LET THE PEOPLE DECIDE

The people of Newcastle are not allowed free choice in the selection of Mayor and Aldermen. No man may be nominated for Mayor unless he is assessed on \$1000 worth of real or personal property and no one may run as an aldermanic candidate unless he is assessed on \$400 worth of property. This limits the electors to a choice between property holders only. And representatives elected from among property holders only have hitherto been, as a rule, reckless spenders of the people's money. It is time for a change. Let the, property qualifications for Mayor and Aldermen be removed, and the citizens have the right of nominating for civic office whom they choose. Let the people be allowed the freedom of deciding for themselves. They are not half as apt to go astray in the selection of candidates as some good people fear.





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Mr. McLeod, who apparently takes a deep in terest in the vendor of spirits

and school books, interrupted with the remark that the children did not necessarily go to the place where liquor was sold to get their books, as there another vendor next door. When pressed by Mr. McKeown to remove the temptation from the children by removing the books from the shop where liquor was sold, Mr. Mc-

Lond replied that he would use his judgment in the matter. Another exposure of the government method of handling school books rather surprised the legislature. Mr. Mc-Keown was able to show that while militical favorites had the books consigned to them when they were sold, other dealers were compelled to pay eash for the books when they wanted to sell them.

To break the forec of this charge Mr. Hazen said that the books were onsigned to Messrs. McMillan in St John and to the King Lumber Company at Chipman, neither of whom supporters of the government.
