Troops have travelled over Gov rnment Railways.

Thousands arrive each week at Halifax and are sent forward to Dispersal Areas.

Since the war began in 1914 up to March 1st, when S.S. Belgic disembarked her returned sol dier passengers at Halifax 757,section of available Dominion Land in 400 troops have been carried on special trains over the Canadian Government Railways.

The first train which carried troops over the Government Railways the year the war was declared was numbered one and all special troop trains to and pre-amption. At St. Albans there still re mains the George, one of the pilgrims' inns, possessing an oratory hapel, where low Mass was said for those lodged there. St. Albans contained the shrine of the protomartyr of Britain. The "New Inn" at Gloucester, built some 740 years ago, first constructed in the middle of the fifteenth century by John Twynning, a onk of St. Peters Abbey, Gloucester, offered accommodations for pilgrims.

The New Inn still retains all its mediaeval quaintness.

Colchester in Essex possesses many hospices, being a halting place in pilgrimages to Walsingham, and there also was the Benedictine Abbey of St. John Pilgrims to the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham found food and rest there. Among the an-
