ENGLAND BUILDS 1,227th. WARSHIP

Thunderer Latest Dreadnought Marks Completion of Four Centuries of Building on Thames—Banks of Historic Stream Have Felt Weight of All Sorts of Fighting Craft.

Popular attention centralized itself to a greater degree than usual upon the preparations for the laying of the keel of the new Dreadnought, the Thunderer, that is to be, in the yards of the Royal Dockyard, at Woolwich. The laying of that keel marked the initial step toward bringing into material existence the twelve hundred and twenty-seventh ship of the Royal Navy on the River Thames during four centuries of war ship construction on that waterway alone.

Some Historic Craft. Of the twelve hundred and twenty-seventh British warships launched on the Thames, Mr. Edward Fraser has written in the Graphic, "considerably more than half the number were ships carrying each fifty guns and more; 'sixty-fours' and 'seventy-fours,' 'eighties' and 'ninety-eights,' up to 110 gun ships—ships rated for the line battle, as the old phrase went.

As Midshipman. In 1882, Prince George was made a midshipman on board the Canada, stationed in the North Atlantic coast, and in 1885 was promoted to a Lieutenant on the Britannia, where he remained until 1890 when he was given the command of the gunboat Thrush on the West Indian coast.

APPOINTMENT OF COUNTY SECRETARY TO J. KING KELLEY

Municipal Council Filled Vacant Office at Quarterly Meeting Yesterday--Salary Fixed at \$2000 --Robert Conroy Elected Warden--Requisition for Medical Health Officer.

At the quarterly meeting of the municipal council yesterday afternoon J. King Kelley was elected county secretary, and voted an allowance of \$2000 a year to cover salary and all office expenses.

The resolution was adopted by a standing vote. On motion of Councillor Hayes a copy of resolution was ordered sent to the Governor General for transmission to the King.

Councillor Baxter moved that the election of a county secretary be made the next order of business. Councillor Baxter thought they ought to have a report from the finance committee before electing a secretary, so they would know just what salary the county would pay.

Councillor Baxter said he approved of the suggestion of Councillor Hayes. The finance committee might meet, while the council took a recess, and later render report on financial affairs.

Councillor Baxter then presented the report of the finance committee. One section of the report recommended the appointment of a medical health officer under the provision of the act recently passed by the legislature, requiring the municipality to pay two-thirds of his salary, or \$1000.

Coun. Curran said it was advisable that the official should be appointed by outside authority as he would not be able to do his duty personally. He would be asked to make the appointment of this official, his salary to be paid in monthly instalments on a requisition signed by the chairman of the board of health.

SHOT HIMSELF WHILE INSANE

Jury Finds Sylvanus Pendleton's Death Due to Nervous Condition and Temporary Insanity.

"We, the jury empaneled to inquire into the cause of the death of Sylvanus Pendleton, find that he came to his death on the 1st day of May, at his residence, 51 Summer street, in the City of St. John, by a bullet from a gun, discharged by his own hands while suffering from nervousness, and while temporarily insane, which but for his death signed--James Carpenter (foreman), Thos. Gibbons, G. Herbert McCormick, A. W. Golding, Peter Aarsnauld, Sidney Gibbs, James Bond.

This was the verdict of the jury in the inquest into the death of Sylvanus Pendleton by Dr. D. E. Berryman in the court house last evening. Six witnesses examined and their evidence showed that just previous to his death Mr. Pendleton was in a very nervous condition. There was nothing submitted to show that he was of unsound mind.

Elizabeth Pendleton, wife of the deceased, the first witness called, told of finding deceased lying on a bed in his studio dead, at 2 o'clock in the morning. Deceased was in a nervous state for about two weeks before coming to his death. She said she witnessed the impression that he would injure himself.

She had never considered him as being insane. She said she was Raymond A. Pendleton, a son of the deceased, sworn, said previous to his death, his father had been unwell for some few weeks, and appeared nervous. Witness never thought he was of unsound mind. He did not know of any reason why his father should have committed suicide.

George A. Chamberlain told of being summoned to the residence of the deceased at 4 o'clock on the morning of the tragedy and of finding deceased lying in his studio with a bullet wound in his right temple. Two guns were lying upon the bed with their muzzles pointing towards the wounds in Mr. Pendleton's head. There were four loaded cartridges.

The council then proceeded to elect a secretary, the three applicants being J. King Kelley, Dr. L. A. Curry and J. A. Sinclair. The result of the balloting was as follows: Sinclair, 7; Kelley, 12; Curry, 5.

The Warden then declared J. King Kelley duly elected secretary. Mr. Kelley in a brief speech said he regretted that he would have to tender his resignation as a councillor of the county and city of St. John. He would try to fulfil the duties of his new office with impartiality.

Coun. Baxter in moving that the resignation should be accepted, said he thought all would entertain most kindly feelings to their new secretary, even those who had voted against him.

The motion accepting the resignation was passed unanimously. The council then took recess. On resuming business, the following officers were elected: Auditor--I. Olive Thomas; Marshal and Keeper of Dead House--Thomas Coulgan.
