Acres of them in Kent will not be worth discring from the ground.

It is estimated the total increase in wages in the country has been \$5,000,000 a year, or from 25 to 75 cents a day for each man. The strikes for the past year number 144, and in only eight cases were unsuccessful. About \$500,000 was spent in sick and death benefits.

THEY CO DIRECT.

Modus Operandi of London's New Direct Mail to Europe.

Thanks to the efforts of the Board of Trade the people of London have now acquired direct mail connections with Great Britain. Instead of being overhauled and delayed at Hamilton and other intermediate points, the letters posted from this office are assorted, deposited in their respective bags and are not handled in transportation until they arrive at Great Britain. The advantages of these increased postal facilities are too apparent to need comment. The first consignment under the new regulations was dispatched last Wednesday. Owing to the innovation of the direct system, slight alterations and additions have been made in the postoffice to expedite the assortment and other business connected with the change. A new distributing table has been erected with its compartments labeled with the names of the offices to which the letters for Great Britain are consigned. A similar one is in use for the papers. All letters for England are directed to London, with the exception of those for Liverpool. When

for Great Britain are consigned. A similar one is in use for the papers. All letters for England are directed to London, with the exception of those for Liverpool. When the letters are addressed to the city of London the words "London (city)" are attached to the label, and when for other points in England are labeled "London (forward.)" These must be put up in separate packages. All letters for Scotland go to Glasgow for distribution, and similarly those for Ireland are sent to Dublin, with the exception of those for Londonderry. The mails for the continent are consigned to London, and there distributed. On Wednesday the bags are sent to Rimouski, and there taken by the Allan Line, while the heavier mail on Monday goes to New York to be transferred to the steamers as the authorities see fit. All the foreign matter leaving this office for New York is placed in one bag, to be there opened and the different bags handed to the steamship. The weight of the letters and also of the papers contained is entered on a sheet and attached to each bag by a wax seal for the information of the steamship companies. Mails for the least important offices are closed first, then weighed, wrapped up, and after attaching the necessary labels, are thrown into the bag ready for shipment. When a letter or paper is suspected to lack the necessary amount of postage it is carefully weighed, and if found wanting the rate is maked on it, also the number of centimes required to make up the correct postage. According to the agreement of the International Postage Congress held in Berne, Switzerland, it was decided to make all money matters in connection with the covention in francs and centimes, as they are more convenient than the fractional alter or naver in Levet short its.



If a man cannot trust his wife to ociates, and cannot persuade her to do right if at any time he believes her to be doing wrong, it seems to us that confidence between the two cannot exist, and genuine marital happiness must be absent. Moreover, it is more than possible that the ability and disposition of a married woman to choose friends that will reflect credit on the household may be just as great as that of her husband.

No wonder the word "obey" in the mar-riage contract is distasteful to most self-respecting women, when its meaning is twisted by the law-makers so as to place woman in a most humiliating position in a relationship where she should be the queen, not the slave.

The defense was that the defender is a personal friend of the man's wife; that she only called at er desire and with her approval, and has in no way annoyed the plain

The sheriff, in disposing of the novel case, said the house was admittedly the man's property, and that he was undoubtedly entitled to forbid anyone from entering it. But the defender says that she has the consent of the wife. That, it seems, is of no account. "A wife's rights in regard to her husband's house," remarks the judge, "originate in her marriage, and have no existence apart from it. when she marries she promises to obey her husband. If, therefore, she gives a per-mission which he forbids she is breaking the contract of her marriage, and the per-mission she gives is null; and anyone acting on such invalid permission, in the knowledge that it is in defiance of the husband's hibition, is doing an illegal act." The wife need not even be called as a codefender, because she has really no standing apart from her husband's desires. He must be obeyed, and if he is not the court comes to his aid. This is law, but it places married women in the position of serfs—a standing which no self-respecting husband would care to have his wife occupy.

If a man cannot trust his wife to se her associates, and cannot persuade her to do right if at any time he believes her to be doing wrong, it seems to us that confidence between the two cannot exist, and genuine marital happiness must be Moreover, it is more than possible that the ability and disposition of a married woman to choose friends that will reflect credit on the household may be just as great as that of her husband.

No wonder the word "obey" in the marriage contract is distasteful to most self-reting women, when its meaning is twisted by the law-makers so as to place oman in a most humiliating position in a elationship where she should be the queen, not the slave.
