



INFORMATION FOR CANDIDATES.

THE ANNUAL EXAMINATION for Cadetship in the Royal Military College will take place at the Military Headquarters of the several Military Districts in which candidates reside, in June of each year. Evidence satisfactory to the Headquarters Board of Examiners of Matriculation in the Faculty of Arts, within the previous 12 months, will be accepted in lieu of passing the obligatory examination. Such matriculants will rank, for admission to the College, in alphabetical order after those who pass the obligatory examination.

In addition to the facilities the College offers for an education in Military Subjects, the course of instruction is such as to afford a thoroughly practical, scientific and sound training in all departments which are essential to a high and general modern education.

The Civil Engineering Course is complete and thorough in all branches. Architecture forms a separate subject.

The Course of Physics and Chemistry is such as to lead towards Electrical Engineering, Meteorological Service, and other departments of applied science.

The Obligatory Course of Surveying includes what is laid down as necessary for the profession of Dominion Land Surveyor. The Voluntary Course comprises the higher subjects required for the Degree of Dominion Topographical Surveyor. Hydrographic Surveying is also taught.

Length of Course three years.

Five Commissions in the Imperial Regular Army are at present awarded annually.

Board and instruction, \$100 for each term, consisting of ten months' residence.



HISTORICAL HAPPENINGS.

Following are the dates and events connected with the discovery and history of Canada:—

1497—June 24. Cabot discovered Cabe Breton.

1500. Gasper Cortereal entered the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

1517. Sebastian Cabot discovered Hudson Bay.

1524. Verrazano explored the Atlantic coast of Nova Scotia.

1534. June 21. Landing of Jacques Cartier at Esquimaux Bay. First landing on Canadian soil.

1535. July. Second visit of Cartier. August 10. Cartier anchored in a small bay at the mouth of St. John River, which in honor of the day he named after St. Lawrence. The name was afterwards extended to the gulf and river.

1540. Third visit of Cartier. 1542-43. The Sieur de Roberval and his party wintered at Cap Rouge.

1598. The Marquis de la Roche landed 40 convicts on Sable Island, where they were left for five years without relief, only twelve being found alive at the end of that time. First attempt to colonize Acadia.

1603. First visit of Samuel de Champlain to Canada.

1605. Founding of Port Royal (Annapolis). Acadia (derived from an Indian word, "Cadie," a place of abundance), by the Baron de Poutr'incourt.

1608. Second visit of Champlain. Founding of Quebec, the first permanent settlement of Canada. The name is said to be an Indian one. "Kebec," a strait. Twenty-eight settlers wintered there, including Champlain. Acadia transferred to Virginia.

1775. Outbreak of the American Revolution and invasion of Canada by the Americans; every place of importance rapidly fell into their hands, with the exception of Quebec, in an attack upon which General Montgomery was defeated and killed on 31st December.

Reinforcements arrived from England, and the Americans were finally driven out of Canada.

1777. Order of Jesuits abolished by Papal decree and consequent es-cheat of their estates in Canada

to the Crown.

1778. June 3. First issue of The Mont-real Gazette. This paper is still published. Captain Cook arrived in Nootka Sound and claimed the present North-west coast (British Columbia) for the Crown of Great Britain.

MEANING OF TERMS USED.

In this act, and in any other act relating to customs, unless the context otherwise requires:

have the meaning of the words "not elsewhere specified."

The initials "n. o. p." represent and have the meaning of the words "not otherwise provided for."

The expression "gallon" means an imperial gallon.

The expression "ton" means two

thousand pounds avoirdupois.
The expression "proof" or "proof spirits." when applied to wines or spirits of any kind, means spirits of a strength equal to that of pure ethyl alcohol compounded with distilled water in such proportions that the resultant mixture shall at a temperature of sixty degrees Fahrenheit have a specific gravity of 0.9198, as compared with that of distilled water at the same temperature.

The expression "gauge," when applied to metal sheets, or plates or to wire, means the thickness as deter-

mined by Stubb's standard gauge. The expression "in diameter," v when applied to tubing, means the actual inside diameter.

The expression "sheet," when applied to metals, means a sheet or plate not exceeding three sixteenths of an inch in diameter.

The expression "plate," when applied to metals, means a plate or sheet more than three sixteenths of an inch in thickness.

FISH FROM UNITED STATES AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

The whole or part of the duties hereby imposed upon fish and other products of the fisheries may be remitted as respects either the United States or Newfoundland, or both, upon proclamation of the Governor in Council, which may be issued whenever it appears to his satisfaction that the Governments of the United States and Newfoundland, or either of them, have made changes in their tariffs of duties imposed upon articles imported from of the hydrometer or gravity bottle, Canada, in reduction or repeal of the shall be ascertained by the distillation

EXPORT OF GAME PROHIBITED.

The export of deer, wild turkeys. quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock, in the carcase or parts thereof, is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited; and to any person exporting or attempting to export any such article shall for each offence incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be exported shall be The initials "n. e. s." represent and forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export, be seized by any officer of the customs, and, if such intention is proved, shall be dealt with as for breach of the customs laws: Provided that this section shall not apply to the export, under such regulations as are made by the Governor in Council, of any carcase or part thereof of any deer raised or bred by any person, company or association of persons, upon his or their own lands.

DUTIES ON MOLASSES AND SYRUPS.

Regulations respecting the manner in which molasses and syrups shall be sampled and tested for the purpose of determining the classes to which they belong, with reference to the duty chargeable thereon, shall be made by the Controller of Customs, and the instruments and appliances necessary for such determination shall be designated by him and supplied to such officers as are by him charged with the duty of sampling and testing such molasses and syrups; and the decision of any officer (to whom is so assigned the testing of such articles) as to the duties to which they are subject under the tariff shall be final and conclusive, unless upon appeal to the Commissioner of Custom within thirty days from the rendering of such decision, such decision, is with the approval of the Controller, changed and the decision of the Commissioner with such approval shall be final.

DUTIES ON WINES AND SPIRITS

In the case of all wines, spirits, or alcoholic liquors subject to duty accord ing to their relative strength of proof such strength shall be ascertaine either by means of Sykes' hydrometer or of the specific gravity bottle, as the Controller of Customs directs; and case such relative strength cannot b correctly ascertained by the direct us

MEDICINAL AND TOILET PREPARATIONS

imported for completing the manufacture thereof, or for the manufacture of any other article by the addition of any ingredient or ingredients, or by mixing such preparations, or by putting up or labelling the same, alone or with other articles or compounds, under any proprietary or special name or trade mark, shall be valued for duty under the provision of sub-section two of section sixty-five of the Customs Act, as amended by section fifteen of chapter fourteen of the statutes of 1888.

MEDICINAL PREPARATIONS T BE LABELLED.

All medicinal preparations, whether chemical or other, usually imported with the name of the manufacturer, shall have the true name of such manufacturer and the place where they are prepared, and the word "alcoholic" or "non-alcoholic" permanently and legibly affixed to each parcel by stamp, label or otherwise; and all medicinal preparations imported without such names and words so affixed may be forfeited.

DUTY ON PACKAGES.

Packages shall be subject to the following provisions:

All bottles, flasks, jars, demijohns, carboys, casks, hogsheads, pipes, bar-rels and all other vessels or packages, manufactured of tin, iron, lead, zinc, glass, or any other material capable of holding liquids, and all packages in which goods are commonly placed for home consumption, including cases, not otherwise provided for, in which bottled spirits, wines or malt liquors or other liquids are contained, and every package being the first receptacle or covering enclosing goods for the purpose of sale, shall in all cases, not otherwise provided for, in which they contain goods subject to an ad valorem duty, or a specific and ad valorem duty, be charged with the same rate of ad valorem duty as is to be levied and collected on the goods they contain, and the value of the packages may be included in the value of such goods.

All such packages as aforesaid containing goods subject to a specific duty only, and not otherwise provided for, shall be charged with a duty of twenty per cent. ad valorem.

Packages not hereinbefore specified,

and not herein specially charged with or declared liable to duty, and being the usual and ordinary packages in which goods are packed for exportation, according to the general usage and custom of trade, shall be free of duty.

All such special packages or coverings as are of any use, or apparently designed for use other than in the importation of the goods they contain, shall be subject to the same rate of duty as would thereon be levied if imported empty or separate from their contents. Packages (inside or outside) containing free goods shall be exempt from duty when the packages are of such a nature that their destruction is necessary in order to release the goods.

PENALTY FOR HAVING BLANK INVOICE WITH CERTIFICATE OF CORRECTNESS.

Any person who, without lawful excuse, the proof of which shall be on the person accused, sends or brings into Canada, or who, being in Canada, has in his possession any bill-heading or other paper appearing to a heading or blank capable of being filled up and used as an invoice, and bearing any certificate purporting to show, or which may be used to show, that the invoice which may be made from such billheading or blank is correct or authentic, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to a penalty of five hundred dollars, and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding twelve months, in the discretion of the court, and the goods entered under any invoice made from any such bill-heading or blank shall be forfeited.

AFFIDAVIT OF IMPORTER CLAIM-ING LOWER RATE OF DUTY ON CERTAIN GOODS.

With respect to goods imported for manufacturing purposes that are admissible under this Act for any specific purposes at a lower rate of duty than would otherwise be chargeable, or exempt from duty, the importer claiming such exemption from duty, or proportionate exemption from duty, shall make and subscribe to the following affidavit or affirmation before the collector of customs at the port of entry, or before a notary public or a commissioner for taking affidavits:

I, (name of importer) the undersigned, importer of the (names of the goods or articles) mentioned in this entry, do solemnly (swear or affirm) that such (names of the goods or articles) are imported by me for the

manufacture of (names of the goods to be manufactured) in my own factory, situated at (name of the place, county and Province), and that no portion of the same will be used for any other purpose or disposed of until so manufactured.

RECIPROCAL TARIFF.

When the custms tariff of any country admits the products of Canada on terms which, on the whole, are as favorable to Canada as the terms of the reciprocal tariff herein referred to are to the countries to which it may apply, articles which are the growth, produce, or manufacture of such country, when imported direct therefrom, may then be entered for duty, or taken out of warehouse for consumption in Canada, at the reduced rates of duty provided in the reciprocal tariff set forth in schedule D to this Act.

