Sir Charles H. Tupper's Lecture.

Hon. Sir C. H. Tupper lectured before a large and representative audience in College Hall on Wednesday evening.

The lecture was the first of the Star Course being given under direction of the Acadia Athenaeum.

Sir Charles spoke an hour upon the Baring Sea question. He is a clear, forcible, able speaker and received the closest attention with frequent bursts of applause.

In beginning the minister referred to the scene which the dispute had reached when the arbitration was agreed to.

He caused much amusement by showing how the representatives of the United States had misrepresented facts in the presentation of their side of the case.

The value of the industry and the enterprise of Canadians in prosecuting it were set forth and Sir Charles closed with a fine tribute to the ability of Sir John Thompson, who had been honored by the Queen in being appointed one of the arbitrators and whose judicial mind had been so influential in the Council at Paris.

John B. Mills, M. P., had a seat on the platform during the lecture. A large number of ladies and gentlemen were present to the close of the address.

The audience gave their distinguished guest a warm reception and discharged their offices of courtesy in an enthusiastic manner.

As the visit of the minister was not political all joined in the greeting to Sir Charles as one of Canada's prominent public men. We have no doubt they will do the same when a Liberal leader visits the institution.

We are glad to see the public men of the country coming to our town and see them so well received and entertained.

Apple Shipments.

Reports of sales in the English market have been so favorable during the past few weeks that apple speculators are again buying quite eagerly.

The prospect now indicates that all the apples in the valley, of the winter varieties, will be bought up for shipment across, leaving only those of inferior grade and variety to be sent to our local markets.

The earlier shipments to London resulted in rather heavy losses to most of our shippers, but in nearly every instance this was owing to the condition in which the fruit was landed.

Some of the steamers which have been carrying fruit appear to be wholly unfit for the purpose, the want of ventilation and intense heat of the hold of the steamer partially cooking the apples during the voyage across.

Nova Scotia Steel.

Mr. Gilpin, inspector of mines, is preparing a display of Nova Scotia minerals and products of the mines for Imperial Institute, London, which will be forwarded shortly, and will remain permanently at the Institute.

Report of Directors of King's Co. Agricultural Society.

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN.—The Directors of this the oldest Agricultural Society in Canada, have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report, this being the 105th year of our Society's existence.

Our membership is large, there being 115 members, and our finances still continue satisfactory.

The Society owns or controls 4 bulls, 2 horses and a ram. There exists a general wish amongst our members to go more in for dairy stock, so much so that we shall have to meet their wishes in the near future by replacing the Shortborns with Ayrshires or other suitable dairy bulls.

It would appear that our members are not keeping as many sheep as formerly, by the small patronage the Shropshire ram gets; though by the "Crop Report," issued by the Secretary of Agriculture, sheep are on the increase in Kings Co. (in spite of the dog nuisance).

The Chester box has proved to be a good stockholder and is largely patronized, the change has been most satisfactory.

We will pass on to the crops of the past season. The spring was rather late and grass slow starting, plowing commenced about May 1st, and excellent weather for getting in the crops, which later on proved too dry.

First of all taking the hay crop, we secured a large crop and in good order. In the Crop Report Kings Co. stands 104, or 4 per cent, above a normal crop; probably this increase has mostly been fed out early, as the pastures have been so dry, at any rate there is not much of a surplus in the county, and prices are likely to be high in the spring.

It is worth now about \$10.00 at the barns. In that Crop Report the acreage given for hay in Kings Co. is 49,100 acres, and the probable yield 54,650 tons; it may be mentioned that the grasshoppers greatly reduced the hay crop, and in some instances destroyed fields of oats, beans and turnips.

The yield of grain this season has been light, not exceeding 30 bushels per acre, and more often less. Oats now are worth 45 cents per bushel, and are scarce. It is an unfortunate thing that Kings Co. farmers cannot raise their own oats, but have to buy largely of imported grain, sending so much money out of our Province.

Potatoes, the principle export crop, are a fair crop of excellent quality, yielding from 150 to 200 bushels per acre, and have a ready sale at 40 cents per bushel for the West Indies market, and the probability is that in this district the crop will be put off early. It is supposed that 40 cents out of the field is equivalent to 60 cents in the spring out of the cellar.

