ATTEMPTED SUICIDE. an Old Man Eighty Years Old Fires a Barn and

Tries to End His Life.

JARVIS, Ont., Nov. 10.—Andrew Ward, JARVIS, Ont., Nov. 10.—Andrew Ward, an old man 80 years of age, has been living for a year past with James Ross, his nephew, a farmer, residing two miles from this village. At a division court, held here yesterday, the old man sued Ross for wages which he claimed for work during the past year. His claim was not sustained. About 10 o'clock last night one of Ross's barns was destroyed by fire, together with the contents. After the fire Ross in company with two young men while passing the stables heard a strange noise, and upon opening the doors a horrible signt presented itself. The old man stood near one of the stalls with a strap around his neck, the end of which he had fastened to his cane and with this he was twisting and tightening the strap evidently endeavouring to take his own life. His throat was cut and his face fearfully swollen. Ross and the two young men who found him took the strap trouble. throat was cut and his face fearfully swollen. Ross and the two young men who found him took the strap from his neck when he staggered to the ground in an almost helpless condition. A jackknife covered with blood was found in one of his pockets, and no doubt this was the instrument with which he had attempted to cut his throat. The wound is about two inches in length but not deep. He is generally suspected of having set fire to the barn, but makes a positive denial of having done so. He admits having been in the burn that evening, and says he drove some cows out, fastened the doors, and came away. Ross had no insurance on the burn nor contents. It contained nearly his whole crop of grain. The loss is estimated at about \$1000.
