CHARGES POLICE WITH CORRUPTION

John H. Roberts of Temperance Fame is in Fight at Montreal.

MONTREAL, July 11.—That the city police here are in league with a gang of hoodlums, who on Monday night almost killed John H. Roberts, at the close of an open air temperance meeting is one of the serious charges made by the Grand Lodge of Quebec, Independent Order of Good Templars, a letter forwarded to-day to Sir Lomer Gouin, the Provincial Premier, who is asked to control the Montreal police force and place it under a competent head.

ASYLUMS ARE OVER POPULATED

Not Enough Accommodation in Ontario For Feeble Minded People.

TORONTO, July 11.—"An over-population of 75 and 130 applicants on file waiting." This growing need of more accommodation for the feeble-minded in Ontario is stated in terse terms in a report issued by E. R. Rogers, inspector of prisons and hospitals in a report just laid before Hon. W. J. Hanna who is taking the matter up with a view to finding a remedy for the existing conditions of things.

POPE CONTINUES IN GOOD HEALTH

But Did Not Take His Usual Drive Owing to the Storms

ROME, July 11.—The pope's physicians to-day dissuaded him from taking his usual drive and walk in the gardens of the vatican owing to the violence of the storm and the heavy rain. His holiness continues perfectly well and the exceptionally cool weather conduces partly to keep him in good health.

MEDICINE HAT, ALB., July 11.—Charges of manipulation of funds entrusted to their care made against Chief of Police Bruce and Magistrate Keely by Sergt. Campy will be looked into by the city council on Monday next.

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MILITANTS PRODUCE SCARE IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

Report of Pistol Followed by Bombardment of Pamphlets on Members of House Created Some Sensation—Mouse Traps Thrown Out.

LONDON, July 11.—The report of a pistol shot fired from the Strangers' Gallery in the House of Commons to-day, accompanied by a yell of "Justice for women!" caused a panic among the members who were in session. Simultaneously with the report a shower of pamphlets rained down on the members. They were printed with the words "Votes for Women." Two persons pointed out as the perpetrators of the outrage were seized by the officials, hustled from the gallery and detained, pending investigation.

SMASHED WINDOWS ON PARADE

A Liverpool despatch to-day says: Militant suffragettes started a window-smashing demonstration during King George's visit here to-day. Armed with pokers, squads of women shattered several large windows along the route of the procession, but the police quickly rounded them up, and order had been restored before the arrival of his Majesty.

FINED FIFTY DOLLARS

A cable from Newport, England, says: A fine of \$50 or one month's imprisonment was inflicted to-day on Mrs. Margaret Haigh Mackworth, daughter of the "coal king," David A. Thomas, by the police magistrate here, for setting fire to a public mail box on June 26.

LATE NEWS OF FRATRICIDE WAR

Roumania it is Said Will Start Fight With Bulgaria—Other News.

LONDON, July 11.—The Roumanian declaration of war on Bulgaria is expected here to assist in bringing to an end the carnage in the Balkans by forcing speedy action on the part of the powers who have been invited to intervene. The object of King Charles of Roumania in assuming the part of a belligerent is to strengthen Roumania's claim to participate in the ultimate sharing out of territory in the Balkan peninsula. For the present, Roumania, it is thought, will probably content herself with occupying the strip of Bulgarian territory from Turtukai on the Danube to Baltchik on the Black Sea, including the city of Silistria.

DESIRED TO BE REAL LIVE HERO

Fifteen Year Old Boy Had Strange Motive for Incendiarism. CAUSED SOME BIG FIRES

PITTSBURGH, Pa., July 11.—Desire to be a hero and his fascination for observing firemen at work was the reason for his starting numerous fires on the north side, given in the confession of Raymond Raab, aged 15, who is under arrest charged with arson. Young Raab enumerates the fires he started, one of them being the Library Office Building which was destroyed with a \$50,000 loss last December.

ARRESTED LAST NIGHT AND MADE A CONFESSION OF HIS CRIMES

RAAB has been suspected for some time as it was observed he was often among the first on the scene of a fire when an alarm was sent in. He was arrested last night and after severe questioning confessed to the charges.

TO STOP BABY CRYING LAY ON DOWN GRADE

LADY BALFOUR TELLS MERCHANTS OF BURLEIGH TOLD A MEETING OF MERCHANTS YESTERDAY HOW TO SILENCE CRYING BABIES. She said she had discovered her method accidentally, and had always found it successful. Her suggestion was to lay the babies with their heads slightly lower than their feet at a gradient of about one in twelve and they would soon fall asleep.

