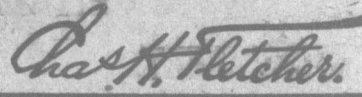

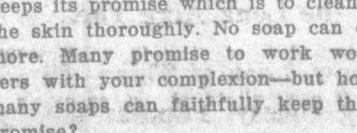

DELEGATES.

MONTREAL, April 17. Special Ottawa despatch to the Star.—The Soviet delegates, which came recently to Ottawa to secure Government recognition of its mission for development of trade between Canada and Russia, was back here yesterday afternoon on a somewhat different errand. Its members were asked to do this explaining and the process is in progress. It appears the authorities going through cases which addressed to the delegation were to be private libraries, discovered by large proportion of Bolshevik propaganda literature. A BELLICOSE ATTITUDE.

FEELING OPENLY EXPRESSED.

RELATIONS THREATENED.

TOKIO, April 17. Beginning on April 26th, nearly the whole of Russia will go on a full week's holiday after a lengthy dispute over the calendar. The Russian

Orthodox Church and Holy Synod civil authorities have fixed the date of Russian Easter as April 26th to April 28th. As the first and second of May are also holidays and the fourth is a Sunday, trade unions have decided to permit workmen to abstain from work for eight days. No public anti-religious demonstrations will be held this Easter by the young communists, who have resolved to confine their campaign to shows, lectures and theatres for a fortnight, in the effort to keep the younger generation from church.

BLOODLESS OPERATION IN CANCER CASES.

CHICAGO, April 17. A radio knife, which may render virtually bloodless operations for cancerous growths, was demonstrated here yesterday by Dr. L. E. Schmidt, who performed two operations with it. A low power radio transmitter is used to generate the current. A knife which resembles a knitting needle, forms one terminal and a sheet of tinfoil, on which the patient lies, forms the other terminal. The human tissue, offering resistance to the current when the knife is applied, causes generation of heat. The knife burns itself through skin and muscles quickly and without pressure. Very delicate operations are possible with the instrument, Dr. Schmidt declared.

FIRST ARRIVAL AT QUEBEC.

QUEBEC, April 17. The first steamer of the season to dock at Quebec, was the collier Alfrdale, from Sydney, N.S., which arrived here this afternoon at four o'clock with a cargo of coal destined for the Dominion Coal Company.

WINNIPEG'S BIG STORM.

WINNIPEG, April 17. With a blizzard of midwinter proportions raging in Winnipeg and district, the storm, which began last Tuesday with mild drizzling rain, sleet and snow, reached its height today. It is the first severe storm of the whole winter season and incidentally the heaviest April snowfall in the history of the city. "Black north winds swept the district for the past thirty-six hours piling snow drifts, and for the first time, this season, the electric car company have been forced to use snow plows.

BANDITS IN ST. PAUL.

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 17. Three bandits held up a postal clerk and a messenger at the Chicago Great Western Depot at South St. Paul today, and escaped with five pouches of mail containing \$35,000 in currency and other registered mail. The robbery occurred at the Chicago Great Western Station, just after the train had unloaded the five pouches, one of which contained at \$50,000 payroll for the Armour & Co. South St. Paul plant. As the pouches were loaded into a truck, the bandits drew up in an automobile, two sprang out with drawn revolvers, forcing the two postal employees to surrender the bags.

ONTARIO INVESTIGATIONS.

TORONTO, Ont., April 17. Although the Public Accounts Committee of the Legislature finished its sessions today, Premier Ferguson announced that the House would carry an investigation into all Government Departments. If criminal actions were necessary, he said, the Government would not hesitate to indict them. The Committee reported to the House evidence taken before it during its eighteen sittings, and made several suggestions and recommendations.

SUSPECTED MURDERERS COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

MONTREAL, April 17. Serafini and Niero, the two suspects arrested after the Bank messenger robbery and killing of two men, a few weeks ago, were today committed for trial on a charge of murder.

AUTHORSHIP OF THE 'ROSBARY'.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 17. Robert Cameron Rogers, long credited as the author of the poem "The Rosary," did, in fact, write the words of the well known song, said not Father Thomas Whaler of Chicago, as reported yesterday by the Sisters of Mount St. Gertrude Academy, Boulder, Colorado, his widow asserted last night.

