

POINTERS FOR WORKMEN.

The following points from the compensation act are printed for the benefit of enquirers:

1st—Notice of injury must be given to employer within two weeks after orcurence of accident. This notice is as per form at foot. It has to be addressed to the employer and signed by the person injured or by his representative. 2nd—Damages can be claimed under common law for any amount, but the decision of the court is not final and can ultimately be appealed to England. Or damages can be claimed under Workmen's Compensation Act, as passed in 1908, for under the common law the workman would not have any claim for injuries sustained through and 1908. In this case the workman and 1908. In this case the workman can petition to any judge of the Supreme Court whose decision is final. This judge has the right to sward costs to either side as may seem just. These costs cannot be more than \$25 as against the employer.
