Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

I deeply regret to have to announce to you The Speech. the death of the Queen Downger, a Princess whose many virtues endeared Her to all classes of Her Majesty's Subjects.

The occurrences of the past year, and the necessity which had arisen for providing suitable accommodation for Parliament while in Session having imposed on me the duty of considering during the recess the important subject embraced in the Address of the Legislative Assembly of last Session, relating to the places for holding the future Meetings of the Legislature, I have deemed it after full deliberation advisable to give effect to the prayer of that Address by summoning you to meet at

The important changes recently made in the Imperial Navigation Laws, and the improvein Chief in and over the Provinces of Canada, ments effected in the Provincial Canals, will, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and the Island of I trust, tend to promote materially the Prince Edward, and Vice Admiral of the same, Commercial interests of the Province, and to being seated in the chair on the Throne, the attract to the route of the St. Lawrence a considerable

considerable portion of the emigration from Europe to this Continent.

It affords me much gratification to be enabled to inform you, that recent advices from England indicate a marked improvement in the value of Canadian securities in the British market. Your deliberations will, I feel satisfied, have a tendency to encourage this reviving confidence.

I am very sensible of the great importance to these Colonies of placing the trade between the British North American Provinces on the most unrestricted footing. I have been in communication during the recess, upon this subject, with the Lieutenant-Governors of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, and with the Governor of Newfoundland. I recommend to your consideration the expediency of giving such powers to this Government, as may enable it to meet the advances of the Sister Colonies in a liberal spirit.

The Act passed last Session for the establishment of reciprocal free trade between Canada and the United States in certain articles the natural products of each, has not yet come into operation. I am informed that a corresponding measure is now under the consideration of the Congress of the United States.

By an Act passed during the last Session of the Imperial Parliament the entire controul of the internal Posts in British North America is vested in the Provincial Authorities. Whatever further action on the part of the Canadian Legislature may be necessary in order to secure for the inhabitants of these Provinces the benefits of a cheap and uniform postage rate, you will, I feel confident, be prepared to adopt.

The expediency of effecting an increase in the Parliamentary Representation of the Province will probably again engage your attention.

A measure will be submitted for your consideration founded on the Report of the Commissioners appointed to enquire into the conduct, discipline and management, of the Provincial Penitentiary. The increasing wealth and population of the Province, and the growing aversion to capital punishment, render it highly important that the system of discipline established in the Provincial

Penitentiary and Gaols should be made as far as possible effectual for the prevention of crime and the reformation of offenders.

I shall lay before you communications from Her Majesty's Commissioners for the promotion of the Exhibition of the Works of Industry of all Nations, to be held in London in 1851, which have been transmitted to me by the Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies. I venture to express the hope that Canadian industry and produce will be fittingly represented on that interesting occasion.

In pursuance of the Act of last Session, the practice and proceedings in the Court of Chancery in *Upper Canada* have been placed upon an improved footing, calculated to facilitate the business of the Court, and lessen expense to suitors. I shall direct copies of the rules which have been promulgated for this purpose to be laid before you.

I would recommend as of analogous and perhaps even equal importance, the consideration of the jurisdiction and practice of the Inferior Courts in that part of the Province, with a view to the extension of their sphere of usefulness, and the lessening as much as possible the expense of litigation.

The regulation of Municipalities, and the construction of Gaols and Court Houses in Lower Canada, and the laws for the selection and return of Jurors, and those for the Assessment of property for local purposes in Upper Canada are among the subjects which will doubtless engage your attention.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

I shall direct the public accounts with the estimates for the year to be laid before you.

I recommend to your attention an enquiry into the Revenue and Expenditure of the Province.

I rely on your readiness to grant the supplies which are necessary for the public service, and for the maintenance of the Provincial credit.

Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen,

I have deemed it to be my duty in the exercise

exercise of the Prerogative with which I am entrusted, to mark Her Majesty's disapproba- pro forma. tion of the course taken by persons holding Commissions at the pleasure of the Crown, who have formally avowed the desire to bring about the separation of this Province from the Empire of which it is a part.

The views put forward by these persons and by those who act with them, do not, 1 have reason to believe, find favor with any considerable portion of Her Majesty's Canadian subjects.

The great majority of the people of the Province have given at this conjuncture, proofs not to be mistaken of Loyalty to the Queen and attachment to the connection with Great Britain.

They look to their own Parliament for the redress of grievances which may be proved to exist, and for the adoption of such measures of improvement as may be calculated to promote their happiness and prosperity.

I feel assured that the confidence placed by them in the wisdom of Parliament will be justified by your acts: and that while you deal unsparingly with abuses, you will not barter away for novelties, rights dear to British subjects, nor abandon those principles of good faith, morality, and constitutional freedom, the strict adherence to which has enabled Great Britain, with God's blessing, to pass unscathed through many perils.

DISSENTIENT:

1st. Because this Bill has been proceeded with, as if it were a Public Bill, relating to matters of Provincial Import, and bearing or the general interests of the whole community; whereas in fact and in truth it directly concerns the separate interest or benefit of certain Companies or Associations of persons to which special powers and privileges have been at various times conceded by the Legislature for the promotion of particular objects of a private nature. The Bill, thus essentially private in its bearing and effect, belongs in my opinion to that class of Private Bills, which, in Treatises on Parliamentary Law and Usage, is termed Local and Personal, and, from its initiation, should have been regarded as such.

2nd. Because, in its proper character as a

Ordered, that the same do lie on the Table. upon Petition, and in due conformity to the Standing Orders of the House.

> 3rd. Because, without the solicitation or consent of any of the parties interested, whether in their corporate capacity or otherwise, signified in the customary manner to the House, this Bill imposes restraints upon the exercise of the powers granted by Statute, which are in my opinion calculated to injure rather than benefit the several interests intended to be protected by them, embarrass the proceedings of Corporations, impede, if not in many cases absolutely prevent, voting at General Meetings, and impair the confidence of Shareholders resident at a distance from the place of holding Elections, in the prudent management of the Joint Stock interests.

4th. Because by the Acts of Incorporation that will be affected by this Bill, the Shareholders have been invested with ample means of remedying all abuses which may from time to time be discovered in the management of their affairs; and until such means shall on trial have failed to produce a salutary effect, and application for increased powers of redress shall bave been made to Parliament in the ordinary form by such Corporations as may find themselves aggrieved, it seems unwise on the part of this House to interpose its authority, and prescribe unsolicited remedies in the gross for alleged evils and abuses; more especially, when, as in the present instance, and with the experience of many years in the practical working of sundry Acts, the preamble, resting on bare surmises merely states that "divers abuses are likely to be engendered in "consequence of, and are liable to result from" a particular practice of Stockholders long sanctioned by law, and does not plainly assertor declare (which it should have done, were the Bill well grounded) that actual and positive abuses did exist and had been proved to exist, in the management of any one Incorporated Joint Stock Company or in all of them.

5th. Because if it be right and just and consistent with sound Parliamentary rules to originate in this House Bills founded on such a basis as the present one, Shareholders in Incorporated Companies will never know at what future moment the powers and privileges specifically granted to them for the advancement of their respective private enterprises, by Private Bill, it ought to have been brought in solemn Acts of Parliament, may be suddenly

invaded

invaded, and varied or modified without their consent or express desire, even to the extent of increasing or diminishing the qualifications of Directors, altering the relative proportions which votes may bear to the amount of Stock held by parties, or in fine, enacting any other arbitrary innovation or restriction affecting their vested rights, which under the influence of a sudden impulse, or erroneous impressions might unfortunately find favor with this Honorable House.