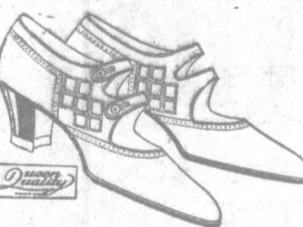

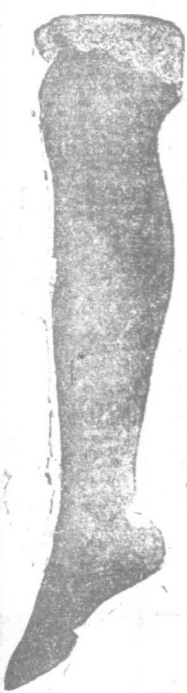

the great congregation in procession marches round the building, seeking figuratively the body of Christ. With them we return to the interior of the church; the sanctuary opens; and the priest announces to the people that "Christ is risen."
Then commences the general thanksgiving. Hymns of praise ring out from the throats of all. The highest in rank advances to the priest and exchange kisses, and saluting in the same way the crucifix which the priest offers. Each of the congregation in turn does the same, some of them bringing their Easter cakes to receive the ecclesiastical blessing.

After the religious comes the social celebration. "Christ is risen" is the general salutation, to which is replied, "Indeed He is." Gaily-coloured Easter eggs are presented among friends—some real, some imitation and containing wonderful surprises. The presentation of an egg demands a kiss from the recipient. In Tolstoy's chapter in "Resurrection," he makes the nobleman Nehudof kiss a young male peasant, and a beggar, "with a red scab in place of a nose," kisses the unfortunate Maslova, who, evincing no sign of disgust, kisses him three times. As far as the writer could see, however, these salutatory salutations are reserved for relatives and intimate friends, and promiscuous kissing is not extensively indulged in.

Now that the days of fasting are over, wholesale gluttony and intemperance become the order of the day. Eating and drinking know only the limits of the larier and the wine cellar. Indeed, so immoderate are the celebrants, that many cases of death through overeating after Easter occur annually.

Entertainments reopen, family parties are held again, and one of the most striking features of the vechera is the quantity of alcoholic liquor consumed. In spite of its place in the realm of prohibition, at this season especially, Russia is literally flooded with a choice variety of drinks—brashka (or home-brewed beer), vodka (whisky), brandy, and some very choice liquors. Vians of the best available, but always including caviare, form the festive board, and for days the feasting goes on. No work is done in Easter week; everybody is on holiday.

Out-of-doors old and young engage in the national sport of the season. This is carried out on an inclined plane (or slide) erected on the ice to a height of forty feet or so. The slope runs over a hundred yards, and a further run on the level of about a quarter of a mile follows.

Where ice conditions permit, the journey is made on sledges, but in the south (where the ice has disappeared) little carts are used. Here, there, everywhere, sledges loaded with holiday-makers and drawn by galloping horses—sturdy or in the familiar three abreast—go dashing over the ice to the accompaniment of songs and musical instruments.

In the shelter of the houses are raised the peculiar long-seated swings, capable of holding eight or ten children, and suspended by chains, upon which not only the youngsters amuse themselves but the women, as they sit, move backward and forward, idling away the hours of their holiday. —Glasgow Weekly Herald.

PUBLIC NOTICE

To Motorists.

The attention of all owners of motor vehicles is hereby directed to the following extracts from "An Act respecting the maintenance of certain public roads," Passed July 13th, 1920.

Be it enacted by the Governor, the Legislative Council, and the House of Assembly, in Legislative Session convened, as follows:—

3. Section two, sub-section three of section two, section eight, and schedule of chapter fifty-seven of the Consolidated Statutes (Third Series), entitled "Of Motor Vehicles," in so far as they relate to registration fees, are hereby repealed.

4. The fees in the Schedule hereto shall be payable by all owners of motor cars and motor vehicles of every kind, including motor cycles and motor trucks, resident or operating the same in St. John's or in any district mentioned in Section Two of this Act. Such fees shall be paid to the St. John's Municipal Council upon registration, and annually thereafter on such date as may be fixed by the said Municipal Council, and shall be paid by it to the Commission, who shall expend it in purchasing road-making machinery and outfit, and in defraying the cost of work done and ordered by it under this Act.

10. A special registration fee of fifty dollars annually shall be paid to the Commission by salemen of motor vehicles and persons owning or operating public garages in respect of machines used solely for demonstration purposes. Every such person shall be entitled upon payment of the said fee, to the use of two number plates of special design, which may be attached interchangeably to different machines while the same are being demonstrated and unsold. No additional registration or license fee shall be payable to the Commission or the St. John's Municipal Council in respect of such machines while they are being used for demonstration purposes as fore-said.

