Ottawa, May 19.—A satisfactory enrollment of officers and men for the school of cavalry was made last night and it is expected that there will be about thirty or thirty-five in the day course and about twenty for the night course.

Ernest Lapointe, of Kamouraska, said that last year the government had given them \$15,000,000 without making any provision at all and now they were asking for a demand for \$45,000,000 more.

HOW THE STANDARD DISREGARDS FACTS

Impudent Misrepresentations of F. B. Carvell Regarding Valley Railway Bridges Totally Disproved by Hansard—Member for Carleton, in Speech in Parliament April 28, Advocated Just What Government Has Now Decided to Do.

The Standard Tuesday, in announcing the decision of the Dominion government to build the Valley railway bridges, made a series of impudent misrepresentations of the position of F. B. Carvell, M.P., in regard to this railway, saying among other things that he opposed aid for the bridges in the House of Commons only a few days ago.

Mr. Carvell pointed out also that unless the bill is amended another session of the New Brunswick legislature will be necessary before the bridges can be started.

It will be seen that Mr. Carvell's plan, as set forth in his speech, was actually adopted by the government. The Standard evidently hopes to injure Mr. Carvell and the Liberals by continuing its misrepresentation but the facts speak for themselves.
