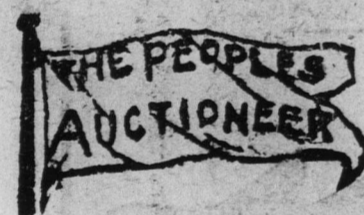

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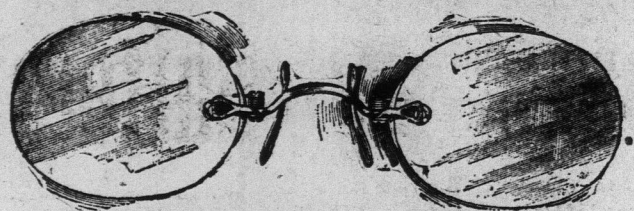

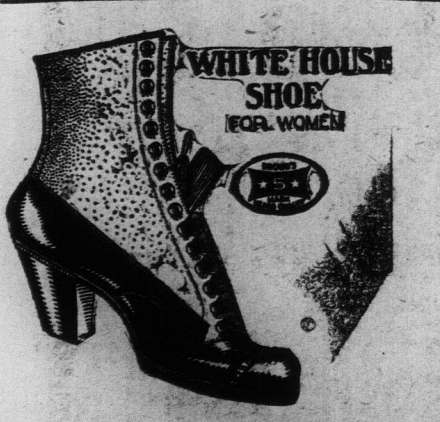

Special to The Evening Telegram. MEXICO, City, To-day. Huerta, by a decree to-day made silver fifty cent pieces legal tender as well as bank notes of the Bank of London and the National Bank branches. These banks are also authorized to put out their notes as legal tender.

HALIFAX, Nov. 5. The Dominion Government steamer Acadia, returned from Hudson Bay to-day. She cruised off the east end of Sable Island and reports deep water at the point where a new island was reported to have been seen. About ten miles east of the island, the officers saw what they took to be newly formed land in the end of the north east bar, piling up seas which were broken over it, but the tide was high and the land was not visible from the steamer which stood some distance from it. The captain of the American fishing vessel, who reported to the new island was 16 miles from Sable Island, may have been off in his distance, and there is a possibility of what he saw being sand piled up over some submerged wreck. Several vessels, both steamers and square riggers, have been lost on the north east bar, as far out from land as ten miles. According to the crew of the Acadia, there is no doubt something unusual has taken place in that vicinity, and the neighborhood has new dangers for mariners. The steamer Stanley goes to the island to-morrow and further investigations will likely be made.

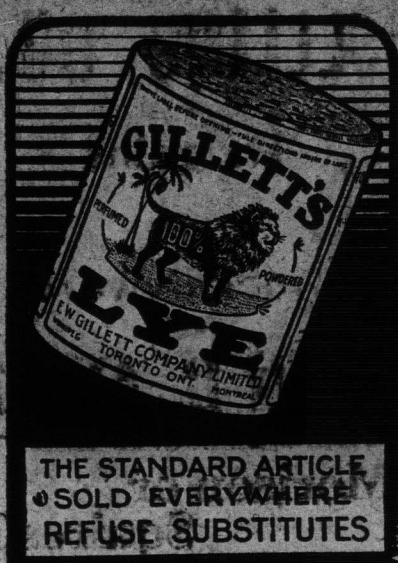
LONDON, To-day. The London morning papers congratulate the American people on the defeat of Tammany, which they consider gives hope of a new birth of democracy in America, and a higher standard of civic responsibility. They think also it is proof of a renewed confidence in President Wilson's administration. The Graphic regards the result of the elections as a manifestation of the nation's approval of President Wilson's spirited Mexico policy, which Huerta would do well to take to heart. The Times is not sanguine that Tammany has suffered a permanent defeat, but thinks it a most encouraging sign that educated young Americans of wealth and leisure are beginning to take interest in the problem of municipal as well as national government. Washington is awaiting word from Huerta. The French Ambassador, Jusserand, has received no instructions from his government to take any steps towards mediation between the States and Mexico. The Embassy would be the natural channel for such steps.