SCHEDULE:
Motor cycles—\$10.00.
All other motor vehicles, except "Ford" motor cars, but including "Ford" motor trucks—\$1.50 per unit of horse-power.
"Ford" and "Chevrolet" motor cars—\$1.25 per unit of horse-power.
Cars for hire—\$1.00 per unit of horse-power. Motor trucks same as motor cars.
Horse-power under the Schedule is to be determined according to the standard or scale of the Royal Automobile Club, of London, England.

4. Every car regularly plying for hire shall carry conspicuously displayed thereon, except when under hire, a notice containing the words "For Hire." In default of such notice, such car shall for the purposes of the fee payable thereon, not be considered a car for hire.

11. Notwithstanding anything contained in Chapter fifty-seven of the Consolidated Statutes (Third Series), or in any other Act, the registration fees payable under the provisions of this Act may be sued for and recovered by action in the name of the Minister of Public Works.

TRINITY

JOSEPH WOODS 1770.

Though several of the countries in England had representatives in Trinity during the 18th century, yet fully 95 per cent. of those from England came to us from Southern countries. This, of course, was largely because of the fact that the great trade routes between England and Newfoundland, began at some point along the coast between Poole and Plymouth. Occasionally, however, a vessel would leave Trinity for Liverpool with a cargo of salted seal skins, oil, etc., and return to Trinity with a general cargo of Colonial requirements from Lester's headquarters at Liverpool. Whilst Trinity, Newfoundland, must have been well known to the people of Liverpool in Lancashire, and to those of Birkenhead in Cheshire (just across the River Mersey from Liverpool); yet, so far as I can find from the old books, only one man came to us and settled down from Lancashire, and only one man from Cheshire. The man who came from Lancashire was Robert Jones, and he who came from Cheshire was Joseph Woods. Joseph Woods came to Trinity in 1770, and Robert Jones came in 1780. I have already given a detailed account of the deeply interesting history of Robert Jones; and I shall now from the meagre information available, follow Joseph Woods through his more prosaic life.

Joseph Woods was born at Birkenhead in the County of Cheshire. Birkenhead is situated on the S.W. side and at the entrance of the river Mersey, and immediately opposite the seaport town of Liverpool in the County of Lancashire. Mr. William Woods had been Light Keeper on Birkenhead for many years, and there, his family of three boys had been born and reared. Joseph was the youngest of the family. To William Woods and his wife and his two elder boys, the passing in and out of the shipping to and from the port of Liverpool were but ordinary events of their everyday life, and seldom, if ever, directed their thoughts from their daily duties at the Light House, and the grounds surrounding it. It was different with Joseph. As we often find in families, he was as different in tastes and interests from the other boys as he could possibly be. The passing of a vessel going in and out of the river was an event of the greatest interest to him, and absorbed his thoughts to the exclusion of all others for the time being.

He knew all the vessels that had visited the port of Liverpool since he was six years of age; and he was thoroughly well versed in the different private house flags, and other marks of ownership. All his spare time, and some that was not spare, found him across the river watching the vessels coming into the wharves, and others leaving for foreign ports. He knew many of the captains and sailors, and nearly every time when he came back to Birkenhead, he brought with him some curios from foreign ports, to add to the already large collection that he had carefully classified in a room that his father had given him for the purpose. He was, for some unknown reason, especially attracted to the Newfoundland vessels and sailors; and with his parents' consent, he often invited the cabin-boy or one of the sailors to return with him to his home, and, when possible, to spend the night there. His parents could not fail to realize the tregd of the boy's thoughts and the bent of his life; nor did they place any obstacle in his way to prevent him from following what was evidently his vocation in life, viz: the sea. They, too, became interested in the country that the Newfoundland boys and sailors used to tell them stories about; and when Joseph, on his 15th birthday came home and asked his parents' consent to go as cabin-boy with Captain Whitewood in the brig Lester, bound to Trinity, Newfoundland, that consent was readily given, and Joseph's delight knew no bounds.

