

The little graveyard where Wesley was buried is behind the famous Stafford's Liniment for all chapel in the City Road, and is visited legged beast shambling its way Aches and Pains, only 20c. per by thousands of pilgrims. The turf in this place is meagre and impoverished, and the asphalt paths are cracked. The Monument itself is in a very serious state of disrepair. With its long inscriptions telling of the life and labours of the evangelist. it is blackened with soot. The surface of the stonework is scarred and defaced, and the foundations are falling to pieces. It is well-known that the atmosphere of London corrodes certain kinds of stone, and this one shows the atmospheric effect in pronounced deterioration. The atmosphere has bitten deep into the surface of the plinth of the memorial, and honeycombed it with ruts and fissures. The memory of John Wesley deserves something other than this crumbling monument in a decaying wilderness. Nearly two years ago the First London District Synod passed a resolution drawing the attention of the trustees of Wesley's chapel to the unkempt condition of Wesley's burial ground, and urgently requesting that "an appeal be made to the Methodist people for funds to put the historic site in a state worthy of its traditional importance." A renovation fund has been opened and £10,000 is asked for. It is estimated that this amount will be required to defray the cost of repairing the chapel and the churchvard with its memorials. #### Current Business Conditions

By GEORGE E. ROBERTS

(From the Monthly Bulletin Issued by The National City Bank of New York for April)

THE general feeling in business circles is one of strengthening confidence that the corner has been turned and that 1922 will be a better year than 1921. The improvement in fundamental conditions and in general feeling since the first of the year has been very marked; in-deed, from the middle of January to the first of March optimism was perhaps over-pronounced, and a moderate reaction in some lines has paturally resulted.

The stock market, which is prompt to reflect and even anticipate changes in fundamental conditions, has been creeping upward for the last six months in a slow but persistent movement which suggests faith that better days are coming. faith that better days are coming. 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

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