PORTLAND, To-day. Nine of the crew of the Gloucester schooner Annie Parker which was told by them for the first time to-night was held up on the Rose and Crown reef, twelve miles off Sankaty Head Light Nantucket last Saturday morning were brought in here by the schr. Lifton. The crew of the Parker consisted of fourteen men beside Capt. Nelson. When she struck the reef on Saturday morning they all embarked safely in their dories. After two others had been lost in launching, one dory containing the captain, Vincent Nelson of Beverly Mass., Ross Worthen of Fabrico, Lester Fletcher of Argyle Sound and Thomas Landry of Arichat was swallowed up in the darkness and never seen again by the "other" two boats. The other two dories, one with six and the other with five men kept together until Saturday night. After that they did not see one another until Sunday morning when both were picked up by the Lifton. They had no food and nothing to drink while driven about by the gales and had to ball out the dories with olekin hats. Among rescued is John Farrell, Mortier Bay, Newfoundland.

MAN BADLY BEATEN—Last night the police found a man lying in an unconscious condition on Water St. and brought him to the police station. Lady eye-witnesses said that mercifully beaten by two scamps.

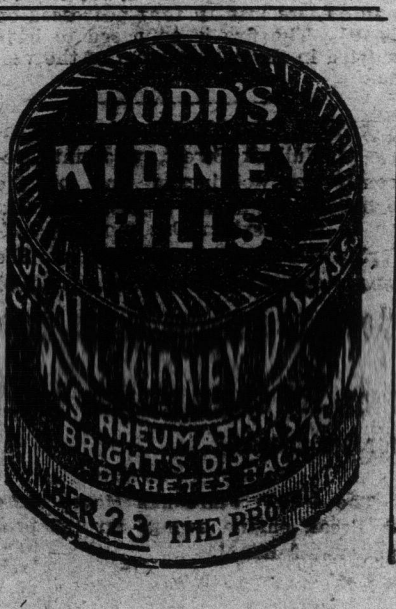

Disgraceful Arrangements.

Yesterday we commented on the refusal of the authorities to allow candidates to appoint agents to watch ballot boxes while they were being carried from the polling booth to the Returning Officer at the place of count. We think such a precaution is only fair to the candidates in all cases, but more particularly in the case of the boxes in St. John's which have to be transferred to the outposts. We applied for permission for a candidate to go on the special train to Trinity in order to be in time for the count, and we were refused. Such a precaution as we have mentioned, becomes all the more necessary in view of the casual manner in which the ballot boxes are being collected in the Twillingate, Fortune and Burgeo Districts. We are now writing on Thursday morning, a week after Polling Day, and there is no information to hand yet that the boxes have been collected in these districts. In Twillingate District there are two steamers, and in face of this the Daily News, this morning, publishes the information that yesterday "the motor boat collecting the ballot boxes, was 'broken down' at Pilley's Island, with 32 boxes on board, and that it was impossible for the motor boat to complete the work." There are delays of a similar duration in Fortune Bay, Burgeo and St. Barbe. Yet in spite

of these delays, candidates are refused the means of watching ballot boxes. The arrangements made by the Government for the collection of these boxes, are disgraceful and deserve the strongest censure. It is an outrage that the arrangements should be so defective that on a Thursday morning after a Polling Day on the Thursday of the week previous, that a Government newspaper should be forced to announce these counts still delayed, coupled with the mild hope that the counts should be taken up during the day, but still unable to announce that the ballot boxes have been collected.

Pogie Fishers Make big Wages.

Twenty young men, belonging to various outlying settlements of St. John's East, who had been pogie fishing outside of Boston and New York, returned home to-day by the Stephano. These men met with much success the past summer and made remunerative wages. Pogie fishing is becoming more popular and profitable each year and quite a contingent of our St. John's fisher folks go abroad to engage in it.



Political Talk.

