HERE'S WHAT GROCERY EXPERT HAS TO SAY OF OUTI

The following comment on the market situation as regards foodstuffs will appear in Canadian Grocer this week:

Of primary interest to the grocery trade during the week was the announcement of prices for the 1917 salmon pack. It was generally expected prices would be high, and in this there was no disappointment. Owing to the disappointingly small pack there will be only a percentage delivery by the packers. In the case of one-pound sockeye tins there will be only 9 per cent of orders delivered, while in sockeye half-pound tins there will be only 40 per cent delivery. On cohoe salmon there will be 10 per cent delivery on one-pound and 40 per cent on half-pound tins. On pink salmon there will be the best delivery of any of the brands, namely, 50 per cent on one-pound and 100 per cent on half-pounds.

Bacon To Be Bought Like Cheese.

Bacon To Be Bought Like Cheese. Rumors of an embargo on the ex-ort of bacon from Canada are not with the provision trade. It is pointed out that Great Britain needs been heavier during the past week, but has not been sufficient to make the price recede. Butter prices re-mained unchanged. Pasture is now in excellent shape and production of creamery butter and cheese should be greatly facilitated throughout Ontario.

Many Slight Advances.

Advances have been recorded on jams, baking powder, lobsters, tapica and sago, herbs, sulphur, tobacco, tomato soups. Manitoba flour was another commodity in which a decline was registered, a clean drop of \$1 per barrel taking place. This was induced by reason of a 20-cemt decline in wheat. 

OTTAWA, Sept. 6 .- By the war service franchise act, brought down by the Government today, it is estimated that to the four hundred thousand soldier votes, there has been added the votes of six hundred thousand women retailed to soldiers. This will constitute not less than a million military votes, and is expected to figure largely in the results of the election. While the bill enfranchises one class of persons in Canada, it disfranchises another, namely, persons of birth in alien enemy countries, who have taken naturalization

within the last fifteen years. It is noted that the franchise has been extended to the women connection of the soldiers who have gone overseas, not to those still in Canada. This would mean that the women relatives of the men taken under the conscription act will not have the right to vote.

The disenfranchisement of aliens is expected to have a considerable effect upon the result of the election in a number of the western constituencies. The indications are that there will be a stiff fight put up over the measure in the Commons and that this may be continued in the Senate if the bill is put through the former house by the application of closure. Parliament has just a month of statutory life left in it, and there is some speculation as to whether the measure will succeed in that time.

I propose that any member of this House who will preach sedition as this honorable gentleman is doing, will not be heard in this House," In the turmoil of cross-firing back and forth Senator Choquette was called "pro-German." Sir James Lougheed declared: "If you had given expression to these sentiments in Europe there would have been a firing squad called out."



There will be no baby welfare exhibit this year at the Western Fair. Much disappointment is felt on the part of those who are interested in infant welfare work, and realize something of its patriotic as well as humanitarian importance. It was only within the past few days it was learned that this feature, to have been one of the "attractions," had been withdrawn. It seems all the more regrettable from the fact that this is the jubilee year, the 50th anniversary of the inauguration of what has become known far and wide as "the great and glorious Western Fair." Nobody can dare to doubt the tremendous service the Western Fair in the fifty years of its existence has rendered in the way of raising the standard of "live stock," of pigs, and horses, of sheep and cattle, and of chickens. The 50th anniversary year would have afforded the Western Fair a fine opportunity for revealing its up-to-dateness by giving prominence to an educational feature which would stand for nothing more nor less than better, healthier and consequently happier babies, babies with a better chance to achieve maturity and to reach robust manhood and womanhood and useful citizenship.

"Pigs is pigs," these days, with food prices cracking the sky-line, and beef and bacon imperatively needed to feed the soldiers, Britain and her allies. So "is" cattle and sheep for that matter.

But surely these are not more important than the human beings to whom God gave dominion over the creatures!

Nobody needs to be reminded of the way the Canadian citizenship has been depleted by the ravages of war. It is too real, too personal, a matter to be ever entirely absent from the mind. But there is something that many otherwise very wise people have failed to grasp, and that is the supreme importance of conserving and cherishing the life which remains.

This is the reason why a child welfare exhibit has achieved, an even greater importance than in the years before the great war.

The outstanding reason why exhibitors are so eager to secure space at the Western Fair is because they are thereby assured of bringing their wares to the attention of great throngs of people representing an enormous constituency. This is why a child welfare exhibit at the Western Fair just at this time is of supreme importance. The Western Fair affords an opportunity of reaching and awakening the interest of a great constituency.

