PROGRESS OF THE WAR [April 6 to April 12]

THE Western campaign, in the week under review, again witnessed the fiercest fighting. Again the Germans continued their efforts to draw nearer to Verdun; and again, while the Germans gained some ground on the west of the Meuse, the French continued to hold the central position.

The Russian campaign in Europe was prosecuted with greater vigor in the Dvinsk sector, but no material change was reported. Very little transpired concerning hostilities in Galicia.

No hostilities were reported in any part of the Balkans. The Austro-Italian campaign continued with the usual vigor, but no important success was achieved by either side.

Another Zeppelin raid was made on the east coast of England on the 5th of April, making the sixth raid in as many consecutive days. One person was killed and eight persons injured; but the exact locality of the raid and the extent of the material damage done were not reported.

In the matter of commerce arising out of the war the Dutch have profited immensely.
