KITCHENER AT CAPE TOWN

Given a Great Public Ovation on his Arrival---Presented With Address.

Briton and Boers are Shaking Hands--No Vindictiveness to be Shown Rebels.

Cape Town, June 23-Lord Kitchener eceived a great public ovation on his arrival here to-day. The town was decorated, the streets were lined with troops, and the mayor and corporation welcomed the British commander at the town hall, and presented him with an address.

In the course of his reply Lord Kitchener, referring to the country of his nativity, paid a special tribute to the services of the Irish troops during the war in South Africa.

Subsequently at a luncheon, in accepting the presentation of a sword of honor, Lord Kitchener took the responsibility of having enforced martial law in Cape Colony... He declared t had prevented a general rebellion by stopping the dissemination of lies. Now, he asked for the suppression of racial feeling and all leagues and bonds. Briton and Boer had had a good fight, and were now shaking hands. Lord Kitchener also said his hearers could be sure that the rebels would not be dealt with vindictively.

KING EDWARD VII--GOD SAVE OUR KING.

Majesty appeared to be in his usual health. With the return of the court to London from Windsor to-day, the festival of the coronation of King Edward may be said to have com-Edward may be said to have commenced, and each day until midnight Saturday, when the last gun of the royal salute will be fired by the fleet at Spithead, will furnish its quota of Valuthe Royal envoy. royal salute will be fired by the fleet at Spithead, will furnish its quota of the attractions which promise to make

the week memorable. A big throng took the apportunity of greeting the King and Queen in their entry into the capital and semistate progress to Buckingham Palace, Accompanied by Prince and Princess Charles of Denmark, their Majesties reached Paddington at 12.30 p. m., and proceeded in semi-state landaus, drawn by four horses with postillions, preceded by outriders, and attended by an escort of the Royal Bragoon Guards, along the route usually fol-lowed by the late Queen Victoria. The thoroughfares were thickly lined with people, and the enthusiasm of the spectators evidenced their delight at the ocular proof of the recovery of the King from his recent indisposition. Rigorous police precautions were tak-en at the railroad station, but the public managed to invade the bridges crossing the track, and the arrival of

ANOTHER CONFESSION.

The evidence of fraud in the North Grey election collected by the Globe's own reporter was so overwhelming that that journal has been compelled to concede that the Conservative cardidate suffered by the act of the Liberal returning officer or his deputies. But it would lessen the effect of the exposure of the Liberal machine operation and asks for exact evidence of other cases of fraud. Not so that good old Liberal journal, the Huntingdon Gleaner, that has no soft words for erime at the ballot box, even when committed to promote the interest of the New Liberalism. It made no bones of telling Judge Lacoste that he had not given Brunet his just deserts when he sent him to prison for six months for stuffing ballot bozes for his uncle in the Brunet-Bergeron election in the St. James division, Montreal. Of the house. frauds in the Ontario election of May 29 the Gleaner says :-

"The examination of the ballot boxes in the many recounts held in Ontario has shown a surprising number of irregularities. Part were evidently due to ignorance on the part of the deputy returning officers, who had been appointed from party motive and not on account of their competence. Making a fair allowance on this score, there remains undoubted proof that many deputy returning officers deliberately used their position to secure the defeat of the Conservative candi dates. Ballots were tampered with as to their marking and many ballots made illegal by the returning officers not initialing them correctly. Public opinion ought to have sufficient force to ensure the punishment of these men who played with a public trust."

FOR NATIONAL UNITY.

Geography and local interests make strongly for division in the national life of Canada, and it is only by the fostering and directing of those forces that make for unity that Confederation can be maintained and the highest destiny of Canada fulfilled. Chief among those unifying forces is the Church. ' More vital than transcontinental railways, more positive than protective tariffs, the Church binds East and West in common sympathy and common purposes for the attainment of common ends.

Such great inter-provincial gatherings as the General Assembly, or the General Conferences, or the General Synod, the chief courts of the Presbyterian, Methodist, and Anglican Churches, have an indirect but very powerful and far-reaching influence on the national life of Canada, forming friendships, stimulating the interchange of thought, and in secret and silent but very real ways binding into one lives which but for such meetings would be forever sundered by the whole breath of the continent alike

in sympathy and interest. At the General Assembly during the past week the leaders of thought and activity, clerical and lay, from Nova Scotia and from British Columbia conferred together on the same committees and in public discussion as to the best solution of some of the great and vital problems in our educational, social, and religious life. And the significant and altogether hopeful thing was that not once was any local jealousy manifested. The men from Nova Scotia who opposed Confederation, and who suffered loss by the National Policy, were as enthusiastic in their Canadianism, and as eager to promote the interests of Western Canada, as any members of the Assembly. They feel as keenly as any Westerner the criticalness of the present time in the development of New Ontario and the West, and they are ready to give men and money for the highest good of the district remotest from themselves. This is indeed a great force making

