



NEWFOUNDLAND THE INCOME WAR TAX ACT, 1918.

FORMS GIVING PARTICULARS OF INCOME FOR THE YEAR, 1917, MUST BE FILLED IN AND FILEI ON OR BEFORE THE 30th JUNE, 1918.

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Newfoundland, shall pay taxe of five per centum upon all income exceeding One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) in the case of unmarried per sons without dependents; and widows or widowers, without dependents, and exceeding Two Thousand Dollar (\$2,000.00) in the case of all other persons; and in addition thereto, a supertax, when the income exceeds Six Thous and Dollars (\$6,000.00). It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00).

The Forms provided by the Department of Finance to be filled in with particulars of the 1917 income of a those whose incomes are liable under the Act, and by Trustees, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, with in formation required of them, may be obtained at the Assessor's Office, Customs' Building, St. John's.