Any question arising as to the countries entitled to the benefits of the reciprocal tariff shall be decided by the Controller of Customs subject to the authority of the Governor-in-Council.

The Governor-in-Council may extend the benefits of the reciprocal tariff to any country entitled thereto by virtue of a treaty with Her Majesty.

The Controller of Customs may make such regulations as are necessary for carrying out the intention of this section.

TRUSTS AND COMBINES.

Whenever the Governor-in-Council has reason to believe that with regard to any article of commerce there exists any trust, combination, association or agreement of any kind among manufacturers of such article or dealers therein, to unduly enhance the price of such article or in any other way to unduly promote the advantage of the manufacturers or sale at the expense of the consumers the Governorin-Council may commission or empower any Judge of the Supreme Court or Exchequer Court of Canada or of any Superior Court in any Province of Canada to enquire in a summary way into and report to the Governorin-Council whether such trust, combination, association or agreement ex-

The judge may compel the attendance of witnesses and examine them under oath and require the production of books and papers, and shall have such other necessary powers as are conferred upon him by the Governorin-Council for the purposes of such enquiry.

If the judge reports that such trust, combination, association or agreement exists, and if it appears to the Governor-in-Council that such disadvantage to the consumers is facilitated by the duties of customs imposed on a like article, when imported, then the Governor-in-Council shall place such article on the free list, or so reduce the duty on it as to give to the public the benefit of reasonable competition in such article.

THE FRENCH TREATY.

I beg to send forthwith, for your information and guidance, text of a proclamation by the Governor-in-Council, dated the 10th day of October, 1895, declaring the provisions of the French Treaty Act in force on, from and after

the 14th October, 1895.
You are hereby advised that the said
Act provides as follows:

"Wines, sparkling and non-sparkling, common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soap), and nuts, almonds, prunes and plums of French origin entering Canada shall enjoy the following advantages:

1. Non-sparkling wines gauging 15 degrees by the centesimal alcoholometer or less, or according to the Canadian system of testing, containing 26 per cent. or less of alcohol, and all sparkling wines shall be exempted from the surtaxe or ad valorem duty of 30 per cent.

2. The present duty charged on common soaps, savons de Marseille (Castile soaps) shall be reduced by one-

3. The present duty charged on nuts, almonds, prunes and plums shall be reduced by one-third.

The following articles of Canadian origin imported direct from that counaccompanied by certificates of origin shall receive the advantage of the minimum tariff on entering France, Algeria or the French colonies: Canned meats.

Condensed milk, pure.

Fresh water fish, eels. Fish preserved in their natural form, Lobsters and crayfish preserved in their natural form.

Apples and pears, fresh, dried or pressed.

Fruits preserved, others.

Building timber in rough or sawn. Wood pavement.

Staves.

Wood pulp (cellulose). Extract of chestnut and other tanning extracts.

Common paper, machine-made. Prepared skins, others, whole.

Boots and shoes. Furniture of common wood. Furniture other than chairs, of solid wood, common.

Flooring in pine or soft wood. Wooden sea-going ships.

It is understood that the advantage of any reduction of duty granted to any other power on any of the articles enmerated above shall be extended

Your attention is also directed to the following provisions of "An Act respecting Commercial Treaties affecting Canada," Chap. 3, 58—59 Vict., viz.:

"1. So soon as the French Treaty Act, 1894, chapter two of the Statutes of 1894, is brought into force by proclamation of the Governor-General, the advantages granted to France by the treaty with that power mentioned in the said Act, with respect to its com-merce with Canada, shall extend to any and every other foreign power which by reason of the operation of such treaty is, under the provisions of a treaty with Great Britain, entitled, in whole or in part, to the same or to the like advantages with respect to its commerce with Canada, to the extent to which in manner aforesaid such other foreign power is entitled thereto; and such advantages shall continue to so extend to such other foreign power so long as the said Act remains in force, or until the right of such other foreign power to such advantages under its treaty with Great Britain is sooner determined.

3. The advantages so granted to France by the said treaty shall extend also to Great Britain and to the several British colonies and possessions with respect to their commerce with Canada, so long as France continues to be entitled to such advantages; and during the period for which France is so entitled to such advantages, all laws inconsistent with the enjoyment thereof by Great Britain and such British colonies and possessions shall be suspended to the extent to which they are so inconsistent."

The Foreign Powers entitled to the same advantages under the provisions of the said Act, as are granted to France by the treaty in question, with respect to its commerce with Canada, are: Argentine Republic, Austria-Hungary, Muscat, Belgium, Russia, Bolivia, Salvador, Chill, Sweden, Norway, Columbia, Spain, Costa Rica.

Satisfactory proof of the origin of the goods in question shall be furnished to the collector at the time of entry.

RECIPROCAL TARIFF.

On all the products of countries entitled to the benefits of this Reciprocal Tariff, under the provisions of Section 16, the duties mentioned in Schedule "A," dutiable goods, shall be reduced as follows:

On and after the twenty-third day of April, 1897, until the thirteenth day of June, 1898, inclusive, the reduction shall in every case be one eighth of the duty mentioned in Schedule "A," and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be seven eighths of the duty mentioned in Schedule "A," dutlable goods."

On and after the first day of July, 1898, the reduction shall in every case be one fourth of the duty mentioned in Schedule "A," and the duty to be levied, collected and paid shall be three fourths of the duty mentioned in

Schedule "A," dutiable goods. Provided, however, that these reductions shall not apply to any of the following articles, but such articles shall in all cases be subject to the duties mentioned in Schedule "A." viz.: Wines, malt liquors, spirits, spirituous liquors, liquid medicines and articles containing alcohol; sugar, molasses and syrups of all kinds, the product of the sugar cane or beet root; tobacco. cigars and cigarettes.

MANITOBA.

The Province of Manitoba was ac 17 quired by the Dominion of Canada in bu 1870, and therefore ranks amongst the n youngest of the sisters of the great British America continent. Manitoba to is recognized as the Prairie Province and resembles in many respects Ohio hi and Illinois of the United States. is the most regular in geographical features of all the provinces, being nearly a perfect parallelogram shape, 200 miles long from east west. It contains 64,066 square miles d and 9,890 square miles of the of land water. land is a level prairie, lying only 70 feet above the sea and about 80 feet above Lake Winnipeg, and is situated in the very centre of the North American continent. It is a part of the domain granted by Charles II. in 1676 The to the Hudson Bay Company. policy of the company, which exercised territorial authority over the whole North-West, similar to that exercise by the East India Company in India was to retain for themselves the rich trade in furs and the natural products of the region. In pursuance of this policy, the company represented to the world that the region was a land of perpetual ice and snow, unfit for habitation for the white man and only suited to the Indians and the wild animals which they hunted. So persistently was this misrepresentation maintained, and so lasting was the effect, that it was only at a compar atively recent date that the real resources of the Prairie Province became generally known. In 1869, the Hudson Bay Company's charter expired, and they surrendered their territorial rights on the suggestion of Earl Granville to Canada for £300,00 and the province, under the name of Manitoba, entered the Dominion of July 15, 1870. When Manitoba entered Confedera

tion the total population, including strip of land since awarded to On tario, was only 11,963, of whom 10,40 were Indians and half-breeds. In 185 it was 65.954; in 1886 it was 108,640, and in 1896 it had risen to 200,000. Some years since, a Chicago stockraiser visited Manitoba for the pur-pose of seeing the capabilities of the country for raising swine. He reported on his return that the country was all right; but the only question he was debating was as to whether during winter he would have in the swineries self-feeding stoves or furnish every pig with a fur overcoat. This may have been regarded as very witty by the Chinese merchant, but it was a baseless libel on the climate, it is needless to say, as the average of 72,000 swine a year were raised without either fur coats and self-feeders, and as a matter of fact many parts of Manitoba are superior as regards the swine industry to portions of the farfamed Illinois, which find a market for their pigs in Chicago.

Contrary to preconceived ideas and reports industriously promulgated by United States immigration agents, the climate of Manitoba is much milder and decidedly healthier than several States of the American Union further south. This, at first sight, anomalous condition, is partly due to the country being drier in winter, and not so try 1900]

a few degrees higher. Even in Manithan a clear, sunny day when the the year than perhaps any other point on the American continent. Windy days are very rare, cyclones and tornadoes are unknown, and the fluctuations from intense cold to sudden thaws have no existence.

Referring to this question of climate, a young Englishman, who resides in Manitoba, recently said: "It was when I returned to England that I began to appreciate the climate Western Canada. It was not long before I began to realize that I would again require the restorer of the pure air of the prairies, and it was not long before I made up my mind to return. A person who has never been away from England can scarcely understand how a winter with the thermometer registering at times from 20 degrees to 30 degrees below zero (as it sometimes does here), is preferable to the changeable weather which is almost always experienced in England at this season of the year. There is no comparison-the winters of Western Canada being infinitely preferable. When in England last winter, I was forced to endure fog, rain and snow, with very little sunshine thrown in and in all it was most discomforting. With the steady winter here, modified by the small percentage of humidity, your blood has a circulation: vim and energy are acquired, in contrast to which the winters of England are most enervating."

It may be a fact not generally known, and a little startling at first mention, that comparatively little snow falls on the prairies, the average depth being 18 inches, and cattle and sheep can graze out nearly all the winter. Nor need the farmer rely entirely upon wheat. The crops of oats, barley, and peas are always large, sometimes phenomenally so, and can be successfully raised north of the wheat belt. Oats yield from 60 to 90 bushels per acre, and in some cases have been known to exceed a hundred. Owing to the almost continuou: sunshine and the absence of rain during harvest time, barley not only yields enormously, but presents a bright appearance, and is in great demand by brewers and sells for several cents a bushel more than that grown in other countries. The yield of pease is splendid, and there is an absolute freedom from grubs and bugs. They are used for fattening hogs and for other feed and are superior for the purpose to corn. The absence of hog cholera in Manitoba is attributed by experts to the excellent feed, pease taking the place of corn.

The Dominion Government has an Experimental Farm in Manitoba, where different grains have been tested, with the object of establishing what varieties are best suited to the

climate and soil.

As already mentioned, Manitoba presents many attractive features for grazing and cattle raising. The prairle grasses are nutritious and in illimitable abundance, and hay can be cheaply and easily made. The first attempts at dairying, as carried on in the older provinces, were made in Manitoba about 1884; in 1886 there

were six creameries and twenty-sx cheese factories. At the present date the home market is supplied with a

slight surplus for exportation.