A week later, with everything for the boy's comfort lovingly supplied by father and mother, he bade them farewell, and the next day as the vessel passed out of the river, signals of mutual good wishes were exchanged between him and those at the Light House. The end of a month full of new interests, such as the ocean can supply to one in love with it, found Joseph in Trinity, Newfoundland. One of the seamen with whom Joseph had established a special friendship was William Hussey, whose parents, John and Zipporah Hussey lived at Salmon Cove, near Trinity. Joseph obtained permission from the Captain to go there with his friend when he went to visit his parents in the old home. The Husseys were people in good circumstances, and they made the visit of their son and his friend a most pleasant one. They made Joseph promise that he would come to them again as often as he could whilst the vessel was in port. It was not a difficult thing to exact this promise from Joseph, and during his stay in Trinity, through the great kindness of the Captain, he and his friend made sev-

eral trips in the ship's jolly-boat to the North Side, and over the hills to Salmon Cove, and back again within the limits of their leave.

During the next year Joseph saw Italy and the Southern parts of England; and during the Autumn the brig Lester passed in by the Light House on Birkenhead, and was safely moored for discharge of cargo at Benjamin Lester's premises in Liverpool. Joseph was glad to visit the old home and to find his father and mother well and glad to see him; whilst they, on their part were more than glad to see their boy so splendidly developed, and still more deeply in love with his work. When the Lester left Liverpool again for Trinity, Joseph went on her as a man before the mast in the second year of his five years' apprenticeship, and becoming more and more manly every day. The next three years were monotonous in one respect; inasmuch as the trade requirements took the vessel in largely the same routes year after year, and brought Joseph back to Liverpool and home once a year. Then came the expiration of his apprenticeship; and when he entered Trinity Harbor at that time, he did so as Joseph Woods, the Able Seaman, and Boatswain of the brig Lester, with the privilege of being paid off in Trinity. In the meantime Joseph had been making new plans for the next few years at least. Those plans were not altogether of his own making; for he had talked them over with John Hussey's daughter, Susannah, during his last visit to her home.

He had also taken Captain Whitewood into his confidence during the voyage, and he had told him all about the plans, so that his honorable discharge was easily effected in Trinity. The fact that Captain Whitewood had set his wife in Trinity made him all the more glad to help Joseph do the same at Salmon Cove. After receiving his discharge and pay at the office, he said good-bye to the captain and his shipmates, and then he went to Salmon Cove and to the home of John and Zipporah Hussey, where he was welcomed, and where a new period of his life began. John Hussey was a respectable and a well-to-do planter. He had no son to follow him in life, or to succeed to his property; for his only son, John (Joseph's friend) had been lost at sea; and when Joseph Woods asked him for his permission to marry his daughter, the old man gave it gladly, and with her went the larger share of the money and property that he possessed at the time, and that he would possess at the time of his death. The following entry in the Marriage Register of old St. Paul's gives the sequel to this: "1775. Married—Joseph Woods, of Cheshire Parish, in Cheshire County, England, to Susannah, daughter of John and Zipporah Hussey, of Salmon Cove."

Thus began another family of permanent settlers in Trinity Bight; the members of which added to the respectability, and to the individual and corporate life of the place, during their day and generation. Owing, however, to the fact that the only boy born to them died in infancy, the name Woods died out with them in Salmon Cove.

LOVE—THE GREATEST THING IN THE WORLD.

"Love is the secret sympathy. The silver link, the silken tie, Which heart to heart, and mind to mind, In body and in soul can bind." (SCOTT.)

All down through the early ages, the highest point of human love was frequently expressed by the words: "the love of women." Then came that mutual love between Jonathan and David, of which we read: "David loved Jonathan as his own soul"; whilst David, in his efforts to do full justice to Jonathan's love for him, referred to it as a love, "passing the love of women." We hesitate to-day to refer to the love of one man for another, as though such love were feminine; and yet, history is full of instances of such love, as evinced by the mind, and the actions of virile men, whose love, for each other was the Jonathan and David-type. Every settlement, and village in our country has produced men whose actions towards each other indicated the existence of such a mutual love; though in the large majority of instances it has been known only to the men themselves, or to their immediate friends. In these days, when the war spirit has engendered more hatred, than love of such a nature; and when that love of such a degree, which is a part of God Himself, is so frequently discounted, and referred to as a mark of effeminacy, it becomes the duty of every right thinking person, to make public any evidence of the existence of the same, that he might know of on the part of man. Permit me to practice what I preach, by calling attention to the following evidence of such a love on the part of George Smith and Charles Brown of Trinity, over sixty years ago. Their names were not Smith and Brown, but they will be known as such in this article. They were, however, real men, and known to me personally.