And not in the great annual gatherings alone, but in the administration of the great activities of the Church, the interests of national unity are served. Ottawa, Ont., June 23 .- How closely the Boer war has been linking the people of Canada with those of the mother country may be gathered to some slight extent from a letter written by the Hon. Mrs. Edith Littleton Gell, sister of Mrs. Brodrick, British secretary of war, to Miss Ruby Rothwell, one of the lady teachers from Canada. You stood to us in Oxford-indeed, in England-for something which is to us invaluable. When our hearts stood still in the agony of those first months of disaster in the war, your best and bravest claimed it as their privilege to stand beside our beloved in defense of our empire; and now that the no less noble task of reconstruction and enlightenment is to the fore the womanhood of Canada has been no less ready to share with the womanhood of England in the task, without which the sacrifice of our sons would be vain.

It is too true that England has not always understood her daughters, but those days have been 'purged with blood' and can never return. The links between us are forged indissolubly by gallant lives and heroic deaths, and I know you must feel that here it was a home welcome which awaited you. We feel you are our kin, and we look to you-knowing we shall not look in vain to aid us in carrying to the uttermost parts of the Empire the traditions of which Oxford is, in a sense, the age-long repository. God bless you all in your high emprise."

American lady readers will note with interest Miss Rothwell's remarks about the London society ladies. She was taken with her companions to the Hon. Irs Alfred Lyttleton's beautiful historical house overlooking Westminster school close to tea. HEART STIMULANT.

There is a deep seated belief amount ing almost to a superstition that alcohol is a very important heart stimulant, especially when this organ is weak. Winternitz, the great authority on hydrotherapy in Germany, has often told us of the very great value of cold as a heart stimulant or tonic and that it is far superior to alcohol in this respect. Dr. Kellogg gives the

method of application as follows: "The application consists of a compress applied to the portion of the chest wall over the heart. This com prises the space bounded by the second rib above, the right border of the sternum, a line falling a half inch to the right of the nipple and the sixth rib below. The compress should be large enough to cover this space and to extend at least two inches outside of it. Ordinarily the best effects are produced by employing water at a temperature of about 60 degrees. The compress should be wrung moderately dry and should be very lightly covered. It is desirable that cooling by slow evaporation should be encouraged and be continued for some time."

Dr. Kellogg continues: "In Germany and France it is the custom to administer alcohol to the patient just before putting him in a cold bath. Some practitioners, as Winternitz, administer but a very small amount, a single mouthful of wine, for instance, while others give brandy in considerable quantities. A few American practitioners employ brandy freely with the cold bath. The unwisdom of this practice will be apparent on due consideration of the following facts:

"One purpose in administering the cold bath is to secure a true stimulant or tonic effect by arousing the vital energies through excitation of the nerve centers. Alcohol was once supposed to be capable of effecting this and was used for this purpose in typhoid fever and various other morbid conditions accompanied by depression of the vital forces. At the present time, however, it is well known, and with practical unanimity admitted, that alcohol is neither a tonic nor a stimulant, but a narcotic; that it de presses and does not excite; that it lessens and does not increase the activity of the nerve centers, and that this is true of small as well as large doses, as has been shown by the researches of careful investigators."

ORCHARD AND GARDEN.

Give the roots of trees a deep and broad bed of soil to start and grow in. In pruning the grape cut back to the third bud, as it is usually the first entirely perfect bud produced.

When winds prevail from any direction, as they usually do, lean the tree a little in that direction when setting out. The essentials in making a good garden are rich soil, plenty of manure, good seeds, timely labor and a fair sea-

Having the soil in a good tilth and planting in straight rows will save much labor in cultivating in the gar-One of the best ways of getting rid of

moss and lichens adhering to the bark of trees is an application of lime white-In taking trees from a nursery or for-

est, preserve all of the roots and fine rootlets possible. Dig out instead of pulling up the tree. When the fruit or leaves of any plant

or tree are eaten by insects of any kind, spraying in good season and sufficiently often is the safest and best remedy. Gladiolus bulbs should be planted in full sunshine, four or five inches deep and about one foot apart. Good soil, rather sandy, is best, avoiding manure, especially if fresh.

GUR FROG FARMERS.

the Industry Is Assuming Large Propo

tions Near Peterbore. Frog farming as an industry is assuming large proportions in parts of Canada. Not only are large shipments of frogs' legs made from country to the United States, but there is a growing demand for the luxury in many of the large centres of the Dominion.

Some of the most successful frog farms are on the Otonabee River, in the Courty of Peterboro. Last year they are said to have produced 5,-000 pounds of dressed frogs' legs and 7,000 living frogs for scientific purposes and for stocking other was

The Deputy Commissioner of Fisheries reports that in the past year a number of applications were made to the Government for leases lands suitable for this industry. No licenses were, however, granted, it was found that the territory concerned was already being farmed by number of people.