No territory can be a wholly desirable place unless the religious and educational requirements of the settlers are satisfied, and Manitoba, notwithstanding its youth, is abundanty supplied with churches, schools and colleges. The Canadians are essentially a religious people. According to the census returns of 1891, there were 10,480 churches in Canada, an increase of 1,828 over the previous decade. Taking the total population, there is a clurch provided for every group of 461 persons; and there are 7,164 clergymen of all denominations, an increase of 735 in ten years. From these facts it may be calculated with certainty that all the religious bodies vied with each other in providing places of worship for their adherents in the new province. In Manitoba there are 30,852 members of the Church of England, 28,437 Methodists, 39,001 Presbyterians, 16,112 Baptists, 39,001 Presbyterians, 16,112 Baptists, 20,571 Roman Catholics, and of other denominations, principally composed of Mormons, Mennonites, Doukhobors and other immigrants from the continent of Europe, 17,533, making a grand total of 152,506. The population of Manitoba in 1896 was 200,000, so that rather more than 76 per cent. of the population were church adherents. When the nomadic nature of the people is considered, the distance many settlers reside from the nearest place of worship, and the number of Indians who are pagans, the religious statistics compare favorably with many old and thickly settled countries.

Under the British North America Act of 1867, the right to legislate on respecting education was matters placed in the hands of the Governments of the several provinces, the rights and privileges of denominational and separate schools then existing being specially protected. In 1883 there were 256 schools in Manitoba, with 246 teachers, a school population of 12,346, the number of pupils, 10,831, and an average attendance of 5,064. In 1887, the number of schools had risen to 464, the number of teachers to 581, the school population to 17,600, the number of pupils to 16,940, and the attendance to 9,715. In 1897 the number of schools was 1,068, the number of teachers 1,197, the school population 51,178, the number of pupils 39,841, tion 51,178, the number of pupils 39,841, every farming district is within easy and the average attendance 21,500. In Ontario, the province which possesses while branches are being extended as

one of the finest educational systems in the world, the total number of pupils registered in 1897 was 482,777, and the average attendance was 273,544, the proportion of attendance out of the registered number of pupils being very nearly the same (53.96 to 56.66) in the new province of Manitoba as in the long established Province of Ontario. This shows that the educational wants of the people are being attended to. and thoroughly appreciated. In 1897 there were in Manitoba four provincial Normal School teachers, nine local Normal School teachers, with an attendance of 143 pupils at the long and 101 pupils at the short sessions. In addition to the common schools and Normal Schools, Collegate Institutes for more advanced education are attached to the Public Schools at Winnipeg, Portage la Prairie, and Winnipeg, Fortage 10 Themselver of pupils enrolled for the year was 554, 86, and 178 respectively. There is also a Normal School in Winnipeg for the training of teachers. The total school receipts for 1897, from Government grants and municipal taxes, were \$825,774, of which \$445,204 went to the teachers as salaries.

The most valuable immigration agents are the railways built to and through a sparsely settled country. The life of Manitoba began with the construction of the Canadian Pacific railway, which was begun in 1881 and was completed four years later. Then immigration began to pour into Manitoba, at first principally from Cntario, but later on from the outer world. In 1898, Manitoba had 1.621 miles of track laid, or an arca of 45.6 square miles of territory to each mile of track laid. Manitoba has 3.2 per cent. of the population of the Dominion, but she has 9.6 per cent. of the railway miles of Canada. A com-parison with Ontario in this respect is instructive, always bearing in mind that Ontario was thickly populated and had large and flourishing cities, towns and villages when Manitoba was the happy hunting ground of the In 1898, Ontario had 6.674 Indians. miles of track laid, or 33.3 square miles of area to each mile of track laid. Ontario's population is 43.7 per cent. of the population of the Dominion, and her railway miles are 39.6 per cent. The information provided by the Government is explicit. Under the Dominion Land Regulations, all sureven-numbered sections (excepting 8 and 26) in Manitoba and the North-West Territories, which have not been homesteaded, reserved to provide wood-lots for settlers. or otherwise disposed of or reserved, are held exclusively for homesteads. A homestead entry for one-quarter section (160 acres) of surveyed agricultural land, open to such entry, may be obtained by any person who is the sole head of a family, or by any male who has attained the age of eighteen years, on application to the local agent of Dominion lands, and on payment of an office fee of \$10. The home-The homesteader must perfect his entry by beginning actual residence on his homestead and the cultivation of a reasonable portion within six months of the date of entry, unless entry shall have been made on or after the first day of September, in which case residence need not commence until the first day of June following, and continue to live upon and cultivate the land for at least six out of every twelve months for three years from the date of perfecting the homestead entry. In the event of a homesteader desiring to secure his patent within a shorter period than the three years provided by law, he will be permitted to purchase his homestead at the Government price at the time of entry, on furnishing proof that he has resided on the land for at least twelve months from the date of his perfecting his homestead entry, and that he has brought at least thirty acres under cultivation. The odd numbered sections are at present reserved for the purpose of being granted as land sub-sidies in aid of the construction of colonization railways in Manitoba and settlements will have the advantage the North-West Territories. A homestead settler, whose land is destitute of timber, can, upon the payment of an office fee of 25 cents, procure from the Crown Timber agent a permit to cut the following quantities of timber free of dues: 3,000 lineal f et of building timbeir, 400 roof poles, and 500 posts. Any settler can obtain a permit, upon the payment of the same fee, to cut fallen timber for fuel or fencing for his own use. Leases lands in Manitoba and the grazing North-West can be obtained at an annual rental of two cents an acre. leases are granted for a period not exceeding twenty-one years, and no single lease covers a greater area than 100.000 acres. The lessee is oblig d within each of the three years from the date of granting of the lease, to place upon the land not less then one-third of the whole amount of stock which is required to be placed upon the land leased, namely, one head of cattle for every twenty acres of land covered by the lease, and shall, during the rest of maintain cattle thereon in that proportion. After placing the prescribed number of cattle upon his leasehold, the lessee may purchase land within the tract leased for a house, a farm or a corral.

It will be seen from these regulations that the Canadian Government is no hard task-master. Immigrants are required for the development of the Dominion, and land is offered on the most liberal terms to those who desire to start life in a country that offers a home and a prosperous future to all those who have sturdy arms and industrious habits.

WHEAT.

In the August Bulletin the estimated wheat yield was 33,504,766 bushels. This was considered at the time a conservative estimate, as a greater yield than 20.55 bushels per acre (as reported) was generally expected. Actual yields have, however, been less. The Government estimate has been realized. The principal causes of shrinkage were a period of drought in August, when wheat was filling, and the ravages of the Hessian fly. The most promising fields, especially on summer-fallow, from which 30 to 35 bushels per acre were expected, only yielded 20 to 25 bushels per acre. Shrinkage from the work of the Hessian fly is estimated in individual cases at from five per cent. to thirty per cent. of the crop. The damage was most serious in the Red River valley. The sample of the wheat is good, grading 1 Hard, 2 Hard, or 1 Northern, although a few cars in some districts are frosted. The absence of weed seeds in grain is specially noted.

OATS.

The oat crop was good, and the sample perhaps the best ever grown in the province: heavy, plump kernel, and free from smut.

BARLEY.

A fair crop, though the grain is reported small or thin.

WEATHER.

Harvest-time was favorable. although a heavy snow-storm, early in the east in August. October, delayed stacking and thresh-1900]

over twenty years. Plowing was continued in all parts of the province to the end of November. Many farmers, having completed their fall plowing, put their plows under cover for the winter, before the frost set in.

LIVE STOCK.

THE ONTARIO AGRICUL-TURAL COLLEGE AND EXPERIMENTAL FARM.

By Dr. Jas. Mills, President of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph.

To the Hon. Sir John Carling, of London, belongs the honor of having taken the first steps towards founding a School of Agriculture in the Province of Ontario; to him also is due the credit of having established the Dominion Experimental Farms at a later date.

In his report for the year 1869, addressed to Governor Howland, Carling, then Commissioner of Agriculture and Arts for Ontario, spoke in complimentary terms of the system of general education in this province, and then said: "I have a growing conviction that something more is required to give our education a more practical character, especially in reference to the agricultural and mechanical classes of the community, which comprise the great bulk of the population and constitute the principal means of our wealth and prosperity. What now appears to be especially needed, in addition to the ordinary instruction in common schools, is the introduction of elementary instruction in what may be termed the foundation principles of agricultural and mechanical science, and I hope to be able, in the next report I may have the honor of presenting to your Excellency, to record the fact of a commencement being made with a prospect of success."

Rev. W. F. Clarke, Commissioner.

On the 12th August, 1869, Mr. Carling appointed the Rev. W. F. Clarke 118 of Guelph, a Commissioner to visit the principal agricultural colleges of the United States, gain what information he could and report with the view of establishing in this province a school to give instruction in agri-culture and kindred subjects, and to conduct experiments for the purpose of solving some of the problems which confronted those who were engaged n agricultural and horticultural pursuits. Mr. Clarke's report, which appeared on the 8th June 1870, was concise, comprehensive and scholarly, and withal practical and sensible in its suggestions and recommendations. It furnished the Minister with the desired information and indicated in outline the scope and character of a school of agriculture such as it was thought should be established in the Province of Ontario.

Schools of Agriculture and Practical Science.

So, in pursuance of his previous intimation, Mr. Carling, in his report for 1870, definitely proposed the establishment of two schools, one for agriculture and the other for mechanic arts, and the outcome of his recommendation and subsequent action was the founding of the School of Practical Science in Toronto, and the purchase of 600 acres of land for a School of Agriculture at Mimico, seven miles west of Toronto.

The land was purchased in 1871, and a contract for the erection of school buildings for the accommodation of 100 resident pupils, at a cost of \$47,900, was entered into in November of that year; but, a change of Government having taken place that fall, the work was delayed for a time, and objections urged against the Mimico site by prominent farmers and stockmen caused some hesitation as to what should be done. At length the Hon. Archibald Mc-Kellar, the new Commissioner of Agriculture, requested the Provincial Board of Agriculture and Arts, and afterwards Professor Miles and Dr. Kedzie, of the Michigan Agricultural College, to examine the site and report as to its suitability for an experimental farm.