George Smith and Charles Brown were close friends from boyhood. That friendship deepened and in-

creased with years, till by the time they had become young men, their feelings towards each other could be fully expressed only by one word, viz., love. They spent all their spare time together, and they were often referred to as "lovers." In the spring of 1868 Brown told his friend Smith that he had made up his mind to go to the seal-fishery during the coming Spring. Smith felt badly about having to part with his chum for so long a time; and had it been possible he would have gone in the same vessel. On the day when the vessels were ready to sail, Smith and Brown bade each other a tearful good-bye, and Smith went home with a lonesome feeling. Every day he looked seaward where he supposed his chum was, and nearly every night he said in his dreams, "One night there had been a light fall of snow such as made the next morning 'ideal' for partridge hunting, and Smith took his gun and hiked off towards the "Indian Look-out." During the afternoon, from the top of the "Look-out," he saw away on the horizon a vessel, which at that time of year, he knew was a sealer; and thinking it might be the one on which his chum Brown was, all the way home he thought so much about him that he drove all the partridges to wing, before he became conscious of their presence.

That night, in his dreams, he saw a sealing vessel anchored off Trouty. He saw a boat lowered from the davits, and one of the three men who got into the boat was Charles Brown. He saw the men leave the vessel, and row to Green Island Cove, where they pulled up the boat and walked over the South Side hills to John Doherty's on the South Side. He saw them get into a punt at Doherty's and row across to Samuel Pittman's, on Hog's Nose; and then he saw them walk down the road towards their homes. This road took them not far from Smith's house, and just as Smith woke up and looked out of the window—there in his line of vision was Charles Brown passing old John Murphy's house. Just as Smith expected, as soon as Brown had reported himself at home, and had washed, he came up to see him. Smith, of course, told him what he had seen in his dream; and Brown said it was absolutely true in every detail. The vessel could not get into Trinity owing to the ice-pack in the Narrows, so they anchored off Trouty, and he and two other men got permission to come on shore. They came exactly by the route that Smith had seen them come. Surely in this we have the existence of a human radio-telegraph, the motive of which was the electricity of a mutual love on the part of two men—"passing the love of women." Next!

INFORMATION FOR ENQUIRERS RE HANNAH GAYLOR.

Hannah Newell Newhook was born in 1862. She was a daughter of Chas. and Catherine Newhook; and a sister of Mrs. (Capt.) George Field, Bonaventure. She married Thomas Gaylor, Jr., of Bonavista in 1886. She was a widow for several years, and she died at the home of the Newhooks at Long Point (Trinity East) in 1867. Thomas Gaylor, Jr., was a son of old Captain Thomas Gaylor of Bonavista, who was well known in Trinity during the years of his sea-service; and widow Gaylor had many friends in Trinity.

ANCIENT AND MODERN.

"The great eye of heaven shined bright, and made a sunshine in a shady place."

I have often wondered why the office-building and stores in connection with so many of our old business premises were so dark, and otherwise so badly arranged for the book-keepers' convenience and comfort. It was so with the office at Garlands, and even more so with that at Glades in Trinity. It is the same to-day as others that I know of in other parts of the country and which have not been changed since they were built a hundred or more years ago. Those who used those dark buildings day after day, and year after year, did not love the darkness "because their deeds were evil." On the contrary, there were times when they must have bled it intensely; though years of use adapted the eye to its unnecessary surroundings; and the officials were more or less conservative in respect of the old-timers' plans. I remember some fifty years ago going into the office of Garlands, in Trinity, in the Brookings time, and feeling sorry for those who were working there in the semi-darkness; and the conditions that always exist in a room where the direct rays of the sun never penetrate; and the only view from a north-west window is the barren side of a hill towering above the building. I have no doubt that those who had worked there for years would not have thanked me for either my pity or my sympathy for them; yet it had a real existence, and it was always good to get outside again in God's sunlight, which they might have had so easily and so abundantly inside as outside. I was glad to see Mr. Ryan's carpenter at work a few weeks ago putting a window in the south wall of this office, as I anticipated what a change it would make to the inside of it. I waited till it was finished and then took advantage of the first oppor-

tunity to call at the office. The changes that that window has made, and made possible, exceeded my anticipations; and those who like myself, knew it in its former condition should go at once and see it as it is to-day.

"Truly the light is sweet, and a pleasant thing it is to behold the sun." Especially in an office.