TO TEACH SEX HYGIENE IN CHICAGO'S SCHOOLS

CHICAGO, July 11.—Chicago will be the first municipality in the United States to take up the teaching of sex hygiene in the High schools. The Board of Education has adopted a recommendation to make the teaching of it a part of the curriculum. It was not without a fight that the question was settled.

BOARD OF EDUCATION ADOPTS IT AS PART OF THE CURRICULUM

For the present the course will be confined to the High schools. Later, if experience shows it to be advisable it will be extended to the upper grades of the elementary schools. In the resolution adopted the words "personal purity" are substituted for "sex hygiene," and the course is officially so designated.

LACROSSE PLAYERS UP

TORONTO, July 11.—The hearing of "Buck" Yeaman and of James Kenzie accused of assaulting Eddie Longfellow and Art Warwick respectively in the progress of a lacrosse match at the Island were this morning in police court for over a week. Warwick was called upon to give evidence and he denied having any knowledge that Mackenzie had struck him or any belief that anyone had struck him intentionally.

THEY'RE NOW ORPHANS

MONTREAL, July 11.—The children of William Leslie, mortally wounded by Miss Mathilde Bernault was practicing on Tuesday last, having been rendered orphans by Leslie's death. Mrs. Frances Desrosches of this city offers to provide for them. The children are now with Leslie's sister in Toronto. Leslie was a plasterer and only came here from Toronto a few weeks ago.

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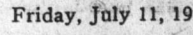

THE GROWING COST OF LIVING

According to the last issued report of the Dominion Labor Gazette, the cost of living is still on the increase. The Department's index number stood at 137.0 for May as compared with 136.3 for April and 136.3 for May, 1912. The chief increases during that month occurred in animals and meats, fish, fruits and vegetables, with a considerable decrease in dairy products and fuel.

A GOOD MOVE BY HON. MR. WHITE.

As Finance Minister, Hon. Mr. White has proved himself to be an alert and valuable man. Recently the Union Life Assurance Company, with some 150,000 policy holders in Canada, was wound up, and Mr. White got good and busy. He entered into negotiations with the Metropolitan Life Assurance Company of New York, one of the strongest corporations in the world, which has taken over the assets, and policy holders have the right to re-insure with them on the terms of the existing policies.

A POPULAR APPOINTMENT.

Mr. Arthur Meighen, M. P., of Portage La Prairie, the new Solicitor General for the Dominion Government, was born in St. Marys, but he has been practicing law in the West for a great many years with much success. He is one of the youngest members of the House, and is now thirty-seven years of age, having been only thirty-two years of age when first elected in 1908. In short order he proved that he was a keen and logical debater, and during his term in Opposition proved himself a most efficient lieutenant of Mr. Borden.

THE OTHER WAY ROUND.

Time was, and for many years, when the call of the United States proved a great lure to Canadians of both sexes. Tens of thousands of them crossed the border to live under the stars and stripes and their numbers were so numerous that in Chicago two papers flourished "The Canadian-American" and "The British American," both appealing mainly to the Dominion born.

Every newspaper man on this side can recall the fact that in connection with the death of some pioneer, and especially of the farming class, the record would run regarding the children: Richard, Chicago; Robert, New York; Frank, Detroit; Mrs. Robinson, Kalamazoo; Mrs. Jones, St. Louis, and John at home. That state of affairs is largely true even yet, but the tide has turned.

Bequest of \$10,000 59 Years Ago Will be Looked Up. (Canadian Press Despatch) BOSTON, July 11.—A hearing on a petition under the will of Thomas W. ST. PETERSBURG, July 11.—A distinctly hopeful view is expressed to-day by the Russian press, and also in official circles in regard to the Balkan situation. Peace is regarded generally as imminent on account of the crippling of the Bulgarian armies and of the severe losses sustained by Serbia. The Russian Red Cross Society has decided not to send any detachments of doctors, nurses and ambulance men to the front.

TILLSONBURG WOMAN ENDS LIFE IN A POND

Commits Suicide While Under Influence of Melancholia. ST. THOMAS, July 11.—The body of Mrs. William Hindson, of Tillsonburg, was recovered from the mill-pond there yesterday, she having committed suicide by throwing herself in while suffering from a fit of melancholia on Monday. The deceased was 52 years of age, and is survived by a husband and grown-up family.