There is no end of worry that Sir Edward is being caused over the filling of the departmental offices. If Sir Edward has a majority when all the counts and accounts are squared up, it is said, he will take the portfolio of Minister of Justice himself.

The latest political rumor is that there is close competition on the Tory ranks for Minister of Agriculture and Mines. The competitors are various and several of the disappointed ones will get disgruntled and make a row in the camp. The announcement of Sir Edward's choice to fill this office will be awaited with much interest.

The Count.

Three days have elapsed since the count was discontinued and up to press hour to-day there were no results received of Fortune, Twillingate, Burgeo and St. Barbe. It is advanced that the work of collecting the ballot boxes was interrupted by stormy weather, but it must be remembered that the S.S. Fortig, which is collecting the Burgeo and LaPoile boxes this afternoon, finished picking up the Fortune Bay ballot boxes last evening and it is only reasonable to expect that the count for that district should have commenced hours ago.

Dray Collides With Express.

As Mr. Andrew McDonald of Kilbride, was driving to town this morning, in his express wagon with a load of vegetables, he met with an accident, and barely escaped serious injury. When opposite Callahan's grocery store, at the foot of Patrick Street, a horse, with dray attached, belonging to the Royal Stores, suddenly took charge of the driver, with the result that before anything could be done to avert a collision, the dray crashed into McDonald's wagon smashing it completely. Fortunately neither of the drivers were hurt, but Mr. McDonald had a very narrow escape.

The dray was considerably damaged, and the wagon is now at N. J. Murphy the wheelwright's for extensive repairs.

Killed in Chicago

Mr. J. B. Mitchell, Commission Agent, has received a message conveying the sad intelligence that his brother-in-law, Mr. Henry Wilson, who was a Commercial Traveller, accidentally fell from a train in Chicago city and was crushed to death. Although terribly mangled he lived for five hours after the train went over him. Deceased was a man, married, and leaves a widow and two children to survive. Three years ago he was here on a visit with his family.

Ferry Boat Sunk in Hr.

Eighteen Persons on Board.

About 2:30 p.m. to-day as the harbor motor ferry boat was crossing with some 18 persons aboard, she collided with the steam tug Ingraham and was cut down and sunk in a minute. The accident occurred near the upper wharf of Pitts'. All the persons on board were rescued and taken aboard the Ingraham and landed safely at Pitts' wharf. Who was in fault was not known to our informant, but he tells us that the Ingraham had a schooner in tow at the time. It is fortunate that no lives were lost and that the loss was limited to the sinking of the ferry boat. This is the second motor ferry that has been lost in the harbor.

\$275,000,000 Stamp Exhibit.

275,000 Rare Specimens Shown at International Exhibition at New York.

New York, Oct. 30.—What is said to be the most elaborate exhibition of postage stamps ever held was opened last night at the Engineering Societies Building, under the auspices of the Association for Stamp Exhibitions. It is the first international exhibition ever held in this country, and the values of the stamps exhibited exceed \$2,000,000.

The prizes offered have attracted 300 exhibitors, who are showing 275,000 stamps. In the lot are two considered the most precious in the world, that were issued to cost three pennies, but they are now called the "318,000 pair." These are unused copies of the one and two penny stamps of Mauritius, exhibited by H. J. Duveen, of London, who is said to have a stamp collection valued at \$1,000,000.

Next in interest are three Alexandrias shown by George H. Worthington, of Cleveland, Ohio, who is said to have the most valued collection of stamps in the world, with the single exception of that of La Renoliere, of Paris. Mr. Worthington's collection is valued by experts at \$1,500,000 while the Paris collection is placed at \$2,000,000. The three stamps in the Worthington collection are said by experts to be worth at least \$5,000 each.

Mr. Alfred Moseley favors work of Labor Unions.

New York, Oct. 30.—Mr. Alfred Moseley, the leading protectionist of Great Britain, member of the executive committee of the Tariff Reform League of Great Britain, who brought a delegation of mechanics here from English trade unions to study the development of industries, leaves the city to-day for California.

