have pleasure in presenting our report for the year ending September 30th, 1890.

During the year there were admitted

of the Infants 101 were placed in the general wards of the Home, and 60 in the Infirmary. On admission 35 of the latter were registered as hopeless cases. A total of 58 /deaths occurred during the year, or a percentage of $\mathbf{3 6 . 0 2}$. The highest monthly death rate was in February when 10 succumbed, and the lowest in November, when only one was recorded.

Amongst the cases of death Marasmus holds the highest place, other causes of death have been

When so many are admitted in a dying condition our death rate must of necessity appear high, but we cannot select cases for our institution, all are gathered in and the critical statistican must judge us accordingly. Were we to deduct the hopeless cases from our calculations and take those only whose prospects for living are reasonably good we then have a death rate of 18.25 per cent., which is more favorable than the general death rate of the city.

But if the last few days or weeks of these unfortunate waifs are made comfortable and happy, if our duty towards them has been done, need we care for comparative percentages ?

For a variety of reasons, epidemics of contagious diseases are always dreaded in public institutions. We have suffered in the past, and, although exercising every precaution, may again suffer in the future,
but for the year just closed we have cause for congratulation in the comparative absence of such, whooping cough being the only invader. It came to us in April, and lasted ten weeks, attacked thirty of the inmates, and is held responsible for one death. During the continuance of the disease, when controllable, no new cases were admitted to the Home.

The general health of the nurses has been good, one taken ill with Inflamatory Rheumatism was sent to the Convalescent Home where she made a good recovery.

During the year Dr. R. A. Pyne was promoted to the cohsulting staff and his place on the active staff was filled by Dr. D. A. Gibb Wishart.

## CONSTITUTION

## OF THE

TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.
I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and -Infirmary."
II.

The object of the Home shall be, to receive and tenderly care for destitute infants under two years of age.

## III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any muney, their babies shall be admitted free.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Committee of thirty ladies, assisted by an Advisory Committee of three gentlemen, and the Committee shall elect annually their Presiding Officers and a Treasurer and Secretary out of their number.
V.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-laws of the Society, provided one month's notice shall be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, itcluding three Officers shall be necessary, as well as. the assent in writing of the "Advisory Committee."
VI.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Committee. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,-especially in the inkestment of funds.
VII.

The funds necessary for suphorting this Home shall be secured by nnual subscriptions, donations, collections, etc.

The Annual Meeting shall b feld the first Tuesday in October, or s near that date as possible. (

The Managir quired ; shall s the proper disc

The Secretar meetings, and office of Secret prepare an ann of the Home.

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## BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee, shall meet monthly, or oftener if required ; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the Matron and nurses.

## II.

The Secretary ${ }^{\text {shall }}$ keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the conditions, progress, and prospects of the Home.

## III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a chartered bank in the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

## IV.

The physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet-nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.
V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet-nurses as possible, each nurse to be intrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the board may determine.

## VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

## RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at $11 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$.
Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

## II.

RUL
All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the Officers.
The following order shall be observed :-The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President ; or, in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

## III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her, before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

## IV.

A Committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 a.m., consisting of the President (or Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The Committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This Committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the General Committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each Manager taking this duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the weekly Committee.

## V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

## VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the Chair.

## RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Applications for admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary Steet, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.
No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by specíal permission of the Committee.
Infants pay $\$ 5$ per month, children who can walk $\$ 4$, unless remitted by the Compittee of Admission.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

## RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.
2. Each woman admitted must give her services for at least six months, to the Institution (or as much longer as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, to be determined by the Board) in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and child.
3. Her good conduct/during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the Lady Managers in pbtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.
4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the visiting physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, \&c., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.
5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her first born.

## PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the ohild a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these enquiries is satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection,