Both reports were unfavorable the site, chiefly on account of the character of the soil and the lack of church and other privileges such as are enjoyed in the immediate neigh- versity, Principal.

borhood of a town or city; and the result was that a committee, consisting of John Dunlop, John Miller, John Dryden, the Hon. David Christie, and Robert N. Ball, was appointed to examine farms in the neighborhood of Whitby, Guelph, and Woodstock, with the view of getting a suitable site for the proposed school. This com-mittee reported the facts, without a definite recommendation, on the 13th of December, 1872, and left it for the Government to decide, which it did by purchasing the Gulph farm of 550 acres from F. W. Stone, a political opponent, in the early part of 1873. Some additions were made as soon

as possible to the farmhouse, which still constitutes the first two stories of the main building, in order to get ready for thirty pupils at as early a

date as practicable.

Name and Motto.

The name decided upon was the Ontario School of Agriculture and Experimental Farm, and the motto sug-gested by George Buckland, the genial and scholarly Professor of Agriculture in the University of Toronto, was "Practice with Science."

Lberal Terms.

In accordance with the recommendation of a Commission appointed to prepare by-laws and regulations for the school, the first years were to be regarded as a preparatory term, in which student help was to be largely employed to put the farm and horticultural department into shape for practical instruction at a later date. During this period students were to work seven hours a day in the outside departments, and for his labor in these departments each was to receive instruction, lodging, board and washing, with a bonus of \$50 in cash at the end of the year, in case he completed it satisfactorily and passed the prescribed examinations in the course of instruction.

Opening of the School in 1874.

On the 29th July, 1873, Henry Mc-Candless, from Cornell University, was appointed the first Principal; and on the 26th of March, 1874, there ap-peared over the signature of Mr. Mc-Candless a long advertisement announcing the school on the 1st of May, 1874.

T. Walton from Toronto, Engineer. Twenty-eight students entered the first term, and the outlook seemed encouraging, but the officers soon began to quarrel among themselves. In a short time the dispute between Principal McCandless and three or four members of his staff became so violent that Mr. Clarke resigned on the 9th of June; and on the 13th of July, twenty-six of the students in attendance sent a petition to the Hon. Oliver Mowat, asking for the removal of the Principal. Mr. McCandless resigned on the 18th of July, and the Government began to realize that its troubles had only begun.

The Second Principal.

Charles Roberts, Esq., of Haslemere, Surrey, England, a prominent graduate of Cirencester Agricultural College, was appointed to succeed Mr. McCandless. He came out for observation in the fall of 1874, but could not enter on his duties until April, but he was suddenly seized with an illness so severe that he decided to resign his position and return at once Some have said to his native land. that the illness was caused by the stories which were told him the frightful difficulties, trials, and annovances of the position which he had accepted.

Third Principal.

Wm. Johnston, B.A., was employed in the capacity of Rector from August, 1874, till the end of 1875, and as Principal for nearly four years—from the beginning of 1876 till the 1st of Oc-tober 1879. Mr. Johnston, though lacking in practical experience, was a man of real ability--a good organizer, an efficient executive officer and a vigorous writer. He soon grasped the situation, and to him very largely is due the credit of having placed the institution on a fairly solid founda-He classified the work in the different departments, handled men to advantage, and did much to give character and stability to the school.

At the time of Mr. Johnston's resignation, and at his suggestion, the Ontario School of Agriculture and Experimental Farm became the Ontario Agricultural College and Experimental Farm, and the chief executive officer of the institution was afterwards to be known as President of the College. The writer took charge at that time (1st of October, 1879), and through storm and stress has stood by the ship for over twenty years.

Farm Superintendents.

From the outset, the office of Farm Superintendent was one of the most important in the School, and it is no less important in the College. James Laidlaw. afterwards representative of South Wellington in the Legislative Assembly, was Farm Superintendent in 1875; William Brown, from the fall of 1875, till 1st of July, 1888, a period Thomas nearly thirteen years; Shaw, from the 1st of October, 1888, till the summer of 1893-nearly years; and Wm. Rennie, from 1st October, 1893, till the 1st October, 1899exactly six years. G. E. Day, B.S.A., was appointed Superintendent on the 1st October of the present year (1899).

Commissioners and Ministers of Agriculture.

The gentlemen who, as Commissioners and Ministers of Agriculture, have had control of the School and College since the Mimico site was purchased by the Hon. John Carling are: the Hon. Archibald McKellar, about four years (1871-1875); Hon. S. C. Wood, nearly eight years (1875-1883); Hon. James Young, a few months in 1883; Hon. A. M. Ross, about four and a half years (1883-1888); Hon. Charles Drury, first Minister of Agriculture, nearly two and a half years (May 1st, 1888, to September 1st, 1890), and Hon. John Dryden, second Minister of Agriculture, over nine years from September 1st, 1890.

It would be invidious to enter into a discussion of the work done by the different Commissioners and Ministers; but, without offence, we think it may be said that every one in the list devoted a great deal of time and anxious thought to the affairs of the College at Guelph, and did the work much better than it would have been done by any Board of Trustees or Governers.

Strong and Weak Points.

One of the especially strong points of the institution, from 1874 to 1899, has been the thorough and persist-ently practical character of its work. Many United States Agricultural Colleges are agriculutural only in name. They have placed agriculture in background, and have broadened their courses so as to compete with arts colleges and universities. The Ontario Agricultural College has not done so, but has always insisted on manual labor, and has given special prominence to agriculture, live stock, dairying, horticulture. veterinary practice, and other branches of study which have a direct bearing on the ordinary work of the Canadian farmer. For a long period the farm management was severely criticised by the farmers of the province, and was of-ten spoken of as the weak point of the institution; but in time the tide began to turn, and during later years the farm has been made an undoubted source of strength to the College.

One undoubted source of weakness, from the beginning till 1893 (for nineteen years), was divided, and necessarily conflicting, authority. It was a cause of trouble to the first Principal; in the form of a double headship, it led to the resignation of Mr. Johnston, the third Principal, in 1879: friction from 1879 to 1888; and in other mencement exercises of the University. 1900]

was an Honorary Council to consult forms it endangered the institution at a later date. It was not till the summer of 1893, that the Government had the courage to give the President full control and make him responsible for everything, thus eliminating a serious element of weakness.

Another source of weakness has been the fact that throughout its history (commencing with the change of site) the College has been systempersistently atically and discussed from the standpont of provincial party politics. In the discussion, the institution has very often been very much misrepresented and injured but by keeping free from politics and attending to its work it has at length established itself fairly well in public confidence and is beginning to receive a reasonable amount of sympathy and support from both political parties.

Courses of Study, Diplomas, and Degrees.

The primary aim of the College always has been to train young men for work and life on the farms of the province. The course for an Associate diploma, extending over a period of two years, and including both study and practical work, has been arranged with this object in view; and nothing is allowed to interfere with this aim throughout the first two years of every regular student's course at the College. Those who complete this course and obtain the Associate diploma, signed by the Minister of Agriculture and President of the College, are known as "Associates of the College."

In 1887 a third year was added to the course, and the College was affiliated with the University of Toronto for advanced examinations and grees. The addition was made at the request of Associates who wished to pursue their studies in certain departments for a longer time than was embraced in the Associate course, with a view to preparing themselves more fully for the work of the farm or for positions as agricultural writers and teachers of agriculture, horticulture, dairying, animal husbandry, chemistry, biology or entomology. The work for this additional year is heavy, and none but the best associates are The examinations take it. to the third year work are conducted by the University of Toronto, and the P.S.A. degree (Bachelor of the Science of Agriculture) is granted to the sucin the same form it caused endless cessful candidates at the annual com-

Ninety-eight degrees · have been granted on the three-year course, and it has recently been decided to extend the course to four years—two years for the Associate diploma, and two additional years for the B.S.A. degree. This change is due to the fact that the additional work required for the degree has been found too heavy for one year.

A special course in dairying was announced for the 1st of February, 1893, and the attendance was so satisfactory that a new dairy building was at once erected, and the equipment for a permanent Dairy School promptly provided; so everything was ready for a large dairy class (over 100) in January, 1894. This school furnishes a very thorough course of theoretical and practical instruction in mlk-testing, butter-making, and cheese-making, and is divided into two departments-one for home dairy work and the other for a factory course including both butter and cheese. A special dairy certificate is given to those who complete this course.

Equipment Then and Now.

From the beginning, the institution had a very fair equipment for instruction in field agriculture and raising-550 acres of land and substantial farm buildings, with good samples (male and female) of cattle, sheep, and swine; three greenhouses and a large garden for instruction in horticulture, and two commodious classrooms for lectures and demonstrations on the subjects embraced in the course of study. A dairy building was erected in the early days, but little or no instruction in the subject was given for the first eleven years after the opening of the school.

Houses for the Farm Superintendent. the Bursar, the Gardener, and the Farm Foreman were erected and large additions to the main building made in the Hon. S. C. Wood's time. farm buildings were erected while the Hon. A. M. Ross was Com-missioner, and the chemical laboratory (the first laboratory provided) was built and equipped in 1887, near the close of Mr. Ross' commissionership. The experimental barn was built while the Hon. Charles Drury was Minister of Agriculture; and the following large and important additions have been made during the regime of the Hon. John Dryden: New greenhouses, biological laboratory, mechanics, hydrostatics, hydrody convocation hall, dairy building (with complete equipment), and houses for General and special lecture-room laboratory,

Present Attendance Overtaxes Capacity.

Present Position.

With an able staff of instructor and workers, and such large and va an uable additions in the way of built in ings, apparatus and appliances, may be surely said that the College now in a good position to train your men for agricultural pursuits; to work in original research; to condu experiments on various lines, and the lead the van of agricultural and he ticultural progress throughout province.

Outside Work.

Already the College has rendered excellent service to the province at large by the publication of reports and bulletins from year to year, and in several outside departments of work:

(1) The Experimental Union of exstudents and others in testing manures and varieties of grain, grasses, potatoes, and other crops throughout the province-about 3,500 of them working under the direction of C. A. Zavitz, B.S.A., the College Experimentalist.

(2) The Farmers' Institutes, organized and controlled by the President of the College for ten years, and assisted by the College staff from their in-

ception to the present time.
(3) Travelling Dairies, sent out from the College, controlled by the President, and conducted by graduates of the College.