It is safe to assume that in the very near future much land now idle will be stocked with frogs. All that is necessary for this purpose is place a few paired breeders in the water. Natural food is almost ways present in sufficient amount for

successful growth. The species considered there to be most profitable, on account of its size, is the Eastern bullfrog, Rana catesbiana, which reaches a length of more than eight inches. It begins to breed at the end of three years, is very productive, and reaches a marketable size in four or five years. Only the hind legs are marketed, and they average half a pound a pair in weight. They are worth 50 cents a pound, at times, to the producer, and American dealers take as many as Canada can supply.

OPERATION SUCCESSFUL

CHAPTER XIII.



Poe and the French. The keener appreciation in Europe of literature as a fine art is no doubt the other single disorder. main reason why Poe is looked upon over there as our most noteworthy poet. Poe certainly had a more consummate art than any other American singer, and his productions are more completely the outcome of that art. They are literary feasts. "The Raven" was as deliberately planned and wrought out as is any piece of mechanism. Its inspiration is verbal and technical. "The truest poetry is most feigning," says Touchstone, and this is mainly the conception of poetry that prevails in European literary circles. Poe's poetry is artistic feigning, like good acting. It is to that extent disinterested. He does not speak for himself, but for the artistic spirit. He has never been popular in this country, for the reason that art, as such, is far less appreciated here than abroad. The stress of life here is upon the moral and intellectual elements much more than upon the æsthetic. We demand a message of the poet or that he shall teach us how to live. Poe had no message but that of art. He made no contribution to our stock of moral ideas; he made no appeal to the conscience or manhood of the race: he did not touch the great common workaday mind of our people. He is more akin to the Latin than to the Anglo-Saxon; hence his deepest impression seems to have been made upon the French mind.-John Burroughs



In the meantime the employes may hold a meeting, to be called under the auspices of the Board of Trade committee, and if the majority of the regular and relief men vote by ballot to substitute the scale of eighteen cents per aour for first eighteen cents per aour for first year of service and twenty cents thereafter, the company will substi-tute it for the present scale.

"The company will not interfere with the freedom of the employees to organize under any form of constitution, but the company decline to give recognition to the union or to receive a grievance committee from the union, but any employe who may have been suspended or dismissed, or who may suspended or dismissed, or who may have any other grievance shall have the right of an appeal in person to the general manager, and to bring with him such of his fellow employes or other witnesses who may have any knowledge of the facts and circumstances of the case.

"The company agree that the cars shall be cleaned for the motormen and conductors in the morning, but

and conductors in the morning, but that the motormen and conductors will report fifteen minutes ahead of time, as at present, without additional pay, and will keep the inside and platforms cleaned as formerly while on duty. That on Sunday the increase shall be such as to make the day day equal to a working day in the

THE MAYOR JUSTIFIES HIS

COURSE. Mayor Howland this evening made statement in justification of the calling out of such a large force. "The bringing in of the militia," he said, had taught the rowdy element that there was a power behind the police and that the hoodlumism which pre-vailed during portions of Sunday would not be tolerated." The Mayor hought that the presence of the soldiers had had a good effect, but lit had also shown that the railway company was not at all prepared for strike. It seemed to him that the company had gone ahead with the expectation that the city would not be able to furnish protection for the running of the cars and that it had not enough men to operate them in time of strike. The company had evidently intended to call upon the city for protection, feeling certain that it would not be given, and that the responsibility for the failure to run the cars would lie with the city. The municipality had badly upset this calculation by providing a force am-ply sufficient to furnish complete protection. Then the company had realized its position, and had apparently been more willing to seek other means

for ending the trouble. THE COST OF THE STRIKE.

The cost in money of the strike is as follows:-To the company, abou \$15,300 in car earnings lost by the three days' stoppage, and probably \$20,000 spent in securing and bringing to the city non-union men, many of whom refused to work afterwards and \$2,000 by way of destruction of property. The employes lose about \$6,000 in wages. The city's loss is probably \$10,000, the cost of moving 700 cavalry men from Niagara campand back again, and the cost of calland back again, and the cost of calling out and maintaining 700 men of the city regiments for the day. WHAT THE COMPANY OFFERED.

The company offered 17 cents for first year men, 19 for men up to five years' service, 20 from five to ten years, and 21 cents after ten years. The negotiations for settlement continued most of the night, and were resumed at the Board of Trade at 10 o'clock this morning, being conclude just before noon.

TROOPS WILL NOT BE NEEDED. The company made no attempt to operate cars this morning, the civil authorities having notified the officials that no protection could be given until the savalry arrived from Nia-gara. The men of the city infantry regiments mustered at 7 o'clock some 670 strong. They were held in the armories as a reserve force. The