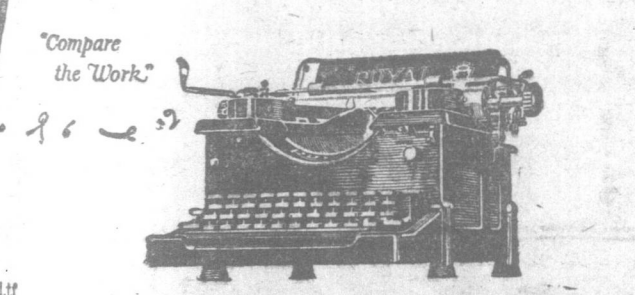

Meat Inspection Urgently Needed

NECESSITY FOR CLEAN MEAT AND THOROUGH EXAMINATION, DOCTOR SAYS.

A suggestion that a meat inspector be appointed for St. Anne de Bellevue, was made by Dr. A. G. Hood, of the Montreal Health Department in an address on "Meat Inspection," delivered before a crowded meeting of women held under the auspices of the Women's Club of St. Anne de Bellevue in the Town Hall. The Mayor, L. J. Boileau, was in the chair, and those present included Georges Charrier, Dr. Kelso, Dr. Guenette, F. J. Harfell and other leading citizens.

Dr. Hood emphasized the necessity of clean meat and thorough inspection in view of the prevalence of tuberculosis in cattle. When this disease was discovered in animals, three inspectors were appointed for the entire city of Montreal, and until a very short time ago meat coming in from distant points was not inspected at all. At the present time it was inspected as soon as it arrived, whether by boat, train or other conveyance and there was also a by-law whereby shippers were not allowed to ship dressed meats of any kind unless it bore the Government stamp.

The speaker described the development of tuberculosis in cattle. It first manifested itself, he said, as a small abscess in the neck, throat, lungs or other part of the animal. This abscess developed quickly. Other diseases found in cattle were pneumonia and inflammation of the heart. In this connection Dr. Hood instanced an animal which, on being killed, was found to have an enlarged heart as big as a milking pail. This had come about as the result of the swallowing an eight-inch nail by the animal. The nail gradually worked its way to the heart.

DISEASE VERY INFECTIOUS.
As an example of the havoc wrought by meat of tubercular animals Dr. Hood cited the case of a herd of cattle belonging to a well known farmer. Dr. Hood was called to the farmer's residence to see a sick animal. It was ordered to be slaughtered and the farmer was advised to have the whole herd tested. This was done and the whole of the twenty-four animals were found to be affected. The leader of the stock, a well known bull weighed, when dressed, 900 pounds and his whole carcass was covered from one end to the other

Strange Things Our Eyes Collect

There are few people who have never experienced the pain or discomfort that comes of getting dust particles or other foreign bodies in the eyes. Fever still, it is safe to say, realize the true source of some of these irritating obstructions. Tell the average person that it is possible to collect in the eye the dust of a falling star and you will probably be disbelieved. Yet microscopic examination has shown this to be a fact. When a meteor reaches our atmosphere it discharges heavy vapours, which condense into myriads of minute particles, any one of which may lodge in the eye that is gazing skyward.
Volcanic eruption may cause discomfort in a similar fashion. Lava flowing from an active crater gives off clouds of vapor containing microscopic particles that make their way round the world in the upper air currents, ultimately to fall in showers upon the earth, where wide-open eyes may easily collect them.
Again, the great deserts contribute largely to the number of foreign bodies gathered in this way. Sandstorms do not cease from troubling immediately they subside. Their particles are borne by the winds the world over, many of them finding lodgment in our eyes, as the microscope has repeatedly proved.
Pollen from the big pine forests of Canada may affect us in like manner, while an even more strange, though not less potent, cause of this special form of irritation is the scales of butterflies' wings, shed as a rule during the first flights after emerging from the pupa.
The sources and variety of things gathered in the eyes during a nominal lifetime are, in fact, amazing, and form an astounding commentary on the disintegrating forces unceasingly at work in the universe.

Massacre Seen as End of Man

BY FAMOUS SCIENTIST.
Sir Oliver Lodge Sounds Warning in Brighton Address.

Mutual extermination may be the destiny of man if he will it so. It is for mankind to decide.

Sir Oliver Lodge, the famous scientist, made this pronouncement in an address to the National Free Church Council at Brighton.

