That Famous Trip.

An Irishman once said, "There is one thing I am not sure of." On being asked what it was, he replied, "I am not sure I have to die."
If he had been such a man as was Elijah or Enoch, he might have had some grounds for his belief, but being of the earth "Earthy," it was absolutely out of place that he should have contemplated such a "finish."
This introduction may not be to the point, but it shows how far one may be out in his ideas, and how very like the evening of the 13th was a most disagreeable one, but long before the scheduled hour for the departure of the train, pupils from both B. F. C. and M. C. crowded into the Depot in such numbers that the place was literally alive with faces that bore a marked contrast to the general aspect without.

After a considerable wait the train at length backed in, and within the next five minutes all the passengers had stowed away both themselves and their baggage, and had settled down to a general confab.

It was then we learned that our only means of salvation lay in beating a retreat back to town, which we did and side tracked to allow the incoming local to pass.
Thus it transpired that, after spending about six hours on the road, we ultimately brought up at the place from whence we started. But the passengers—at least the majority of those in "our car"—were not at all dispirited, and when they found it was likely to be an "all-night job" they started in to make it as enjoyable as possible. Games of various kinds were indulged in, and the sound of merry songs, and orange peel floated harmoniously through the car, and the latter alighting on the nose and other adjacent organs.

One friend (he was not of our number) became sleepy, and after sleeping away the good humour that characterized him during the early hours of the evening, was suddenly awakened by a friendly piece of orange peel which, instead of evoking some good natured ejaculation, produced the opposite effect, whereupon he immediately set out to wreak vengeance upon the culprit.
His act was not unanimously applauded, rather was it denounced as unfitting to such a time and place, and his name (we didn't know what) became "mud."
One of our number who usually carries his Autograph Album, and who has a mania for new autographs, made a general canvass of the car, and when he had finished his album showed a large number of original items, all bearing on the events of the fatal 13th April.
As we passed through Holyrood, daylight appeared, and those of us who had been most active during the night began to feel the effects of our activity, and are long were oblivious to everything.
Soon, however, we arrived at Briggs Junction, where our ways diverged, some going via the Shore Line, others continuing West, and after taking a sad farewell, we separated with a wish that when we next met Spring would be here to stay. We shall not soon forget the 13th April, 1911.

People Ignored.

Those who live on Quidi Vid Road will derive cold comfort from the words of the Government organ this morning. Ever since they learned that the sealers of the Newfoundland, whom the authorities have determined to detain for observation, were to be isolated in a structure now being erected near Quidi Vid Road, they have been in a state of alarm, fearing that smallpox might spread to their dwellings. Their alarm was natural and they looked to the Government and Municipal Council for protection. Yesterday we counselled the Government to re-consider their decision. Instead of doing so, the Daily News has promptly declared in behalf of the Government that the sealers who are under observation will it is hoped be housed in this temporary structure to-night. According to the Daily News of this morning, one case has already broken out among the 68 men under observation, and there is a risk of other cases. The Daily News is trying to make out that the furor which has arisen is due to the Opposition newspapers. This is not so. The Opposition newspapers have but voiced a natural and reasonable objection which was in existence more than 24 hours before these newspapers were issued. For instance, Councillor Mulally was on the alert on Sunday, and the Evening Telegram and Evening Herald were not issued till Monday afternoon.

It will be remembered that our objection was taken solely to the location. We stated that these men deserve the most considerate treatment, good food and comfortable quarters, but that they should be given the best available of these without endangering the public at large. We pointed out that a hastily run up shed could not be comfortable, and we drew a contrast between the housing of these unfortunate men and the housing of the members of the Picnic Party. But we challenge the Daily News to point out where we suggested that a private house should be taken. We suggested the hiring of one or two sealing steamers, cleaning them out, and making the men as comfortable as possible, and in such a way as would isolate them from others, who would be thus kept immune. The value of our suggestion is unwittingly corroborated by the Daily News itself under the caption of "A LESSON LEARNED."

"The present trouble has taught one important lesson—the necessity for a quarantine station. St. John's has never been face to face with the imperative need hitherto. It confronts us to-day, and the lesson of experience is the lesson best learned. What is wanted is a hulk, fitted up for the purpose and kept anchored, and let us hope, idle; but always ready for MINARD'S LINIMENT CURES DAN-DRUFF."

