As some misapprehension exists regarding the casket and case in which were placed the remains of the late Archbishop Lynch, having been alleged that the casket was sup-plied from New York, The World gives the following authentic particulars. Messrs. Ward & Evel, undertakers' furnish order for which was taken by Mr. L. C. Hawkey, manager of the Toronto branch of the firm. 32 Front-street west. It was a splendid piace of workmanship; manufactured out of sold red cedar, covered with rich black broadcloth and drapery, with combination of silk and velvet fringe and metallic inside. The handles were long extension woven silk bars with beavy silver attachments. It was richly upholstered inside with white satin, the lid being hinged. The outside case which contained the casket when taken to the grave was of highly polished solid oak, with silver corners, lined with purple plush. The casket and case were the first of the kind ever used in Toronto.
