The next fortification westward from Fort Alexander is Fort Peter, armed with 80 guna, and the one side of which dominates the roads and the passage to St. Petersburg. Fort Menchikoff, which was built in 1851, commands one channel. Finally, on the right bank of this channel, and opposite Fort Menchikoff, lies Fort Risbank, which, when finished, will play 250 cannons.

The latest accounts from St. Petersburg confirm the intelligence that all the strand batteries which dominate the channel that leads into the roads, have been doubled and all these batteries, which together now number 8,000 guns of the greatest caliber, must be brought to silence before Cronstadt itself can ever be attacked. The same intelligence says further that there stands three corps of artillery in reserve.

By a ukase of March 11, General Dohn of the engineers has been appointed "Governor Military" of Cronstadt as interim, and thus replaces the regular commandment, General Lucche.

The readers of this description will perceive that Cronstadt is a very redoubtable fortification, even to the allied armsda, and this, too, without the aid of those "infernal machines," submarine batteries, etc., which some time since filled the columns of the German journals, but which in reality nover existed anywhere except in the brains of the Russian disposed Berliners. Many, indeed, are the changes which have been rung, nevertheless, upon these reports, and all possible versifications have been made out of them. THE ATMOSPHERIC TELEGRAPH.—The at-THE ATMOSPHERIC TELEGRAPH.—The atmospheric telegraph of 1. S. Richardson, of Boston, which was illustrated on page 265, vol. 8 Sci. Am., has been laid before Congress, and an appropriation asked for laying down a line between Washington and Baltimore, for carrying the mails. A committee, appointed by the Senate—of which Senator Mallory is chairman—to investigate the subject, has reported as follows:

"It is deemed expedient that the experi-ment should be made for a short distance, upon an established mail route, in order that, if successful, it might constitute a part of a more extended work; and your com-mittee has been disposed to prescribe a direct line between Washington and Bal-timore. The mail between Washington and New York is now carried upon railroads in New York is now carried upon railroads i twelve hours. If your committee do not geatly err, the same mails may be carried between these cities in two hours, by the proposed atmospheric telegraph, and the expenditure now necessary for the trans-mission of one set of mails, would enable mission of one set of mails, would enable the post office department to send six sets of mails every twelve hours. Many practical difficulties and objections will doubtless develope themselves whenever the atmospheric telegraph shall be established upon a large scale—such, for example, as wastage of power in the air pumps, the wear and tear in the mail bags, pistens, and interior surface of the tubes by high velocities, the admission of air in the tubes, the effects of climate upon them, the expense of establishing them, &c., &c.; but your committee, after weighing these and other objections which have been suggested, do not hesitate to recommend an appropriation to

RUMOURED EVACUATION OF THE PRINCI-

The Austrian Correspondenz states that it is believed General Alderberg, on the 24th, brought orders to Prince Gertschakoff at Bucharest to evacuate the Priocipalities.

The Presse announces that the Russians are in full retreat from Frateschti to Bucharest, followed by the Turks under Omar Pacha. The latter portion of this report is probable.

The Sentinelle Toulonnaise of the 30th ultim states that a number of pieces of siege artillery had been embarked at Toulon for the East. They are to form five batteries, with 633 cannoncers, who have nearly all arrived at Toulon.

LATEST OPERATIONS ON THE DANUBE. The operations of the beligerent armies in the Danubian provinces have assumed within these few days, a character considerably more decisive than before. The Torks, it will be remembered, crossed the Danube from Rustchuk on the 7th of last month, and subsequently established themselves in the town of Giurgevo, on the opposite bank. The Russians had retired to Fratescht; a sillnes within a very short distance of Giurgevo. a village within a very short distance of Giurgevo, and on the line of communication with their head-quarters at Bucharest. At this conjuncture General Gortschokoff, as was positively asserted, summoned to Frateschti all the force under his command, with the obvious design either of attacking the Turks and driving them back across the Danube, or of opposing their advance. A few days later we reserved intelligence that the former of these intentions had been carried out by a grand attack-upon Giurgevo, but that the assailants had been repulsed with signal loss. This action took place on the 23d, and we yesterday published its natural sequel in the announcement that the Russiass had retreated from Fratechti on the 27th, that they were preparing also to evacuvillage within a very short distance of Giurgevo

published its natural equel in the announcement that the Rassians had retreated from Fratechti on the 27th, that they were preparing also to evacutate Bucharest, and that the victorious Turks were advancing rapidly on their track. It is probable, indeed, that Omar Pacha has by this time entered Bucharest, and that the capital of Wallachia is once more in possession of its lawful sovereign.

Important as such events are in themselves, they acquire additional significance from the circumstances attending them. It is evident that the retreate of the Russians is general—that is to say, that it has taken place in pursuance of concerted orders and from all points at once. Not only Frateschti, but Kalugereni, a place midway between Frateschti and Bucharest, Bucharest itself, and Oltenitzs, the old scene of conflict on the banks of the river, were all to be abandoned, and the artillery and baggage from each of these positions was already moving by parallel routes towards Moldavia. The Times says—We are at length in a condition to present to the public something more than speculations and surmises on the movements of the allied armies in the East. About the time we write, if not on this very day, a force made up of English, French, and Turks, and amounting to between 80,000 and 100,000 men, will invade the Crimea, and attempt to effect a lodgement on the heights commanding the harbour of Sebastopol. The preparations have been some time in progress, and the rumoured visit of Generals Brown and Canrobert to the Circassian coast, with 5000 men, was really to secure a landing on the Crimea. It is then with the greatest satisfaction that we now announce an enterprise corresponding to the dignity and resources of the two great western powers, England and France, and so far justifying the confidence of Turkey. A fortnight will probably elapse before any tidings of the result can arrive, but at an earlier date we shall learn from the East that all the disposable forces have embarked for the neighbourhood of Sebastopol. It is possible that the attack may degenerate into a blockade; and, if we only persevere, we must ultimately starve out the garrison of this proud fortress; but we hope to report an end of the affair long before it comes to that pass; and, with the forces at our disposal, there is no reason why every some and every plank in the fort should not be at the mercy of the allied armies in a very few weeks or even days.
