WHAT THE EXPOSE MEANS.

THE WORLD HAS BROKEN UP THE TYRANNY OF THE BOARD.

This Paper Has Not Treated the Matter as a Party Question—How the Reform, if Extended, Will Affect the Grocery Trade of the Town.

There are two great and broad charges that the World has made and substantiated by abundance of proof, and to make the same clear to every man in the country all we ask is a tribunal wherefore to lay any amount of testimony.

The Globe has not attempted to deny these charges. The Mail by its silence admits them to be true, and The Telegram and News, two evening papers well posted in what goes on in the city, have declared that the World's charges are true.

Chairman Armstrong of the License Commission does not declare them to be untrue, all he does is to summon the editor of the World into court, where on a charge of criminal libel he will carry out the duty of the trial of the World's charges.

There is one good thing to be noted: the tyranny of David, Robert and Jeffrey is a thing of the past. The World has shown more attention to their duty to the people and less to their party. And not for some time will the party spirit be so active in the party collections from hotel men, neither will commissioners care to have as their support the party spirit of the Reform Club.