(4) Dairy schools, east and west, under the control of the President.

(5) Fruit Experiment Stations, twelve of them and two sub-stations, testing varieties of fruit under various conditions of soil and climate throughout the province, and preparing a description of Canadian fruits, under the control of a small Board, of which the President of the College is chairman, and the College Professor of Horticulture a member.

With due regard to modesty and professional etiquette, I think I may say that, through these organizations and in other ways, the College is imparting a great deal of useful information to the farmers of Ontario, is creating a widespread interest in agriculture, and is adding dignity to life and labor on the farm.

A Forward Movement Needed.

Progress has been the watchword of very practical, specially adapted to the College in the past, and it would the wants of young men who intend seem that the time has come for ano be farmers. It embraces agricul- other forward movement. Increased

accommodation for students is very much needed, and there is a growing demand for instruction in domestic economy for farmers' daughters; so it would appear to be the duty of the province to provide at once the new building which the ex-students asked for last year, and to add without further delay a large and well-equipped Department of Domestic Economy.

THE FUTURE OF THE ONT-ARIO AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

By Mr. C. C. James, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for Ontario, and ex-Chemist of the Ontario Agricultural College.

Mr. James referred particularly to two points in connection with the training of the students in the future. He thought that special instruction should be given in what might be caned the study of "citizenship," so that when the students leave the College to become farmers they would at the same time be qualified at once to step into municipal life well equipped as to the duties and privileges of citizens. They should have an acquaintance wth Canadian history, and bewell grounded in municipal administration. They should be directed to take an intelligent interest in public questions, political, educational, and social. In the second place, he thought more attention might with advantage be given to the special training of the students for Farmers' Institute work. Every student on leaving the College should have in his head and in his pocket at least two practical addresses or papers that he could give at Farmers' Institute meetings and defend against critics. These papers should be prepared under the direction of the staff and have been discussed before the students and Many hints could be given to the students that would be exceedingly valuable in preparing for such work.

Beyond these two pieces of advice or suggestion he did not venture to prophesy. As the future, however, is largely the outcome of the past, he rould only look for a most prosperous idevelopment of the institution, since after a varied experience the College has become so firmly established in the estimation of the class for which it was instituted.

AREA AND POPULATION.

The total area of Canada, including its lakes and rivers as well as its land is 3,653,946 square miles,

The population of the Dominion of Canada is estimated to be at present 5,083,424. The following figures for provinces and districts are taken from the census of 1891: Ontario, 2,114,32 Quebec, 1,483,525; Nova Scotia, 321,263 New Brunswick, 321,263; Manitoba 152,506: British Columbia, 28,173 Prince Edward Island 109,078; North-West Territories, 98,967; Territories east of Hudson Bay, unknown, making a total of 4833,239.

Prince Edward Island is the smallast province in the Dominion, but it is more than twice as thickly populated as any other province, the proportion beng 54.5 persons to the squarenile. Nova Scotia comes next with 22.0 persons to the square mile. The following is the order in which the provinces stand according to density of population, as ascertained by the census of 1891:

Canada is a young country, with an enormous territory in the North-West only recently brought into the Dominion, compares very favorably in railway facilities with the old world and the United States. There were 16.71 miles of railway in operation on the 30th of June, 1898, and 16,870 miles of track laid.

Canada has 166 railways. Twenty-five of these have been amalgamated and form the Grand Trunk System Twenty-three others have been consolidated into the Canadian Pacific System. The remaining 118 have more or less. consolidated. Two of these are bridge companies, with 3 1-8 miles of rails, one is a tunnel, with 21-4 miles of rails, and nine are electric railways with 114 miles of rails. As a rule, the railways of Canada are built with a gauge of 4 feet 8 1-2 inches. The exceptions are the Carillon, Grenville, thirteen miles, with a gauge of 5 feet 6inches; the Prince Edward Island railway, with a gauge of 3 feet 6 inches; the Montford Colonization, 21 miles, with a gauge of and the Alberta coal railways, 64 miles, with a gauge of 3 feet.

NEW ONTARIO.

The annual influx of settlers into this continent is rapidly filling up the free grant districts, which are so attractive to the dwellers of the overpopulated countries of Europe. In the United States there are no longer any free grant lands, every acre has to be purchased by the settler with hard cash, frequently at more than its actual value. But Canada still extends a welcome with open arms to the stranger from across the ocean. In the northern districts of the premier province of the Dominion, known as New Ontario, there are homes, and happy homes, for thousands of the tollers of the old land. New Ontario comprises the Districts of Nipissing, Temiscaming, Algoma, Thunder Bay, Wabigoon, and Rainy River.

These districts comprise a vast territory, and it is doubtful if any country in the world can present greater advantages to settlers of the right sort. To the poor man, who wishes to rise above his poverty, and has in-telligence and strength, who is not afraid of hard work for a rich reward, it offers cheap and fertile lands, a healthful climate, and ultimate com-petency as a reward for his labors. This is no lawless territory, but has all the advantages of settled institutions, and a good government, freedom from war's alarms, and the conscript system of European countries, and from the incursions of savage tribes. In Northern Ontario, life and property are as safe as in England, and freedom prevails under the British flag.

While the settler's life in any new district is not devoid of haidships, the immigrant to New Ontario has his home from the primeval forests. A neer of the Wabigoon country. In the 19007

113.61 man with some knowledge of farming, with industry and self-denial, a clear head and strong arms, can make a home for himself and family, obtain immediate material comforts, and the prospects, after a few years of labor, of a competency.

One of the great advantages offered in New Ontario is the fact that the settler can obtain abundance of wellpaid employment throughout the year, thus enabling him to realize ready money while he is putting in part of his time in clearing his farm. He can obtain employment in cutting and hauling pulpwood and cordwood, railway ties, posts and telegraph poles, and tanbark, getting out pine logs under contract for lumbermen, and working on Government roads and bridges.

The climate of New Ontario is temperate compared with that of many of the thickly inhabited and prosperous parts of the new and old world. There is an entire absence of fever and ague, and there is no malarial disease whatever, making this district one of the most healthy countries under the sun. Nor is this immunity from disease its only advantage. It is attractive to the immigrant on account of the cheapness of the land and the fertility of the soil. It is a first-class country for live stock and dairying. All the crops of the temperate zone can be successfully raised. There are immense mineral resources and incalculable forest wealth. There is a great variety of industries and constant winter employment, cheap building material, fuel for the cutting, and fruit for the picking. There are fine fisheries and an abundance of game. There is water communication and good railway accommodation. There are religious and educational advantages. There are good local markets, and facilities for reaching foreign industrial centers.

The Wabigoon country, in Rainy River District, is attracting much attention at present. The agricultural section lies midway between Fort William, on Lake Superior to the east. and the city of Winnipeg to the west. The Canadian Pacific railway passes through the district, and the fertile land extends for forty miles along the railway line from Dinorwic to Eagle river. It is estimated that the area of good agricultural land in this child's play compared to what the district is about 170,000 acres, of settler of Old Ontario had two or which about 30,000 have been located. three generations ago in hewing out The Ontario Government was the piospring of 1895 the Hon. John Dryden, Minister of Africulture, with the eye of an experienced farmer, selected a site for a house and barn and commenced farming operations with the view of testing the agricultural capabilities of the section. A small crop was put in that summer, consisting of wheat, oats, barley, grass, and a few roots. In the early summer a warm, comfortable house was built, such as any settler of moderate means might erect. Later, a basement barn, with necessary accommodation, Was added. At the present time there are 130 acres cleared and stumped, that all kinds of labor-saving machinery can be used to the best advantage. The farm is surrounded by a substantial cedar post and wire fence. The farm buildings are across the railway track and almost opposite the railway station at Dryden. Mr. D. Anderson, who visited the farm in 1898, said: "As I stood at the back of the farm and looked at the railway station, a pleasing rural scene filled the eye. A fifty-acre field of oats just beginning to shoot, another field of heavy spring wheat and barley waving in the wind, and just beyond, the dark green of a healthy field of Swede turnips; a flock of Shropshire sheep were nibbling in the home field next the barn, while half a dozen useful milch cows were industriously grazing the young, tender grass which recent rains had caused to cover the pasture fields, while the farm team was just finishing the ploughing of a ten-acre fallow field that had been grubbed, stumped, and burned this summer. The Pioneer Farm has demonstrated very clearly the excellent agricultural advantages of this section by changing in a few short years wild waste land to clean flields and a well cultivated farm."

This district presents special advantages to the farmer. Generally speaking, the soil consists of a strong clay of greyish color, changing in lower lying sections to a clay loam or occasionally even lighter soil. It is remarkably free from stone, and pulverises quickly when turned to the On the creek bottoms sun and air. the soil is very rich, and heavily timbered, making the clearing more difficult. On the rolling upland the clay is of a drier nature, and will require much more rain or moisture than in loamier soil in the same neighborhood, and perhaps either manure or ages to the farmer in growing wheat,

A striking feature of this district is the abundance and excellence of the water supply, and the water is pure and good. Water can be had for the digging on almost every farm at from ten to twenty-five feet. Wabigoon lake, a beautiful sheet of water, lies not quite a mile south of the railway track. It is almost thirty miles long by four or six miles wide, and it is dotted with picturesque islands. shores are well wooded, and it contains a plentiful supply of fish, including white fish, maskinonge, herring, pike, and pickerel. From the lake the Wabigoon river, a broad navigable stream, with abundant water power, flows north and west through the townships of Wainwright, Eaton, and Sandford. The Pelican river flows from Pelican lake, in the township of Rugby, through that township and four or five miles into the township of Eaton, where it joins the Wabigoon. The township of Aubrey is bounded on one side by Eagle lake. The district is abundantly watered. There is no fear in this region of the disastrous droughts that afflict some of the Western States of the Union.

Every prospective settler naturally enquires about the timber of the region where he intends making his home, for the timber on his newlyacquired land will either prove source of profit or an obstacle to his farming. In the Wabigoon district, the timber consists of a growth of small poplars, a few spruce, with here and there a tamarac, but the greater bulk of the timber is jack pine—a resinous fir that predomithroughout the whole country. predominates resinous settler, on his first arrival, can make very good wages cutting jack pine into cordwood, for which there is always a ready cash sale at from \$1.65 to \$1.80 per cord delivered at the nearest railway station. Tamarac ties, eight feet long, sell at twenty-five cents each, while ties of the same material twelve feet long, are worth forty cents. Large sections of the country have been burned over and are ready for the plough. Where the timber has been burned off the land is growing up with native grass and wild peas, showing that the soil is only awaiting the arrival of the settler to give him an abundant return for his labor.