"The average man," he continued, "has not progressed far as yet. While his ancestors were tree dwellers and cave dwellers, he might be described as a slum dweller. But still humanity is far better than one would expect from its superficial aspect and sordid surroundings.

"Many of the animal instincts remain and are strong. The fighting instinct, for instance, is prominent, and has blossomed into irrational forms which inflict untold misery.

Future Wars.
"It would seem how as if it might be regarded as a step in advance to wage war mainly by machinery, guiding tanks and submarines and aeroplanes from a distance without human bodies inside, so that they can be laden wholly with high explosives, poison gas, and disease germs, and this is what we shall come to if humanity is not discovered.

"Massacre is not fighting, and it is massacre towards which humanity is now again tending. The original fighting instinct has been prostituted and degraded by the apparent advance in civilization. Every advance in knowledge and power can be prostituted to vile ends. The conditions have grown so fearful in prospect that there must surely be a revolt against them.

"Happiness is not so super-abundant on this planet that we can afford to spend our energies in damaging and hurting each other. The evil is a disease of civilization, a mania which has accompanied material progress."

The Prince's Fall

"As the heir to a not unimportant throne the Prince will really have to ask himself whether he can continue to take nasty tumbles over the sticks or in the hunting field and yet show a proper regard for the responsibilities that he is heir to."

Vaccine for Epilepsy

IMPORTANT DISCOVERY IN MODE OF TREATMENT.

Satisfactory results, it is claimed, have been achieved in the treatment of epilepsy by an important discovery. The discoverer of the treatment is a former student of King's College, London. He received much encouragement and advice during the stages of his experimentation from Professor R. Thayer Hewlett, professor of bacteriology at the college. Giving some account of the discovery, the professor stated: "It is a vaccine treatment, the patient providing, as it were, his own antidote. The vaccine is injected at weekly intervals. A limited number of cases have been under test, about 15 all told, during the last two or three years. The results have been most encouraging, but the number of cases treated and the length of time devoted to the tests would not as yet justify any far-reaching claims for the treatment. One difficulty that has not been surmounted is the small number of the patients that the experimenters have been able to treat. Doctors are naturally cautious about allowing their patients to submit to new forms of treatment that are admittedly in the experimental stage." The deaths from epilepsy total between 2,000 and 3,000 every year, according to official statistics, and among males the highest total is recorded between the ages of 15 and 25. Among women the highest total deaths recorded occur between the ages of 25 and 35.

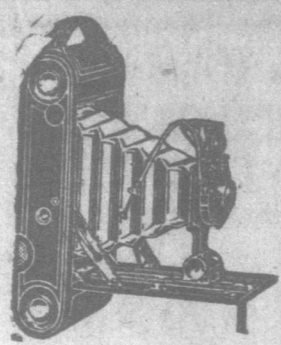

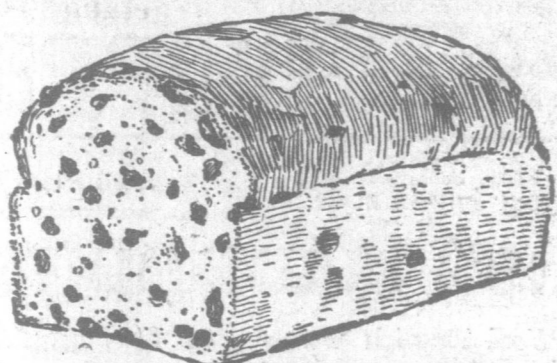

Why is Prince so Often in Berlin?

DENTIST, HIS FRIENDS SAY—MAY BE POLITICS.

BERLIN, April 7.—Former Crown Prince Frederick William is a great sufferer from toothache, judging by the explanations his friends make of his frequent automobile trips from Cels, where he has his castle, to Berlin and Potsdam. His friends say he always comes in to see his dentist, although Berlin has become so accustomed to his visits that explanations of them are not as necessary as they were after his return from Holland when the Government explained that Frederick William would live at Cels Castle and not take part in politics. Since then there has been a swing to the political right and Foreign Minister Stresemann and his associates are compelled to make fewer apologies for permitting the former Crown Prince to return, which apparently was designed to checkmate attempts by the Bavarians to place former Crown Prince Rupprecht on the German throne.

There no longer are any plaintive stories in the monarchist newspapers about the poverty of the former Crown Prince and there are no indications of the existence of want around Cels castle. There automobiles are abundant and many new thoroughbred riding horses, recently purchased at Potsdam, have been installed. Those give the impression that Frederick William is not earning his living as a dirt farmer.

