THE ISSUE OF THE HOLD-UP.

A hold-up of the estimates is a matter of far more immediate public concern than ordinarily supposed. It affects the public interest in a multitude of ways.

The estimates are a series of proposals to spend the money of the public in certain ways for the public benefit. If the proposals are not endorsed the expenditure cannot be made.

The hold-up of the recent session affected the public interests adversely through nearly every department of the Government.

In the customs department alone 1,800 employees were without the wages due them. The men on the Government railways had to wait for their pay until public opinion forced the abandonment of the blockade.

Another seed-wheat swindle. Press dispatches have been entering our recently with stories of the Alexander Taylor school. This is

marvellous new variety of wheat that is supposed to revolutionize the wheat growing branch of agriculture. Briefly, the story is that some years ago an Idaho farmer went to Alaska and while prowling around in some remote corner found a few heads of a new kind of wheat growing in the wilderness.

On the face of it the story looks decidedly "fishy." Alaska as a natural nursery for developing new varieties of cultivated cereals is a conception startling enough in itself. Equally disquieting is the behaviour of the lucky discoverer of this alleged variety.

A wheat that would produce two hundred bushels to the acre would be worth keeping as a monopoly. But unless we altogether misinterpret the source, meaning and purpose of these despatches, the Idaho gentleman does not want to keep his monopoly and the agents will be along one of these days offering the Alaska marvel to the farmers for seed—at several dollars per bushel.

Experimental Farm. Indian Head, Aug. 29, 1908. Dear Sir,—I notice in nearly all papers reports of a wonderful wheat which is being raised in the States and which is being prepared to take in confiding farmers in due time.

These of our readers who have lived the half century will remember a huge swindle operated on Ontario farmers with a wheat called "El Dorado" which was said to revolutionize the whole world.

The "El Dorado" wheat was an exact counterpart of this new variety, and was for a year or two dangled before our eyes through newspapers, until agents went through the country and sold it at high prices, stipulating that the entire crop from the seed was to be taken by the agents at a great advance in price over all other grades.

My opinion is, another big wheat swindle is being prepared, and I trust the settlers of three western provinces will not be suckers, like those of Ontario were in the seventies. The "El Dorado" wheat was one of no use for flour, and could not be sold except for feed, it gave no better yield than the ordinary wheat of that period.
