LONDON, MONDAY, JUNE 22. THE MAGNITUDE OF THE BRIT-

ISH EMPIRE. The London Daily Mail signalized Empire Day by publishing a great quantity of data throwing light on the

magnitude of the British Empire.

The area of the Empire is now 13,-000,000 square miles, or more than a fifth of the whole area of land on the the standpat attitude on the tariff. The total population in 1908 is over 400,000,000, or between onefourth and one-fifth the total population of the earth. Of this vast population only a fraction is white, the total number of white inhabitants not exceeding 58,350,000 in the current year. In other words, the empire has six colored inhabitants for every white one. It is not generally known that between 1860 and 1907 the area of the empire increased from 5,850,000 square miles to. 11,445,000. During the same period-less than half a century-the revenue has increased two and a half times, and the volume of trade has been more than trebled.

We note, says the New York Sun, in commenting on the Mail's statistics, that the annual cost of all the defensive forces of the empire is \$455,spent in imperial administration. If we analyze these figures we find that the people of the United Kingdom contributed toward the disbursethe white inhabitants of the empire outside of the British Isles only 12 the Provincial Government. cents. The imperial navy in 1908 fifty-one other battleships, thirty- for Laurier, are basing their calculaeight armored cruisers and seventy- tions on unreliable data. seven other cruisers, besides destroyers, torpedo boats and submarines. The aggregate war strength of the land forces of the empire in 1908 is officially estimated at slightly over 1,-000.000.

If now we turn to commercial statistics we find that the total value of another victory in England. The day the empire's trade in 1906, the last that Great Britain decides against year for which detailed data are free trade means the beginning of the obtainable, reached \$7,630,000,000 for imports and exports combined. The adian products. total intra imperial trade fell only a little short of \$2,000,000,000, or about 26 per cent of the whole commerce, foreign and intra imperial. The shipping of the empire is almost exactly the powers in the world. In 1906 it consisted of 10,340,000 tons of steam vessels and 2,450,000 tons of sailing vessels. To this aggregate Canada contributed 661,000 tons and Australia's share was 368,000 tons.

The total revenues of the empire now amount to \$1,400,000,000 annually. while the aggregate debt exceeds \$7,-500,000,000. Of the self-governing states of the empire Canada is the least taxed and the least indebted, whereas taxation and debt are highest in New Zealand. For play time or morning wear, this little apron and bloomers will be found not only comfortable for the little ones but economic t for the mother, as they save laundry bills and may be made of left over pieces or inexpensive

The apron is a plain sack style closed at the back and having sash ties extending from the under-arm seams and tied in a bow over the closing. It is made of figured cambric. A turnover collar in two sections with rounding low er corners is a pretty neck finish and is bor dered with a tiny frill of edging. The long bishop sleeves have their wristbands finished with similar frills.

The bloomers are closed at the sides and are gathered at the top to bands, in which button-holes are worked to attach the garment to the under-waist. They are drawn in about the knees by elastic in the hems. The apron and bloomers may be of like or different material. The pattern is in 4 sizes—2 to 8 years. Sharkey then went to the United States district attorney's office in the Postoffice Building. From there the commandant's office at the Navy Yard was communicated with and soon word came over the wire that Sharkey was not wanted by the authorities.