6th. Because I have hitherto failed to discover in the Records of British Legislation any example of a measure widely and deeply affecting private interests and privileges similar to the present one, and cannot therefore but apprehend that it is a precedent unsafe in its origin and progress, and very questionable on the ground of expediency and propriety.

The Members, on the part of the Legislative Council of the Joint Committee on the Library, beg leave to report-

That at the outset of their labours, Your Committee have felt it incumbent on them to deliberate upon the most suitable method whereby Your Honorable House could record its high sense of the courteous liberality of the several Legislative Chambers, State Functionaries, and private individuals, who have so generously responded to the appeal made, on behalf of the Legislature and People of Canada, for assistance in the re-construction of the Parliamentary Libraries, so barbarously destroyed on the night of the 25th April, 1849.

In the consideration of this matter they have referred to precedents which are to be found in the Proceedings of the Imperial Parliament. On the occasion of the destruction by fire, in 1834, of the Building wherein the sittings of the English Parliament were held, and the consequent loss of the Libraries attached to the two Houses of the British Legislature, a similar munificence was evinced by the Chambers of Peers and Deputies of France, in transmitting to the Lords and Commons splendid sets of their Journals and official publications, together with other valuable Works, for the enrichment of their respective Libraries. In acknowledgment of this liberal act, the House of Lords adopted a Resolution declaratory of the satisfaction with which they received the intelligence of the receipt of so valuable a present from the French Authorities. They did not, however, make order for the transmission of this Resolve, to France, through their Speaker, on account of the informality which would attend any communication with a Foreign Body by either, or both Houses of Parliament, except through the Executive, or Head of the Government; but it was tacitly agreed upon that the terms of the Resolution should be conveyed to the French Chamber, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

The House of Commons, in like manner, and doubtless for similar reasons, abstained from sanctioning any direct communication with the French Government on this subject; but after

the attention of the House had been called to the matter by a Member in his place, a general feeling was expressed in favour of Mr. Speaker conveying to the Chambers of *France*, in some unofficial way, after the Session should terminate, the strong sense entertained by the House of their attention and munificence.

Following the course of procedure indicated by these examples, Your Committee would respectfully suggest the propriety of Your Honorable House embodying in some general Resolution, an expression of Your grateful appreciation of the prompt and generous response which has been made to the application for assistance in a work of such interest and importance, as well to the Legislature itself, as to the people of this Province generally. This Resolution might be afterwards communicated to the several Donors, by Mr. Speaker, at the close of the Session, without any formal direction from the House to that effect; or otherwise, he could be requested to convey it to such of the Donors with whom he might officially correspond, without irregularity; and with regard to foreign Functionaries, His Excellency could be addressed to transmit to them, in a formal manner, copies of the Resolution of the House.

In this way, it appears to Your Committee, that a fitting acknowledgment might be made by the House of the courtesy and kindness which have been manifested on the present occasion, and which, in the opinion of Your Committee, cannot but tend to unite, more closely, existing ties of political connexion with the Mother Country and the Sister Provinces, and to increase, towards our foreign neighbors, those feelings of good-will which are so essential to the preservation of peace and unanimity between contiguous States.

Your Committee have appended to this Report a complete List of the Donations received up to this date. Among them will be found one which is deserving of especial mention, namely, the series of Journals and Sessional Papers of the House of Commons, from 1801 to 1848, presented to the Library by the Right Honorable the Speaker of the House of Commons. The worth of this Collection, as a repertory of parliamentary, historical, and statistical information, can scarcely be over-rated; and it will be found of immense

The removal of *Charles de Léry*, Esquire, the late Clerk, has led to a reduction of the Staff of the Officers of the House, and a reduction in its expenditure may therefore be accomplished.

The introduction of the use of the French language has added very largely to the work of the House; and your Committee do not now recommend the House to dispense with the services of any who are at present employed.

