### New Books.

Ocean to Ocean; Diary of a Journey from the Atlantic to the Pacific, by the Rev. George M. Grant, of Halifax, N.S. Toronto: James Campbell & Son.

This is the record of a journey from the Atlantic to the Pacific by the Secretary attached to the Expedition of Mr. Sandford Fleming, the Engineer-in-Chief of the Canada Pacific Railway. The narrative is given in the form of a diary, and commences with the departure of the Expedition, which was composed of the Engineer, a Doctor, Botanist, Secretary, Photographer, besides a number of assistants and servants. The author at the outset states that he makes no pretensions to fine writing, but aims to give a faithful and unvarnished record of the various incidents which befel the travellers in their long and diversified journey, and of the many little adventures which give a spice to the narrative. The book will be perused with great interest by travellers and by all who delight in travel and adventure, and who wish to become acquainted with our vast territories in the North-West—their climate, capabilities, resources, scenery and geographical and geological features. From the first start, on the 1st of July, from Halifax, till the 11th of October, when the Expedition reached its farthest point of visit in British Columbia, 5,314 miles were traversed, 457 being by railway (to Collingwood); 1,687 by steamer; 485 by canoe; and 2,185 by horses, including wagon, pack and saddle horses.

The Pacific Railway and the  
Canadian Loan Guarantee Bill.

Late intelligence from England  
confirms the report already circu-  
lated, that the efforts of Sir Hugh Al-  
lan to raise money among the English  
capitalists for the construction of the  
Canadian Pacific Railway have ended  
in utter failure. All the great finan-  
cial houses gave the scheme the cold  
shoulder. The charter was objected  
to, and people laughed at the idea of  
the road being built in ten years.  
Objection was also taken to the pro-  
posal to start the road from a point  
near Lake Nipissing, and to run  
through the country north of Lake  
Superior. Nearly every one who  
gave an opinion said the road should  
start from a point at or near Toron-  
to. Others again thought the capi-  
tal of the Company too small, and  
that the Canadian promoters of it  
should have shown their confidence  
in the scheme by subscribing more  
largely than they had done. Great  
surprise was also expressed at the  
extraordinary powers granted by the  
Government, and the fears of many  
in the soundness of the enterprise  
were aroused by the charges which  
Mr. Huntington preferred against  
Sir John A. Macdonald and his col-  
leagues. And to crown all, the pov-  
erful influence of the Grand Trunk  
stockholders in London was exercis-  
ed to defeat Sir Hugh Allan, and  
they have succeeded.

The bill authorizing the Imperial  
Government to guarantee the pay-  
ment of a loan to be raised by the  
Canadian Government for the con-  
struction of the Pacific Railway, en-  
largement of the canal and to repeal  
the Canada Defence Loan Act has  
been introduced in the House of  
Commons. It recites that the Gov-  
ernment of Canada propose to raise  
a loan not exceeding eight million  
pounds for the above purposes; that  
the Imperial Government be autho-  
rized to guarantee a portion of the  
loan, the amount so guaranteed not  
to exceed three million six hundred  
thousand pounds, the rate of interest  
not to exceed four per cent; that  
the Government of Canada be re-  
quired to form a sinking fund at the  
rate of one per cent, per annum on  
the entire amount of loan guaranteed  
by the Imperial Treasury. The re-  
maining clauses of the bill refer to  
the mode of payment and invest-  
ment of the sinking fund and in-  
terest, and for securing the re-pay-  
ment of such sums as may be ad-  
vanced by the Imperial Government.

A Halifax special says that it will  
take the greater part of the summer  
to recover the entire cargo of the  
Atlantic.

The Ottawa Citizen gives circulation  
to the rumor that Mr. Macdonald, of  
Pictou, will fill the vacancy in the  
Cabinet made by Mr. Howe's retire-  
ment. He will not, however, take  
his seat, until after the Pacific Rail-  
way Committee has reported.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—We have  
received a despatch, stating that the  
Prince Edward Island Legislature on  
Monday, unanimously passed resolu-  
tions accepting the terms offered that  
Province on entering the Union.  
The only other British North Ameri-  
can Province not in the Canadian  
Confederation, is Newfoundland.

DESPATCH FROM PARIS says the  
new French Government has resolv-  
ed to adopt a free trade policy, and  
also to reduce the military expendi-  
tures. M. Thiers will resume his lit-  
erary labors. A despatch from Ber-  
lin says the prevalent opinion in the  
German Capital is that President  
McMahon will prove a counterpart of  
General Monck, the restorer of the  
house of Stuart to the English throne,  
and that his election heralds the legi-  
timate restoration in France.

FAREWELL SERMON AND PRESENTATION.  
—Last Sabbath the Rev. R. Acherson of  
the U. F. Church, Galt, preached his  
farewell sermon, from 2 Cor. vi. 2,—"Be-  
hold now is the day of salvation."  
There was a large attendance, including  
besides the members of his own con-  
gregation, a large number from other  
churches. On Tuesday a farewell pray-  
er meeting was held in the church, and was  
followed by the presentation to Mr. Ach-  
erson of an address, and a purse contain-  
ing the handsome sum of \$150. Mr.  
Acherson made a feeling reply, and added  
a few affectionate words of farewell.  
After singing the 139th Psalm, the Rev.  
Mr. Fortens offered up prayer and the  
meeting dispersed.