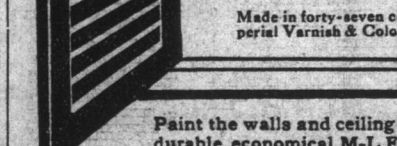

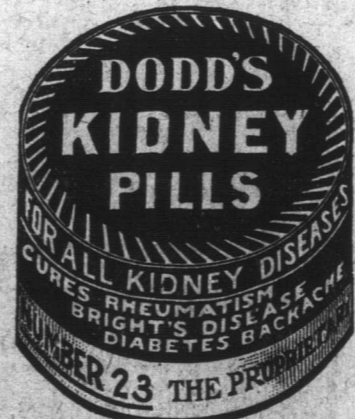

Brutal Conduct.

Last evening some men who had become frenzied from liquor had a free fight at the foot of Hutchings' Street, and kicked and butted each other when they were not using their fists. Police and citizens had to interfere, and both men were placed under arrest. One of them gave the officers and those who assisted them a hard time of it. He was manacled only after a fierce fight and then had to be brought down bodily to the station. One of the others engaged in the melee got away but is known by the police and will be summoned.

Row in Council Over the Hospital Shed

A meeting must be held to-night, said Councilor Channing to Secretary J. L. Slattery last evening. Mr. Slattery, who has such a long experience of the way of Councilors smiled and said that he did not think there would be a meeting because a notice of 24 hours was needed in order to notify the members; and second, he himself was not expecting a meeting and had an important appointment. And as it turned out, Mr. Slattery was right. There was no meeting. Knowing that the storm centre of this trouble was somewhere in the vicinity of Councilor Mullaly, the Telegram sought him out and got the following version of the affair, which shows that he was not, as usual, "doing nothing," as our contemporary put it this morning. Councilor Mullaly is one of those who does not lie on his oars where there is civic trouble. In fact he visited the site of the hospital shed last Sunday and seeing that it was in the city limits and knowing that permission had not been granted for its erection, he intended to enquire about it next morning. Mr. Major, who lives in the vicinity, waited on him Monday morning and protested against the hospital being built there and said that the neighbors were indignant. Councilor Mullaly said he knew nothing about it. He advised Mr. Major to see Mr. J. M. Kent and other members of the district of St. John's East and to get the residents to sign a protest. Councilor Mullaly then phoned Secretary Slattery and asked him whether he was aware of what was going on. He replied that he knew that the building was being erected and that permission had been given by Senior Councilor Martin, who had consulted with Engineer Ryan. It was a case of emergency, said the Secretary, and therefore a meeting had not been called. Councilor Mullaly said that it would have been an easy matter to call a meeting in an hour or two, and he questioned the right of Senior Councilor Martin and Engineer Ryan to do what they had done. Councilor Mullaly then said over the phone: "Are you aware that the residents are protesting?"

The reply came back: "Yes, I am. Let them protest." Later on in the day Mr. Williams who also resides in the locality where the shed is being put up, called on Councilor Mullaly and accused him of not looking out for the welfare of the citizens, inasmuch as he (Mr. M.) was allowing a smallpox hospital to be erected in their midst. Councilor Mullaly said, "I did not agree to it and know nothing about it. Get up a petition protesting against its going up. I am behind you." Councilor Mullaly saw Mr. Kent, M.H.A., in the afternoon, who said to him, "Yes, I know all about it. A petition is being signed to be handed to me, and as soon as I get it I shall place it in Councilor Martin's hands." Councilor Mullaly then called on Councilors Channing, Ryan, and Myrick. They said they knew nothing of what was going on and realized that they had been ignored. Councilor Channing suggested a meeting to-night. He thereupon wrote a requisition for a meeting. It was signed by himself, Councilors Mullaly and Myrick. At 5.30 Councilor Channing called at the City Council and met the Secretary there. "Be on hand, Mr. Slattery," he said; "there will be a meeting to-night at 9 o'clock."

Meetings were evidently far away from Mr. Slattery's mind. "There is a custom," he said, "that a notice of 24 hours is necessary to have the members summoned." "Is it in the rules?" said Councilor Channing. "No," said Secretary Slattery; "but it is an old custom."

"We must have this meeting," repeated Councilor Channing, "as the emergency demands it."

"I don't think so," replied the Secretary, "and besides, I myself have an important engagement."

"Now, Mr. Slattery, understand me," said Councilor Channing, going towards the door; "meeting must be held to-night."