While Wabigoon presents advantgreen crops will have to be ploughed barley, oats and root crops, it is as a in to put life into and quicken it bedairying and stock-raising section that it offers particular attractions. Clover and grasses grow most pro-lifically, the former producing two crops a year. Fine natural pasture is supplied in the prairie grass and wild peas, while cattle thrive on the wold hay to be obtained in all the creek bottoms. In this district summer frosts are unknown. Ploughing usually begins about the last week in April and finishes about the second week in November. Generally, the seeding is done about the first week in May.

The products of the Pioneer Farm give a fair idea of the capabilities of the district. Fall wheat, Dawson's Golden Chaff, yielded from twenty to twenty-five bushels per acre: Colorado spring wheat, about twenty; Harabout twelve. The rison's bearded, clover in fall wheat, sown early May, at the time of putting in wheat, was in full bloom, from one and a half to two feet high. Clover is cut twice in the season, the first crop about two tons, and the second one ton per acre. Potatoes yield bushels per acre. Mr. Duncan Anderson, a practical farmer, having inspected the Wabigoon district, made the following report: "From what I have seen, I know from my own experience in clearing land, that a working farmer of moderate means, with an industrious family (if not afraid of flies for a few weeks in the heat of summer for the first few years, and other drawbacks incident to pioneer life), can in five or six years have 100 acres cleared and free from both stumps and stones. Thus many men who are now forced to work for others, if they were to put forth an effort and deny themselves some of the luxuries of life, could, in a few years. become independent, by having a very comfortable farm home of their own in the

the Wabigoon country." Outside of the Pioneer Farm, it is well to mark some other yields of crops. The following reliable figures show the remarkable fertility of these northern regions: Slate river, acres of oats, 1,100 bushels: Oliver, 847 bushels of potatoes per acre: McIntyre, 1,500 bushels of turnips per acre: Oliver, 45 bushels of wheat per acre; Pigeon river, 4 1-2 tons of timothy per acre; Farm station. Port Arthur, red table carrots, 647 bushels per acre; Rowlter. Port Arthur. celery. fortyfive and a half tons per acre.

Ontario Government being anxious to reserve the land for the bona fide settler, and to prevent it falling into the hands of speculators, where it might remain unproductive to the detriment of settlement, have decided upon the following conditions: That the ount of land each applicant may purchase shall not exceed 160 acres; but if a head of a family he is allowed to increase his purchase to 240 acres: that the price paid shall be 50 cents an acre, one-fourth down and the balance in three equal annual instalments with interest at six per cent. The settler will be required to clear and put under cultivation at least ten per cent, of the land purchased and to erect a habitable house of not less that 16 by 20 feet. Settlers without means are bound to meet obstacles difficult to overcome: but in this district, with perseverance, they can earn a larger income than elsewhere, and with economy they can lay by an annual surplus that will enable them in the course of a few years to purchase a farm for themselves and have, what they could not expect elsewhere, a comfortable home and a productive farm on which to end their days.

The chief advantages of the Wabigoon country may be described in a few words. There is cheap land. which can be easily cleared. The main line of the Canadian Pacific railway passes right through the agricultura! belt, practically bringing the market to every farmer's door. There is sufficient timber for building, fencing, and fuel. There is a good soil, an abundant supply of pure water, and a healthy climate. There is plenty of fish and game to supply the needs of the settler. There is winter employment in the lumber camp, also hauling and chopping cordwood.





A grant was also given to be Nipigon Pulp, Paper, and Manufacturing lompany, on the Nipigon River, near the orth shore of Lake Superior. All the comsnies will use water power from the falls on the rivers on which they are located.

ANGLO - CANADIAN COM-MERCIAL RELATIONS.

In discussing the commercial relations of Canada aud Great Britain at the Canadian Club dinner in New York, Mr. Ross, the On-ario Premier, said: "If the Canadian seller a the British market had a preference of 10 er cent, or even 5 per cent, over the United tates seller, the effect upon Canadian trade ould be simply incalculable. Apply it to the nillions of bushels of wheat which England uys with which to feed her subjects, and let he Canadian agriculturist on the prairie feel hat he has the advantage over the United tates agriculturist, then you would speedily ee our prairies filled with a teeming popula-on, and the wheat trade of America change s course. The same would apply to the products of our forests and our mines. I hope ach a preference may some day be given to s, although British statesmen as yet have ot shown any disposition to consider it seriusly. I know of nothing Britain could do hat would be more helpful to us in building p Canada, and strengthening the relations between us and the Mother Country."

EXPENDITURE PER CAPITA.

It is generally understood that the increase in the annual expenditure has been chiefly caused by additional services, such as the Yukon District and Intercolonial Railway extension to Montreal, which did not exist under former Governments; and that this increased expenditure adds nothing to the burdens of the people, inasmuch as the services produce large increases on the revenue side of their account.

But even if this view were left aside, and only the total annual expenditure chargeable to income considered, the statement is a very favorable one. The following is a statement of expenditure per capita for twenty years:

The total exports of Canada for the year ending June 30th last were \$175,656,947, or \$46,440,165 over 1896, which year showed an increase over 1878 of \$40,638,618.

The greatest proportional increase over 1896 was in agricultural products, over 95 per cent. In animals and their products 53 per cent. In manufactures 47 per cent., and in no case has there been a decrease.

The figures of the last three years indicate that the removal of the old regulations which required a quarantine detention of ninety days on cattle entering the United States from Canada has enabled the farmers and stock-raisers of the Dominion to find a large market in the United States for their live stock. The total value of the last year's export to the United States of Canadian cattle amounted to \$1,269,020.

THE EXPORT TRADE.



TRANSMISSION OF WATER POWER.

By J. A. Kammerer, Toronto. Canada being the birthplace of the electric telephone, and the electric in-candescent lamp, and also the arena of some of the earliest efforts in the practical application of electric power for the propulsion of street railway cars, it seems fitting that it should be also in Canada where should be made the first practical application of the transmission of electric energy over long distances from water powers to centres of manufacture. It also seems proper that the Canadian Year Book, a chronicler of facts, should have, for the benefit of the layman rather than the engineer, a general resume of the progress in development of our immense water powers by the utilization of them for growth and promotion of the different industries requiring the application of power, and the transmission of this power by electricity.

Those water powers, before the advent of electricity, had been inaccessible owing to their situation, or could not be profitably utilized by any of the known methods of transmission; or were unavailable because of the lack of facilities for the proper handling of raw materials and the finished products where the powers were located, and still more because of the inability to carry the power to the already well-established manufacturing centres. These difficulties have all been happily overcome by the advent of multi-phase electricity, and its application for the transmission of power over long distances, and now Canada can boast of more hydraulic-developed and electricallytransmitted horse power per capita of population than any other country under the sun.

Canadians had the honor to project and have in daily commercial operation the longest distance electrical transmission plant on earth at the time, and has in daily use at this writing the largest dynamos for the generation of electric power ever built, and they were built in Canada. This is a matter of sincere congratulation to Canadians, and should forever set at rest the idea that Canada cannot stand alone, or that as a nation it is not progressive and up-to

The earliest application of electricity for purely power "purposes in Canada, transmitted any considerable distance, is perhaps, the plant of the Barber Bros., near Georgetown, where

a direct current electric plant put in at a water power situated about two miles from their woollen mills; of this, 50 horse-power was transmitted, and used to supplement their steam plant, but this was never enlarged, owing to the difficulty experienced incidental to the transmission of the low tension direct current. and also the great loss of energy in driving over the lines at such a low pressure. This plant, however, is a pioneer, and was put in operation in 1890, and is still in daily use.

From 1890 to 1894 very little done in Canada by way or atilizing water powers for the transmission of power by electricity, but the rapid development, beginning about that time, of the high tension multi-phase alternating current apparatus, was making great advances, and the Montmorency Power Co., of Quebec, who were utilizing the Falls of Montmorency, situated nine miles from Quebec city, to drive their arc and incandescent electric lighting machinery, decided to construct an up-todate multi-phase electric plant, generate the current at a high tension at the Montmorency Falls, drive it to Quebec, and there re-transform it into energy and use it through multiphase motors to drive their arc and incandescent lighting machines well as their power machinery. Their first installation had a capacity of 4,000 horse-power, and as that proved eminently successful, they have been enlarging their plant, and now supply the Quebec District railway, and many factories, elevators, etc., with power and light, their present capacity being about 8,000 horse-power, which is shortly to be enlarged.

In this plant was used the highest tension current which up to that time had been put into successful operation, viz., 5,600 volts. This current was generated by the dynamos direct, and generators were at that time considered a marvel that would withstand this immense pressure.

The generators used by them are of the S.K.C. Inductor type, which were the only machines that would admit of the generation of this high current within themselves, and was a decided step toward bringing into use electric power transmitted from afar.

Following this installation by the Montmorency Co. came that of the North Shore Power Co., of Three Rivers, Que., who had a water power at Batiscan Chute, 16 miles away,

where they developed hydraulically and transmitted by electricity to the city of Three Rivers about 1,000 horsepower, which is utilized in driving the city lighting machinery, with motors, as well as driving the water works pumps and other industries requiring power. The distance in chis case was seven miles further than from Montmorency Falls to Quebec. It was decided that in order to get a loss that would make the transmission a commercial success it was necessary to use higher pressure than at Quebec in order to decrease the cost of the copper on the transmission This was accomplished by what is known as step-up transformers, the current coming from the generator at a pressure of 2,400 volts, then being transformed or stepped up to 12,000 volts, transmitted sixteen miles, and then, by a similar translating device reduced to an ordinary working pressure of 2,400 volts. This was found to work admirably, and the entire plant as installed at that time has been continuously in successful operation.

The generators used in this plant throughout, as well as the translating devices, are of what is known as the S.K.C. System, manufactured by the Royal Electric Company of Montreal.