Mr. Moseley said: "The workingmen in Great Britain want to have his cake and eat it too, and business conditions in the United Kingdom in the last two or three years have tended to convince him that such a phenomenon was possible. "It arises in this way: The object of labor organizations is to protect labor, and in that object all thinking men must admit they are within their rights. What is the use of protecting labor unless you are going to protect labor's products. The protection of labor's production applies as much to the production of the soil as to the production of mills." Mr. Moseley thought the test of free trade would come next year.

Auto Tire Burst

While machine was travelling at 114 miles an hour. Noted speed driver was trying to lower hour record.

London, Oct. 31.—Percy Lambert, the holder of many world's automobile speed records, was killed on the Brooklands motor car race track to-day while he was making an attack on the hour record. Lambert was travelling in his car at the rate of 114 miles an hour when one of the tires burst, and caused the machine to turn turtle at the top of the embankment and then fall to the bottom. The daring motor driver was terribly crushed beneath his machine. He was taken to a hospital in an ambulance, but died from his injuries before he reached there.

Only on Monday of this week Lambert had captured the 50 miles' world's record, covering the distance in 27 minutes 2-5 seconds. On February 15th, of this year, on the same track, he had established a record for the hour of 103-3-4 miles, and at the same time 109 miles' record of 37 minutes 40-3-5 seconds.

British Imperial Club, N.Y. City

There are probably very few of our readers who are aware that a most attractive club-house has recently been established in New York for the benefit of those who are accustomed to visit that city from time to time, and the news should prove of special interest to ladies, because it was in order to provide convenient quarters for our countrywomen when visiting New York without an escort that the undertaking was originally started. We refer to the British Imperial Club, which was opened about a year ago and whose rooms at 108 East 20th Street it was recently our privilege to inspect. Housed in one of New York's handsome old residences within easy access of the shopping and theatre districts the members of this club are indeed to be congratulated.

One enters a spacious hallway furnished as a lounge and sees beyond an inviting glimpse of the large dining room where real old English dinners, such as roast beef with Yorkshire pudding and apple pie, are served exactly as they would be in the British Isles. The club rooms on the floor above are equally attractive, and as you sit and watch the crackling embers in the wide fire place while chatting with English friends over 5 o'clock tea and real thin bread and butter, you can well imagine that you are once more in far away England so thoroughly homelike is the whole atmosphere. Indeed the housekeeper was formerly with the Ladies' Park Club in London. These rooms form a most attractive setting for dances, teas, musicales, etc., and several such functions have already been successfully held. Miss Beatrice Harraden, the celebrated English authoress, was entertained on her recent visit to the city and expressed herself delighted with the experience. One large room is set apart for private entertainments, the two upper floors being devoted to bedrooms.

Not only is the British Imperial Club the first British organization in the United States to have a club-house of its own, but we believe we are correct in stating further that it alone shares with the National Arts Club of New York the distinction of having a mixed membership. It is confidently expected that the coming season will be one of great activity. It is intended to set apart one afternoon each week on which to hold an informal tea, and to open the club rooms to British visitors each Friday evening, and we strongly advise anyone who may be contemplating a visit to New York to get in touch with the Secretary so that they may have the opportunity during their stay of living in what one enthusiast has already described as a corner of Old England in the heart of New York.

from the size of a postage stamp up to at least twenty-five feet square, and any error of course, will be magnified in proportion."

As my guide finishes speaking he opens an iron door which, as we step through, closes behind us, leaving us in pitch darkness.

Without the Penny. "Put your hands on my shoulders, and follow me," says Mr. Hepworth. We pass down a passage and are in another room, or rather range of rooms, all lit from the ceiling by means of dull-red lamps, that shed a peculiarly baleful light upon ourselves and the operatives.

In this portion of the factory the sensitive films are dealt with and manipulated in various ways. Beyond this again are the drying rooms where the negatives are being dried on huge wooden drums that revolve noiselessly on ball bearings.

Very interesting is the developing room, where the films are developed and washed. Here are some truly marvelous machines, each one of which is capable of developing, fixing, washing and finishing eight hundred feet of film an hour.

