

CHIEF CLARK WANTS TO KNOW WHAT TO DO.

He is Puzzled Between Judge Carleton's Decision and Judge Forbes' Charge to Grand Jury.

Chief Clark does not know just what to do about handling boxing bouts or prize fights. He stands between the decision of Judge Carleton in the Litdecision of Judge Carleton in the Littlejohn-McLeod bout, and the reading of the law by Judge Forbes a few days ago. The chief recalls that the Littlejohn-McLeod bout was attended by an official referee, time-keeper, seconds and all the other officials. It was fought for money just the same as this last affair, and yet it was declared not to be a prize fight. In the former case the men were arrested and discharged. This time they should all be arrested, according to Judge Forbes, even if the fatality had not occurred. The chief is rather uncertain about his duty in such cases.

Judge Forbes denied having said that
Judge Carleton was wrong in deciding that the Littlejohn-McLeod con-

ing that the Littlejohn-McLeod contest was not a prize fight.

"How could I say that? I do not know what the conditions were that governed that particular contest, and have no knowledge concerning the evidence adduced regarding it before Judge Carleton. In my address to the grand jury I stated what according to my interpretation of the law constimy interpretation of the law consti-tuted a prize fight, and I reiterate that the Criminal Code specifically states that a contest between two men, for money, whether gloves are used or not, at which a referee officiates, and the men have seconds, and an admittance fee is charged, is a prize fight, and contrary to law."

The judge also stated that everyone attending a prize fight where a fatality occurred was guilty of manslaughter, whether they were present as spectators or officials, and were liable to be indicted. The judge referred to a case in England, where all present at a certain exhibition which resulted in the death of one of the contestants, were tried and found guilty of man-slaughter. The judge stated, however, that it would be improper for him to make special reference to the case in this city, as it was now before the




