There should be no difficulty as regards the reserve Companies in Scotland. foresee, however, a very great diffi culty in getting comforts over to the Battalion on service, especially if it is still at the Dardanelles. The extraordinarily perfect arrangements the troops in France have, I think, spoiled people a little as to what is normally impossible under conditions of warfare with troops in the situa-tion of the Dardanelles. It is really miserable—life is too short—you are not here long, so make your stay agreeable. Eat what you like and ligest it; enjoy it, without dread of rebellion in the stomach.