The printing machines reminded me very forcibly of penny-in-the-slot machines, the negatives being automatically "delivered," as it were, at a little opening an inch or so square, and brilliantly illuminated, where they come in contact with the sensitive film for a second or so before being passed on into the murkiness beyond.

We are Serenity. The average life of a film, Mr. Hepworth informs me, is about three months; but its life history is like the life history of a butterfly—a swift transition from virgin freshness to gentle decay.

It is "first run" to-day, and "junk" a few short weeks hence. What is now fourpence a foot, to be handled by a new-born baby, will before Christmas, be so much scrap, fit only for working up into varnish.

For this reason there is a continual, steady demand for new films, and this demand it is the business of the Hepworth factory to meet. Started, fourteen years ago, it has grown during the interval from the tiniest beginnings to its present proportions.

About seventy hands are employed, and all of them earn good money, for their work is highly skilled and technical. Most of them are quite young people, who have been with Mr. Hepworth since they first left school.

"Practically all the people I employ are new-born babies," remarks the proprietor, as he bows me a courteous farewell. "That is the main difficulty in film making—to get a proper supply of skilled labor. I could give employment to many more hands, if only I knew where to find them."

Cable News.

Editor Evening Telegram.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5. Democratic Governors were elected yesterday in each State in which this office was filled. In Massachusetts, New Jersey, Virginia and, with the exception of New York State, where the Tammany democracy was rebuked, more democracy than republican victories were recorded at the polls. Maryland elected a democratic State Senator, and of four Congressmen three democrats were elected. The exception was C. D. Paige for the third district of Massachusetts. In Massachusetts there was a democratic landslide. Lieut. Governor Walsh was chosen Governor. The State plurality was 53,691, the largest ever given a democratic candidate for office. Walsh carried with him into office every democratic candidate on the State ticket with the possible exception of the Attorney General. The Tammany democracy in New York State was condemned in a manner which left little solace to the leaders. John P. Mitchell, Fusionist, was elected Mayor of New York, leading Edward McCall, the Tammany candidate, by 121,209 votes. Sulzer, the deposed Governor of the State, was returned to the Assembly from New York City. The New York assembly will be safely republican. In New Jersey, Fielder, democrat, was elected Governor with 22,000 plurality over the republican candidate. The democrats will control both houses of the Legislature.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Nov. 5. Reports received here from Port au Prince indicate a revolt against Orestes, which has been brewing in Haiti for several months, and which is likely to result in actual fighting next month. Delegates of the Government in the North have resigned, and troops have been sent to keep order there. There have been clashes between the revolutionists and the Government soldiers in the capital, and firing is heard every night on the outskirts of Port au Prince. The President is surrounded by a heavy guard whenever he appears in public. It is reported that the date of the Revolution has been set for the beginning of December. Foreigners are getting ready to flee, and several refugees have arrived at Kingston.

MELUN, France, Nov. 5. Sixteen bodies have been taken from the burned and splintered coaches of the Marseilles-Paris Express train wrecked near here last evening. It is believed that several more bodies are still among the wreckage. The corpses were badly burned and almost unrecognizable. Nine of the dead were Government clerks. Two others were French Infantry Captain and his wife. Another was a prominent merchant of Lyons. Thirteen were seriously hurt and others badly shaken.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5. The Scout cruiser Chester, at the Philadelphia Navy Yards was ordered to-day to prepare to sail for Vera Cruz immediately. The Chester is not a fighting ship, but is swift and valuable for scout duty. Of lighter draught than the big warships now at Vera Cruz, she will be able to join the smaller craft in shore.

Winter North.

According to reports brought up by the s.s. Invermore, the Labrador coast is covered with snow and there is every indication of a severe winter. From Battle Harbor to Hopedale, the hills are covered to a depth of from four to ten inches. When the ship was coming south from Hopedale a series of blizzards were experienced. The weather was intensely cold and there is a deal of ice in several of the bays and harbors.