Freezing a Pit

Many people are familiar with refrigeration in some form or another; for instance, in its use in cold storages for foreign meat and for the manufacture of ice-cream.

Few, however, are aware of the assistance it renders to the mining engineer who is faced with the problem of sinking a shaft at a new colliery from the surface to the coal seams lying at a great depth.

When the ground is dry it is a comparatively simple operation, but the real difficulties appear when water-bearing sands are encountered.

At a colliery in Durham a pit was sunk some years ago where the freezing process was not employed, and in consequence the pumping machinery actually raised 15,000 gallons of water, weighing 6 tons, every minute in order to keep the pit bottom clear for the sinkers to work.

At a neighbouring colliery a different plan was followed. Instead of the workmen having to labour under a constant stream of water, the entire mass of water-bearing sand was frozen into a solid rock-like substance and high explosives had to be employed by the excavators.

At suitable distances apart in the circumference of the pit boring tubes were forced through the watered sand until they became embedded in the hard rock below. The sand was then cleared from these tubes and down each of them a freezing pipe was lowered to the bottom.

In order to allow the water-bearing sand to be in actual contact with these pipes the boring tubes were withdrawn. The freezing pipes consisted of inner and outer pipes, the inner ones being coupled to the outlet of the refrigerating plant, down which the brine or cooling mixture was forced to the full depth of the sand deposit.

The brine returned by way of the closed bottom outer pipe to the refrigerating plant again, carrying with it a certain amount of heat from the earth.

After a few days this constant transference of heat caused cylinders of frozen sand to form round each pipe until finally they joined up and made a hard wall round the shaft and effectively barred off the water, so that sinking could be carried on without pumping.

When the sinkers reached the hard rock a permanent cast-iron water-tight lining was placed in the new shaft, and after being made secure the ground was thawed by passing steam down the pipes, which were then easily withdrawn for use elsewhere.

Two Cleaning Hints

Pewter that has become dull may be brightened in this way: Squeeze out most of the juice from half a lemon and then dip this into the dust which has been sifted from cinders. Rub the metal briskly and then polish it with a soft chamois leather. When pewter has become very badly discoloured rub over the metal a cut onion on which a little pumice powder has been sprinkled.

Brass fittings and mounts on furniture are often difficult to clean because it is desired to avoid soiling the wood surrounding them. It will be found helpful to tie a little salt in a thick soft cloth and to moisten this slightly with vinegar and then to rub the brass with it. The metal should then be polished with a dry flannel dipped in fine wood ashes.

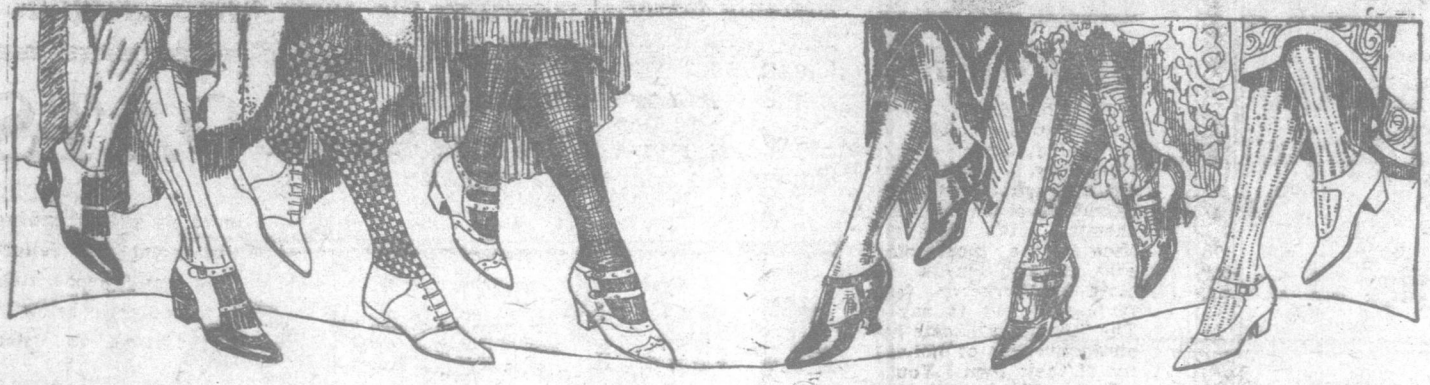
