RT. REV. MONSIGNOR REARDON. Rt. Rev. Monsignor Reardon, P.P. denly, on Friday last, death occurring in the Presbytery. bishop Roche Monsignor Reardon was born in St. John's 73 years ago, and after spending several years at St. Bonaventure's College went to Ireland, taking passage by sailing vessel, leaving here in 1866. He took up studies for the priesthood in All Hallows College 15th, he was ordained Priest by the late Rt. Rev. Bishop Power, and was attached to the Cathedral for a few months. In 1873 he was sent to Harbor Breton, a parish also held by the late Most Rev. Archbishop Howley and the late Very Rev. Father Clarke, P.P., Torbay. After laboring there for several years he was transferred to St. Mary's, and Sept. 15th, 1897, the date of his silver jubilee as a priest was appointed to Placentia by Bishop Howley, where he carried out the last years of his sacredotal Domestic Prelate. He was the oldest priest in the Archdiocese, and the oldest in the Dominion except Rt. Rev. Monsignor Donnelly, who celebrated his golden jubilee a few weeks ago. During his Priesthood, Monsignor Reardon was most active in advancing education in the different parishes over which he presided. End of the Dresden.

The German cruiser Dresden wa the only ship of Vice-Admiral von Spee's squadron that escaped from the battle fought on Dec. 8, 1914, off the Falkland Island in the South Atlantic. The Dresden, which had sailed back into the Pacific was discovered off the Island of Juan Fernandez on March 14, 1915, by the cruisers Kent and Glasgow and the armed liner Orama, and after a brief en gagement, was blown up by her own crew to prevent capture. She had, of course, no chance against her op ponents. It transpired that the Dresden was in Chilian waters when th attack was made upon her, that is she was within three miles of the island which belongs to Chili. 

Ghosts Haunt Palaces.

Many ghostly manifestations are reported as taking place in Britain's Royal residences. Catherine Howard often haunts a certain corridor at Hampton Court. She was one of the wives of Henry VIII whom he imprisoned. She managed to escape and reaching the King's presence sank on her knees and pleaded for mercy. It is part of this distressing scene which witnesses claim they have seen. The ghost of Jane Seymour is still reported to ascend at frequent intervals the staircase leading to what is known as the "Silver-Stick Gallery." The figure is dressed in white, and carries a candle. The fact was brought to the notice of the authorities, and investigations were begun, as a result of which a new apartment was discovered. This apartment contained a spinning-wheel, and there were signs that it had been in recent use. For fifty years nothing more was heard of the sounds. Then they began again. In addition, the figure of a woman in black was seen to emerge from the newly-discovered room every time a child died in the Palace. Among the many who saw it was Princess Frederica of Hanover, who was watching by the bedside of her dying daughter.

Training Men for Marriage.


Legs and Health.


