Rev. Mr. Dickinson spoke briefly to the resolution. Dean Partridge felt some such change as this was bound to come, and it would be useless to attempt to resist the advance of radical ideas in this direction.

Rev. Mr. Eatoough saw several serious risks involved in this proposed radical change. What, for example, he asked would become of the older men when the parishes dropped them.

Rev. J. de Soyres thought a hard and fast election every seven years would not work altogether for good, yet he felt that Mr. Hanington deserved the thanks of the synod for bringing this very important matter to the attention.

Rev. J. M. Davenport felt that the Methodist plan was the right one, provided the transference system were adopted. Judge Hanington said it would be well to consider whether the benefits of the proposed change would outweigh its disadvantages.
