Biography.

MR. THOMAS CAMPBELL.

The following letter appears in the columns of the *Edinburgh Chronicle*. It gives some interesting particulars of the younger days of one of the most deservedly popular poets of the day, and is understood to be from the pen of Mr. Robert Gillilan, a gentleman who has himself acquired some celebrity as a

To the Editor of the Edinburgh Chronicle.
 Sir,—In your last publication in the article on Thomas Campbell, the poet, you state to your belief, that he was a native of Glasgow. Now I beg to correct that statement, by informing you, that Thomas Campbell was born in Kilmartin, a parish in North Ayrshire, Argyllshire, in the vicinity of which Ayr, and about twelve miles west from the Firth of Clyde, is situated the hamlet where the poet was born. I am situated at the bottom of a valley, and beautifully sheltered either side by the birch, the mountain ash

and the pine-tree ; the whole scenery is esteemed for wild and romantic beauty. The

atic language is spoken by the natives; and at English, as well as the Gaelic, is taught in the schools. Campbell was removed to the College of Glasgow in about his fifteenth year, where he commenced the cultivation of poetry. It was here he formed an intimacy with the Rev. Hamilton Paul, of Droughton, who was then also pursuing his studies at that University. There was a strong congeniality of tastes between them both being addicted to what Burns calls the "sin of rhyme," but while the one was merely making a pastime of the "divine art," it was the other's chief study, and he has

When Campbell at Glasgow for Edinburgh, his friend Paul made this prophetic remark to him, 'Thomas [and our excellent and reverend friend], I receive from the way that poetry is deepening upon you, that, whatever other profession you attempt, it will be the one by which you will yet be distinguished. CAPTAIN DAVIDSON, of MUIRHOUSE.
From the London Courier.

The following singlar and romantic details relative to this gentleman have reached from authentic sources :—

“Captain Davidson, who was formerly an officer in the army, succeeded his father in valuable entailed estates of Muirhouse Hall, in the county of Edinburgh, some years ago. He was previously married, and had a large family of seven children. After his suc-

tion he mortgaged his life interest in the un-
improved estates so deeply, that he had almost
surplus, and his life was insured with vari-
ous insurance companies to the amount of
\$20,000. He executed a deed of settlement,
in his affairs, to take effect at his death, in
favor of Mr. Cunningham, the present Sa-
vor General for Scotland, Mr. James Simp-
son, of the Scotch bar, and Mr. Andrew

In the Summer of the year 1834 he passed his days in Herne Bay, and all the world heard, as was intimated in the public journals, that he was drowned there when bathing from the outer end of the pier.

It was so strong that the insurance companies paid the £18,000, taking obligations from those from whom the payments were made to refund and priority from some of them to do so, in case of Captain Davidson's re-appearance. His eldest son was seized heir by a jury before whom evidence on oath, as to the circumstances in which Captain Davidson's death was inflicted, was laid. His son accordingly entered into possession of the entailed estates, borrowed £2,000

American capitalists will no doubt, give their assistance too; and we cannot but think that this consideration as a mere speculation, the stock will be as good, or better, than of some of the

mi-les; and the locality is not by any means of an unfavorable character, and presents no obstacles that may not be overcome easily and expeditiously, and without any very extraordinary outlay. Much greater difficulties are encountered and vanquished continually in the United States; and really, to suffer from a narrow neck of land, which divides two great oceans and interposes a barrier to commerce and navigation, is possibly a better lot than to be situated in a remote and inaccessible spot.

The Government of New Granada seems much disposed to encourage every undertaking calculated to be beneficial to the country and grants of various kinds have been made upon very liberal terms. Though the population is increasing very rapidly, and will continue to do so as long as there is peace, yet the Government gives every encouragement to the emigration of Europeans.

The oath of an Executive Council member was afterwards administered to each of the Members of His Majesty's Council present, viz. the Chief Justice, the Honourables George Wright, Ambrose Lane, Thomas H. Haviland, Robert Hoodson, John Brecken and John Spencer Smith. His Excellency, previous to retiring, directed a Proclamation to be issued announcing his assumption of the Government. On leaving the Court House the guard again presented arms, which furnished the ceremony.

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