With that he left abruptly and went over the stairs. The last words of

Councilor Channing rang in the Secretary's ears in a dramatic way till he recalled the old recitation, "Curfew must not ring to-night." He knew that it was only the suddenness of the Councilor in springing this thing on him that made him tremble for the moment. He put on his hat and coat, told Mike Hynes to put out the lights, and putting a good "sultana" in the side of his mouth, went off to keep his appointment. Meantime the requisition for the meeting had been taken to Councilor Martin by Councilor Channing's boy at 6 p.m.

"What did he say?" asked Mr. Channing of the boy when he came back.

"He told me to tell you, sir, that he had an engagement."

Ottawa Has Epidemics.

OTTAWA, To-Day.

The sanitary conditions here bid fair to bring about an early proration. Typhoid Fever has been followed by Diphtheria and Smallpox. The latter disease is so prevalent that compulsory vaccination will probably be ordered. Since January 1,200 cases of typhoid have been reported. Sixty-four deaths have occurred. Fifty-two smallpox patients are at Porter's Island and many others in the city. Charles Blue, the official stenographer of the house committees, is a victim, and yesterday the sessional messenger became a suspect. The conditions of such an epidemic may terminate the session abruptly.

Rebels Capture Guns.

AQUA, PRIETA, Mexico, To-Day.

The most important battle of the Mexican revolution, thus far, was fought here yesterday, between the Federals, commanded by Lieut. Col. Diaz, and the rebels under Garcia. It resulted in the repulse of the former. Two Federal machine guns fell into the possession of the rebels. The Federals sustained a loss estimated by the rebels at 200 killed. The rebels gave their own loss as 20.

What's In a Name?

Funny Things You Didn't Know About Our Nomenclature. Surnames are not what they seem, and some of the most distressing contain a wealth of meaning. Take, for example, the surname with which many people think they are cursed—Snooks. This, by no means, seems to be an imposing cognomen; but, as a matter of fact, it is a name of great antiquity, and one of which nobody need be ashamed. In reality, it is a contraction of "Sevenoak." It was first corrupted to Senoaks, which, in its turn, was corrupted to Snooks of to-day. The original bearer of the name of Legless was so called merely because he was a lawyer. Originally, the name was spelled Laegless, the expression signifying "learned in the law." Strangely enough, Laegless is derived from exactly the same source and signifies exactly the opposite to its apparent meaning. Take the case of the surname Hart. It is really a corruption of Hard, which was a name given to show that the owner was a man of firm character and resolute bearing. One must extend pity to the poor individual burdened with such a name as Gumbold. Yet those who possess the name may be interested to know that it, too, has nothing at all to do with any part of the anatomy. It denotes that its first bearer was a man of considerable importance and great power in the state. It is derived from the Norse word "gunbald," which itself has nothing to do with any affliction, but means "bold in war."

Working Classes Will Stop War.

Toronto, April 8.—Sir George Gibbons, chairman of the Canadian section of the International Waterways Commission, addressing the members of the Empire Club at their annual meeting last night, said: "I venture the prophesy that we are going to see within a very short time a treaty between the Mother Country and the United States different from any treaty ever before made between them. For the first time in its history the United States has said to Great Britain: "We are ready to have a treaty that will cover not only honor, but vital interests and everything else." "I would venture to prophesy also that within five years we shall have a permanent Court at the Hague for the settlement of all international disputes, at which will sit representatives not only from Great Britain and the United States, but from Germany as well. Ottawa, April 10.—An invitation having been received from the Imperial Cadets' Association of London, England, for Canadian Cadets to participate in the "Boys' Blesley" on the 24th of May, it has been decided to send twelve cadets from organized cadet corps, accompanied by an officer to take part in the competition. The Department of Militia and Defence will provide transportation to and from the cadets' homes and subsistence during their stay in England. They will sail from Montreal for England May 5, and return to Canada early in June. The cadets will be selected from those participating in the miniature and gallery competition of Canadian Rifle League, 1911, and be chosen according to the places taken by them in a special competition to be fired with single loading rifles, 22 bore, on local miniature ranges, from the 11th and 19th of April.

Two Died From Bout. Sydney, N. S. W., April 6. — Two boxers in Sydney, who were knocked out in a match, went home feeling ill and dazed. In a little while both of them died, and upon a post mortem being made it was discovered that the death of each was due to rupture of a vein in the brain. All principals engaged in the boxing match have been arrested charged with manslaughter.