The next large transmission power undertaken was that by large transmission the Lachine Hydraulic and Land Company, of Montreal, Que., who dammed the north shore of the St. Lawrence river, and had in operation, in the fall of 1897, a plant conveying power to Montreal, six miles away. The capacity of their development is about 15,000 horse-power. It is a notable development owing to the manner in which the power is obtained and the dam was constructed, that is, instead of the river being completely dammed only part of the river was under tribute by a wing dam, taking in only a part of the river, and while this was quite an engineering feat, and has been in operation for some time, it was found necessary to instal an auxiliary steam plant in the city of Montreal, owing to danger experienced from anchor or frazile ice.

The next installation of importance begun was that of the Chambly Manufacturing Company, who are utilizing the Richelleu river at Chambly Rapids, eighteen miles from Montreal, and who began work in the fall of 1896 and are now transmitting power into the city of Montreal. Their hydraulic development is over 25,000 horse-power.

This plant is particularly notable, as being at the time of its inception the largest single development of power in North America, and also the only plant, at this writing, that generates primarily in its dynamos a current of a pressure of 12,500 volts. This current is transmitted directly over the wires into Montreal, a distance of eighteen miles, and is there transformed from this pressure of 12,500 volts to the ordinary working pressure of 2,400 volts through the medium of translating devices called step-down transformers.

These generators are referred to in the first part of this article as being the largest that have ever been built anywhere, and are the largest in use to-day. They weigh over 115 tons same speed as those in use by the Niagara Falls Power Company at Niagara Falls, N.Y., would have an output each, and if they were operated at the same speed as those in use by The Niagara Falls Power Company at Niagara Fills, N.Y., would hve an output capacity of over 7,500 horse-power each.

These generators, as well as the entire electrical equipment of this plant, were built and installed by the Royal Electric Company of Montreal, every piece being built and finished in their shops, and these being, as above stated, the largest electrical machines in existence, speak only, as they alone can speak, of the capacity of the Canadian manufacturer to cope with anything in the line of machinery that is to be built, and will stand as a lasting monument to the company building them as an engineering feat, and marking an epoch as a radical departure in dynamo building which will stand out as bold in the future in the electric power transmission as does the telephone in the electrical transmission of sound.

Up to this time the longest distance over which power had been transmitted electrically was about eighteen miles, and the highest pressure 12,500 voits, but in the summer of 18% the Cataract Power Company, of Hamilton, who had acquired certain waterights near the city of St. Catharines, desired to develop the hydraulic power and bring the electric energy to the city of Hamilton, a distance of between thirty-five and thrity-eight miles. The ground was gone over carefully by hydraulic engineers, and it was found that they could secure a head of 270 feet.

The generation of the electric power

the transmission of the same from the power-house to the city of Hamilton, presented at that time a seemingly unsurmountable obstacle to the carrying out of the scheme, no transmission of energy such a long distance for commercial purposes having up to that time been undertaken. The largest electrical concerns both in America and Europe were consulted, but the limitation of a practical working pressure sufficiently great to insure the transmission of power such a long distance, practically precluded the undertaking of the work. by any of the companies consulted, the highest commercial working pressure, up to that time, being not above 12,500 volts.

At this pressure the cost of the transmission line became so great that the Cataract Power Company did not feel warranted to undertake the development of the enterprise. The longer the distance, the heavier the conductor must be: therefore to transmit this long distance, it was necessary that the pressure be 20,000 volts or over, so that the cost of the conductor would be within the limit set to allow the Cataract Power Company to undertake the development of the enterprise. After nearly a year of futile attempts to have the work undertaken at a pressure which would justify them in proceeding with the work, and being unsuccessful, they consulted J. A. Kammerer, one of the staff of the Royal Electric Company of Montreal, and after careful consideration of the conditions and preliminary estimates of cost prepared by him, with a working pressure of 24.000 volts guaranteed, the Royal Electric Company agreed to undertake the work which, with its consequent saving, brought the cost within the limits deemed necessary by he Cataract Power Company to admit the enterprise being proceeded

Ground was broken on October 5th. 1897, and the work pushed with such vigor that the current was sent over he lines from DeCew Falls to Hamlton on the afternoon of August 25th, 898, or just ten months and ten days fter the beginning of the undertakng, and it has been in successful opration, without a moment's intermison, to the present writing.

The generating plant, which had or-shally a capacity of 3,000 horselower, is now being increased to thirty-five miles distant, and to Nel-low horse-power, and at this writing son, about seventeen miles away.

to 50,000 horse-power, and Hamilton, the city where the power is transmitted to, which had been before the advent of the Catract Powc" Company a city of small manufacturers, and a city of smoke and dust, has now become a practically smokeless city, or, as suitably termed by an eminent writer, "a smokeless city in a coalless province.'

This enterprise, at the time it was undertaken, and at its completion, and when power was first transmitted over the lines, was the longest distance and the highest pressure then known in practical commercial operation and has changed the city of Hamilton from a smoky manufacturing town to one of the brightest and cleanest cities in Canada, and growth of its manufacturing indus-tries since the advent of electricallytransmitted power has been phenomenal. The different factories already established, and those negotiating for power, will show a consumption of in the near future of 40,000 horse-power, and it certainly serves to, and is, making Hamilton the manufacturing centre of the Dominion of Canada.

Another example of transmission of hydraulic power by electricity is that of the West Kootenay Power Company, of Rossland, B.C. This plant is situated at Bonnington Falls, sixteen miles north of Nelson, B.C. It was projected and built under exceptionally severe physical conditions, and has, no doubt, done more to cheapen mining in the mountain districts than anything else, the mines being so far away from the railways, and as the cost of hauling fuel over the rough mountain roads to the mines, in order to drive steam engines and air compressors, made it impracticable in most cases to operate the property at a profit, but now, with the advent of electric power, they have become exceptionally valuable, and which, without the possibility of long-distance transmission of electrical energy by electricity, would never have present electrical developed. The present electrical equipment of the West Kootenay Company consists of two 1,000 horsepower and one 1,500 horse-power revolving Field type generators, delivering current at 1,000 volts, stepping it up through the usual translating devices to 20,000 volts and transmitting it to the Rossland mining camp, about

cipally for lighting and motor power, and at Nelson it is also used for lighting and motor power, and the tramway company are operating their rotary converters, from which is supplied the power for their street railway.

Another transmission plant is that of the British Columbia Electric Company, from Gold Stream to Victoria, a distance of twelve and one-half miles, 1,000 horse-power. The current is generated at 700 volts, stepping up 12,500 volts, transmitted to toria and there converted into 1,000 volts for lighting, and to 350 volts for their rotary converters for street railway apparatus. This plant is another instance of an existing property operating by steam, who, with the advent of poly-phase electricity, were able to discard their steam plant, or rather to keep it as an auxiliary, and operate their lights, power and street railway apparatus from a water power twelve miles away. The water used in this plant has a fall of 600 feet, or rather an available head of 600 feet.

The Cascade power plant of Cascade, B.C., is under construction now. The dam is almost completed. head which they will operate under is 168 feet, and they expect to develop 8,000 horse-power and transmit the same electricity to Grand Forks, 14 miles away, and to Greenwood 25 miles away. The right of way has all been secured and is being cleared. They expect to be ready with their power in August of this year. hydraulic and electric equipment will be of the latest and most up-to-date pattern, and the contracts for the same are shortly to be lef.

The proposed transmission plant of the Stave Lake Power Company, another British Columbia concern, is now under consideration, and upon which work will shortly be started. Their available head of water is 108 feet, and the minimum horse-power they expect to develop is 17.000. It is proposed to transmit this power thirty-nine miles to Vancouver, and thirty-four miles to New Westminster. This will be, when completed, the longest distance power transmission plant in Canada.

About two years ago the corporation of the town of Orillia began an agitation for a municipal power plant to furnish cheap power to its already existing energy-consuming industries. and also to attract manufacturers and make it an object by offering them the inducement of cheap power The little town is certainly describe to locate there. The town of Orillia of great credit for its pluck, and it

was one of the first to supply an incandescent service to its citizens. This, at the time of the putting in of the plant, was a very radical departure from established practices, the plant, as put in, has been in successful operation for the past six years, and it is said to be a paying investment for the corporation.

This encouraged them to take up the matter of supplying power, and as there were numerous water powers in the vicinity, they looked to an hydraulic development instead of to increasing their steam plant for lighting and power business. A After investigating a number of water powers they decided to develop the Ragged Rapids of the Severn River near Sparrow Lake, and about twenty miles from Orillia. At the point where they decided to put their dam and power house the physical difficulties were not very great, and they claim that at the driest season there is a sufficient flow of water at a thirty-five foot head to give them at least 3,000 horse-power. This plant is now being constructed, and it is thought that by September 1 next power will be delivered in the town and the lighting and waterworks pumping will also be from the same source, instead of from the steam plant, as heretofore.

The water-power development was no unusual thing, but as the Raggei Rapids are between nineteen and twenty miles distant from Orillia, the question of the transmission of power became at once a living question, and one on which the success of the scheme largely depended. Here again multi-phase electricity came to the rescue.

The present development is about hydrauli 1,000 horse-power. The equipment consists of two 500 horse power wheels, and the electrical equipment of 2,300 K.W.S.K.C. generators generating a two-phase current at 2,400 volts, and stepping it up for trans mission to Orillio to 20,000 volts at three-phase, and at Orillia re-trans-forming it into two-phase again for distribution about the town.

The complete electrical equipment is being furnnished by the Royal Elec tric Company of Montreal. The Electrical Maintenance and Construction Company, of Toronto, are building the entire works.

This is the first municipal corporation that has undertaken a long dis tance transmission of power by elecwater-power tricity generated by

Trenton Electric Company, composed of Toronto capitalists, about two years ago acquired the water rights and privileges of the corporation of Trenton, on the Trent river, about two and one-half miles from the town of Trenton, and there installed an electric lighting and power transmission plant. The current is transmitted to the town of Trenton, about two and one-half miles distant, where it is used for lighting, and it is contemplated, in fact the line is completed, to transmit power to Belleville, a distance of twelve miles. maximum horse-power is about 1,200. They have installed in their powerhouse two 300 k.w., or about 800 h.p. capacity, of electrical generators, from which the current is delivered primarily to the line at 6,600 volts and conveyed to Trenton and Belleville. It is expected that power will be delivered in Belleville some time during the coming summer. The electrical apparatus for this plant was furnished by the Canadian General Electric Company, of Peterboro', and is of their revolving Field type.

