School Board Decide To Defer Immediate Action Regarding Purchase Of Rideau Hall -Not All In Favor.

At a special meeting of the School Board last evening, it was decided to make an offer to purchase the Bell building and lot adjoining the high school, provided the Common Council was agreeable. An effort will be made today to secure an option to purchase for a certain sum.

Chairman Emerson presided, and there were present Trustees Bullock, Russell, Nase, Day, Smith, Agar and Mrs. Skinner with Sup. Bridges, Sec. Leavitt and Architect Mott.

The chairman stated the meeting had been called to consider the report of the committee appointed to look into the question of purchasing the Bell building. The board held an option to purchase for \$10,000 which would expire in a short time.

Estimate of Cost.

Estimate of Cost.

Trustee Bullock, on behalf of the committee, said that if the board took over the building, it would cost \$2.288 to fit up the first floor for their purposes; \$970 for the 2nd floor and \$790 for the third floor. In addition about \$400 would be required to put the zoof in proper condition. Then there would be the architect's fees, making the total cost upwards of \$4,500. These estimates included the installation of two new bollers for heating purposes.

The Chairman—Why put in two boilers?

The architect, Mr. Mott, stated that they could put in one large boiler, but in view of the fact that they might not want to fit up the upper floors at once he thought they could get along with a smaller boiler for a time, If the third floor was fitted up then a small boiler could be put in to heat that floor.

Mr. Russell—If we bought the building we would have to issue bonds, wouldn't we?

The Chairman—Oh yes. That's what is worrying us.

Trustee Bullock said that while he felt the School Board needed better offices he was not ready to recommend the purchase.

Mr. Rusell—Would you pay \$8000 for the building?

Mr. Bullock—Yes. I think I would. But i would not un after it at that price.

Mr. Russell—We've just asked the

But I would not run after it at that price.

Mr. Russell—We've just asked the council for an assessment of \$141.000 - \$9.000 over last year. If we asked for \$16.000 more, we might not get it. We only want a board room and office rooms. We don't need class rooms.

Mr. Day said that if the Board was forced out of its present quarters he knew where they could get better quarters at a lower rent.

The Chairman pointed out that they had to vacate the Leinster street school on May I, or pay rent for the year.

In reply to a question the Superintendent said they might find accommodation for some of the Leinster street pupils in the Bell building if fitted up, and the others could be distributed. In other schools, until the new school was ready.

The Chairman said he was in favor of purchasing the Bell building. A few yedfs from now city property would increase in value. The High school was already overcrowded and it was not advisable to let other parties secure the Bell property. He thought the Board could afford to hold the property idle for a year. The lot was in a central position. The architect said the building was put up about 13 years ago. The cost was about \$15,000.

Mr. Day said that at first he was favorable to the proposition of tha purchase, but in view of the fact that they only want one class room for the overflow from the High school, he thought it was unnecessary to spend \$15,000 or more to secure a new building.

COMMISSION GOVERNMENT IN DES MOINES.

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

New York, Jan. 23.—After a very strong opening and unwonted activity during the first hours trading, which showed advances of from one to two points in the active issues, today's stock market developed a greater degree of weakness than had been observed for some weeks past. The primary cause of the reaction, perhaps was a decline in the interboro Met, issues, presumably because of the new offer submitted to the city to build and operate the projected subways by a local contracting firm. While it was the opinion of many-people that this new proposition would not be accepted the sentimental effect on the Interboro issues was nevertheless very adverse. The reaction also started a number of other unfavorable rumors, one to the effect that a decision would be handed down by the Supreme Court against the present control of the Harriman roads.

Other factors of influence were small stock exchange failure and a resolution introduced in the house at Washington providing for a sweeping investigation of the so-called Steel Trust, accompanied by a scathing attack on the validity of the corporations absorption of the Tonn. Coal and Iron Co. Under the weight of these influences prices declined from one to two points and showed Hitle rallying power. While such a reaction inclination was to await the result of tomorrow's N. Y. City bond sale before taking any decided stand. All things considered, however, there seems to be no reason to expect anything worse than a temporary set-back at this time.