To John Fennings Taylor, Junior, Esquire, the Additional Assistant Clerk and Chief Office Clerk, the Committee recommend the payment of an annual Salary of £300. To the two Senior Writing Clerks, William Anstruther Maingy and Joseph Eugène Doucet, the annual Salary of £150 each; and to the two Junior Writing Clerks, James Adamson and John George Couillard, the annual Salary of £100 each; with the express understanding that all the foregoing Officers shall give up their whole time and attention, from day to day, to the business of the House, throughout the year, unless leave of absence be granted by the Honorable the Speaker; and should any Officer absent himself, without leave in writing first obtained from the Speaker, your Committee suggest that any such Officer so absenting himself from his duties, should be dismissed from the service of the House: And your Committee would further suggest, that the Clerk of the House do in future make a monthly return or report to the Honorable the Speaker, upon the attendance of the Officers under him, and in every instance reporting their absence, if absent; and that the Clerk be further required to exercise a careful supervision over those who are under him, in order to ensure the efficient discharge of their respective duties.

Then, His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to deliver the following Speech:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

In relieving you for the present from further attendance in Parliament, I desire to offer you my warm acknowledgments for the zeal and diligence with which you have applied yourselves during the course of the Session, to the consideration of many subjects of great importance to the Public welfare.

It will be my study to carry into effect without unnecessary delay, the arrangements contemplated in the Imperial and Provincial Acts which have recently passed, for transferring to the Colonial Authorities the control and management of the Provincial Post Office.

I am of opinion that an exchange of Products may take place between the several British North American Provinces, to a greater extent than has hitherto been the case, with much advantage to these Colonies; and I shall avail myself of the powers conferred on me by the Act which you have passed for the promotion of his important object.

I have had great satisfaction in transmitting to the Secretary of State, to be laid at the foot of the Throne, the Addresses passed during the present Session by either House of the Provincial Parliament, expressive of devoted Loyalty to Her Majesty and attachment to the Institutions of the Province.

These Addresses represent, I am confident, the sentiments of the great body of the Canadian People, as truly as those of Parliament.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

I thank you, in the name of Her Majesty, for the liberality with which you have voted the Supplies which are requisite for the Public and this Provincial Parliament is accordingly Service. Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen,

I congratulate you on the improvement which has taken place in the Revenue, and on the promise of an abundant Harvest which seems to be general throughout the Province.

Nature has bestowed on this Province singular facilities for transporting to distant Markets its own Products and those of other Countries, and their extension and development are objects of primary importance to its welfare.

I had therefore much satisfaction in lately visiting, in company with many Members of both Houses of Parliament, a great PublicWork which forms a link in the chain of Water communication extending from the far West through Canada to the Ocean.

The gratification which I derived from this visit was enhanced by the opportunity which it afforded for an exhibition of courtesy on the part of the Citizens of a neighboring and friendly Nation.

I have also observed with satisfaction the impulse which recent Acts of the Legislature have given to Railway enterprize, and to the construction of Plank and Macadamized Roads in various parts of the Province.

I trust that on your return to your respective Districts, you will exert the influence which you so deservedly possess in furtherance of these and other measures of practical utility. By directing the energies of the People of the Province towards the prosecution of objects, in the accomplishment of which they have a common interest, the asperities of party spirit, which have exercised at various periods so baneful an effect on its welfare, will, it may be hoped, be mitigated, and its progress in all that constitutes substantial prosperity, with God's blessing, ensured.

The Librarian of the Honorable the Legislative Council has the honor to Report,—That, on the evening of the 25th April, 1849, the building containing the Library under his charge was set fire to by incendiaries, and the whole of the valuable collection of Books, with the exception of a few odd volumes, was entirely consumed.

The Librarian regrets that from the violence and suddenness of the attack, without a moment's warning, he was utterly unable to do

anything to save them; and that they, together with his own books, papers and private property, in the Library, of necessity fell a prey to the flames.

During the past recess, no Books have been bought, with the exception of a few necessary works of reference, which have been purchased by the Honorable the Speaker.