The Auburn Power Company, of Peterboro', are utilizing a fall on four Otonabee river. about the the miles from center of town of Peterboro'. They have have about 800 h.p. in water, but at present they have only one 150 h.p. generator installed, which is delivering power to the different factories in the town of Peterboro'. It is expected that this will be increased in the near

future.

The Lindsay Light, Heat and Power Company, who have been operating by steam for a long time, supplying are and incandescent lights to the town of Lindsay, are now at work ransmitting power from Fenelon Falis, sixteen miles away, to the town of Lindsay, and propose doing a large business in power among the manufacturers, as well as driving their present arc and incandescent machinery by water power. The maximum amount of horse-power to be delivered is in the neighborhood of 1,500 h.p. and and is an example of the progressiveness of the existing electric light companies taking advantage of the possibility of transmitting power by multiphase current at a high tension and making it commercially successful. They expect to have the first power in Lindsay by midsummer.

Another long distance power transmission which is under construction now is that of the Canadian Electric Light Company, of Levis, Que. The distance of their transmission is about seven miles from Chaudiere Falls; the amount of power to be transmitted, 2,000 h.p. The electrical equipment for this plant consists of two 1,000 h.p. generators of the revolving Field type, made by the Canadian General Electric Company, of Peterboro', Ont., and they deliver the current direct to the lines at 5,500 volts. The current is to be re-transformed at Levis for lighting and power purposes.

The Jacques Cartier Water Power Company, of Quebec City, is another power transmission company which was organized about two years ago, and which is now delivering electrical current at the city of Quebec. water power of which they availed themselves is thirteen miles from the city. Their electrical equipment consists of two 1,000 h.p. generators, made by the Westinghouse Electrical Manufacturing Company of Pittsburg-Pa., U.S.A. The current is generated at 1,000 volts, and through step-up devices it is raised to 20,000 volts, at which pressure it is transmitted to the city of Quebec, and there re-transformed into a workable voltage. This company is in competition with the Montmorency Power Company, lively times are anticipated. and business consists chiefly in lighting.

The Shawinigan Water and Power Company, of Shawinigan, P.Q., is still another instance of an immense development of hydraulic power converted into electricity, which is used ing transmitted any considerable disin and about the vicinity, it not betance, but utilized for commercial, pulp, and electrolytic work. being placed.

The Valleyfield Cotton Milling Company is also another instance of a large water-power development, they utilizing in their mills in the neighborhood of 5,000 h.p.

In addition to the above, there are a number of small transmission plants running from 100 to 300 horse-power, which, in an article of this kind, carnot be given space, but which go a swell the grand aggregate.

Another proposed development is that of the Ontario Niagara Falis Power Company, formerly the Dominion Power Company, which propose

THE GAME LAWS.

Ontario.

The Ontario Game Laws provide for the following close seasons:-

Quail and wild turkeys-Dec. 5 to Wild turkeys cannot be killed Oct. 15. V until 1900.

Grouse, pheasants, woodcock, partridge, snipe, rail, golden plover-Dec. 15 to Sept. 15. Swans or geese—May 1 to Sept. 15.

Ducks and waterfowl-Dec. Sept. 1.

Hares-Dec. 15 to Sept 15. Beaver, otter, mink, sable, marten, fisher—April 1 to Nov. 1.

Muskrat-May 1 to Jan. 1.

Deer, elk, reindeer or caribou—Nov. 15 to Nov. 1 the following year.

Only two deer may be taken in one season by one person.

No person shall hunt, pursue, kill, wound or capture deer in the waters of any river or lake within the limits of the Province of Ontario, or immediately after leaving such waters, and any person carrying a rifle, carbine or shotgun, and stationed in a canoe, punt, or boat of any kind, at or near any place where hunted deer are likely to enter the water during the open season, shall prima facie be deemed to be engaged in hunting or pursuing deer within meaning of this section.

All residents of Ontario must obtain licenses to kill deer, the license to be signed by the Chief Fish and Game Warden, and countersigned by the Pro-

a license tag affixed. Permits are issued to non-residents on payment of a fee of twenty-five dollars.

Quebec Close Seasons.

Shooting—Deer and moose from 1st January to 1st October. . . Caribou from 1st February to 1st September.

N.B.—The hunting of moose, caribou or deer, with dogs or by means of snares, traps, etc., is prohibited; but red deer may be hunted with dogs in the Counties of Ottawa and Pontiac, from 20th October to 1st of November of each year. No person has a right, during one season's hunting, to kill or take alive more than two moose, two caribou and three deer.

Beaver, mink, otter, marten, pekan, fox or lynx, from 1st April to 1st November. . . Hare, from 1st February to 1st November. . . Muskrat from 1st May to 1st January following, and bear between the 1st day of July and the 20th of August. . . Woodcock and snipe, plover, curlew, tattler or sandpiper from 1st February to 1st September. . Partridges of any kind, 1st February to 15th September. . Black duck, teal, wild duck of any kind (except sheldrake, loons and gull), from 1st March to 1st September. . Insectivorous birds, etc., protected between 1st March and 1st September. . It is unlawful to take nests of eggs at any time.

Fishing—Salmon (fly-fishing), from 15th August to 1st February. Speckled trout (salmo fontinalis), from 1st October to 30th April. Ouananiche, 15th September to 1st December. Large grey trout, lunge, etc., from 15th October to 1st December. Pickerel (dore), etc., 15th April to 15th May. Bass, 15th April to 15th June. Maskinonge, 25th May to 1st July. Whitefish, from 10th November to 1st December.

No person who is not domiciled in the Province of Quebec can at any time fish in the lakes or rivers of this Province, not actually under lease, without having previously obtained a license to that effect from the Commissioner of Crown Lands.

Manitoba Close Seasons.

Shooting—None of the folowing animals and birds shall be shot at, hunted, trapped, taken or killed on any Sunday, or between the dates named in ach year, nor shall any common carrier carry them, in whole or in part (except the skin), within the said periods:—

All kinds of deer, including antelope, k, or wapiti, moose, reindeer, or caribou, or their fawns, between the 15th December and the 15th October follow-

ing, and no one person may kill or take more than two of the said animals. This does not apply to deer which are private property and taken on his own lands and premises by or with the consent of the owner.

The grouse known as prairie chickens. and partridges, between 15th November and 1st October following, and it is illegal for one person to kill more than one hundred in one year, or twenty in . Woodcock, plover, snipe one day. and sandpipers, between 1st January and 1st August. . . All kinds of wild duck, sea duck, widgeon, teal, between 1st May and 1st September. fisher or pekan and sable, between 15th May and 1st October. between 1st May and 1st December fol-Marten, between 15th lowing. April and 1st November, . . Beaver must not be shot, hunted, trapped or

killed.

No birds or animals, excepting furbearing animals, shall be trapped, nor shall any swivel guns, batteries, punts or night lights be used to kill swans, geese or ducks; nor shall any beaver or muskrat house be destroyed at any time; nor shall polson or poisonous bait be exposed for any animal or bird. No person shall have in his possession any of the said animals or birds, except skins thereof. It is unlawful to trade or barter skins or heads of animals for export, except by license of Minister of Agriculture.

No eggs of the birds mentioned may at any time be taken or had in possession. No person or corporation shall at any time export any of the animals or birds mentioned. Persons without a domicile in the Province must take out a license, costing \$50, to kill any of the animals or birds named.

Fishing—Whitefish, tullibee, salmon, or lake trout may not be caught, bought, sold or had in possession between October 5 and December 15th; pickerel, pike, gold eyes, mullets, April 15th and May 15th; sturgeon, May 15th and June 15th; speckled trout, not between September 15th and May 1st.

Ontario.

Neither salmon trout or whitefish shall be caught between the 1st and 30th of November.

Fresh water herring shall not be caught between the 15th October and

30th November.
Speckled trout shall not be caught between 15th of September and 1st of May; 15 pounds weight can only be caught in the day; fish five inches long or less must be returned to the water.

THE C.W.A.

The Canadian Wheelmen's Association (familiarly known as the C.W.A.) was organized at St. Thomas by a few enthusiasts in or about the year 1882, and is now the largest amateur athletic association in Canada. For many years the Association has held its annual convention at the city of Toronto, at which the most exciting episodes were general, election of officers, and the awarding of the annual wheelmen's meet held on the 1st day of July.

With the advent of the modern pneumatic bicycle, the membership of the Wheelmen's Association was greatly augmented, and about a year ago numbered nearly 10,000. The objects of the association, as laid down in its constitution, are:

(a) To promote the general interest of cycling in Canada.

(b) To escertain, defend and protect the rights of wheelmen.

(c) To encourage and facilitate touring.

(d) To secure improvement in the condition of the public roads and highways of the Dominion.

(e) To control and govern track bicycle racing and racing bicyclists, both amateur and professional, in Canada.

(f) To establish and regulate bicycle championships for Canada and its constituent provinces.

All these objects have been attained in a very large measure. The Association has ever been on the alert to protect its members from anything which would infringe upon their rights as wheelmen, and has expended hundreds of dollars to this end, and the immunity from encroachments upon their rights which wheelmen enjoy, is largely due to the Association. The Kingston toll-gate nuisance, whereby wheelmen were asked to contribute toll the same as the owners of other This vehicles, is a case in point. mediaeval relic is still in vogue many parts of Canada, but it has been held that the proprietors of these toll gates canot exact any fee from the wheelmen. It is within the memory of most cyclists, the audacious attempt which the railway companies made to exact an almost prohibitive charge from cyclists for the carriage of their wheels.

The Executive of the C.W.A., believing that the railway companies bicycles as baggage should carry when accompanied by the owner, a bill was introduced in Parliament by Mr. George Casey, M.P., on behalf of the C.W.A. to this end, and was carried in the Commons, though defeated in the Senate by a small majority. The immediate effect, however, of the agitation was, that the railway companies forthwith made great concessions to the wheelmen, and wheels are now carried at a cost which does not operate harshly at all.

The Association has done a great deal for the betterment of the urban and suburban roads of the country, and the rapid advancement made in this direction has been largely due to the untiring efforts of the Association to this end. The Association greatly encourages touring, one of the real pleasures of the wheelmen, and the country has been dotted over with sign boards, and an exhaustive touring book is now in course of preparation, being compiled by the energetic chairman of the Roads and Touring Toronto. 
