The Goulds, on Wednesday and the terms under which we were ginored by the company at Iriquois and that there was no place for Newfoundlanders to work inside the mills. The only work which they were given to perform was outside in an atmosphere forty degrees below zero. On finding that somebody had been mispresenting matters we asked the Company to have the matter decided in some court in order that our rights may be decided upon. This they refused to do, with the result that we were forced to leave and seek our way home as best we could. Surely there ought to be some action taken by the authorities here to prevent men with families depending upon them from being taken.

leave and seek our way home as best we could. Surely there ought to be some action taken by the authorities here to prevent men with families depending upon them from being taken thousands of miles from their homes upon contracts which are ignored by the parties with whom they have to work.

Over two hundred Newfoundlanders have gone to Iriquois and nobody takes the trouble in this country to find out on behalf of the men what conditions there are like, or whether the authority to make the terms which were made with us. What guarantees are there that the wages agreed to be paid will be paid?

Surely it is time that some protection be afforded people in this country and not have them subjected to treatment


