LORDS TRY TO COMPROMISE

ouncils Not Compelled To Meet in Taverns - Other Minor Questions

Agreed Upon-Radicals Aver That the Peers Have Acknowledged Their Defeat-Bill Sent Back To the Commons. LONDON, Feb. 23.—The House of Lords to-day resumed consideration of the Parish

The Duke of Devonshire urged that before attempting to go into the details of the measure with a view of amending it their lordships shall consider the general position. He claimed that their lordships had done their duty in making the amendments they thought desirable, but how far they should nsist on going in that direction must, in his judgment, be determined more on the grounds of expediency than upon principle. They could not, however, leave out of account the fact that the bill had been accepted by a large majority of the people.

Lord Salisbury thought it was possible to interpret the canons of conduct laid down by the Duke of Devonshire in a manner absolutely depriving the peers of the power of amending any bill that might be sent to them. Still he did not differ in the main from the drift of the Duke's advice. He agreed that many of the amend. the main from the drift of the Duke's advice. He agreed that many of the amendments that had been made, though they improved the bill, did not involve any question of principle. He could not, however, admit that all of the amendments which the House of Commons had restored to the bill should be accepted. It was especially the duty of the House of lords to see that the interests of the peers were not sacrificed, as they would be under the provisions of the bill as it passed the House of Commons. The tribunal to which the provis on for compulsory allotments was referred must carefully consider another question of vital importance—the control of charities. These the Lords must safeguard. [Cries of Hear, hear.]

He estimated that at least 500 cords of firewood could be thus taken out, with great

firewood could be thus taken out, with great advantage to the park, at a cost of not more than three or four hundred dollars. WINCHESTERS FOR THE A.P.A. Sixty Rifles Bought by Council 2, Disclosed by a Suit in Toledo,

Toledo, O., Feb. 23.-A. J. Rummel brought suit yesterday for \$138.40 as balance on a contract for a lot of rifles sent to Council No. 2 of the American Protective

The suit was directly against W.J.Ostrander, a wholesale dealer in second-hand goods, who swore-that he was appointed by goods, who swotes have the was appointed by a committee of five, which was appointed by Council No. 2, to investigate the various brands of rifles and to contract for 60 of The committee went with him on several trips of investigation, and decided to buy 60 Winchesters, and Ostrander bought them. The guns were stored in his build-ing and handed out to members of the A.P.A. on orders. The members of the committee were reluctant to admit this. They said their defence was that the council had not ordered Ostrander to buy the guns, although all of the contract price, \$731, save that for which suit was brought, had been paid. One member of the committee was Police Commissioner Doville, who said he had taken two of the rifles, and they were now at his house. Other persons admitted having the guns in their houses ready for any use they might need to make of them. Judgment was rendered for the plaintiff in the full amount claimed.