In the Crop Report we see that there were 6,266 acres planted this season in potatoes; as prices are good there is every reason to think that a large acreage will be planted next spring. Beans have in this district largely taken the place of potatoes, as a field crop, and have proved a good crop, 25 bushels per acre being considered a good yield.

The estimation for the county is about 5,290 bushels, far in excess of any other county in the Province, and the price at present is \$2.00 per bushel.

The root crop has turned out better than most of us expected, being helped greatly by the fall rains, turnips yielding about 500 bushels per acre, only a small proportion of the crop being hoisted at present. There have been four sows built the past summer in this part of the county, and are filled with corn, English horse-beans, and sunflower heads, this mixture when put in in good order and the proper proportions is a perfect feed for milch cows, and is popularly known as the "Robertson Mixture."

It is a crop that does not take much out of the soil, is easily and cheaply cultivated, thereby being a cheap food. The maximum cost, as fed out to stock, (cut up) would be \$3.00 per ton.

Now, turning to dairy matters, it will be remembered that on March 2nd last, a special meeting was called by your Directors for the purpose of hearing addresses from Col. Wm. Blair, the manager of Nappan Experimental Farm, and Prof. Hopkins, Dairy Inspector for this Province. We were able to give those gentlemen a full house, and we passed a most profitable evening together, but not only that, for the very first step, were taken at this meeting to organize a Dairy Factory, and now to-day we have in Wolfville the Acadia Dairy Co. Creamery and Cheese Factory, in full working order, indeed a substantial evidence of the spirit of the meeting. As most of our members are patrons of that Factory it might not be out of place here to state that things have turned out satisfactory. There have been made at the Factory, up to Nov. 1st, 25,044 lbs of cheese, and 4,345 lbs of butter, one ton of milk now making 90 lbs of butter.

This factory is now getting 7 tons of milk per week, and with the prospect of a considerable increase by the beginning of the year, the intention being to run all the year round.

The season was a very trying one for the cows, what with short pastures, in July and August, and no after-feed on our dikes in September, and also the appearance for the first time of the "horn-fly" amongst our cattle. This pest is hard to get rid of, and is said to be worse the second season. Some used kerosene emulsion on their cattle, but it does not seem to have the desired effect; the yield of milk was largely reduced and cattle lost flesh through continual worry.

At the recent Provincial Exhibition held in Halifax, the Acadia Dairy Co. with their entries took their prizes in the following order:—

keen competition with several other factors, proving the quality of the products, a feat not performed by any other competitor in those classes. We may hope ere long with the able manager now employed, to make these substantial products of our farms a world-wide reputation, as has already been obtained in this Province.

In the Crop Report (before referred to) the increase in cows is as high as 25 per cent. in one locality, and others from 10 per cent. to 15 per cent.; this shows a move in the right direction; thus Kings Co. is destined to be in a few years, by the use of good dairy bulls, the greatest dairying county in the Dominion of Canada.

In the past she has been noted for fat cattle of superior quality, through the use of fine Shortborns, so she will be much more so and with a wider reputation too, for the excellence of her Dairy products; and the few factories that have sprung up the past summer, simultaneously (it might almost be said), will be but a mere fraction of those in this county ten years hence; for we have got the feed, the climate, plenty of pure water, good facilities for shipping, and we will trust the men with push enough to get us there. We also held another special meeting in April at which Prof. Faville, of the Horticultural School lately established in Wolfville, kindly presented various specimens of the various subjects pertaining to fruit growing, and especially, the propagation of plants. His lecture with charts proved not only interesting but most instructive, and we quite hope to be favored with more lectures from him this winter.

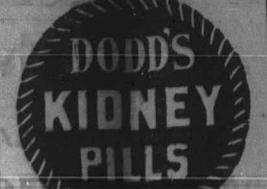

CHAPTER IV. Well, Joshua, six weeks have gone by and the thieving goes on just the same. Now what are you going to do about it? "You just wait and see."

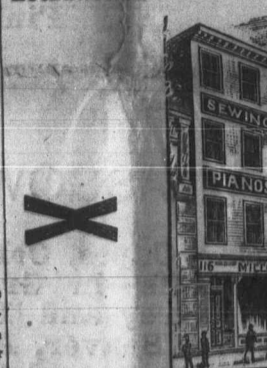