To be sure, a child welfare exhibit involves a considerable amount of expense. So do judging rings for cattle and horses and improvements in stables. Far be it from the writer to countenance cruelty to animals, still, it might be possible to do them justice and at the same time to be able to do something towards awakening the public to the importance of conserving the lives and rais ng the standard of health and efficiency of the future supporters, and perhaps even directors of the Western Fair.

8,000 BABIES SAVED IN YEAR.

Some people regard better babies' exhibits and infant welfare work as merely fads, and not worthy the attention of "sensible" people. What good does it all do anyway, they want to know. Still others of the very orthodox variety exhibit a somewhat shocked attitude when the subject of "reducing infant mortal-ity" or "cutting down the death rate of babies" is mentioned. For the benefit of the skeptical and also for those who think that talk about cutting down the death rate of bables is akin to flying in the face of Providence, the following quotation is given from a paper read by an eminent American

physician at a Canadian medical gathering: "Among the fields of public health of the present day, there is none so important, none which is fraught with such beneficent possibilities of practical life-saving as that which deals with the prevention of infant mortality. The campaign carried on in New York City has reduced the infant mortality rate from 154 in 1906 to 93 in 1916, a reduction which amounts to a saving in that city of over 8,000 lives in a year. Recent attempts by Chapin and by Schneider to estimate the relative value of various lines of public health endeavor have led both authorities to estimate that infant welfare work offers one-fifth of the total possibilities of life-saving which are open to the health department; and I believe that they are undoubtedly correct in their conclusions.'

WANTED-TESTED THRIFT RECIPES.

Have you in your possession a recipe for bread, buns, biscuits, muffins, etc., in which catmeal, commeal or some other substitute is used instead of wheat? In connection with the food conservation campaign in London, the local committee proposes to publish a little booklet of recipes which will prove helpful to every housewife who pledges herself to support the food conservation movement and the efforts of the food controller to meet the needs of Britain and her allies

in the way of wheat, beef and bacon.

It is only intended to include in the booklet recipes which are absolutely guaranteed by experiment, and which are calculated to carry out the food conservation plans and also to keep within bounds as far as possible the cost of living. Any readers of this page who have such tried and tested recipes are asked to co-operate with the food conservation committee by sending them to

the chairman, Mrs. Williams, "Bishopstowe." The "Ordinary Person" contributed some most valuable suggestions to this department a few weeks ago. Surely there are others also who have in their pos-session favorite recipes which are economical and meet the need of the hour for conservation of wheat, of beef and of bacon.

"IT'S DELICIOUS"-THIS WAR BREAD.

If your baker in the near future offers you a loaf of "Wartime Brown Bread" don't be afraid to try it. And don't imagine you are making a patriotic sacrifice in accepting it. If it turns out as well as when manufactured in the home kitchen, your family will soon be crying out its preference for wartime brown bread, and regarding white flour bread as somewhat insipid in comparison, excepting for the sake of variety.

The local food conservation committee isn't doing its work by halves, nor is content that its whole mission will be performed with the enrollment of the London housewives in the food conservation army of Canada.

A task which the executive has set itself has been that of interviewing the

pakers in regard to the manufacturing of wartime bread, and asking them to ry absolutely guaranteed recipes. The following is one which Mrs, David Williams, "Bishopstowe," chairman of the local committee of the Women's Auxiliary to the Organization of Resources Committee, and appointed last week a member of the central executive, is bringing to the attention of the bakers:

WARTIME BROWN BREAD.

- "2 cups rolled oats. "1 cup Roman meal.
- "1 cup cornmeal.
- "1 quart boiling water.
- "1 tablespoonful molasses or corn syrup.
- "1 tablespoonful shortening. "1 tablesponful milk.
- "1 yeast cake.

"Pour the boiling water over the rolled oats and Roman meal and, when lukewarm, add yeast cake, which has been soaked in water half an hour. Add other ingredients and proceed as with ordinary bread, adding enough white flour to make proper consistency. Make into four loaves and bake an hour or a little more than

Mrs. Williams emphasizes the importance of making the loaves small enough order that they will cook through thoroughly without the crust becoming too

John I. A. Hunt, one of the delegates who represented London at the Provincial Women's Food Conservation Convention held in Toronto in July, has been good enough to furnish another recipe for "Wartime Bread." Like Mrs. Williams' bread, it is declared by those who have sampled it to be "simply

The recipe has been tried in Goderich as well as in London, and has aroused enthusiastic approval there. It is as follows:

"2 cups rolled oats, seald and allow to get cool. "1 yeast cake, 1 tablespoonful of molasses and 1 tablespoonful of shortening, 1 quart of lukewarm water and 1 dessert spoonful of salt.

'2 cups cornmeal, mixed with a sufficient quantity of flour to make the proper consistency. "This quanity will make four good loaves, which represent real household economy as well as patriotic


