A recent decision by the judicial committee of the Privy Council makes the Dominion of Canada responsible for a large amount of money, said to reach the sum of ten million dollars. It will be recalled that the original contract with the Grand Trunk Pacific. that of 1903, provided that the government was to guarantee onds of the Railway Company. The contract named certain sums and the guarantee was to cover the face value of bonds of those mounts. The second contract, of 1904, by introducing the word implement" changed the bargain

If the guarantee was to be for \$13,000 a mile, the new arrangement meant the government must guarantee bonds enough to produce \$13,000 cash, no matter at what price the bonds were issued. This construction was placed upon the revised arrangement by critics of the measure, and it has been apheld by the Privy Council. The Laurier Government endeavored to dispute this reading, claiming that it was not bound to this extent, but the final decision is that the Dominion is pledged to the
